## GR 23 Rule for Certifying Professional Guardians

- (a) <u>Purpose and Scope</u>. This rule establishes the standards and criteria for the certification of professional guardians as defined by RCW 11.88.008 and prescribes the conditions of and limitations upon their activities. This rule does not duplicate the statutory process by which the courts supervise guardians nor is it a mechanism to appeal a court decision regarding the appointment or conduct of a guardian.
- **(b)** <u>Jurisdiction</u>. All professional guardians who practice in the state of Washington are subject to these rules and regulations. Jurisdiction shall continue whether or not the professional guardian retains certification under this rule, and regardless of the professional guardian's residence.

#### (c) Certified Professional Guardian Board.

- (1) Establishment.
- (i) Membership. The Supreme Court shall appoint a Certified Professional Guardian Board ("Board") of 12 or more members. The Board shall include representatives from the following areas of expertise: professional guardians; attorneys; guardianship advocates for incapacitated persons; courts; state agencies; and those employed in medical, social, health, financial, or other fields pertinent to guardianships. No more than one-third of the Board membership shall be practicing professional guardians.
- (ii) Terms. The term for a member of the Board shall be three years. No member may serve more than three consecutive full three-year terms, not to exceed nine consecutive years, including any unfilled term. Terms shall be established such that one-third shall end each year. All terms of office begin October 1 and end September 30 or when a successor has been appointed, whichever occurs later.
- (iii) Leadership. The Supreme Court shall designate the Chair of the Board. The Board shall designate the Vice-Chair, who shall serve in the absence of or at the request of the Chair.
- (iv) Vacancies. Any vacancy occurring in the terms of office of Board members shall be filled for the unexpired term.
  - (2) Duties and Powers.
- (i) Applications. The Board shall process applications for professional guardian certification under this rule. The

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Board may delay or deny certification if an applicant fails to provide required basic or supplemental information.

- (ii) Standards of Practice. The Board shall adopt and implement policies or regulations setting forth minimum standards of practice which professional guardians shall meet
- (iii) Training Program. The Board shall adopt and implement regulations establishing a professional guardian training program.
- (iv) Examination. The Board may adopt and implement regulations governing the preparation and administration of certification examinations.
- (v) Recommendation of Certification. The Board may recommend certification to the Supreme Court. The Supreme Court shall review the Board's recommendation and enter an appropriate order.
- (vi) Denial of Certification. The Board may deny certification. If the Board denies certification, it shall notify an applicant in writing of the basis for denial of certification and inform the applicant of the appeal process.
- (vii) Continuing Education. The Board may adopt and implement regulations for continuing education.
- (viii) Grievances and Disciplineary Sanctions. The Board shall adopt and implement procedures to review any allegation that a professional guardian has violated an applicable statute, fiduciary duty, standard of practice, rule, or regulation, or other requirement governing the conduct of professional guardians authority. The Board may take disciplinary action and impose disciplinary sanctions based on upon a findings that establish a of violation of an applicable statute, duty, standard of practice, rule, regulation or other requirement governing the conduct of professional guardians. Sanctions may include decertification or lesser remedies or actions designed to ensure compliance with duties, standards, and requirements for professional guardians.
- (ix) Investigation. The Board may investigate to determine whether an applicant for certification meets the certification requirements established in this rule. The Board may also investigate to determine whether a professional guardian has violated any the statute, duty, standard of practice, rule, regulation, or other requirement statute governing the conduct of professional guardians.
- (x) Authority to Conduct Hearings. The Board may adopt regulations pertaining to the orderly conduct of hearings.
- a) Subpoenas. The Chair of the Board, Hearing Officer, or designated a party's attorney shall have the power to issue subpoenas.
- b) Orders. The Chair or Hearing Officer may make such pre-hearing or other orders as are necessary for the orderly conduct of any hearing.
- c) Enforcement. The Board may refer a Subpoena or order to the Supreme Court for enforcement.
- (xi) Confidentiality. Information in the Board's possession shall be disclosed upon request, except that the following information shall not be disclosed without a court order:
- a) Personal information, including, but not limited to, home address, financial information, medical information, or Social Security number;

- b) Records required by law, regulation, or court order to be confidential:
- e) Records of reviews or investigations by the Board which did not result in sanctions;
- d) Professional guardian examination questions, answers, or scores;
- e) Records of investigations shall remain confidential except for documents showing the results of the investigation where there has been an appeal; and
- f) Records of disciplinary actions shall remain confidential except all formal complaints and the process after filing the formal complaint shall be public.
- (xi) Disclosure of Records. The Board may adopt regulations pertaining to the disclosure of records in the Board's possession.
- (xii) Meetings. The Board shall hold meetings as determined to be necessary by the chair. Meetings of the Board will be open to the public except for executive session, s of the Board, and review panel, or and disciplinary meetings prior to filing of a formal disciplinary complaint.
- (xiii) Fees. The Board shall establish and collect fees in such amounts as are necessary to earry out support the duties and responsibilities of the Board.
- (3) Board Expenses. Board members shall not be compensated for their services. Consistent with the Office of Financial Management rules, Board members shall be reimbursed for actual and necessary expenses incurred in the performance of their duties. All expenses shall be paid pursuant to a budget submitted to and approved by the Supreme Court. Funds accumulated from examination fees, annual fees, and other revenues shall be used to defray Board expenses.
- (4) Agency. Hearing officers are agents of the Board and are accorded rights of such agency.
- (5) (xiv) Immunity from Liability. No eause of action against the Board, its members, or agents, including hearing officers appointed by the Board or its Chair, shall accrue in favor of a professional guardian or any other person arising from any act taken pursuant to this rule, provided that the Board or individual acted in good faith. The burden of proving that the acts were not taken were not in good faith shall be on the party so asserting it. The Board, its members, or agents, including duly appointed hearing officers, shall enjoy quasi-judicial immunity if the Supreme Court would have immunity in performing the same functions.
- (6) Conflict of Interest. A Board member should disqualify himself or herself from making any decisions in a proceeding in which his or her impartiality might reasonably be questioned, including but not limited to, when the Board member has a personal bias or prejudice concerning a party or personal knowledge of disputed evidentiary facts concerning the proceeding.
- (7) Leave of Absence. The Board may adopt regulations specifying that a Board member who is the subject of a disciplinary investigation by the Board must take a leave of absence from the Board. A Board member may not continue to serve as a member of the Board if the Board or Supreme Court has imposed a final disciplinary sanction on the Board member.
- (8) Administration. The Administrative Office of the Courts (AOC) Office of the Administrator for the Courts

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- (OAC) shall provide administrative support to the Board and may contract with agencies or organizations to carry out the Board's administrative functions.
- (d) <u>Certification Requirements</u>. Applicants, Certified Professional Guardians, and Certified Agencies shall comply with the provisions of Chapter 11.88 and 11.92 RCW. In addition, individuals and agencies must meet the following requirements.
- (1) Individual Certification. The following requirements apply to applicants and do not apply to currently certified professional guardians, except as stated in subsection (d)(1)(vii). An individual applicant shall:
  - (i) Be at least 18 years of age;
  - (ii) Be of sound mind;
- (iii) Have no felony or misdemeanor convictions involving moral <u>turpitude</u>;
- (iv) Possess an high school diploma or equivalency (GED) associate's degree from an accredited institution and at least four five full years' experience working in a discipline pertinent to the provision of guardianship services, such as legal, financial, social service, or health care; or an associate of Arts degree and three years experience working in a discipline pertinent to the provision of guardianship services, such as legal, financial, social service, or health care; or a Bachelor of Arts baccalaureate degree from an accredited institution and at least two one full years' of experience working in a discipline pertinent to the provision of guardianship services, such as legal, financial, social service, or health care; and:
- (v) The experience required by this rule must include decision-making or the use of independent judgment on behalf of others in the area of legal, financial, social services or healthcare or other disciplines pertinent to the provision of guardianship services;
- $(v_i)$  Have completed the mandatory certification training.
- (vii) Applicants enrolled in the mandatory certification training on September 12, 2008, and who satisfactorily complete that training, shall meet the certification requirements existing on that date, or the date the applicant submitted a complete application for certification, whichever date is earlier, and not the requirements set forth in this rule.
- (2) Agency Certification. Agencies must meet the following additional requirements:
- (i) All officers and directors of the corporation must meet the qualifications of Chapter 11.88.020 RCW for guardians:
- (ii) Each agency shall have at least two (2) individuals in the agency certified as professional guardians, whose residence or principal place of business is in Washington State and who are so designated in minutes or a resolution from the Board of Directors; and
- (iii) Each agency shall file and maintain in every guardianship court file a current designation of each certified professional guardian with final decision-making authority for the incapacitated person or their estate.
- (3) Training Program and Examination. Applicants must satisfy the Board's training program and examination requirements.
- (4) Insurance Coverage. In addition to the bonding requirements of Chapter 11.88 RCW, applicants must be

- insured or bonded at all times in such amount as may be determined by the Board and shall notify the Board immediately of cancellation of required coverage.
- (5) Financial Responsibility. Applicants must provide proof of ability to respond to damages resulting from acts or omissions in the performance of services as a guardian. Proof of financial responsibility shall be in such form and in such amount as the Board may prescribe by regulation.
- (6) Application and <u>Under</u> Oath. Applicants must execute and file with the Board an approved application under oath.
- (7) <u>Application Fees</u>. Applicants must pay fees as the Board may require by regulation.
- (8) *Disclosure*. An applicant for certified professional guardian or certified agency shall disclose upon application:
- (i) The existence of a judgment against the applicant arising from the applicant's performance of services as a fiduciary;
- (ii) A court finding that the applicant has violated its duties as a fiduciary, or committed a felony or any crime involving moral turpitude;
- (iii) Any adjudication of the types specified in RCW 43.43.830, and RCW 43.43.842;
- (iv) Pending or final licensing or disciplinary board actions or findings of violations;
- (v) The existence of a judgment against the applicant within the preceding eight years in any civil action;
- (vi) Whether the applicant has filed for bankruptcy within the last seven years. Disclosure of a bankruptcy filing within the past seven years may require the applicant or guardian to provide a personal credit report from a recognized credit reporting bureau satisfactory to the Board;
- (vii) The existence of a judgment against the applicant or any corporation, partnership or limited liability corporation for which the applicant was a managing partner, controlling member or majority shareholder within the preceding eight years in any civil action.
- (89) Denial of Certification. The Board may deny certification of an individual or agency based on any of the following criteria:
- (i) Removal as guardian by a court order where Failure to satisfy certification requirements provided in section (d) of this rule;
- (a<u>ii</u>) The existence of a <u>j</u>-Judgment has been entered against the guardian applicant arising froms a result of the applicant's performance of services as a guardian fiduciary;
- (biii) There is a A court finding by the court that the guardian applicant has violated its fiduciary duties or committed malfeasance, nonfeasance, misfeasance, a felony or any crime involving of moral turpitude;
- (<u>iiiv</u>) Any adjudication of the types specified in RCW 43.43.830, and RCW 43.43.842;
- (iii) Finding by the court that the professional guardian has violated the guardian's duties to the incapacitated person or their estate; and
- (iv) Pending or final professional licensing or disciplinary board actions or findings of violations;
- (vi) A Board determination based on specific findings that the applicant lacks the requisite moral character or is otherwise unqualified to practice as a professional guardian;

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- (vii) A Board determination based on specific findings that the applicant's financial responsibility background is unsatisfactory.
- (10) Designation/Title. An individual certified under this rule may use the initials "CPG" following the individual's name to indicate status as "Certified Professional Guardian." An agency certified under this rule may indicate that it is a "Certified Professional Guardian Agency" by using the initials "CPGA" after its name. An individual or agency may not use the term "certified professional guardian" or "certified professional guardian agency" as part of a business name.

