Purpose: This amendment is intended to make the rule clearer, and thus easier to understand, particularly for the many pro se petitioners that seek relief from restraint under these rules. Because a newly proposed rule 16.8A will set forth the circumstances under which a petition filed in the Supreme Court will be transferred to the Court of Appeals, the sentence regarding the Supreme Court "ordinarily" transferring the petition should be omitted, as it is not particularly helpful.

SUGGESTED AMENDMENT RULES OF APELLATE PROCEDURE (RAP) RULE 16.3 - PERSONAL RESTRAINT PETITION—GENERALLY

- (a) Habeas Corpus and Postconviction Relief. Procedure for Relief from Restraint. Rules 16.3 through 16.15 and rules 16.24 through 16.27 establish a single procedure for original proceedings in the appellate court to obtain relief formerly available by a petition for writ of habeas corpus or by an application for post conviction relief. from restraint.
- **(b) Former Procedure Superseded.** The procedure established by rules 16.3 through 16.15 and rules 16.24 through 16.27 for a personal restraint petition supersedes the appellate procedure formerly available for a petition for writ of habeas corpus and for an application for post-conviction relief, unless one of these rules specifically indicates to the contrary. These rules do not supersede and do not apply to habeas corpus proceedings initiated in the superior court.
- (c) Original Appellate Court Jurisdiction. The Supreme Court and the Court of Appeals have original con-

current jurisdiction in personal restraint petition proceedings in which the death penalty has not been decreed. The Supreme Court will ordinarily exercise its jurisdiction by transferring the petition to the Court of Appeals. The Supreme Court has exclusive original jurisdiction in personal restraint proceedings in which the petitioner is under a sentence of death.

Submitted by the Board of Governors of the Washington State Bar Association

Purpose: RCW 10.73.130 provides that RCW 10.73.090 and 10.73.100 apply to petitions filed after July 23, 1989. The current reference to RCW 10.73.130 is no longer necessary because there would not be any petitions pending that were filed before July 23, 1989.

SUGGESTED AMENDMENT RULES OF APELLATE PROCEDURE (RAP) RULE 16.4 - PERSONAL RESTRAINT PETITION—GROUNDS FOR REMEDY

- (a) Generally. Except as restricted by section (d), the appellate court will grant appropriate relief to a petitioner if the petitioner is under a "restraint" as defined in section (b) and the petitioner's restraint is unlawful for one or more of the reasons defined in section (c).
- **(b) Restraint.** A petitioner is under a "restraint" if the petitioner has limited freedom because of a court decision in a civil or criminal proceeding, the petitioner is confined, the petitioner is subject to imminent confinement, or the petitioner is under some other disability resulting from a judgment or sentence in a criminal case.
- **(c) Unlawful Nature of Restraint.** The restraint must be unlawful for one more of the following reasons:
- (1) The decision in a civil or criminal proceeding was entered without jurisdiction over the person of the petitioner or the subject matter; or
- (2) The conviction was obtained or the sentence or other order entered in a criminal proceeding or civil proceeding instituted by the state or local government was imposed or entered in violation of the Constitution of the United States or the Constitution or laws of the State of Washington; or
- (3) Material facts exist which have not been previously presented and heard, which in the interest of justice require vacation of the conviction, sentence or other order entered in a criminal proceeding or civil proceeding instituted by the state or local government; or

- (4) There has been a significant change in the law, whether substantive or procedural, which is material to the conviction, sentence, or other order entered in a criminal proceeding or a civil proceeding instituted by the state or local government, and sufficient reasons exist to require retroactive application of the changed legal standard; or
- (5) Other grounds exist for a collateral attack upon a judgment in a criminal proceeding or civil proceeding instituted by the state or local government; or
- (6) The conditions or manner of the restraint of petitioner are in violation of the Constitution of the United States or the Constitution or laws of the State of Washington; or
- (7) Other grounds exist to challenge the legality of the restraint of petitioner.
- (d) Restrictions. The appellate court will only grant relief by a personal restraint petition if other remedies which may be available to petitioner are inadequate under the circumstances and if such relief may be granted under RCW 10.73.090 or .100 and .130. No more than one petition for similar relief on behalf of the same petitioner will be entertained without good cause shown.

