- (5) A client who meets the requirements in this section is eligible to receive hospice care through the medicaid agency's hospice program when all of the following is met:
- (a) The client's physician certifies the client has a life expectancy of six months or less.

- (2) "Business entity" has the meaning set forth in RCW 48.17.010(2) and includes a sole proprietorship having associated licensees authorized to act on its behalf in the business or trade name of the sole proprietorship.
- (3) "Days" means calendar days including Saturday and Sunday and holidays, unless otherwise specified.
- (4) "Electronic submission" or "submitted electronically" means submission of a licensing process by an applicant, licensee, insurer, or education provider by means of the commissioner's web site or a third-party licensing provider or other state agency.
- (5) "File" means a record in any retrievable format, and unless otherwise specified, includes paper and electronic formats.
- (6) "Home state" has the meaning set forth in RCW 48.17.010(4).
- (7) "Insurer" has the meaning set forth in RCW 48.17.-010(7).
- (8) "Licensee" means a person licensed by the commissioner under Title 48 RCW to sell, solicit or negotiate insurance and includes adjusters and surplus line brokers.
- (9) "Line of authority" means a license issued in one or more lines of insurance listed in RCW 48.17.170.
- (10) "NAIC" means the National Association of Insurance Commissioners.
- (11) "Third-party licensing provider" is designated on the commissioner's web site at: www.insurance.wa.gov.
- (12) "Reinstatement" means the reissuance by the commissioner of a license that was not renewed more than sixty days but fewer than twelve months after its expiration date.
- (13) "Resident" means a person who has elected to make Washington his or her home state, or, in the case of a business entity, has a place of business in this state.
- (14) "Sending written notice" or "sending a copy of the written notice" means transmitting the required information in writing and, where required, on forms designated by the commissioner for that purpose, via first class mail, commercial parcel delivery company, telefacsimile, or electronic transmission, unless a specific method of transmission is specified.
- (15) "Surety" means that limited line of authority of insurance or bond that covers obligations to pay the debts of, or answer for the default of another, including faithlessness in a position of public or private trust.
- (16) "Travel insurance" means ((that limited line of authority of insurance coverage for trip cancellation, trip interruption, baggage, life, sickness and accident, disability, and personal effects when limited to a specific trip and sold in connection with transportation provided by a common carrier.
- (17))) insurance coverage for personal risks incident to planned travel including, but not limited to:

- (a) Interruption or cancellation of trip or event;
- (b) Loss of baggage or personal effects;
- (c) Damages to accommodations or rental vehicles; or
- (d) Sickness, accident, disability, or death occurring during limited duration travel.

Travel insurance does not include major medical plans, which provide comprehensive medical protection for travelers with trips lasting six months or longer, including those working overseas as an expatriate or military personnel being deployed.

- (17) "Travel insurance producer" means a licensed limited lines producer of travel insurance.
- (18) "Travel retailer" means a business entity that offers and disseminates travel insurance on behalf of and under the direction and supervision of a licensed travel insurance producer.
- (19) "Written" or "in writing" means any retrievable method of recording an agreement or document, and, unless otherwise specified, includes paper and electronic formats.

- WAC 284-17-011 Limited line of travel insurance. (1) Travel insurance is a limited line of authority ((and is defined in WAC 284-17-001(16).

A person must not sell, solicit, or negotiate travel insurance in this state unless that person is licensed as an insurance producer with the travel limited line of authority.
- (2) A business entity acting as a travel insurance producer is required to:
- (a) Be licensed as a producer with the travel limited line of authority; and
- (b) Designate an individual licensed as a producer with the travel limited line of authority to act as a designated licensed responsible person (DLRP) who is responsible for the business entity's compliance with the laws of this state.
- $((\frac{(2)}{2}))$ (3) The requirements of this chapter for passing an insurance producer examination and for prelicensing and continuing insurance education do not apply to insurance producers that transact only the limited line of travel insurance.
- (4) A travel retailer may offer and disseminate travel insurance on behalf of and under a travel insurance producer business entity license only if the travel insurance producer holds a business entity license, and:
- (a) Clearly identifies the licensed business entity as the licensed producer on marketing materials and fulfillment packages distributed by travel retailers to customers, identification shall include the entity's name and contact information;
- (b) Keeps a register of each travel retailer that offers travel insurance on the licensed business entity's behalf. The register must include the name and contact information of the travel retailer and an officer or person who directs or controls the travel retailer's operations, and the travel retailer's federal