#### (e) Guardian Disclosure Requirements.

- (1) A Certified Professional Guardian or Certified Agency shall disclose to the Board in writing upon application within 30 days of occurrence and on a continuing basis:
  - (1) Removal as guardian by a court order where;
- (ai) The existence of a Jjudgment has been entered against the professional guardian arisings a result of from the professional guardian's performance of services as a guardian fiduciary;
- (bii) There is a A court finding by a court that the professional guardian violated its fiduciary duties, or has committed malfeasance, nonfeasance, misfeasance, a felony, or any crime of involving moral turpitude;
- (2iii) Any adjudication of the types specified in RCW 43.43.830, and RCW 43.43.842;
- (3) Finding by a court that the professional guardian has violated the guardian's duties to the incapacitated person or their estate:
- (4<u>iv</u>) Pending <u>or final professional</u> licensing or disciplinary <u>board</u> actions <u>related to fiduciary responsibilities</u> or <u>final licensing or disciplinary actions resulting in findings of violations;</u>
- $(5\underline{v})$  Residential or business moves or changes in employment; and
- (6vi) Names of Certified Professional Guardians they employ or who leave their employ.
- (2) Not later than June 30 of each year, each professional guardian and guardian agency shall complete and submit an annual disclosure statement providing information required by the Board.
- **(f) Regulations**. The Board shall adopt regulations to implement this rule.
- (g) Provisional Certification. The Board may adopt and implement regulations permitting provisional certification of professional guardians and the initial certification of successful applicants.
- (hg) Personal Identification Number. The Board shall establish an identification numbering system for professional guardians. The Personal Identification Number shall be included with the professional guardian's signature on documents filed with the court.
- (i) Expenses of the Board. Members of the Board shall not be compensated for their services. Consistent with the Office of Financial Management rules, Board members shall be reimbursed for their actual and necessary expenses incurred in the performance of their duties. All expenses shall be paid pursuant to a budget submitted to and approved by the Supreme Court. Funds accumulated from examination

- fees, annual fees, and other revenues shall be used to defray expenses of the Board.
- (j) Administration. The Office of the Administrator for the Courts (OAC) shall provide administrative support to the Board, and may contract with agencies or organizations to carry out the Board's administrative functions.
- (k) Title. An individual certified under this rule may use the initials "CPG" following the individual's name to indicate status as "Certified Professional Guardian." An agency certified under this rule may indicate that it is a "Certified Professional Guardian Agency" by using the initials "CPGA" after its name.
- (l) Existing Law Unchanged. This rule shall not expand, narrow, or otherwise affect existing law, including but not limited to. Title 11 RCW.

#### (mh) Ethics Advisory Opinions.

- (1) The Board may issue written ethics advisory opinions to inform and advise Certified Professional Guardians and Certified Agencies of their ethical obligations.
- (2) Any Certified Professional Guardian or Certified Agency may request in writing an ethical advisory opinion from the Board. Compliance with an opinion issued by the Board shall be considered as evidence of good faith in any subsequent disciplinary proceeding involving a Certified Professional Guardian or Certified Agency.
- (3) The Board shall publish opinions issued pursuant to this rule in electronic or paper format. The identity of the person requesting an opinion is confidential and not public information.
- (i) Existing Law Unchanged. This rule shall not expand, narrow, or otherwise affect existing law, including but not limited to, Title 11 RCW.

- **(b) Tutors.** A lawyer or judge may act as a tutor for only one law clerk at a time. To be eligible to act as a tutor in the law clerk program, a lawyer or judge shall:
- (1) Be an active member in good standing of the Bar Association, or be a judicial member who is currently elected or appointed to an elected position, provided that if a disciplinary sanction has been imposed upon the lawyer or judge within the 5 years immediately preceding approval of the law elerks clerk's application for enrollment, the Board of Governors shall have the discretion to accept or reject the lawyer or judge as tutor;
- (2) Have been actively and continuously engaged in the practice of law or have held the required judicial position for at least 10 years immediately preceding the filing of the law clerks application for enrollment; this may be a combination of active practice and judicial experience; and
- (3) Provide a tutors statement certifying to the law elerks clerk's employment and to the tutors eligibility, and agreeing to instruct and examine the law clerk in the curriculum prescribed by the Law Clerk Committee Board with the approval of the Board of Governors.
  - (c) Length of Study. [No change].
- (d) Course of Study. The subjects to be studied, the sequence in which they are to be studied, and any other matters pertaining thereto shall be as prescribed by the Law Clerk Committee Board with the approval of the Board of Governors
  - (e) Examinations. All law clerks shall:
- (1) Each month, complete a written examination prepared, administered, and graded by the tutor. The examination shall be answered without research, assistance, or reference to source materials during the examination;
- (2) Annually, or at such other intervals as may be established by the Law Clerk Committee Board, appear with the tutor before the Law Clerk Committee Board for an oral evaluation of the law clerks progress.
  - (f) Certificates. [No change].
- **(g) Termination.** The Board of Governors may direct a law clerk to change tutors, and may terminate the enrollment of law clerks or remove tutors from the program. - (g) Subpoenas. A lawyer member of the Committee Client Protection Board, or counsel for the Washington State Bar Association assigned to the Committee, shall have the power to issue subpoenas to compel the attendance of the lawyer being investigated or of a witness, or the production of books, or documents, or other evidence, at the taking of a deposition. A subpoena issued pursuant to this rule shall indicate on its face that the subpoena is issued in connection with an investigation under this rule. Subpoenas shall be served in the same manner as in civil cases in the superior court.
- **(h) Reports.** The Board of Governors, in consultation with the Committee Client Protection Board, shall file with the Supreme Court a full report on the activities and finances of the Fund at least annually and may make other reports to the court as necessary.
- (i) Communications to the Association: Communications to the Association, Board of Governors (Trustees), Committee Client Protection Board, Association staff, or any other individual acting under the authority of these rules, are absolutely privileged, and no lawsuit predicated thereon may be instituted against any applicant or other person providing information.

# WSBA WASHINGTON STATE BAR ASSOCIATION LAWYERS' FUND FOR CLIENT PROTECTION (APR 15) PROCEDURAL RULES

(Adopted by the Washington Supreme Court July 18, 1995; amended February 11, 1997; May 6, 1999; October 5, 2001; December 2, 2004; September 1, 2006; November 2, 2006)

RULE 1. PURPOSE [No change].

#### RULE 2. ESTABLISHMENT OF THE FUND [No change].

## RULE 3. LAWYERS' FUND FOR CLIENT PROTECTION $\frac{\text{COM-MITTEE}}{\text{BOARD}}$

- A. <u>Membership</u>. The Lawyers' Fund for Client Protection Committee Board shall consist of 11 lawyers and 2 non-lawyers appointed by the Trustees for terms not exceeding 3 years each.
- B. <u>Vacancies</u>. Vacancies on the <u>Committee Board</u> shall be filled by appointment of the Trustees.
- C. <u>Officers</u>. The Trustees shall appoint a chairperson of the <del>Committee</del> <u>Board</u> for a term of one-year or until a successor is appointed. The secretary of the <del>Committee</del> <u>Board</u> shall be a staff member of the WSBA assigned to the <del>Committee</del> <u>Board</u> by the Executive Director of the WSBA.

[51] Miscellaneous

- D. <u>Meetings</u>. The <u>Committee Board</u> shall meet not less than once per year upon call of the chairperson, or at the request of the staff member of the WSBA, who shall not be entitled to vote on <u>Committee Board</u> matters.
- E. <u>Quorum</u>. A majority of the <u>Committee Board</u> members, excluding the secretary, shall constitute a quorum.
- F. <u>Record of Meetings</u>. The secretary shall maintain minutes of the <u>Committee Board</u> deliberations and recommendations.
- G. <u>Authority and Duties of Committee Board</u>. The Committee Board shall have the power and authority to:
- (1) Consider claims for reimbursement of pecuniary loss and make a report and recommendation regarding payment or nonpayment on any claim to the Trustees.
- (2) Provide a full report of its activities annually to the Supreme Court and the Trustees and to make other reports and to publicize its activities as the Court or Trustees may deem advisable.

#### H. Conflict of Interest.

- (1) A <u>Committee Board</u> member who has or has had a lawyer/client relationship or financial relationship with an applicant or lawyer who is the subject of an application shall not participate in the investigation or deliberation of an application involving that applicant or lawyer.
- (2) A Committee Board member with a past or present relationship, other than that as provided in section (1), with an applicant or lawyer who is the subject of an application, shall disclose such relationship to the Committee Board and, if the Committee Board deems it appropriate, that member shall not participate in any action relating to that application.

#### **RULE 4. APPLICATIONS FOR PAYMENT**

- A. <u>Application Form</u>. All applications for payment through the Lawyers Fund for Client Protection shall be made by submitting an application on a form approved by the <u>Committee Board</u>, and shall include all information requested on the form.
- B. <u>Disciplinary Grievances</u>. Before an application for payment from the Fund will be considered, the applicant must also file a disciplinary grievance with the Office of Disciplinary Counsel, unless the lawyer is disbarred or deceased, or unless the <u>Committee Board</u> in its discretion finds that no disciplinary grievance is required.
- C. <u>Notice by Office of Disciplinary Counsel</u>. Any person who has filed a disciplinary grievance with the WSBA alleging a loss occasioned by the dishonest conduct of a lawyer should be provided with a Lawyers Fund for Client Protection application form and given information about the Fund.

#### **RULE 5. ELIGIBLE CLAIMS**

- A. <u>Eligibility</u>. To be eligible for payment from the Fund, the loss must be caused by the dishonest conduct of a lawyer or the failure to account for money or property entrusted to a lawyer in connection with the lawyer's practice of law, or while acting as a fiduciary in a matter related to the lawyer's practice of law.
- B. <u>Time Limitations</u>. Any application must be made within three years from the date on which discovery of the loss was made or reasonably should have been made by the applicant, and in no event more than three years from the date

- the lawyer dies, is disbarred, is disciplined for misappropriation of funds, or is criminally convicted for matters relating to the applicant's loss, provided that the <u>Committee Board</u> or Trustees in their discretion may waive any limitations period for excusable neglect or other good cause.
- C. <u>Dishonest Conduct</u>. As used in these rules, "dishonest conduct" or "dishonesty" means wrongful acts committed by a lawyer in the nature of theft or embezzlement of money or the wrongful taking or conversion of money, property or other thing of value, including but not limited to refusal to refund unearned fees or expenses as required the Rules of Professional Conduct.
- D. <u>Excluded Losses</u>. Except as provided by Section E of this Rule, the following losses shall not be reimbursable:
- (1) Losses incurred by partners and associates of the lawyer causing the loss;
- (2) Losses covered by any bond, surety agreement, or insurance contract to the extent covered thereby, including any loss to which any bonding agent, surety, or insurer is subrogated, to the extent of that subrogated interest;
- (3) Losses incurred by any financial institution which are recoverable under a "banker's blanket bond" or similar commonly available insurance or surety contract;
- (4) Losses incurred by any business entity controlled by the lawyer or any person or entity described in Rule 5 D (1), (2) or (3);
- (5) Losses incurred by any governmental entity or agency.
- (6) Consequential damages, such as lost interest, or attorney's fees or other costs incurred in seeking recovery of a loss.
- E. <u>Special and Unusual Circumstances</u>. In cases of special and unusual circumstances, the <u>Committee Board</u> may, in its discretion, consider an application which would otherwise be excluded by reason of the procedural requirements of these rules.
- F. <u>Unjust Enrichment</u>. In cases where it appears that there will be unjust enrichment, or that the applicant contributed to the loss, the <u>Committee Board</u> may, in its discretion, recommend the denial of the application.
- G. Exhaustion of Remedies. The Committee Board may consider whether an applicant has made reasonable attempts to seek reimbursement of a loss before taking action on an application. This may include, but is not limited to, the following:
  - (1) Filing a claim with an appropriate insurance carrier;
  - (2) Filing a claim on a bond, when appropriate;
- (3) Filing a claim with any and all banks which honored a financial instrument with a forged endorsement;
- (4) As a prelude to possible suit under part (5) below, demanding payment from any business associate or employer who may be liable for the actions of the dishonest lawyer; or
- (5) Commencing appropriate legal action against the lawyer or against any other party or entity who may be liable for the applicant's loss.