(a) Generally. Under the titles indicated, the petition should set forth:

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- (1) Status of Petitioner. The restraint on petitioner; the place where petitioner is held in custody, if confined; the judgment, sentence, or other order or authority upon which petitioners restraint is based, identified by date of entry, court, and cause number; any appeals taken from that judgment, sentence or order; and a statement of each other petition or collateral attack as that term is defined in RCW 10.73.090, whether filed in federal court or state court, filed with regard to the same allegedly unlawful restraint, identified by the date filed, the court, the disposition made by the court, and the date of disposition.
- (2) Grounds for Relief. A statement of (i) the facts upon which the claim of unlawful restraint of petitioner is based and the evidence available to support the factual allegations, (ii) why other remedies are inadequate, and (iii) why the petitioners restraint is unlawful for one or more of the reasons specified in rule 16.4(c). Legal argument and authorities may be included in the petition, or submitted in a separate brief as provided in rule 16.10(a).
- (3) Citations to Court Documents. If some of the evidence supporting the factual allegations is contained in the files of a trial or appellate court, the petition should identify the documents needed for review and the case numbers under which they can be found. The appellate court may order that any court documents identified for review be transferred or transmitted to the court.
- (4) Statement of Finances. If petitioner is unable to pay the filing fee or fees of counsel, a request should be included for waiver of the filing fee and for the appointment of counsel at public expense. The request should be supported by a statement of petitioner's total assets and liabilities.
 - (4) (5) Request for Relief. The relief petitioner wants.
- (5) (6) Oath. If a notary is available, The petition must be signed by the petitioner or his attorney and verified substantially as follows under penalty of perjury. The verification may be in the following form:

After first being duly sown, on oath, I depose and say: I declare under penalty of perjury under the laws of the State of Washington that I am the petitioner, that I have read the petition, know its contents, and I believe the petition is true

or

After first being duly sown, on oath, I depose and say: I declare under penalty of perjury under the laws of the State of Washington that I am the attorney for the petitioner, that I have read the petition, know its contents, and I believe the petition is true.

raised for the first time in an amended petition that is filed outside the one-year time bar do not relate back to the original petition, and will be time-barred unless they fall within an exception to the time bar.

- (a) Filing Fee. A personal restraint petition will be filed by the clerk of the appellate court only if the statutory filing fee is paid, unless the appellate court determines that the petitioner is unable to pay the filing fee indigent. The statute requiring governing payment of a fee for filing a petition for writ of habeas corpus is controlling.
- **(b) Filing in Court of Appeals.** A personal restraint petition filed in the Court of Appeals must be filed in the division which that includes the superior court entering the decision on the basis of which petitioner is held in custody or, if petitioner is not being held in custody on the basis of a decision, in the division in which the petitioner is located.
- (c) Deficient Petitions. If the clerk of the appellate court determines that a petition submitted does not conform with this rule or with rule 16.7 (a)(1), (3), (4), (5), (6), or (7), the petition should be filed and the clerk will direct the petitioner to correct the deficiency within 60 days.
- (d) Service of Petition. If petitioner's restraint is imposed by the state or local government, the clerk of the appellate court will reproduce a copy of the petition and serve the petition on the officer or agency under a duty to respond to the petition. If petitioner's restraint is imposed by a person or agency other than the state or local government, the petitioner must prepare and serve a copy of the petition on the proper respondent.
- (e) Amendment of Petition. The appellate court may allow a petition to be amended. All amendments raising new grounds are subject to the time limitation provided in RCW 10.73.090 and 10.73.100.

Subsection (c) is intended to provide a summary mechanism for the appellate court to remand a collateral attack that has been improperly

transferred to the appellate court pursuant to CrR 7.8 (c)(2). It would be unfair to require petitioners to pay a filing fee in such circumstances. If the petition is not dismissed as clearly frivolous or clearly barred, and not transferred back to the trial court, the court will enter an order requesting a response from the State.