Employer Identification Number. The licensed business entity must also certify that the travel retailer registered complies with United States Code, Title 18, section 1033. The licensed business entity must submit the register within thirty days upon request by the commissioner;

- (c) Complies with the fingerprinting requirements applicable to insurance producers in the resident state of the business entity;
- (d) Has paid all applicable insurance producer licensing fees as set forth in Washington state law; and
- (e) Requires each employee whose duties include offering and disseminating travel insurance to receive a program of instruction or training, which is subject to review by the commissioner.
- (5) An employee of a travel retailer may sell or offer travel insurance without being individually licensed as an insurance producer if the travel retailer is licensed and acting in compliance with this chapter, and the employees are under the supervision of a licensed travel producer.
- (6) A travel retailer whose activities, and those of its employees, are limited to offering and disseminating travel insurance on behalf of and under the direction of a licensed business entity meeting the conditions stated in this section, is authorized to do so, upon registration by the licensed business entity.
- (7) As the insurer designee, the travel insurance producer is responsible for the acts and supervision of the travel retailer.

WAC 220-56-310 Shellfish—Daily limits, this amendment will increase the daily harvest quota for spot shrimp, to provide greater fishing opportunity.

 - (4) Horse clams: 7 clams.
- (5) Oysters: 18 oysters, shucked and the shells left on the beach. Minimum size before shucking two and one-half inches along the longest dimension of the shell.
 - (6) Rock scallops: 6 scallops.
 - (7) Weathervane scallops: 12 scallops (over 4 inches).
- (8) Spiny and pink scallops: 10 pounds or 5 quarts in the shell, in the aggregate.
 - (9) Shrimp:
- (a) In Areas 1((-)) <u>through</u> 3 and Area 4 west of the Bonilla-Tatoosh line((—)): Total weight ((10)) $\underline{25}$ pounds, maximum ((80)) $\underline{200}$ spot shrimp as part of the ((10)) $\underline{25}$ -pound limit.
- (b) In Area 4 east of the Bonilla-Tatoosh line and Areas 5((-)) through 13((--)): First Saturday in May through May 31, daily limit 80 shrimp((-)); during all other open periods total weight 10 pounds, maximum 80 spot shrimp as part of the 10-pound limit.
 - (10) Octopus: 1 octopus.
 - (11) Pinto abalone: Closed statewide.

- (f) It is unlawful to fail to return undersize or oversize sturgeon to the river immediately.

- (ii) The minimum fork length is 38 inches, except on the mainstem Columbia and its tributaries from The Dalles Dam to Priest Rapids Dam and the Snake River from the Confluence Protection Area to Lower Granite Dam where the minimum fork length is 43 inches.
- (4) It is unlawful to fish for sturgeon in the Columbia River and tributaries upstream of Chief Joseph Dam.
- (5) For all saltwater waterways, ((excluding)) except Puget Sound and ((Puget Sound)) its tributaries, it is permissible to ((fish for)) catch and release white sturgeon the entire year. However, for freshwater waterways, it is permissible to ((fish for)) catch and release white sturgeon only when the season is open for salmon or game fish, unless otherwise provided.

- (a) Minimum size is 43 inches in fork length in the Columbia River and tributaries upstream from The Dalles Dam
- (b) Minimum size is 38 inches in fork length in all other state waters.

WAC 284-170-002 Risk adjustment program (1) An issuer of a non-grandfathered individual or small group plan in Washington state must participate in the permanent risk adjustment program (program) established pursuant to RCW 48.43.720.