#### **RULE 6. PROCEDURES**

A. <u>Ineligibility</u>. Whenever it appears that an application is not eligible for reimbursement pursuant to Rule 5, the applicant shall be advised of the reasons why the application may not be eligible for reimbursement.

Miscellaneous [52]

- B. <u>Investigation and Report</u>. The WSBA staff member assigned to the <u>Committee Board</u> shall conduct an investigation regarding any application. The investigation may be coordinated with any disciplinary investigation regarding the lawyer. The staff member shall report to the <u>Committee Board</u> and make a recommendation to the <u>Committee Board</u>.
- C. <u>Notification of Lawyer</u>. The lawyer, or his or her representative, regarding whom an application is made shall be notified of the application and provided a copy of it, and shall be requested to respond within 20 days. If the lawyer's address of record on file with the WSBA is not current, then a copy of the application should be sent to the lawyer at any other address on file with the WSBA. A copy of these Rules shall be provided to the lawyer or representative.
- D. <u>Testimony</u>. The <u>Committee Board</u> may request that testimony be presented to complete the record. Upon request, the lawyer or applicant, or their representatives, may be given an opportunity to be heard at the discretion of the <u>Committee</u> Board.
- E. <u>Finding of Dishonest Conduct</u>. The <u>Committee Board</u> may make a finding of dishonest conduct for purposes of considering an application. Such a determination is not a finding of dishonest conduct for purposes of professional discipline.
- F. Evidence and Burden of Proof. Consideration of an application need not be conducted according to technical rules relating to evidence, procedure and witnesses. Any relevant evidence shall be admitted if it is the sort of evidence commonly accepted by reasonably prudent persons in the conduct of their affairs. The applicant shall have the burden of establishing eligibility for reimbursement by a clear preponderance of the evidence.
- G. <u>Pending Disciplinary Proceedings</u>. Unless the <del>Committee Board</del> or Trustees otherwise direct, no application shall be acted upon during the pendency of a disciplinary proceeding or investigation involving the same act or conduct that is alleged in the claim.
- H. <u>Public Participation</u>. Public participation at <u>Committee Board</u> meetings shall be permitted only by prior permission granted by the <u>Committee Board</u> chairperson.
- I. Committee Board Action. (1) Actions of the Committee Board Which Are Final Decisions: A decision by the Committee Board on an application for payment of \$25,000 or less whether such decision be to make payment, to deny payment, to defer consideration, or for any action other than payment of more than \$25,000 shall be final and without right of appeal to the Trustees.
- (2) Actions of the Committee Board Which Are Recommendations to the Trustees: A decision by the Committee Board (a) on an application for more than \$25,000, or (b) involving a payment of more than \$25,000 (regardless of the amount stated in the application), is not final and is a recommendation to the Trustees which shall have sole authority for final decisions in such cases.

#### RULE 7. ADJUDICATION BY TRUSTEES

A. A recommendation by the Committee Board (a) concerning applications for more than \$25,000, or (b) that payments of more than \$25,000 be made to applicants regarding any one lawyer, shall be reported to the Trustees which may, in its discretion, adopt, modify, disapprove or take any other

appropriate action on the Committee's Board's recommendation

B. A decision of the Trustees shall be final and there shall be no right of appeal from that decision.

#### RULE 8. NOTIFICATION OF APPLICANT AND LAWYER

Both the applicant and the lawyer who is the subject of an application shall be advised of any decision of the Committee Board or the Trustees.

RULE 9. LIMITATIONS ON AMOUNT OF REIMBURSEMENT [No change].

RULE 10. NO LEGAL RIGHT TO PAYMENT [No change].

RULE 11. RESTITUTION AND SUBROGATION [No change].

**RULE 12. COMPENSATION FOR REPRESENTING APPLICANTS** [No change].

#### **RULE 13. CONFIDENTIALITY**

- A. <u>Matters Which Are Public</u>. The facts and circumstances which generated the loss, the <del>Committee's Board's findings of fact and recommendations to the Trustees with respect to payment of a claim, the amount of claim, the amount of loss as determined by the <del>Committee Board, and the amount of payment authorized and made, shall be public.</del> After payment is authorized, the name of the lawyer causing the loss shall be public.</del>
- B. <u>Matters Which Are Not Public</u>. The <u>Committee's Board's</u> investigation and deliberations of any application; the name of the applicant, unless the applicant consents; or the name of the lawyer unless the lawyer consents or unless the lawyer's name is made public pursuant to these rules, shall not be public.

#### **RULE 14. NOTICE OF ACTION**

Notice of approval of an application to the Fund may be published in the *Washington State Bar News* and elsewhere at the direction of the Committee Board or Trustees. Notice may also be posted electronically on any web site maintained by the WSBA. If the lawyer has made full restitution to the Fund, any notice posted electronically by the WSBA may, at the request of the lawyer, be removed.

#### **RULE 15. AMENDMENTS**

These Rules may be amended, altered or repealed on the recommendation of the Committee Board by a vote of the Trustees, with the approval of the Supreme Court.

#### Suggested Amendment SUPERIOR COURT CRIMINAL RULES (CrR) Rule 4.8 - Subpoenas

(Amending the criminal rules regarding subpoenas)

#### Submitted by the Board of Governors of the Washington State Bar Association

A. <u>Purpose</u>: Existing CrR 4.8 reads: "Subpoenas shall be issued in the same manner as in civil actions." Two events underscore the need for a new approach to subpoenas in the criminal context. First, a newly redrafted version of the civil subpoena rule, CR 45, took effect September 1, 2007. Second, prior to the decision of the Court of Appeals in *State v. White*, 126 Wn. App. 131, 107 P.3d 753 (2005), the practice for issuing subpoenas in criminal actions (particularly the issue of whether to give notice of issuance of a subpoena *duces tecum*) was not consistent throughout the state. The *White* case, which required compliance with CR 45 notice obligations for service of all subpoenas, underscored problems in engrafting civil procedures onto criminal cases.

In 2006, along with suggesting the redraft of CR 45, the WSBA submitted a suggested redraft of CrR 4.8. The Supreme Court published both proposals for comment. In May 2007, the Court referred proposed CrR 4.8 back to the WSBA for additional review in light of three letters the Court received in opposition to that proposal. The current proposal is submitted in response to that request for additional review. The proposal is based on extensive consultation with the

authors of the comment letters and input of members of the prosecution and defense bar.

The new suggested rule explicitly recognizes two types of subpoenas: (1) those directing a person to attend and give testimony ("a subpoena for testimony") and (2) those requiring production of documentary evidence or tangible things ("a subpoena for production").

A subpoena for testimony compels a person to attend a trial or hearing. Provisions regarding form (subsection (a)(1)), service (subsection (a)(3)), and "when excused" (subsection (a)(4)) are consistent with existing practice. Under subsection (a)(1), a subpoena may be issued by the court or by an attorney of record. Under subsection (a)(3), service on a person directed to testify is accomplished by personal service, abode service, or mail (provided that a waiver form is filed in case of service by mail). Proof of service or a waiver of service can be evidenced by affidavit or declaration. The waiver provision is intended as an alternative means of service that will facilitate cost-effective service. Under subsection (a)(4), a person is excused from further testimony after his or her examination, unless otherwise ordered by the court. This subsection is virtually identical to CR 45 (f)(2).

A subpoena for production compels a person to produce and permit inspection and copying of designated documents or tangible things in the possession, custody, or control of that person. Service requirements for a subpoena for production (subsection (b)(3)) depend upon whether the subpoena also directs the person to attend and give testimony: a subpoena that both requires attendance and production must be served on the witness like a subpoena for testimony, pursuant to subsection (a)(3), but service of a subpoena for production only is accomplished pursuant to CR 5(b). Subsection (b)(4) synthesizes provisions from CR 45(c) for the protection of persons subject to a subpoena for production and provides a mechanism to seek court protection upon timely motion.

Subsection (b)(2) places differing duties on prosecutors and defense counsel to provide advance notice of a subpoena for production. This subsection is premised on the observation that, unlike in civil practice (where discovery obligations of all parties generally correspond), procedural and ethical requirements in criminal cases are such that disclosure obligations differ for the prosecution and the defense. For instance, CrR 4.7 places quite different burdens on prosecutors and defense counsel in the context of discovery. The obligation of a defense lawyer not to act in such a way as to incriminate his or her client creates unique problems. The proposed rule therefore requires advance notice to the defendant of a subpoena seeking evidence belonging or pertaining to that defendant, and to alleged victims or complaining witnesses of a subpoena seeking evidence belonging or pertaining to that person. This would require the prosecution to give notice to the defendant of essentially all subpoenas for production (assuming that most relevant evidence will "pertain" to the defendant), but would not require the defendant to give notice to the prosecution of all subpoenas for production that the defendant may issue. A defendant would have to provide notice of a subpoena for production for evidence belonging or pertaining to a different defendant in the same case, however. Subsection (b)(2)(B) includes a provision for waiver of notice upon ex parte court order for good cause shown.

Miscellaneous [54]

To keep the rule as simple as possible, no proposed subpoena form (like the one appended to CR 45) is included in this proposal.

#### SUGGESTED AMENDMENT CRIMINAL RULE (CrR) RULE 4.8 Subpoenas

Subpoenas shall be issued in the same manner as in civil actions:

- (a) For Attendance of Witnesses at Hearing or Trial. A subpoena commanding a person to attend and give testimony at a hearing or at trial ("a subpoena for testimony") shall be issued as follows:
  - (1) Form; Issuance.
- (A) A subpoena for testimony shall (i) state the title of the action, the case number, the name of the court in which the action is pending, and, if different, the name of the court from which the subpoena is issued; and (ii) command each person to whom it is directed to attend and give testimony at a specified time and place.
- (B) The court in which the action is pending or before which attendance is required may issue a subpoena for testimony under the seal of that court, or the clerk may issue the subpoena for testimony in response to a praecipe. An attorney for a party also may sign and issue a subpoena for testimony.
- (C) A command to a person to produce evidence or to permit inspection may be joined with a subpoena for testimony or may be issued separately under section (b) of this rule.
- (2) Notice. Notice to each party of the issuance of a subpoena for testimony is not required; provided that, when a subpoena for testimony also commands the person to whom it is directed to produce evidence or to permit inspection of things, the serving party shall give advance notice of such subpoena in the manner described in subsection (b) of this rule.
- (3) Service—How Made. A subpoena for testimony may be served by any suitable person over 18 years of age, by giving the witness a copy thereof, or by leaving a copy at the witness's dwelling house or usual place of abode with some person of suitable age and discretion then residing therein. When service is made by any person other than an officer authorized to serve process, proof of service shall be made by affidavit or declaration. A subpoena for testimony may also be served by first-class mail, postage prepaid, together with a waiver of personal service and instructions for returning such waiver to the attorney of record of the party to the action in whose behalf the witness is required to appear. Service by mail shall be deemed complete upon the filing of the returned waiver of personal service, signed in affidavit or declaration form.
- (4) When Witness Excused. A witness subpoenaed to attend a hearing or trial is excused from further attendance as soon as the witness has given testimony in chief and has been cross-examined thereon, unless a party moves in open court that the witness remain in attendance and the court so orders. Witness fees will not be allowed any witness after the day on which the witness's testimony is given, except when the witness has in open court been required to remain in further

attendance, and when so required the clerk shall note that fact in the minutes.