RULES OF APELLATE PROCEDURE (RAP) RULE 16.8A - PERSONAL RESTRAINT PETITION—PRELIMINARY REVIEW BY COURT

- (a) Preliminary Review. Upon receipt of the petition, the appellate court will conduct a preliminary review.
- (b) Dismissal Without Response. The appellate court will dismiss the petition without requesting a response if it is clearly frivolous or clearly barred by RCW 10.73.090 or RAP 16.4(d).
- (c) Remand to Superior Court. If the petition was originally filed as a habeas corpus petition or a motion under CrR 7.8, and the superior court clearly erred in transferring the matter to the Court of Appeals, the Court of Appeals will remand the matter to the superior court. New subsection (b) provides a mechanism for the court to require the respondent to admit or deny a specific allegation, at the court's discretion after the time for filing a response has passed. Some claims, such as claims that the State withheld material exculpatory evidence, could be more expeditiously resolved by an order to admit or deny an allegation, rather than referring the matter for a superior court reference hearing. The respondent would not be required to admit or deny specific allegations unless directed to do so by the court. As formulated, this mechanism can be utilized in the appropriate circumstances at the court's discretion.

(a) Generally. The respondent must serve and file a any response within 60 days after the petition is served the court requests that a response be filed, unless the time is extended by the commissioner or clerk for good cause shown, or unless the court can determine without requiring a response that the petition should be dismissed under RCW 10.73.090 or RCW 10.73.140. The response must answer the allegations in the petition. While some petitions are frivolous on their face, and should be summarily dismissed pursuant to RCW 10.73.140, this rule, and newly proposed RAP 16.8A, other petitions may reveal themselves to be frivolous only after the State has provided its response. For example, a claim that a defendant's offender score was miscalculated may be shown to be frivolous once the State provides the plea and sentencing documentation. The rule as formulated makes it clear that such petitions may be decided by the Chief Judge without referring the petition to a panel of judges.

SUGGESTED AMENDMENT RULES OF APELLATE PROCEDURE (RAP) RULE 16.11 - PERSONAL RESTRAINT PETITION—CONSIDER-ATION OF PETITION

(a) Generally. The Chief Judge will consider the petition promptly after the time has expired to file petitioner's reply brief. The Chief Judge determines at the initial consideration if the petition will be retained by the appellate court for determination on the merits or transferred to a superior court for determination on the merits or for a reference hearing. For the purpose of rules in this Title 16, "Chief Judge" includes "Acting Chief Judge."

- **(b) Determination by Appellate Court.** The Chief Judge determines at the initial consideration of the petition the steps necessary to properly decide on the merits the issues raised by the petition. If after consideration of the response and any reply, the Chief Judge determines that the issues presented are frivolous, the Chief Judge will dismiss the petition. If the petition is not frivolous and can be determined solely on the record, the Chief Judge will refer the petition to a panel of judges for determination on the merits. If the petition cannot be determined solely on the record, the Chief Judge will transfer the petition to a superior court for a determination on the merits or for a reference hearing. The Chief Judge may enter other orders necessary to obtain a prompt determination of the petition on the merits.
- (c) Oral Argument. Decisions of the Chief Judge will be made without oral argument. If a petition is to be decided on the merits by a panel of judges, the appellate court clerk will set the petition for consideration by the panel of judges, with or without oral argument. If oral argument is directed, the clerk will notify the parties of the date set for oral argument.

However, the right to counsel is limited in some cases by RCW 10.73.140, and thus the proposed amendment acknowledges that the right to counsel is "to the extent authorized by statute."

SUGGESTED AMENDMENT RULES OF APELLATE PROCEDURE (RAP) RULE 16.12 - PERSONAL RESTRAINT PETITION—SUPERIOR COURT HEARING

If the appellate court transfers the petition to a superior court, the transfer will be to the superior court for the county in which the decision was made resulting in the restraint of petitioner or, if petitioner is not being restrained on the basis of a decision, in the superior court in the county in which petitioner is located. If the respondent is represented by the Attorney General, the prosecuting attorney, or a municipal attorney, respondent must take steps to obtain a prompt evidentiary hearing and must serve notice of the date set for hearing on all other parties. The parties, on motion, and for good eause shown will be granted reasonable pretrial discovery. Each party has the right to subpoena witnesses. The hear-

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ing shall be held before a judge who was not involved in the challenged proceedings. The petitioner has the right to be present at the hearing, and the right to cross-examine adverse witnesses, and the right to counsel to the extent authorized by statute. The Rules of Evidence apply at the hearing. Upon the conclusion of the hearing, if the case has been transferred for a reference hearing, the superior court shall enter findings of fact and have the findings and all appellate files forwarded to the appellate court. Upon the conclusion of the hearing if the case has been transferred for a determination on the merits, the superior court shall enter findings of fact and conclusions of law and an order deciding the petition.