- (2) Beginning September 1, 2015 or on an alternate date established by the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services (HHS), the commissioner will annually publish a notice of benefit and payment parameters (notice). The notice must include a statement of intent regarding whether the state or HHS will administer the program. The commissioner will determine the form of the notice, which will be consistent with the form required by HHS.
- (3) HHS will administer the program for 2014-2015. Issuers must comply with HHS requirements for the risk adjustment program.
- (4) Prior to publishing the annual notice of benefit and payment parameters, the commissioner will consult with an advisory group comprised of representatives from issuers who participate in the program, from the Health Benefit

Exchange, and, if under contract or otherwise established by the legislature, the commissioner's designated administrative entity for the state risk adjustment program.

- (a) The role of the advisory group is to review the prior state level performance of the risk adjustment program, and assist the commissioner in determining the benefit to state insurance markets of using:
 - (i) state-specific factors for risk adjustment; and
- (ii) a state specific methodology for risk adjustment incorporating both the issuer and the enrollee's perspective.
- (b) If an issuer wishes to participate in the advisory group, it must notify the commissioner in writing of its designated participant not later than May 1 of each year.
- (c) The advisory group must review the modeling and make recommendations based on the principles of preserving enrollment on existing plans for enrollees, ensuring market stability, and addressing adverse selection risk and experience in Washington state.
- (5) For a benefit year during which HHS administers the program, within thirty days of its submission of program data to HHS, an issuer must submit to an actuarial firm designated by the commissioner, the same data that it submits to HHS. Corrected data must also be submitted. All issuers participating in the risk adjustment program in Washington state, not just those participating in the advisory group, must conform to this requirement.
- (a) The data may only be used to perform modeling to inform the advisory group and commissioner in the annual decision-making process described in this section. Modeling done using the data must de-identify both issuers and any enrollees. Each advisory group participant is entitled to review all modeling reports, and upon request, learn which deidentified issuer represents their data set. The actuarial firm may not otherwise disclose the identity of data set sources.
- (b) The actuarial firm and each issuer must execute all necessary privacy and security agreements to ensure the confidentiality and privacy of personal health information, establish remedies for unauthorized release or distribution of the data that are consistent with state and federal law, provide for the retention of the data for not less than ten years, and for the destruction of the data after a ten year period of time. The commissioner will prepare a template for use by the actuarial firm and issuers. The agreement must be identical for each issuer, unless the commissioner specifically agrees to an exception or change requested by an issuer or the actuarial firm for good cause. The commissioner will resolve disputes between the actuarial firm and an issuer.
- (6) An issuer that does not submit data pursuant to this rule is subject to enforcement under title 48 RCW.

Chapter 200-305 WAC

DEBARMENT PROCEDURES

NEW SECTION

WAC 200-305-010 Definitions. The definitions in this section apply throughout this chapter unless the context clearly requires otherwise:

- (1) "Affiliate" means a person that is in affiliation with another person or persons. Persons are affiliates of each other and an affiliation exists if, directly or indirectly, either one controls or has the power to control the other or a third party controls or has the power to control both. Factors used to determine control include:
 - (a) Interlocking management or ownership;
 - (b) Identity of interests among family members;
 - (c) Shared facilities and equipment;
 - (d) Common use of employees; or
- (e) A business entity organized following the debarment or proposed debarment of a person which has the same or similar management, ownership, or principal employees as the person that was debarred or proposed for debarment.
- (2) "Agency" means any state office or activity of the executive and judicial branches of state government, including state agencies, departments, offices, divisions, boards, commissions, institutions of higher education as defined in RCW 28B.10.016, and correctional and other types of institutions
- (3) "Bid" means an offer, proposal, or quote for goods or services in response to a solicitation issued for such goods or services by the department or an agency of Washington state government.
- (4) "Bidder" means an individual or entity who submits a bid, quotation, or proposal in response to a solicitation issued for such goods or services by the department or an agency of Washington state government.
- (5) "Contractor" means an individual or entity awarded a contract with an agency to perform a service or provide goods.
 - (6) "Conviction" means:
- (a) A judgment or any other determination of guilt of a criminal offense by any court of competent jurisdiction, whether entered upon a verdict or plea, including a plea of nolo contendere; or
- (b) Any other resolution that is the functional equivalent of a judgment, including probation before judgment and deferred prosecution. A disposition without the participation of the court is the functional equivalent of a judgment only if it includes an admission of guilt.
- (7) "Covered transaction" means submitting a bid, having a bid considered, entering into a state contract, or subcontracting on a state contract.
- (8) "Debar" means to prohibit a contractor, individual, or other entity from submitting a bid, having a bid considered, or entering into a state contract during a specified period of time as set forth in a debarment order.
- (9) "Debarring official" means the director of the department of enterprise services or the director's designee.
- (10) "Department" means the department of enterprise services.
- (11) "Director" means the director of the department of enterprise services.
- (12) "Person" means any individual, corporation, partnership, association, unit of government, or legal entity, however organized.
 - (13) "Principal" means:
- (a) An officer, director, owner, partner, principal investigator, or other person within a bidder or contractor with man-