- (b) For Producing Evidence or Permitting Inspection. A subpoena commanding a person to produce and permit inspection and copying of designated documents or tangible things in the possession, custody, or control of that person ("a subpoena for production") shall be issued as follows:
  - (1) Form; Issuance.
- (A) A subpoena for production shall (i) state the title of the action, the case number, the name of the court in which the action is pending, and, if different, the name of the court from which the subpoena is issued; (ii) command each person to whom it is directed to produce and permit inspection and copying of documentary evidence or tangible things in the possession, custody, or control of that person at a specified time and place; and (iii) set forth the text of subsection (b)(4) of this rule.
- (B) The court in which the action is pending or before which attendance is required may issue a subpoena for production under the seal of that court or the clerk may issue the subpoena in response to a praecipe. An attorney for a party also may sign and issue a subpoena for production.
- (C) A subpoena for production may be joined with a subpoena for testimony, or it may be issued separately.
- (2) Notice. Notice to parties of the issuance of a subpoena for production is not required; provided that, whenever a party intends to serve a subpoena for production seeking evidence or inspection of things belonging or pertaining to a defendant who is not the party seeking or issuing the subpoena, then the serving party must give all parties advance notice; and provided that, whenever any party intends to serve a subpoena for production seeking evidence or inspection of things belonging or pertaining to an alleged victim or complaining witness, then the serving party shall provide advance notice to all parties and to the alleged victim or complaining witness.
- (A) Time and Manner. If advance notice is required under this rule, then no fewer than five days prior to service on the person named in the subpoena for production, notice shall be provided in the manner prescribed by CR 5(b). The parties may agree to shorten the time for advance notice when a subpoena seeks solely evidence or tangible things belonging or pertaining to a defendant. The court may shorten the time for advance notice upon a showing of good cause by a party; provided that, any alleged victim or complaining witness whose evidence or tangible things are sought shall receive notice and an opportunity to be heard on any motion to shorten time.
- (B) Court May Excuse Notice. A court on ex parte motion may excuse compliance with the advance notice requirement upon the serving party's showing of good cause; any such court order, along with a copy of the subpoena for which notice is excused, shall be filed under seal pursuant to GR 15.
- (3) Service—How Made. A subpoena for production shall be served in the manner prescribed in CR 5(b); provided that, if the subpoena for production is joined with a subpoena for testimony, then subsection (a)(3) of this rule shall govern service.

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(4) Protection of Persons Subject to Subpoena for Production. On timely motion, the court may quash or modify a subpoena for production if it (A) fails to allow reasonable time for compliance; (B) requires disclosure of privileged or other protected matter and no exception or waiver applies; (C) is unreasonable, oppressive, or unduly burdensome; or (D) exceeds the scope of discovery otherwise permitted under the criminal rules. The court may condition denial of a motion to quash or modify upon the advancement by the party on whose behalf the subpoena for production is issued of the reasonable cost of producing the books, papers, documents, or tangible things.

(c) Contempt. Failure by any person without adequate excuse to obey a subpoena served upon that person may be deemed a contempt of the court from which the subpoena issued.

#### Suggested Amendment SUPERIOR COURT CIVIL RULES (CR) CR 26 - General Provisions Governing Discovery

(Clarifying procedures for assertion of privilege or of workproduct after production in discovery)

#### Submitted by the Board of Governors of the Washington State Bar Association

**A. Purpose:** Federal Rule of Civil Procedure 26 (b)(5) (B) establishes what is often referred to as a "claw back" procedure. Through it, a party that has inadvertently disclosed privileged or trial-preparation materials through discovery may alert the receiving party of that event. After being notified, the receiving party must take steps to return, destroy, or sequester the subject material, and may not use or disclose it until the disclosing party's claim of protection is resolved. The federal rule is procedural only; it does not purport to alter the legal standards applicable to privileges or their waiver.

The suggested amendment to Washington's CR 26 would add a new subsection (b)(6) that is functionally identical to the federal "claw back" rule. A concurrent proposal to amend CR 45 would, as in its federal counterpart, restate this rule in the context of documents produced in response to a subpoena.

**RULE 26. General Provisions Regarding Discovery**

- (6) Claims of Privilege or Protection as Trial-Preparation Materials for Information Produced. If information produced in discovery is subject to a claim of privilege or of protection as trial-preparation material, the party making the claim may notify any party that received the information of the claim and the basis for it. After being notified, a party must promptly return, sequester, or destroy the specified information and any copies it has; must not use or disclose the information until the claim is resolved; and must take reasonable steps to retrieve the information if the party disclosed it before being notified. Either party may promptly present the information in camera to the court for a determination of the claim. The producing party must preserve the information until the claim is resolved.
- (67) Discovery From Treating Health Care Providers. The party seeking discovery from a treating health care provider shall pay a reasonable fee for the reasonable time spent in responding to the discovery. If no agreement for the amount of the fee is reached in advance, absent an order to the contrary under section (c), the discovery shall occur and the health care provider or any party may later seek an order setting the amount of the fee to be paid by the party who sought the discovery. This subsection shall not apply to the

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provision of records under RCW 70.02 or any similar statute, nor to discovery authorized under any rules for criminal matters.

(78) Treaties or Conventions. If the methods of discovery provided by applicable treaty or convention are inadequate or inequitable and additional discovery is not prohibited by the treaty or convention, a party may employ the discovery methods described in these rules to supplement the discovery method provided by such treaty or convention.

#### Suggested Amendment SUPERIOR COURT CIVIL RULES (CR) Rule 45 - Subpoena

(Clarifying "abode service" and procedures for assertion of privilege or work-product protection after production in response to a subpoena)

#### Submitted by the Board of Governors of the Washington State Bar Association

**A.** <u>Purpose</u>: A newly redrafted version of CR 45 took effect September 1, 2007. These suggested amendments would refine that version in two ways.

First, this suggested amendment would make the language regarding service in CR 45 (b)(1) conform more closely to CR 5 (b)(1). Under the prior and current versions of CR 45, a subpoena may simply be left at "the place of such person's abode." This amendment would replace that with language from CR 5 (b)(1), requiring the document to at least be left at the person's "dwelling house or usual place of abode with some person of suitable age and discretion then residing therein."

Second, this suggested amendment would add a new subsection CR 45 (d)(2)(B) that would incorporate the proposed "claw back" rule of CR 26 (b)(6) (which applies to discovery generally) expressly into the procedures for subpoenas. This would essentially track Federal Rule of Civil Procedure 45 (d)(2)(B). For more information, please see the statement of purpose for the concurrent suggested amendment of CR 26

# Suggested Amendment CIVIL RULES FOR COURTS OF LIMITED JURISDICTION (CRLJ) Rule 45 - Subpoena

(Revising subpoena rule to conform to revisions to CR 45)

Submitted by the Board of Governors of the Washington State Bar Association **A. Purpose:** A newly redrafted version of CR 45 took effect September 1, 2007. The corresponding CRLJ 45 was not amended at that time and remains nearly identical to the former version of CR 45. This suggested amendment would conform CRLJ 45 to CR 45 (including to additional changes suggested by a concurrent proposal to amend CR 45).

By way of background, the recent redraft of CR 45 conformed that rule, to the extent practicable, to Federal Rule of Civil Procedure 45 and improved CR 45's organization and usefulness. For a detailed discussion of the substantive changes introduced by the redraft of CR 45, please see the statement of purpose for the amendment that took effect September 1, 2007.

For more information on the two additional changes now being suggested for CR 45, please see the statement of purpose for the concurrent suggested proposal to amend CR 45.

The suggested redraft of CRLJ 45 would once again put it on par with its counterpart in the Civil Rules. The language of the suggested amendment is nearly identical to the language of CR 45 (assuming that CR 45 is amended pursuant to the concurrent suggested proposal). There would be three minor differences. First, CRLJ 45 (a)(3) would end with "...in accordance with rule 26" because, unlike the Civil Rules, there is no rule 34 in the Rules for Courts of Limited Jurisdiction. Second, CRLJ 45 (a)(4) would refer to the court issuing a subpoena "in the name of the State of Washington" rather than, as in CR 45, "under the seal of that court." This is because of uncertainty over whether all courts of limited jurisdictions have seals. Finally, the form subpoena attached to CRLJ has been altered for use in courts of limited jurisdiction

#### **RULE 45. SUBPOENA**

(a) For Attendance of Witnesses. The subpoena shall be issued as follows:

(1) Form. To require attendance before a court of limited jurisdiction or at the trial of an issue therein, such subpoena may be issued in the name of the State of Washington by the court before which the attendance is required or in which the issue is pending: Provided, That such subpoena may be issued with like effect by the attorney of record of the party to the action on whose behalf the witness is required to appear, and the form of such subpoena in each case may be the same as when issued by the court except that it shall only be subscribed by the signature of such attorney.

(2) Issuance for Trial. To require attendance before a court of limited jurisdiction or at the trial of an issue of fact, the **subpoena** may be issued by the clerk in response by a praceipe or by an attorney of record.

(3) Issuance for Deposition. To require attendance out of such court before a judge, justice of the peace, commissioner, referee or other officer authorized to administer oaths or to take testimony in any matter under the laws of this state, it shall be issued by an attorney of record or by such judge, justice of the peace, commissioner, referee or other officer before whom the attendance is required.

(b) For Production of Documentary Evidence. A subpoena may also command the person to whom it is directed to produce the books, papers, documents, or tangible things designated therein; but the court, upon motion made

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promptly and in any event at or before the time specified in the **subpoena** for compliance therewith, may (1) quash or modify the **subpoena** if it is unreasonable and oppressive or (2) condition denial of the motion upon the advancement by the person in whose behalf the **subpoena** is issued of the reasonable cost of producing the books, papers, documents, or tangible things.

(c) Service. A subpoena may be served by any suitable person over 18 years of age, by exhibiting and reading it to the witness, or by giving him a copy thereof, or by leaving such copy at the place of his abode. When service is made by any other person than an officer authorized to serve process, proof of service shall be made by affidavit.

(d) Subpoena for Taking Depositions; Place of Examination.

(1) Proof of service of a notice to take a deposition as provided in CR 30(b) and 31(a) constitutes a sufficient authorization for the issuance by the attorney of record or the officer taking the deposition of subpoenas for the persons named or described therein. The subpoena may command the person to whom it is directed to produce and permit inspection and copying of designated books, papers, documents, or tangible things which constitute or contain matters within the scope of the examination permitted by rule 26, but in that event the subpoena will be subject to the provisions of section (b) of this rule.

The person to whom the **subpoena** is directed may, within 10 days after the service thereof or on or before the time specified in the **subpoena** for compliance if such time is less than 10 days after service, serve upon the attorney designated in the **subpoena** written objection to inspection or copying of any or all of the designated materials. If objection is made, the party serving the **subpoena** shall not be entitled to inspect and copy the materials except pursuant to an order of the court from which the **subpoena** was issued. The party serving the **subpoena** may, if objection has been made, move upon notice to the deponent for an order at any time before or during the taking of the deposition.