The appellate court order will define at whose expense the record is prepared. The record will be prepared at public expense where the petitioner is indigent, as set forth in rule 16.15(h). Oral argument is governed by rule 16.11(c).

Amend CrRLJ 2.2: Warrant of Arrest or Summons Upon Complaint;

Submitted by the District & Municipal Courts Judges Association

Background and Purpose: In the fall of 2012, the Superior Court Judges Association [SCJA] submitted proposed amendments to Superior Court rules CrR 2.3 [Search Warrants] and CrR 3.2.1 [Procedure Following Warrantless Arrest-Preliminary Appearance]. No amendments were proposed for the analogous rules for courts of limited jurisdic-

tion [CLJ] at that time. As a result, an inherent conflict was potentially created between the CLJ and Superior Court rules. The DMCJA expressed concerns to the SCJA regarding the proposed amendments. Thereafter, the SCJA requested that the Supreme Court defer action on its proposed rule amendments to allow the two Associations to confer and try and reach consensus on proposed language. The Supreme Court deferred action on the SCJA's proposal until September 30, 2013. In the meantime, representatives from the SCJA and the DMCJA have discussed the overall purpose of the SCJA proposal and have come to consensus on language that addresses the concerns of both Associations. As a result of those discussions, the DMCJA hereby submits proposed amendments to three CLJ rules: CrRLJ 2.2 [Warrant of Arrest or Summons Upon Complaint]; CrRLJ 2.3 [Search and Seizure], and CrRLJ 3.2.1 [Warrantless Arrest-Preliminary Appearance].

The purpose of the proposed amendments is to acknowledge that the technology utilized by courts, law enforcement and attorneys for transmitting and preserving documents and recorded testimony has significantly evolved over the years and will continue to evolve. For over a decade, CLJ and Superior Courts in Washington have been receiving and approving search warrants and probable cause determinations via telephone, facsimile and email. The rules continue to require that the court receive the sworn evidence in support of the probable cause determination or warrant application from the prosecuting authority or police officer through reliable methods. Because technology continues to evolve, the various methods of transmitting sworn evidence and issuing probable cause determinations and warrants are not specified in these rules. The rules continue to require preservation of the sworn evidence considered by the court in making the probable cause determinations and issuing warrants.

A minor amendment is proposed to CrRLJ 2.2 to acknowledge evolving technology for recording information. In CrRLJ 2.3 the reference to CrRLJ 8.10 is deleted because GR 31 contains the provisions for public review of court records. The sentences in CrRLJ 3.2.1 were rearranged for clarity.

Because the proposed amendments are part of a threerule package, this GR 9 Cover Sheet is being submitted with each rule proposal.

Proposed Amendment:

CrRLJ 2.2 WARRANT OF ARREST OR SUMMONS UPON COMPLAINT

- (a) Issuance of Warrant of Arrest.
- (1) Generally. If a complaint is filed and if the offense charged may be tried in the jurisdiction in which the warrant issues, and if the sentence for the offense charged may include confinement in jail, the court may direct the clerk to issue a warrant for the arrest of the defendant unless the defendant has already been arrested in connection with the

offense charged and is in custody or has been released on obligation to appear in court.