agement or supervisory responsibilities related to a covered transaction; or

- (b) A consultant or other person, whether or not employed by the bidder or contractor, who:
 - (i) Is in a position to handle state funds;
- (ii) Is in a position to influence or control the use of those funds; or
- (iii) Occupies a technical or professional position capable of substantially influencing the development or outcome of an activity required to perform the covered transaction.
- (14) "Service" for any delivery required under this chapter means personal delivery, delivery by US postal mail service, electronic mail delivery, or delivery by other reasonable commercially acceptable means of delivery.

NEW SECTION

WAC 200-305-020 Causes for debarment. The director may debar a contractor based on a finding of one or more of the causes specified in RCW 39.26.200. A debarment may include any affiliate of the contractor if specifically named and given notice of the proposed debarment pursuant to this chapter. The director may also debar a contractor or affiliate for any other cause the director determines to be so serious and compelling as to affect responsibility as a state contractor, including debarment by another governmental entity for any cause listed in regulations.

NEW SECTION

- WAC 200-305-030 Mitigating and aggravating factors. The following are the mitigating and aggravating factors that the reviewing official and debarring official may consider in determining whether to debar and the length of the debarment period.
- (1) The actual or potential harm or impact that resulted or may result from the wrongdoing.
- (2) The frequency of incidents and/or duration of the wrongdoing.
- (3) Whether there is a pattern or prior history of wrong-doing.
- (4) Whether the contractor or affiliate has been excluded or disqualified by an agency of the federal government or has not been allowed to participate in state or local contracts or assistance agreements on a basis of conduct similar to one or more of the causes for debarment specified in this rule.
- (5) Whether the contractor or affiliate has entered into an administrative agreement with a federal agency or a state or local government that is not government-wide but is based on conduct similar to one or more of the causes for debarment specified in this rule.
- (6) Whether the contractor or affiliate has accepted responsibility for the wrongdoing and recognizes the seriousness of the misconduct that led to the cause for debarment.
- (7) Whether the contractor or affiliate has paid or agreed to pay all criminal, civil and administrative liabilities for the improper activity, including any investigative or administrative costs incurred by the government, and has made or agreed to make full restitution.
- (8) Whether the contractor or affiliate has cooperated fully with the government agencies during the investigation

- and any court or administrative action. In determining the extent of cooperation, the reviewing official or debarring official may consider when the cooperation began and whether the contractor or affiliate disclosed all known pertinent information.
- (9) The kind of positions held by the individuals involved in the wrongdoing.
- (10) Whether the contractor or affiliate took appropriate corrective action or remedial measures, such as establishing ethics training and implementing programs to prevent recurrence.
- (11) Whether the contractor or affiliate brought the activity cited as a basis for the debarment to the attention of the appropriate government agency in a timely manner.
- (12) Whether the contractor or affiliate has fully investigated the circumstances surrounding the cause for debarment and, if so, made the result of the investigation available to the reviewing official or debarring official.
- (13) Whether the contractor or affiliate had effective standards of conduct and internal control systems in place at the time the questioned conduct occurred.
- (14) Whether the contractor or affiliate has taken appropriate disciplinary action against the individuals responsible for the activity that constitutes the cause for debarment.
- (15) Other factors appropriate to the circumstances of a particular case.