- (2) Place of Examination. A resident of the state may be required to attend an examination only in the county wherein he resides or is employed or transacts his business in person, or at such other convenient place as is fixed by an order of the court. A nonresident of the state may be required to attend only in the county wherein he is served with a **subpoena**, or within 40 miles from the place of service or at such other convenient place as is fixed by an order of the court.
- (3) Foreign Depositions for Local Actions. When the place of examination is in another state, territory, or country, the party desiring to take the deposition may secure the issuance of a **subpoena** or equivalent process in accordance with the laws of such state, territory or country to require the deponent to attend the examination.
- (4) Local Depositions for Foreign Actions. When any officer or person is authorized to take depositions in this state by the law of another state, territory or country, with or without a commission, a **subpoena** to require attendance before such officer or person may be issued by any judge or justice of the peace of this state for attendance at any places within his jurisdiction.

- (e) Subpoena for Hearing or Trial. [Reserved. See RCW 5.56.010.1
- (f) Contempt. Failure by any person without adequate excuse to obey a subpoena served upon him may be deemed a contempt of the court from which the subpoena issued.
- (g) When Excused. A witness subpoenaed to attend in a civil case is dismissed and excused from further attendance as soon as he has given his testimony in chief and has been cross-examined thereon, unless either party moves in open court that the witness remain in attendance and the court so orders; and witness fees will not be allowed any witness after the day on which his testimony is given, except when the witness has in open court been required to remain in further attendance, and when so required the clerk shall note that fact in the minutes.

#### (a) Form; Issuance.

- (1) Every subpoena shall:
- (A) state the name of the court from which it is issued;
- (B) state the title of the action, the name of the court in which it is pending, and its case number;
- (C) command each person to whom it is directed to attend and give testimony or to produce and permit inspection and copying of designated books, documents or tangible things in the possession, custody or control of that person, or to permit inspection of premises, at a time and place therein specified; and
- (D) set forth the text of subsections (c) and (d) of this rule.
- (2) A subpoena for attendance at a deposition shall state the method for recording the testimony.
- (3) A command to a person to produce evidence or to permit inspection may be joined with a command to appear at trial or hearing or at deposition, or may be issued separately. A party may be compelled to produce evidence at a deposition or permit inspection only in accordance with rule 26.
- (4) A subpoena may be issued by the court in which the action is pending in the name of the State of Washington or by the clerk in response to a praecipe. An attorney of record of a party or other person authorized by statute may issue and sign a subpoena, subject to RCW 5.56.010.

#### (b) Service.

- (1) A subpoena may be served by any suitable person over 18 years of age by giving the person named therein a copy thereof, or by leaving a copy at such person's dwelling house or usual place of abode with some person of suitable age and discretion then residing therein. When service is made by any person other than an officer authorized to serve process, proof of service shall be made by affidavit.
- (2) A subpoena commanding production of documents and things, or inspection of premises, without a command to appear for deposition, hearing or trial, shall be served on each party in the manner prescribed by rule 5(b). Such service shall be made no fewer than five days prior to service of the subpoena on the person named therein, unless the parties otherwise agree or the court otherwise orders for good cause shown. A motion for such an order may be made ex parte.

#### (c) Protection of Persons Subject to Subpoenas.

(1) A party or an attorney responsible for the issuance and service of a subpoena shall take reasonable steps to avoid imposing undue burden or expense on a person subject to that

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subpoena. The court shall enforce this duty and impose upon the party or attorney in breach of this duty an appropriate sanction, which may include, but is not limited to, lost earnings and a reasonable attorney's fee.

- (2)(A) A person commanded to produce and permit inspection and copying of designated books, papers, documents or tangible things, or inspection of premises need not appear in person at the place of production or inspection unless commanded to appear for deposition, hearing or trial.
- (B) Subject to subsection (d)(2) of this rule, a person commanded to produce and permit inspection and copying may, within 14 days after service of the subpoena or before the time specified for compliance if such time is less than 14 days after service, serve upon the party or attorney designated in the subpoena written objection to inspection or copying of any or all of the designated materials or of the premises. If objection is made, the party serving the subpoena shall not be entitled to inspect and copy the materials or inspect the premises except pursuant to an order of the court by which the subpoena was issued. If objection has been made, the party serving the subpoena may, upon notice to the person commanded to produce and all other parties, move at any time for an order to compel the production. Such an order to compel production shall protect any person who is not a party or an officer of a party from significant expense resulting from the inspection and copying commanded.
- (3)(A) On timely motion, the court by which a subpoena was issued shall quash or modify the subpoena if it:
  - (i) fails to allow reasonable time for compliance;
- (ii) fails to comply with RCW 5.56.010 or subsection (e)(2) of this rule;
- (iii) requires disclosure of privileged or other protected matter and no exception or waiver applies; or
- (iv) subjects a person to undue burden, provided that the court may condition denial of the motion upon a requirement that the subpoenaing party advance the reasonable cost of producing the books, papers, documents, or tangible things.

(B) If a subpoena

- (i) requires disclosure of a trade secret or other confidential research, development, or commercial information, or
- (ii) requires disclosure of an unretained expert's opinion or information not describing specific events or occurrences in dispute and resulting from the expert's study made not at the request of any party, the court may, to protect a person subject to or affected by the subpoena, quash or modify the subpoena or, if the party in whose behalf the subpoena is issued shows a substantial need for the testimony or material that cannot be otherwise met without undue hardship and assures that the person to whom the subpoena is addressed will be reasonably compensated, the court may order appearance or production only upon specified conditions.

#### (d) Duties in Responding to Subpoena.

- (1) A person responding to a subpoena to produce documents shall produce them as they are kept in the usual course of business or shall organize and label them to correspond with the categories in the demand.
- (2)(A) When information subject to a subpoena is withheld on a claim that it is privileged or subject to protection as trial preparation materials, the claim shall be made expressly and shall be supported by a description of the nature of the

documents, communications, or things not produced that is sufficient to enable the demanding party to contest the claim.

(B) If information produced in response to a subpoena is subject to a claim of privilege or of protection as trial-preparation material, the person making the claim may notify any party that received the information of the claim and the basis for it. A resident of the state may be required to attend an examination, produce documents, or permit inspection only in the county where the person resides or is employed or transacts business in person, or at such other convenient place as is fixed by an order of the court. A nonresident of the state may be required to attend an examination, produce documents, or permit inspection only in the county where the person is served with a subpoena, or within 40 miles from the place of service, or at such other convenient place as is fixed by an order of the court.
- (3) Foreign Proceedings for Local Actions. When the place of examination, production, or inspection is in another state, territory, or country, the party desiring to take the deposition, obtain production, or conduct inspection may secure the issuance of a subpoena or equivalent process in accordance with the laws of such state, territory, or country.
- (4) Local Depositions for Foreign Actions. When any officer or person is authorized to take depositions in this state by the law of another state, territory, or country, with or without a commission, a subpoena to require attendance before such officer or person may be issued by any court of this state for attendance at any place within its jurisdiction.

#### (f) Subpoena For Hearing or Trial.

- (1) When Witnesses Must Attend—Fees and Allowances. [Reserved. See RCW 5.56.010.]
- (2) When Excused. A witness subpoenaed to attend in a civil case is dismissed and excused from further attendance as soon as the witness has given testimony in chief and has been cross-examined thereon, unless either party moves in open court that the witness remain in attendance and the court so orders. Witness fees will not be allowed any witness after the day on which the witness' testimony is given, except when the witness has in open court been required to remain in further attendance, and when so required the clerk shall note that fact.

#### (g) Contempt.

Failure by any person without adequate excuse to obey a subpoena served upon that person may be deemed a contempt of the court from which the subpoena issued. An adequate cause for failure to obey exists when a subpoena purports to require a non-party to attend a deposition, produce docu-

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ments, or permit inspection at a place not within the limits provided by subsection (e)(2).

(h) Form. A subpoena should be substantially in the form below.

After being notified, a party must promptly return, sequester, or destroy the specified information and any copies it has; must not use or disclose the information until the claim is resolved; must take reasonable steps to retrieve the information if the party disclosed it before being notified; and may promptly present the information in camera to the court for a determination of the claim. The person responding to the subpoena must preserve the information until the claim is resolved.

#### Suggested Amendment SUPERIOR COURT MANDATORY ARBITRATION RULES Rule 4.2 - Discovery

(Clarifying that CR 26(i) conferences are not required before an arbitrator may hear a motion for additional discovery)

#### Submitted by the Board of Governors of the Washington State Bar Association

A. <u>Purpose</u>: The proposed amendment clarifies that parties are not required to comply with CR 26(i) before an arbitrator may hear a motion for additional discovery. This is in response to reports of parties to arbitrations opposing MAR 4.2 discovery motions because of the moving party's alleged failure to comply with the conference requirements of CR 26(i).

CR 26(i) states: "The court will not entertain any motion or objection with respect to [CR] 26 through 37 unless counsel have conferred with respect to the motion or objection." Thus, by its terms, CR 26(i) does not apply to arbitrations. This makes sense because CR 26(i) is a judicial workload reduction rule. Arbitrators—who oversee a process that is designed to be quicker and less complicated than Superior Court litigation—do not need the same buffer. Furthermore, MAR 4.2 motions are not related to a party's failure to comply with or object to discovery; rather, they are seeking to conduct discovery beyond that specified in MAR 4.2.

# SUGGESTED AMENDMENT MANDATORY ARBITRATION RULES (MAR) Rule 4.2 - Discovery

After the assignment of a case to the arbitrator, a party may demand a specification of damages under RCW 4.28.360, may request from the arbitrator an examination under CR 35, may request admissions from a party under CR 36, and may take the deposition of another party, unless the arbitrator orders otherwise. No additional discovery shall be allowed, except as the parties may stipulate or as the arbitrator may order. The arbitrator will allow discovery only when reasonably necessary. The conference requirements of CR 26(i) shall not apply to motions to the arbitrator to allow additional discovery under this rule.

#### Suggested Amendment ADMISSION TO PRACTICE RULES (APR) RULE 8. SPECIAL ADMISSIONS

#### Submitted by the Board of Governors of the Washington State Bar Association

**Purpose:** Effective July 2008, the Supreme Court adopted an amendment to rule 5.5 of the Rules of Professional Conduct (RPC) that authorizes lawyers from other jurisdictions to practice law in Washington for a single employer or as authorized by federal law to provide legal services in Washington for no fee through a qualified legal services provider. RPC 5.5(e).

Although this new amendment refers to these pro bono lawyers appearing before courts pursuant to Admission to Practice Rule 8(b), they are not eligible under current APR 8(b) for pro hac vice admission because that rule requires that the non-Washington admitted lawyer maintain a residence and practice in the jurisdiction where he or she is admitted.

Therefore, the WSBA Board of Governors proposes an amendment to APR 8(b) to allow in-state house counsel to be admitted under that rule on a case-by-case basis for the limited purpose of providing pro bono legal services under RPC 5.5(e).