- (2) Probable Cause. A warrant of arrest must be supported by an affidavit, a document as provided in RCW 9A.72.085 or any law amendatory thereto, or sworn testimony establishing the grounds for issuing the warrant. Sworn testimony shall be recorded electronically, or stenographically or by any reliable method. The evidence shall be preserved. The court must determine there is probable cause to believe that the defendant has committed the crime alleged before issuing the warrant. The evidence shall be subject to constitutional limitations for probable cause determinations and may be hearsay in whole or in part.
 - (3) Ascertaining Defendant's Current Address.
- (i) Search for Address. The court shall not issue a warrant unless it determines that the complainant has attempted to ascertain the defendant's current address by searching the following: (A) the District Court Information system database (DISCIS), (B) the driver's license and identicard database maintained by the Department of Licenses; and (C) the database maintained by the Department of Corrections listing persons incarcerated and under supervision. The court in its discretion may require that other databases be searched.
- (ii) Exemptions from Address Search. The search required by subdivision (i) shall not be required if (A) the defendant has already appeared in court (in person or through counsel) after filing of the same case, (B) the defendant is known to be in custody, or (C) the defendant's name is unknown.
- (iii) Effect of Erroneous Issuance. If a warrant is erroneously issued in violation of this subsection (a)(3), that error shall not affect the validity of the warrant.
 - (b) Issuance of Summons in Lieu of Warrant.
- (1) Generally. If a complaint is filed, the court may direct the clerk to issue a summons commanding the defendant to appear before the court at a specified time and place.
- (2) When Summons Must Issue. The court shall direct the clerk to issue a summons instead of a warrant unless it finds reasonable cause to believe that the defendant (i) will not appear in response to a summons, (ii) will commit a violent offense, (iii) will interfere with witnesses or the administration of justice, or (iv) is in custody.
- (3) Summons for Felony Complaint. If the complaint charges the commission of a felony, the court may direct the clerk to issue a summons instead of a warrant unless it finds reasonable cause to believe that the defendant will not appear in response to a summons, or that arrest is necessary to prevent bodily harm to the accused or another, in which case it may issue a warrant.
- (4) Summons. A summons shall be in writing and in the name of the charging jurisdiction, shall be signed by the clerk with the title of that office, and shall state the date when issued. It shall state the name of the defendant and the nature of the charge, and shall summon the defendant to appear before the court at a stated time and place. The summons shall inform the defendant that failure to appear as commanded may result in the issuance of a warrant for the arrest of the accused.
- (5) Failure To Appear on Summons. If a person fails to appear in response to a summons, or if delivery is not effected

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within a reasonable time, a warrant of arrest may issue, if the sentence for the offense charged may include confinement in jail.

- (c) Requisites of a Warrant. The warrant shall be in writing and in the name of the charging jurisdiction, shall be signed by the judge or clerk with the title of that office, and shall state the date when issued. It shall specify the name of the defendant, or if his or her name is unknown, any name or description by which he or she can be identified with reasonable certainty. The warrant shall specify the offense charged against the defendant and that the court has found that probable cause exists to believe the defendant has committed the offense charged and shall command the defendant be arrested and brought forthwith before the court issuing the warrant. If the offense is not a capital offense, the court shall set forth in the order for the warrant, bail and/or other conditions of release.
 - (d) Execution; Service.
- (1) Execution of Warrant. The warrant shall be directed to all peace officers in the state and shall be executed only by a peace officer.
- (2) Delivery of Summons. The summons may be served any place within the state. It may be served by a peace officer, who shall deliver a copy of the same to the defendant personally, or it may be delivered by the court mailing the same, postage prepaid, to the defendant at his or her last known address.
- (e) Return. The officer executing a warrant shall make return thereof to the court before whom the defendant is brought pursuant to these rules. At the request of the prosecuting authority any unexecuted warrant shall be returned to the issuing court to be canceled. The peace officer to whom a summons has been given for service shall, on or before the return date, file a return thereof with the court before whom the summons is returnable. For reasonable cause, the court may order that the warrant be returned to it.
 - (f) Defective Warrant or Summons.
- (1) Amendment. No person arrested under a warrant or appearing in response to a summons shall be discharged from custody or dismissed because of any irregularity in the warrant or summons, but the warrant or summons may be amended so as to remedy any irregularity.
- (2) Issuance of New Warrant or Summons. If during the preliminary examination of any person arrested under a warrant or appearing in response to a summons, it appears that the warrant or summons does not properly name or describe the defendant or the offense with which he or she is charged, or that although not guilty of the offense specified in the warrant or summons, there is reasonable ground to believe that he or she will be charged with some other offense, the judge shall not discharge or dismiss the defendant but may allow a new complaint to be filed and shall thereupon issue a new warrant or summons.
- (g) Failure to Issue Warrant—Dismissal. Upon five days' notice to the prosecuting attorney, the court shall dismiss a charge without prejudice if (i) 90 days have elapsed since the citation or complaint was filed and (ii) on the date that the order of dismissal is entered, no warrant has been issued and the defendant has not appeared in court.