NEW SECTION

- WAC 200-305-040 Referring a person for debarment. (1) Any person may file a referral for debarment with the department. The referral must be in writing. The referring party may complete the department's debarment referral form. The referral should include the following information:
- (a) The name and contact information of the person submitting the referral;
- (b) The specific facts supporting the request for debarment, including the dates and locations for all events upon which the referral is made:
- (c) The cause or causes specified in RCW 39.26.200(2) upon which debarment may be based that the referring party believes are supported by the facts presented; and
- (d) The name of the contractor and any affiliates the referring party believes should be subject to debarment.
- (2) The person submitting the referral should provide additional information if requested by the department.
- (3) The department will make an initial assessment of the submittal. If the department determines that the facts as presented, if true, support a debarment, the department will conduct a review to substantiate the allegations. Otherwise, the department will reject the referral.
- (4) The department will notify the referring party in writing and state whether the referral will be reviewed or rejected.

NEW SECTION

WAC 200-305-050 Review. (1) If the department accepts a debarment referral and conducts a review, the department will notify the contractor and affiliates in writing.

Proposed [116]

- (2) The notice must:
- (a) State the applicable cause(s) for debarment and the factual allegations supporting each cause in terms sufficient to put the contractor and affiliates on notice of the specific reasons for the review;
- (b) Identify the statutory and administrative code provisions addressing debarment;
- (c) Request a written response to the allegations including any documents that support the response, and state that failure to respond will result in the department making a decision without the recipient's input; and
 - (d) State the effects of a debarment order.
- (3) At the conclusion of the review, the reviewing official will issue a report that includes the following information:
 - (a) Facts found by the reviewing official;
 - (b) Whether the facts support debarment; and
- (c) Either a recommendation that the referral be dismissed with no further action taken or that a debarment order be issued, including the duration of the debarment.

NEW SECTION

WAC 200-305-060 Notice of recommended debarment. (1) If, based on the review, the reviewing official determines that the facts support debarment the reviewing official shall notify the affected contractor and affiliates. The reviewing official shall cause service of the notice of recommended debarment on the affected contractor and affiliates. The notice shall include the following information:

- (a) Date when the recommended debarment takes effect:
- (b) Each cause for the recommended debarment and the facts that the reviewing official found that support each cause:
 - (c) The period of the recommended debarment;
- (d) How the recommended debarment will impact either the contractor or affiliates or both;
- (e) Either the contractor or affiliates or both may request a hearing in accordance with WAC 200-305-070 to dispute the recommended debarment or the recommended debarment period. The notice shall state that if no hearing is requested within thirty days of the date of issuance of the notice, the debarring official shall issue a final, unappealable debarment order; and
- (f) The recommended debarment order will not go into effect until the resolution of the hearing in accordance with WAC 200-305-080.
- (2) In the event either an affected contractor or affiliate or both does not request a hearing, the reviewing official will provide the report and recommendation to the debarring official, who may issue a final debarment order. The order shall include the effective date of the debarment order.

NEW SECTION

WAC 200-305-070 Request for a hearing on recommended debarment. Either the contractor or affiliate or both may request a hearing on the recommended debarment. The request must be filed with the director within thirty days after the date the reviewing official issued the notice of recom-

mended debarment. The person requesting the hearing must also serve a copy of the request on the reviewing official.

The request for hearing must be in writing and must specify:

- (1) The name of the person requesting the hearing and the person's contact information; and
- (2) The items, facts or conclusions in the notice of recommended debarment that the requestor contests.

NEW SECTION

WAC 200-305-080 Hearing on recommended debarment. (1) The director may hear the appeal personally or may delegate the authority to hold the hearing and draft a proposed decision to another person or to an administrative law judge pursuant to chapter 34.12 RCW. The reviewing official, on behalf of the department, shall be the petitioner in the hearing, and the contractor and affiliates shall be the respondents.