#### SUGGESTED AMENDMENT ADMISSION TO PRACTICE RULES (APR) RULE 8 SPECIAL ADMISSIONS

A member in good standing of the Bar of any other state or territory of the United States or of the District of Columbia, who is a resident of and maintains a practice in such other state, territory, or District, or a lawyer who is providing legal services for no fee through a qualified legal services provider pursuant to RPC 5.5(e), may appear as a lawyer in any action or proceeding only (i) with the permission of the court or tribunal in which the action or proceeding is pending, and (ii) in association with an active member of the Washington State Bar Association, who shall be the lawyer of record therein, responsible for the conduct thereof, and present at proceedings unless excused by the court or tribunal.
- (1) An application to appear as such a lawyer shall be made by written motion to the court or tribunal before whom the action or proceeding is pending, in a form approved by the Board of Governors, which shall include certification by the lawyer seeking admission under this rule and the associated Washington lawyer that the requirements of this rule have been compiled with, and shall include an indication on which date the fee required in part (2) was paid, or indicating that the fee was waived pursuant to part (2). The motion shall be heard by the court or tribunal after such notice to the Washington State Bar Association as is required in part (2) below, together with the required fee, unless waived pursuant to part (2), and to adverse parties as the court or tribunal shall direct. Payment of the required fee shall only be necessary

- upon a lawyer's first application to any court or tribunal in the same case. The court or tribunal shall enter an order granting or refusing the motion, and, if the motion is refused, the court or tribunal shall state its reasons.
- (2) The lawyer making the motion shall submit a copy of the motion to the Washington State Bar Association, accompanied by a fee in each case in an amount set by the Board of Governors with the approval of the Supreme Court. Payment of the fee shall only be necessary upon a lawyer's first motion to any court or tribunal in the same case. The associated Washington counsel shall be jointly responsible for payment of the fee. The fee shall be waived for a lawyer providing legal services for no fee through a qualified legal services provider pursuant to RPC 5.5(e). The Washington State Bar Association shall maintain a public record of all motions for admission pursuant to this rule.

#### Suggested Changes to CrRLJ 7.3 (JUDGMENT)

**Purpose:** CrRLJ 7.3 specifies the minimum elements which the court must include in a judgment and record of the sentencing proceedings in a court of limited jurisdiction. This suggested change to CrRLJ 7.3 adds two additional elements to the judgment and record of sentencing proceedings:

- 1) The specific statute or ordinance, including any subsection, for which the defendant is sentenced (CrRLJ 7.3(c)), and
- 2) Identify if the charge is a domestic violence-related offense (CrRLJ 7.3(d)).

A letter from the FBI's National Instant Criminal Background Check System (NICS) Section, which was sent to court officials in Washington State, has prompted the amendments suggested for CrRLJ 7.3. The NICS is a computerized system designed to conduct a search of available records to immediately determine if a person is eligible to receive or possess firearms. Before transferring a firearm to a nonlicensed individual, a federal firearms licensee must contact the NICS Section for a background check. The NICS Section has three business days to conduct the background check and determine whether a firearms transfer is prohibited. If the NICS Section has not been able to make a definitive determination within that time frame, the federal firearms licensee may lawfully transfer the firearm.

Among other federal prohibitions, persons convicted in any court of a qualifying Misdemeanor Crime of Domestic Violence (MCDV) are prohibited from possessing a firearm. The letter from the FBI, dated September 26, 2007, stated that previously the NICS Section and state counterparts used police reports to establish whether a qualifying Misdemeanor Crime of Domestic Violence (MCDV) had been committed. However, only certain misdemeanor offenses fall within the federal definition of a MCDV, and the NICS Section is now required to request the actual record of conviction, not just the police reports, to determine if the prospective firearm transferee has been convicted of a crime which will bar him or her from taking possession of a firearm. If the record of conviction is not explicit, the NICS Section will need to make its determination from court transcripts or other court documentation.

This information from the FBI prompted the Supreme Court Pattern Forms Committee to review the non-electronic pattern judgment and sentence form to determine if Washington's court records of conviction provide sufficient information to assist state and federal authorities with firearm background checks. Pursuant to CrRLJ 7.2 (e)(2), a non-electronic judgment and sentence form is prescribed by the Administrator for the Courts in conjunction with the Supreme Court Pattern Forms Committee. Pursuant to CrRLJ 7.2 (e)(1), an electronic judgment and sentence is prescribed by

the Administrator for the Courts in conjunction with the Judicial Information System Committee (JISC). CrRLJ 7.3 sets forth the minimum elements of information which must be included in both the non-electronic pattern judgment and sentence form and the electronic judgment and sentence form.

After reviewing the non-electronic pattern judgment and sentence form, the Pattern Forms Committee amended the form to include the specific statute or local ordinance, including the subsection, to which defendant pled or was found guilty. Also added was a place to identify a crime as a domestic violence-related offense under state law, when appropriate. However, modifying the non-electronic pattern judgment and sentence form does not affect the contents of the electronic judgment and sentence form.

The electronic judgment and sentence record consists of the elements set forth in CrRLJ 7.3. Amending CrRLJ 7.3, as suggested in this rule change, will result in the electronic judgment and sentence including the same two additional elements which have already been added to the non-electronic pattern judgment and sentence form. In addition, if CrRLJ 7.3 is amended by the Supreme Court, then those courts of limited jurisdiction which have developed their own non-electronic judgment and sentence form instead of using the form developed by the Pattern Forms Committee will be required to update their judgment and sentence form to include the two new required elements.

The suggested rule change will assist the persons who do the state and federal firearm background checks in determining if the crime is a "Misdemeanor Crime of Domestic Violence." The suggested rule change will also improve consistency among the courts of limited jurisdiction that choose not to use the pattern judgment and sentence form by requiring that all of those courts include the same minimum elements in the forms they develop as are included by the courts using the pattern form. Finally, the parties will have a better understanding of the conviction and a better record of what happened in the courtroom if these two additional elements are included in the judgment and sentence.

A final reason to amend the rule to add this information is that RCW 10.99.040 (1)(d) requires all judges to identify domestic violence (DV)-related offenses on docket sheets. The Legislature's directive to judges to assist in identification of DV-related offenses can be fulfilled by making sure the sentencing documents contain this information.

### CRIMINAL RULES FOR COURTS OF LIMITED JURISDICTION (CrRLJ)

#### **RULE 7.3 JUDGMENT**

A judgment of conviction shall set forth whether the defendant was represented by a lawyer or waived representation by a lawyer, the plea, the verdict or findings, and the adjudication and sentence. The court may order that its sentence include special conditions or requirements, including a specified schedule for the payment of a fine, restitution, or other costs, or the performance of community service. If the defendant is found not guilty or for any other reason is entitled to be discharged, judgment shall be entered accordingly. The judge or clerk shall enter the judgment on the record. The judgment and record of the sentencing proceedings of

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the courts of limited jurisdiction shall be preserved in perpetuity, either in an electronic or hard copy format. "Hard copy format" may include microfilm, microfiche, or a paper copy. At a minimum, the judgment and record of the sentencing proceedings shall include:

- (a) Defendant's name;
- **(b)** Defendant's ID numbers;
- (c) The charge, as well as any amendments to the original charge  $(\frac{1}{2})$ , and citation to the statute or ordinance, including subsections, for which the defendant was sentenced:
- (d) <u>Identification of any charge defined under law as a</u> domestic violence offense;
  - (d) (e) Arraignment date;
  - (e) (f) The plea, and the date entered;
- (f) (g) Representation by or waiver of lawyer, as well as date of lawyer's appearance or waiver;
- (g) (h) The parties present, including but not limited to the judge, attorneys, prosecutor, defense counsel, witnesses;
  - (h) (i) Verdict or findings, and the date entered;
  - (i) (j) Adjudication and sentence, and the date entered;
- (j) (k) Conditions or requirements of the sentence, including but not limited to a specified schedule for the payment of a fine, restitution, or other costs, performance of community service, counseling or treatment;
- (k) (l) The outcomes of any hearings held on the case, including but not limited to noncompliance hearings, reviews.

The judgment and record of the sentencing proceedings shall be prima facie evidence of a valid conviction in subsequent proceedings in courts of limited jurisdiction and in superior court.

# Suggested Amendment to RAP 13.4 Requiring Parties to Serve a Petition for Review, Answer, and Reply

#### Submitted by the Supreme Court Clerk's Office

**Purpose:** The purpose of the proposed amendment is to require that the parties serve a petition for review, answer, and reply on other parties. Currently, the rule provides that these pleadings will be served by the Clerk's office. In practice, most attorneys serve the other party with their petition for review, answer, and reply. Requiring service by the party, instead of by the Clerk's office, is consistent with the requirements in the RAPs for parties to serve the opposing party with a motion (including a motion for discretionary review), answer to a motion, or reply to answer (RAP 17.4(a) and (f), see also RAP 13.5(c) and 13.5A(c)); notice of appeal or notice for discretionary review (RAP 5.4(a)); statement of grounds for direct review (RAP 4.2(b) and RAP 4.3(b)); statement of arrangements (RAP 9.2(a)); designation of clerk's papers (RAP 9.6(a)); and any brief (RAP 10.2(h) and RAP 13.7(e)).

The only other place in the RAPs where the party does not make service is in the case of a Petitioner filing a personal restraint petition. See RAP 16.8(c). In that situation it makes sense to require the Clerk to make service because the rule also provides that the Clerk makes a determination as to who is the appropriate respondent(s). Often times the Petitioner in a personal restraint petition is mistaken as to who is the appropriate respondent.

#### **RAP 13.4**

## RULE 13.4 DISCRETIONARY REVIEW OF DECISION TERMINATING REVIEW

(a) **How to Seek Review.** A party seeking discretionary review by the Supreme Court of a Court of Appeals decision terminating review must <u>serve on all other parties and</u> file a petition for review or an answer to the petition that raises new issues. A petition for review should be filed in the Court of Appeals. If no motion to publish or motion to reconsider all or part of the Court of Appeals decision is timely made, a

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petition for review must be filed within 30 days after the decision is filed. If such a motion is made, the petition for review must be filed within 30 days after an order is filed denying a timely motion for reconsideration or determining a timely motion to publish. If the petition for review is filed prior to the Court of Appeals determination on the motion to reconsider or on a motion to publish, the petition will not be forwarded to the Supreme Court until the Court of Appeals files an order on all such motions. The first party to file a petition for review must, at the time the petition is filed, pay the statutory filing fee to the clerk of the Court of Appeals in which the petition is filed.

