This policy applies whenever the department or selfinsured employer receives a request for claim information. This policy does not apply to crime victims' compensation claims under chapter 7.68 RCW. This policy is updated to add additional clarification and to reflect current practice.

Due to reconsideration of RCW 51.28.070, state fund and self-insured employers and their authorized representatives may review all claim files of a worker who has a claim pending with the requesting employer. The employer may review open and closed claims and claims by the worker filed against other employers regardless of the body part or condition. <u>Purpose</u>: An amendment to the rule is proposed to allow sworn testimony establishing the grounds for issuing an arrest warrant to be recorded through reliable means, in addition to electronically or stenographically.

There is a request to amend the comparable rule for courts of limited jurisdiction.

RULE 2.2 WARRANT OF ARREST AND SUMMONS

(a) Warrant of Arrest.

(1) *Generally*. If indictment is found or an information is filed, the court may direct the clerk to issue a warrant for the arrest of the defendant.

(2) *Probable Cause*. Before ruling on a request for a warrant the court may require the complainant to appear personally and may examine under oath the complainant and any witnesses the complainant may produce. A warrant of arrest may not issue unless the court determines that there is probable cause to believe that the defendant committed the offense charged. The court shall determine probable cause based on an affidavit, a document as provided in RCW 9A.72.085 or any law amendatory thereto, or sworn testimony establishing the grounds for issuing the warrant. Sworn testimony shall be recorded electronically Θr_{a} stenographically, or through any other reliable means. The evidence shall be preserved and shall be subject to constitutional limitations for probable cause determinations and may be hearsay in whole or in part.

<u>Purpose</u>: CrR 2.3 was adopted in 1973. The technology used by courts, law enforcement, and attorneys for transmitting and preserving documents and recorded testimony has significantly evolved. Telephone, facsimile, electronic mail, and digital recording methods are widely used. Statute and court rule allow for the use of digital signatures. With the proposed changes, the rule would continue to require that the court receive the sworn evidence from the prosecuting authority or police officer and issue the warrant through reliable methods that preserve the evidence and the warrant. Because technology continues to evolve, additional methods

of transmitting the sworn evidence and issuing the warrant are not specified in the rule. General Rule 31 (Access to Court Records) sets forth the provisions for public review of court records.

CrR 2.3 SEARCH AND SEIZURE

(c) Issuance and Contents. A search warrant may be issued only if the court determines there is probable cause for the issuance of a warrant. There The evidence in support of the warrant must be an in the form of affidavits, a document as provided in RCW 9A.72.085 or any law amendatory thereto, or sworn testimony establishing the grounds for issuing the warrant and may be provided to the court by any reliable means. The Any sworn testimony may must be an electronically recorded telephonic statement and made part of the court record. The recording or a duplication of the recording shall be a part of the court record and shall be transcribed if

requested by a party if there is a challenge to the validity of the warrant or if ordered by the court. The evidence in support of the finding of probable cause shall be preserved and shall be subject to constitutional limitations for such determinations and may be hearsay in whole or in part. If the court finds that probable cause for the issuance of a warrant exists, it shall issue a warrant identifying the property or person and naming or describing the person, place or thing to be searched. The court's authorization may be communicated by any reliable means. The court shall record a summary A record shall be made of any additional evidence on which it the court relies. The warrant shall be directed to any peace officer. It and shall command the officer to search, within a specified period of time not to exceed 10 days, the person, place, or thing named for the property or person specified. It The warrant shall designate to whom the court to which the warrant it shall be returned. The warrant may be served at any time

(d) Execution and Return With Inventory. The peace officer taking property under the warrant shall give to the person from whom or from whose premises the property is taken a copy of the warrant and a receipt for the property taken. If no such person is present, the officer may post a copy of the search warrant and receipt. The return shall be made promptly and shall be accompanied by a written inventory of any property taken. The inventory shall be made in the presence of the person from whose possession or premises the property is taken, or in the presence of at least one person other than the officer. The court shall upon request deliver provide a copy of the inventory to the person from whom or from whose premises the property was taken and to the applicant for the warrant.