Suggested Amendments to CRIMINAL RULES FOR THE COURTS OF LIMITED JURISDICTION

Amend CrRLJ 2.3: Search and Seizure;

Submitted by the District & Municipal Courts Judges Association

Background and Purpose: In the fall of 2012, the Superior Court Judges Association [SCJA] submitted proposed amendments to Superior Court rules CrR 2.3 [Search Warrants] and CrR 3.2.1 [Procedure Following Warrantless Arrest-Preliminary Appearance]. No amendments were proposed for the analogous rules for courts of limited jurisdiction [CLJ] at that time. As a result, an inherent conflict was potentially created between the CLJ and Superior Court rules. The DMCJA expressed concerns to the SCJA regarding the proposed amendments. Thereafter, the SCJA requested that the Supreme Court defer action on its proposed rule amendments to allow the two Associations to confer and try and reach consensus on proposed language. The Supreme Court deferred action on the SCJA's proposal until September 30, 2013. In the meantime, representatives from the SCJA and the DMCJA have discussed the overall purpose of the SCJA proposal and have come to consensus on language that addresses the concerns of both Associations. As a result of those discussions, the DMCJA hereby submits proposed amendments to three CLJ rules: CrRLJ 2.2 [Warrant of Arrest or Summons Upon Complaint]; CrRLJ 2.3 [Search and Seizure], and CrRLJ 3.2.1 [Warrantless Arrest-Preliminary Appearance].

The purpose of the proposed amendments is to acknowledge that the technology utilized by courts, law enforcement and attorneys for transmitting and preserving documents and recorded testimony has significantly evolved over the years and will continue to evolve. For over a decade, CLJ and Superior Courts in Washington have been receiving and approving search warrants and probable cause determinations via telephone, facsimile and email. The rules continue to require that the court receive the sworn evidence in support of the probable cause determination or warrant application from the prosecuting authority or police officer through reliable methods. Because technology continues to evolve, the various methods of transmitting sworn evidence and issuing probable cause determinations and warrants are not specified in these rules. The rules continue to require preservation of the sworn evidence considered by the court in making the probable cause determinations and issuing warrants.

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A minor amendment is proposed to CrRLJ 2.2 to acknowledge evolving technology for recording information. In CrRLJ 2.3 the reference to CrRLJ 8.10 is deleted because GR 31 contains the provisions for public review of court records. The sentences in CrRLJ 3.2.1 were rearranged for clarity.

Because the proposed amendments are part of a threerule package, this GR 9 Cover Sheet is being submitted with each rule proposal.

Proposed Amendment:

CrRLJ 2.3 SEARCH AND SEIZURE

- (a) Authority To Issue Warrant. A search warrant authorized by this rule may be issued by the court upon request of a peace officer or the prosecuting authority.
- (b) Property or Persons Which May Be Seized With a Warrant. A warrant may be issued under this rule to search for and seize any (1) evidence of a crime; or (2) contraband, the fruits of crime, or things otherwise criminally possessed; or (3) weapons or other things by means of which a crime has been committed or reasonably appears about to be committed; or (4) person for whose arrest there is probable cause, or who is unlawfully restrained.
- (c) Issuance and Contents. A search warrant may be issued only if the court determines there is probable cause for the issuance of a warrant. There must be a An affidavit, a document as provided in RCW 9A.72.085 or any law amendatory thereto, or sworn testimony establishing the grounds for issuing the warrant, must be provided or transmitted to the court by any reliable method. The sworn testimony may be an electronically recorded telephonic statement. The s Sworn testimony must be in writing, recorded electronically, or otherwise preserved. The record shall include any additional evidence relied upon by the court. The recording, or a duplication of the recording, shall be a part of the court record and shall be provided if requested by a party or if ordered by the court, subject to the provisions of rule 8.10. The evidence in support of the finding of probable cause shall be preserved and shall be subject to constitutional limitations for such determinations and may be hearsay in whole or in part. If the court finds that probable cause for the issuance of a warrant exists, it shall issue a warrant or direct an individual whom it authorizes for such purposes to affix the court's signature to a warrant. The authorization of the warrant may be done through any reliable method. The warrant may be directed to any peace officer. The warrant shall command the officer to search, within a specified period of time not to exceed 10 days, the person, place or thing named for the property or person specified. He The warrant shall designate the court to which the warrant it shall be returned. It The warrant shall be returned to the issuing court, and filed in the public files of the court record and available for public review unless ordered sealed by the court. Unless otherwise designated by the issuing court, the warrant may be served at any time of day or night.