- (b) Considerations Governing Acceptance of Review. A petition for review will be accepted by the Supreme Court only: (1) If the decision of the Court of Appeals is in conflict with a decision of the Supreme Court; or (2) If the decision of the Court of Appeals is in conflict with another decision of the Court of Appeals; or (3) If a significant question of law under the Constitution of the State of Washington or of the United States is involved; or (4) If the petition involves an issue of substantial public interest that should be determined by the Supreme Court.
- (c) Content and Style of Petition. The petition for review should contain under appropriate headings and in the order here indicated: (1) Cover. A title page, which is the cover. (2) Tables. A table of contents, with page references, and a table of cases (alphabetically arranged), statutes and other authorities cited, with reference to the pages of the brief where cited. (3) Identity of Petitioner. A statement of the name and designation of the person filing the petition. (4) Citation to Court of Appeals Decision. A reference to the Court of Appeals decision which petitioner wants reviewed, the date of filing the decision, and the date of any order granting or denying a motion for reconsideration. (5) Issues Presented for Review. A concise statement of the issues presented for review. (6) Statement of the Case. A statement of the facts and procedures relevant to the issues presented for review, with appropriate references to the record. (7) Argument. A direct and concise statement of the reason why review should be accepted under one or more of the tests established in section (b), with argument. (8) Conclusion. A short conclusion stating the precise relief sought. (9) Appendix. An appendix containing a copy of the Court of Appeals decision, any order granting or denying a motion for reconsideration of the decision, and copies of statutes and constitutional provisions relevant to the issues presented for review.
- (d) **Answer and Reply.** A party may file an answer to a petition for review. A party filing an answer to a petition for review must serve the answer on all other parties. If the party wants to seek review of any issue that is not raised in the petition for review, including any issues that were raised by not decided in the Court of Appeals, the party must raise those new issues in an answer. Any answer should be filed within 30 days after the service on the party of the petition. A party may file a reply to an answer only if the answering party seeks review of issues not raised in the petition for review. A reply to an answer should be limited to addressing only the new issues raised in the answer. A party filing any reply to an answer must serve the reply to the answer on all other parties. A reply to an answer should be filed within 15 days after the

- service on the party of the answer. An answer or reply should be filed in the Supreme Court. The Supreme Court may call for an answer or a reply to an answer.
- (e) **Form of Petition, Answer, and Reply.** The petition, answer, and reply should comply with the requirements as to form for a brief as provided in rules 10.3 and 10.4, except as otherwise provided in this rule.
- (f) **Length.** The petition for review, answer, or reply should not exceed 20 pages double spaced, excluding appendices
- (g) Service and Reproduction of Petition, Answer, and Reply. The clerk will arrange for the reproduction of copies of a petition for review, an answer, or a reply, and bill the appropriate party for the copies as provided in rule 10.5. The clerk will serve the petition, answer, or reply if the party has not done so.
- (h) Amicus Curiae Memoranda. The Supreme Court may grant permission to file an amicus curiae memorandum in support of or opposition to a pending petition for review. Absent a showing of particular justification, an amicus curiae memorandum should be received by the court and counsel of record for the parties and other amicus curiae not later than 60 days from the date the petition for review is filed. Rules 10.4 and 10.6 should govern generally disposition of a motion to file an amicus curiae memorandum. An amicus curiae memorandum or answer thereto should not exceed 10 pages.
- (i) **No Oral Argument.** The Supreme Court will decide the petition without oral argument.

## Submitted by the Practice of Law Board for the State of Washington

**Purpose:** The Practice of Law Board has suggested a new rule, APR 28, which would authorize qualified and trained nonlaywers to provide legal assistance to the public in specific defined and authorized areas of law under careful regulation. GR 25 provides that one of the purposes of the Practice of Law Board is to make recommendations regarding the circumstances under which nonlaywers may be involved in the delivery of certain types of legal and law-related services. This rule is the Board's fulfillment of that purpose.

New Admission to Practice Rule 28: Limited Practice Rule for Legal Technicians

A) **Purpose.** The Civil Legal Needs Study (2003), commissioned by the Supreme Court, clearly established that the legal needs of the consuming public are not currently being met. The public is entitled to be assured that legal services are rendered only by qualified trained legal practitioners. Only the legal profession is authorized to provide such services. The purpose of this rule is to authorize certain persons to render legal assistance or advice in defined areas of law. This rule shall prescribe the conditions of and limitations upon the provision of such services in order to ensure that only trained and qualified legal practitioners may provide the

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- same. This rule is intended to permit trained legal technicians to provide limited legal assistance under carefully regulated circumstances in ways that expand the affordability of quality legal assistance which protects the public interest.
- B) **Definitions.** For purposes of this rule, the following definitions will apply:
- 1) "Approved and reviewed by a lawyer" means that a lawyer has supervised the legal work and documented that supervision by the lawyer's signature and bar number.
- 2) "APR" means the Supreme Court's Admission to Practice Rules.
- 3) "Board" when used alone means the Practice of Law Board.
- 4) "Commission" when used alone means the Nonlawyer Practice Commission which is authorized and directed to carry out the functions established by this rule.
- 5) "Lawyer" means a person licensed in accordance with the APR's to engage in the general practice of law in the State of Washington and whose activities are governed by the RPC's.
- 6) "Legal Technician" means a trained practitioner authorized to engage in the limited practice of law as specified by this rule and related rules. The legal technician does not represent the client in court proceedings or negotiations, but provides limited legal assistance as set forth in this rule to a pro se client.
- 7) "Paralegal" shall mean a person qualified by education, training or work experience, who is employed or retained by a lawyer, law office, corporation, governmental agency or other entity and who performs specifically delegated substantive legal work for which a lawyer is responsible.
  - 8) "RPC" means the Rules of Professional Conduct.
- 9) "Substantive legal work" shall mean work performed by a person that requires knowledge of legal concepts and is customarily, but not necessarily, performed by a lawyer.
- 10) "Supervised" means a lawyer directs, approves and has responsibility for work performed by the Legal Technician.
  - 11) Words of authority:
- a) "May" means "has discretion to," "has a right to," or "is permitted to".
  - b) "Must" or "shall" mean "is required to".
  - c) "Should" means recommended but not required.
- C) **Certification Requirements.** An applicant for certification as a Legal Technician shall:
  - 1) Age. Be at least 18 years of age.
  - 2) Moral Character. Be of good moral character.
- 3) <u>Education</u>. Have graduated from a paralegal/legal assistant program that is approved by the American Bar Association or the Commission and is:
- a) An associate degree or other paralegal/legal assistant program that consists of a minimum of 90 quarter hours (900 clock hours or 60 semester hours) of which at least 45 quarter hours (450 clock hours or 30 semester hours) are substantive legal courses; or
- b) A bachelor's degree program in paralegal/legal assistant studies; or
- c) A post-baccalaureate certificate program in paralegal/legal assistant studies.

- 4) <u>Experience</u>. Possess the following substantive legal experience as a paralegal/legal assistant under the supervision of a lawyer:
- a) Those with an associates degree from an American Bar Association approved institution or who hold a bachelor's degree need a minimum of 2 years experience; or
- b) Those who are graduates of any other program set out in sub-section (3) need 3 years experience.
- 5) <u>Pro Bono Service Requirement</u>. Complete at least 20 hours of pro bono service to a legal services organization approved by the Commission within the two years prior to taking the Legal Technician examination.
- 6) <u>Examination</u>. Satisfactorily complete an examination which shall, at a minimum, cover the rules of professional conduct applicable to Legal Technicians, rules of ethics, rules relating to the attorney-client privilege, procedural rules and substantive law issues related to one or more discrete areas of practice.
- 7) Oath. Execute under oath and file with the Commission 2 copies of his/her application, in such form as may be required by the Commission. In the event of the failure or refusal of an applicant to furnish any information or proof, or to answer any interrogatories of the Commission pertinent to the pending application, the Commission may deny the application.
- 8) Examination Fee. Pay, upon the filing of the application, the examination fee as established by the Commission.
- D) Scope of Practice Authorized by Limited Practice Rule. The Legal Technician may undertake the following only in the defined area(s) of law for which the Legal Technician has been certified:
- 1) Ascertain whether the problem is within the defined practice area, and if so, obtain relevant facts, and explain the relevancy of such information to the client;
- 2) Inform the client of applicable procedures, including deadlines, documents which must be filed, and the anticipated course of the legal proceeding;
- 3) Inform the client of applicable procedures for proper service of process for motion papers, and proper filing procedures:
- 4) Provide the client with self-help materials prepared by a lawyer or approved by the Commission, which contain information as to statutory requirements, case law basis for the client's claim, and venue and jurisdiction requirements;
- 5) Review pleadings or exhibits presented by the client from the opposing side, and explain the documents;
- 6) Select and complete forms that have been approved by the State of Washington, either through a governmental agency or by the Administrative Office of the Courts or the content of which is specified by statute; federal forms; forms prepared by a lawyer; or forms approved by the Commission; and advise the client of the significance of the selected forms to the client's case;
- 7) Perform legal research and draft legal letters and pleadings, if the work is reviewed and approved by a lawyer.
- 8) Advise client as to other documents which may be necessary (such as exhibits, witness declarations, or party declarations), and explain how such additional documents or pleadings may affect the client's case;

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9) Assist the client in obtaining necessary documents, such as birth, death, or marriage certificates.

While acting within the scope of authority set forth in this rule, the relationship between the Legal Technician and the client shall be governed by all rules, expectations, privileges and considerations that govern the relationship between lawyers and their clients.

- E) Conditions Under Which A Legal Technician May Provide Services. A Legal Technician may render services authorized by this rule only under the following conditions and with the following limitations:
  - 1) Be certified pursuant to these rules;
- 2) Have a staffed office for the acceptance of service in the State of Washington;
- 3) Personally perform the services for the client. The Legal Technician shall not supervise a non-certified individual to perform the services in the legal technician's place. Nothing in this prohibition shall prevent a person who is not certified from performing translation services; and
- 4) Prior to the performance of the services, the Legal Technician shall enter into a written contract that includes the following provisions:
- (a) An explanation of the services to be performed, including a conspicuous statement that the Legal Technician may not appear or represent the client in court;
- (b) Identification of all compensation and costs to be charged to the client for the services to be performed;
- (c) A statement that documents submitted by the client to the Legal Technician may not be retained by the Legal Technician for any purpose, including payment of compensation or costs:
- (d) A statement that the Legal Technician is not a lawyer and may only perform limited legal services. This statement shall be on the face of the contact in twelve-point bold type print;
- (e) A statement describing the Legal Technician's duty to protect the confidentiality of information provided by the client and the Legal Technician's work product associated with the services sought or provided by the Legal Technician;
- (f) A statement that the client has the right to rescind the contract at any time and receive a full refund of unearned fees. This statement shall be conspicuously set forth in the contract; and
- (g) Such other conditions as the Commission may require.
- 5) A Legal Technician may not provide services to a client who requires assistance exceeding the scope of practice authorized by this rule, and shall inform the client, in such instance, that the client requires the services of a lawyer. The scope of practice shall be determined as provided in regulations adopted by the Commission and approved by the Board and the Supreme Court.
- 6) A Legal Technician must sign all pleadings completed by the Legal Technician and include his/her certificate number.
- F) **Prohibited Acts**. In the course of dealing with clients or prospective clients, a Legal Technician shall not:
- 1) Make any statement that the Legal Technician can or will obtain special favors from or has special influence with any court or governmental agency;

- 2) Retain any compensation for services not performed;
- 3) Refuse to return documents supplied by, prepared by, or paid for by the client upon the request of the client. These documents must be returned upon request even if there is a fee dispute between the Legal Technician and the client; or
- 4) Represent or advertise, in connection with the provision of services, other titles or credentials that could cause a client to believe that the Legal Technician possesses professional skills beyond those authorized by the certificate for which the Legal Technician is approved.
- 5) Represent or otherwise provide legal or law related services to a client, except as permitted by law or elsewhere in this rule.

#### G) Continuing Certification Requirements.

- 1) <u>Continuing Education Requirements</u>. Each Legal Technician must complete a minimum number of credit hours of approved or accredited education as prescribed by Commission regulations, during each calendar year in courses certified by the Commission to be appropriate for study by Legal Technicians pursuant to this rule; provided that the Legal Technician shall not be required to comply with this subsection during the calendar year in which he or she is initially certified.
- 2) <u>Pro Bono Publico Service</u>. Each Legal Technician should aspire to render at least 30 hours of pro bono publico service per year.

#### H) Financial Responsibilities

- 1) Financial Responsibility. Each certified Legal Technician shall show proof of ability to respond in damages resulting from his/her acts or omissions in the performance of services permitted by this rule. The proof of financial responsibility shall be in such form and in such amount as the Commission may by regulation prescribe.
- 2) <u>Annual Fee</u>. Each certified Legal Technician must pay the annual fee established by the Commission.
- I) Existing Law Unchanged. This rule shall in no way expand, narrow or affect existing law in the following areas as they apply to both lawyers, and Legal Technicians engaged in the limited practice of law, under the exclusive regulatory authority of the Supreme Court in the State of Washington:
- 1) The fiduciary relationship between a certified Legal Technician and his/her customers or clients;
- 2) Conflicts of interest that may arise between the certified Legal Technician and a client or customer; and
- 3) The lack of authority of a Legal Technician to give legal advice without being licensed to practice law other than an authorized under this rule.