Before making the determination, the court may consider an affidavits, a documents as provided in RCW 9A.72.-085 or any law amendatory thereto, or sworn testimony, and further may examine under oath the affiant and any witnesses the affiant may produce. Evidence may be provided by any reliable means. Sworn testimony shall be recorded electronically, or stenographically recorded or through any other reliable means. The evidence shall be preserved and shall be subject to constitutional limitations for probable cause determinations, and may be hearsay in whole or in part. The court's probable cause determination may be recorded by any reliable means.

The federal courts have long implemented electronic service of filed pleadings through the ECF/Pacer system. Our current rules permit electronic service only with the express consent of counsel in each case. GR 30 (b)(4) prevents local courts from having a choice.

Description of Proposal: The Willapa/Grays Harbor Oyster Growers Association (the association) is proposing to use imidacloprid on tidelands to control burrowing shrimp that are impacting commercial shellfish operations. The association has applied for a national pollutant discharge elimination system (NPDES) permit from the Washington state department of ecology (ecology). This permit would authorize and regulate the use of the pesticide imidacloprid on tidelands used for shellfish farming in Willapa Bay and Grays Harbor. Ecology anticipates the completion of a draft environmental impact statement (EIS) in order to inform a permit decision. If the proposal is accepted, it will be followed by issuance of a permit. Need for Proposal: The use of imidacloprid is being proposed to control burrowing shrimp on commercial shellfish beds in Willapa Bay and Grays Harbor. Burrowing shrimp destabilize the sediment on shellfish beds while also resuspending sediments into the water column. This causes shellfish to sink into the undermined sediment and die, resulting in the inability of shellfish growers to farm historic shellfish beds. Please refer to the web site for more information on the history and background of burrowing shrimp and aquaculture.

Proponent: Willapa/Grays Harbor Oyster Growers Association.

Location of Proposal: Willapa Bay in Pacific County, and Grays Harbor in Grays Harbor County, Washington.

Lead Agency: Ecology.

Preliminary Content: Ecology has preliminarily identified the following areas for discussion in the EIS pursuant to the State Environmental Policy Act (SEPA): Sediment quality, air quality, water quality, plants, animals, and human health.

A discussion of alternatives could include:

1. No action - which means no permit is issued.

2. Mechanical control of burrowing shrimp only.

3. Alternative chemical control of burrowing shrimp only.

4. Other production methods.

5. An integrated pest management plan which may include both chemical and mechanical control methods.

Purpose of Scoping: Scoping is the public process in which ecology identifies the significant environmental issues and provides notice to the public, other agencies, and affected tribes, that an EIS is being prepared. Through the scoping procedure interested parties can help define the issues the EIS will address, identify alternatives, and provide focus to the EIS.

Agencies, affected tribes, and members of the public are invited to comment on the scope of the EIS. Ecology prefers to have comments submitted by e-mail, but accepts all comments.

Announcing a Draft Zostera japonica Management on Commercial Clam Beds in Willapa Bay General Permit for Review and Comment

Proposed Permit: The Washington state department of ecology (ecology) is proposing a new general permit to regulate the use of imazamox for management of Zostera japonica (Z. japonica) on commercial clam beds in Willapa Bay, a surface water of Washington state. Permit development was requested by commercial shellfish growers to control Z. japonica on commercial clam beds in Willapa Bay to facilitate the cultivation and harvest of clams.

Washington's water quality statutes and regulations do not allow the discharge of pollutants to waters of the state without permit coverage. Imazamox, the herbicide proposed for management of Z. japonica is a potential pollutant, and therefore requires a discharge permit before application to surface waters. Ecology issues general permits in place of a series of individual permits when the permitted activities are similar.

Ecology has determined that this proposal is likely to have significant adverse impacts on the environment, particularly the native eelgrass, *Zostera marina*. A draft environmental impact statement (DEIS) has been prepared and is available for review and comment.

Purpose of the Permit: This permit would allow the management of Z. japonica on commercial clam beds in Willapa Bay, excluding geoduck culture, using the herbicide imazamox. Commercial clam growers must apply for coverage under this permit prior to implementing Z. japonica control activities using imazamox.