- (2) The reviewing official shall have the burden of proving the basis for the cause for debarment and the debarment period as set forth in the notice for recommended debarment.
- (3) The hearing shall be conducted in accordance with the Administrative Procedure Act, chapter 34.05 RCW and to the extent not covered in this chapter, by the uniform procedural rules in chapter 1-08 WAC.
- (4) If the director presides over the hearing, the director shall issue a final decision in writing that includes findings of fact, conclusions of law, and, if appropriate the debarment period. The director shall cause service of the final decision on all parties.
- (5) If the director's delegate or an administrative law judge presides over the hearing, she or he shall issue a proposed decision that includes findings of fact, conclusions of law and if appropriate the debarment period. The proposed decision shall also include instructions on how to file objections and written arguments or briefs with the debarring official. Objections and written arguments and briefs must be filed within twenty (20) days from the date of receipt of the proposed decision.
- (6) The parties shall agree to the method of service, as defined in WAC 200-305-010(14) for the proposed decision.

NEW SECTION

WAC 200-305-090 Final decision. (1) The debarring official shall review the proposed decision in accordance with the Administrative Procedure Act, chapter 34.05 RCW and any objections, written arguments and briefs timely filed by the parties. The debarring official may:

- (a) Allow the parties to present oral arguments;
- (b) Allow the parties to submit additional information if circumstances so warrant; or
- (c) Remand the matter to the delegate or administrative law judge for further proceedings;
- (2) The debarring official shall issue a final decision that adopts in whole or in part, modifies or rejects the proposed decision. If the decision is to issue a debarment order, the debarment becomes effective on the date specified in the debarment order, but in no event will the debarment order go into effect sooner than five (5) days from the date issued.

[117] Proposed

(3) The debarring official shall cause service of the final decision on all parties. Either the contractor or affiliate or both may file a petition for review of the final decision to superior court. If neither the contractor nor affiliate appeals within the period set by RCW 34.05.542, the debarring official's decision is conclusive and binding on all parties. The appeal must be filed within 30 days from service of the final decision.

NEW SECTION

- WAC 200-305-100 Effect of a debarment order on the contractor and affiliate. The effects of a debarment order on the contractor and affiliate are:
- (1) A debarred contractor and affiliate is ineligible to be a participant in any covered transaction or act as a principal of a person participating in any covered transaction as defined in WAC 200-305-010(7).
- (2) Debarment constitutes debarment of all divisions or other organizational elements of the debarred person, unless the debarment decision is limited by its terms to specific divisions, organizational elements, or commodities.
- (3) A person's debarment shall be effective in every agency, unless the director states in writing the compelling reasons justifying continued business dealings between an agency and the debarred person.

NEW SECTION

- WAC 200-305-110 Effect of a debarment order on state agencies. The effects of a debarment order on state agencies are:
- (1) Agencies shall not permit debarred persons to participate in covered transactions, unless the debarring official determines in writing that there is a compelling reason to do so.
- (2) If the period of debarment expires or is terminated prior to award, the contracting officer may, but is not required to, consider a debarred persons bid.
- (3) Notwithstanding debarment, agencies may continue contracts or subcontracts in existence at the time the person was debarred unless the debarring official determines otherwise
- (4) Agencies shall not add new work, exercise options, or otherwise extend the duration of current contracts or orders for debarred persons, unless the debarring official makes a written determination of the compelling reasons for doing so.

NEW SECTION

WAC 220-305-120 Relief from a debarment order.

- (1) A debarred contractor or affiliate may request that the debarring official grant relief from the final debarment order or reduce the time period or scope of the final debarment order.
- (2) The debarring official may reduce or terminate the debarment based on:
 - (a) Newly discovered material evidence;
- (b) A reversal of the conviction upon which debarment was based:
 - (c) A bona fide change in ownership or management;

- (d) Elimination of other causes for which the debarment was imposed: or
 - (e) Other reasons the debarring official finds appropriate.