#### J) Professional Responsibility.

- 1) As grantees by the Supreme Court of authority heretofore reserved exclusively to lawyers, Legal Technicians acting within the scope of authority set forth in this rule shall be held to the standard of care of a lawyer.
- 2) Legal Technicians shall be held to the same ethical standards as a lawyer, except to the extent that the RPCs conflict with these rules, in which case these rules shall apply.
- 3) All funds that come into a Legal Technician's possession are subject to RPC 1.15B.

## Submitted by the Practice of Law Board of the State of Washington

C. <u>Purpose</u>: The Practice of Law Board has suggested a new rule, APR 28, which would authorize qualified and trained nonlaywers to provide legal assistance to the public in specific defined and authorized areas of law under careful regulation. These regulations are necessary to provide the administrative framework for proposed APR 28.

#### NON-LAWYER PRACTICE COMMISSION REGULATIONS Current Draft

#### **REGULATION 1. PURPOSE**

The purpose of these regulations is to establish procedures for the Non-Lawyer Practice Commission (Commission) in order to carry out its purposes and exercise its powers pursuant to General Rule 25 (GR 25) and APR 28.

#### REGULATION 2. PRACTICE OF LAW BOARD

A. For purposes of these regulations, the Practice of Law Board (POL Board) shall determine Commission membership; hear discipline appeals; recommend the Commission's annual budget; and consider and recommend areas of practice to be submitted to the Supreme Court.

#### REGULATION 3. ESTABLISHMENT OF THE COMMISSION

- A. <u>Commission Responsibilities</u>. The Commission shall be responsible for the following:
- (1) Holding public hearings regarding scope of practice area:
- (2) Processing applications, screening applicants and fees;
  - (3) Testing of general, ethical and procedural aspects;
- (4) Continuing Legal Education (CLE) requirements and approval of such programs;
- (5) Approval of education requirements for certification in specific areas;
  - (6) Initial discipline and grievance hearings;
- (7) Establishing and over-seeing committees and tenure of members;
  - (8) Trust account requirements and procedures; and
- (9) Such other activities and functions as the POL Board may determine.
- B. Members. The Commission shall consist of 7 members (Member[s]) appointed by the Supreme Court of the State of Washington (Supreme Court) at least 4 of whom shall be lawyers licensed to practice law in the State of Washington, and the remainder of whom shall be non-lawyer Washington residents. At least 4 members of the Commission shall be existing or former members of the POL Board.

- At least one Member shall be a legal educator. Appointments shall be made by the Supreme Court after considering nominations from the POL Board and after input from the WSBA Board of Governors and any other interested people or organizations.
- C. <u>Member Terms</u>. The Members shall initially be appointed to staggered terms of 1 to 3 years. Thereafter, appointments shall be for 3-year terms. No Member may serve more than 2 consecutive full 3-year terms.
- D. <u>Resignation</u>. A Member may resign from the Commission by letter addressed to the Commission and the Supreme Court with resignation to be effective 2 days following the date of the letter or any effective date thereafter which may be specified in the letter.
- E. <u>Vacancies</u>. A membership vacancy shall be deemed to occur on the resignation of a Member or upon declaration of a vacancy by the Supreme Court following any request to the Supreme Court by the Commission for the reasons set forth in section O below, or if a Member has three unexcused absences from regular Commission meetings or is not present at more than a majority of the Commission meetings during any 12-month period as determined by the chairperson. A membership vacancy shall be filled by the Supreme Court for the unexpired term.
- F. <u>Administration of Commission</u>. The Washington State Bar Association (WSBA), in consultation with the POL Board and Commission shall provide the Commission with an administrator (Commission Administrator) and any additional staff support as designated by the Executive Director of the WSBA. The Commission Administrator shall not be entitled to vote on Commission matters.
- G. <u>Funding and Expenses</u>. The POL Board and Commission shall prepare an annual budget to be submitted for approval on a schedule set by the WSBA Board of Governors. The WSBA shall pay all expenses reasonably and necessarily incurred by the Commission pursuant to the budget and the expense policy of the WSBA. Funding for the Commission shall be generated by Legal Technician certification fees, as well as commitments from the WSBA.
- H. <u>Officers</u>. The POL Board shall annually designate a chairperson and a vice-chairperson from among the Commission membership.
- I. <u>Regular Meetings</u>. The Commission shall meet as necessary to complete its business, as determined by the Commission or upon call of the chairperson, but not less than once per year.
- J. <u>Regular Meeting/Agenda Notice</u>. In January of each year, the Commission may file the times and places of its regularly scheduled meetings with the Office of the Code Reviser for publication in the Washington State Register. At least 7 days prior to each regularly scheduled meeting, the Commission shall submit agendas to the Administrative Office of the Courts and to WSBA for website posting.
- K. <u>Special Meetings</u>. A special meeting of the Commission may be called at any time by the chairperson or by a majority of the Commission membership by delivering written notice personally, by mail, or by e-mail to each Member at least 2 business days before the time of such meeting and by providing notice of the special meeting to the public by

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submitting notice for posting on the Administrative Office of the Courts website and the WSBA website.

- L. <u>Voting</u>. Each Member shall be entitled to 1 vote on each matter submitted to a vote at a meeting of the Commission. A majority vote of the Members present at a meeting at which a quorum exists shall, unless a greater vote is required by other provisions of these regulations or by APR 28, decide any issue submitted. Members shall not be permitted to vote by proxy.
- M. Quorum. A majority of the Members shall constitute a quorum. The chairperson may appoint temporary members of the Commission (or any designated committee) from among former members of the Commission, when a Member is disqualified or unable to function on a specific matter, for good cause. If less than a quorum is present at a meeting, a majority of the Members present may adjourn the meeting and continue it to a later date and time upon notice. At any reconvened meeting at which a quorum is present, any business may be transacted which might have been transacted at the adjourned meeting. Members present at a properly called meeting may continue to transact business until adjournment, notwithstanding the withdrawal of Members leaving less than a quorum.
- N. Action by Communication Equipment. The Members or any committee may participate in a meeting of the Commission or such committee by means of a conference phone or similar communications equipment by which all persons participating in the meeting can hear each other at the same time, and participation by such means will constitute presence in person at a meeting.
- O. Removal of a Member. The Commission may request the Supreme Court to declare a membership vacancy with respect to any Member whose removal from the Commission would, upon a 2/3 vote of the Commission excluding the affected Member, be in the best interest of the Commission; however, such action may only be taken by the Commission at a regular or special meeting following notice of such proposed action.
- P. <u>Committees</u>. The Commission shall establish such committees as it deems necessary and appropriate with each committee having a specified function determined by the Commission and as required otherwise under these regulations.
- Q. <u>Records</u>. The Commission Administrator shall maintain deliberations, recommendations, and decisions of the Commission and its committees. All records of the Commission and its committees shall be filed and maintained at the principal office of the WSBA.
- R. Open Meeting and Records. All records, files, meetings and proceedings of the Commission and its designated committees shall be open and public, except that the Commission may meet in executive session and records and files may be made confidential where the preservation of confidentiality is desirable or where public disclosure might result in the violation of individual rights or in unwarranted private or personal harm as determined by the Commission. All discussions of particular complaints and investigations will be held in Executive Session.
- S. <u>Public Participation</u>. The chairperson or the chair of any designated committee may allow for public participation

at any meeting. Members of the public who wish to address the Commission or a designated committee at any meeting shall be required to provide contact information on a form provided for that purpose and shall be required to comply with any time limitation deemed appropriate by the chairperson or the designated committee chair.

## REGULATION 4. PROCEDURE FOR DETERMINING AREAS OF PRACTICE

A. Notice and Public Hearing. Before any area of practice is authorized, notice shall be given to interested parties, including any group or individual who has requested notice and also to the WSBA Board of Governors, any WSBA section that might be affected and such other groups or individuals the Commission believes might be interested in such matter. Notice shall also be given in the WSBA Bar News, on the WSBA website and the POL Board website. Notices shall be given no less than 90 days prior to submission to the Commission for consideration. In addition, a minimum of 2 public hearings shall be held at separate locations within the State of Washington.

#### B. Commission Committees

- 1. Establishment of Committees. The Commission shall establish a separate committee for each area of practice by Legal Technicians when an area of practice is under consideration. Each such committee shall be composed of no less than 5 members, including 1 of each of the following: a lawyer licensed in the State of Washington whose practice area emphasizes the area of practice under consideration; a legal educator in the state of Washington; a person who is interested in practicing as a Legal Technician in this area; a member or former member of the POL Board.
- 2. Committee Responsibilities. The committee shall first determine whether the proposed area promotes access to affordable and reliable law related services in an area of unmet civil legal need that is practical and feasible for nonlawyer practice. If so, the committee shall determine the scope and nature of practice for Legal Technicians and any limitations and conditions to be imposed. The Commission shall report its recommendation to the POL Board. If this area of practice if approved by the Supreme Court, the Committee shall develop the forms and materials which may be used by the Legal Technicians; the test to be administered to those seeking certification; the continuing education/ethics requirements to be developed; and such other functions as the Commission shall request. The committee shall remain in place if the area of practice is approved by the Supreme Court, to continue such functions as shall be necessary, subject to the terms of tenure as established by the Commission.
- C. Transmittal of Recommendations to Supreme Court. The Commission recommendation shall be forwarded to the POL Board for a determination whether to send the recommendation to the Supreme Court of the State of Washington. If such a recommendation is sent to the Supreme Court, all comments received and the Board of Governors recommendation shall also be sent to the Court. The Supreme Court of the State of Washington shall make the final determination on whether or not to open any area of practice of law to Legal Technicians as provided under these rules and regulations governing the same.

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REGULATION 5. DISCIPLINE. The Commission shall have the authority to hold such hearings and impose such discipline as may be appropriate for any violations of the Admission to Practice Rules (APR). Such discipline shall be consistent with the Rules of Professional Conduct (RPC), as such apply to Legal Technicians. A disciplinary finding by the Commission may be reviewed by the POL Board. The POL Board decision may be reviewed by the Supreme Court at the Court's discretion.

#### REGULATION 6. CONFLICT OF INTEREST.

- A. <u>In General</u>. A Member who has or has had a lawyer/client relationship or financial relationship with, or who is an immediate family member of, a person or entity who is a complainant or the subject of a matter before the Commission shall not participate in the investigation or deliberation on any matter involving that person. No WSBA employee shall participate in deliberation on any matter which is pending in, or likely to be referred to, the WSBA attorney disciplinary or bar admission systems.
- B. <u>Disclosure</u>. A Member with a past or present relationship, other than that as provided in section A above, with a person or entity who is the complainant or subject of a matter before the Commission, shall disclose such relationship to the Commission and, if the Commission deems it a conflict, that Member shall not participate in any action relating to that matter.

#### REGULATION 7. PETITIONS FOR REVIEW.

Petitions for review from any action of the Commission to the Supreme Court shall comply with GR 25(g).

- 1. Suggested Rule Change to CrR 3.1(d) CrR 3.1 (a)-(c) and (e)-(f) [unchanged]
- (d) Assignment of Lawyer.
- (1) Unless waived, a lawyer shall be provided to any person who is financially unable to obtain one without causing substantial hardship to the person or to the persons family.