- (d) Execution and Return With Inventory. The peace officer taking property under the warrant shall give to the person from whom or from whose premises the property is taken a copy of the warrant and a receipt for the property taken. If no such person is present, the officer may post a copy of the search warrant and receipt. The return shall be made promptly and shall be accompanied by a written inventory of any property taken. The inventory shall be made in the presence of the person from whose possession or premises the property is taken, or in the presence of at least one person other than the officer. The court shall upon request deliver provide a copy of the inventory to the person from whom or from whose premises the property was taken and to the applicant for the warrant.
- (e) Motion for Return of Property. A person may move the issuing court for the return of the property seized under the warrant on the ground that the property was illegally seized, or does not appear relevant or reasonably calculated to lead to the discovery of relevant evidence, and that the person is lawfully entitled to possession of the property. The motion shall be filed in the court which issued the warrant and a copy served upon the chief executive of the law enforcement agency that obtained the warrant. Proof of service shall be filed with the court. The prosecuting authority's assertion that property lawfully seized is relevant or reasonably calculated to lead to the discovery of relevant evidence shall be binding on the court.
- (1) Procedure if Charges Pending. If a motion based on the ground that property was illegally seized is made or comes on for hearing after a complaint or citation and notice is filed in the court in which the motion is pending, it shall be treated as a motion to suppress. If charges are pending in another court at the time a motion made upon any ground is filed or comes on for hearing, the motion shall be transferred to the other court and subject to its rules of procedure.
- (2) Procedure if No Charges Pending. If no charges are pending in any court at the time the motion is made, the issuing court shall set the motion for hearing not less than 30 days from the date of the filing or service of the motion, whichever is later
- (3) Procedure if Motion Granted. If the motion is granted, the property shall be returned unless the prosecuting authority seeks review within 14 days.
 - (f) Searches of Media.
- (1) Scope. If an application for a search warrant is governed by RCW 10.79.015(3) or 42 U.S.C. subsection 2000aa et seq., this section controls the procedure for obtaining the evidence.
- (2) Subpoena Duces Tecum. Except as provided in subsection (3), if the court determines that the application satisfies the requirements for issuance of a warrant, as provided in section (c) of this rule, the court shall issue a subpoena duces tecum in accordance with CRLJ 45(b).
- (3) Warrant. If the court determines that the application satisfies the requirements for issuance of a warrant and that RCW 10.79.015(3) and 42 U.S.C. subsection 2000aa et seq. permit issuance of a search warrant rather than a subpoena duces tecum, the court may issue a warrant.
- (g) Motion for Suppression. Absent prejudice to the defendant, procedural noncompliance with rules of execution

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and return does not compel invalidation of a warrant or suppression of its fruits.

Comment: CrRLJ 2.3 was adopted in 1987. The technology utilized by courts, law enforcement and attorneys for transmitting and preserving documents and recorded testimony has significantly evolved. Telephone, facsimile, electronic mail and digital recording methods are widely used. Statute and court rule allow for the use of digital signatures. The rule continues to require that the court receive the sworn evidence from the prosecuting authority or police officer and issue the warrant through any reliable method that preserves the evidence and the warrant. Because technology continues to evolve, the various methods of transmitting the sworn evidence and issuing the warrant are not specified in the rule. General Rule 31, Access to Court Records, sets forth the provisions for public review of court records.

Proposed Amendment:

CrRLJ 3.2.1 PROCEDURE FOLLOWING WARRANTLESS ARREST—PRELIMINARY HEARING

- (a) Probable Cause Determination. A person who is arrested shall have <u>a</u> judicial determination of probable cause no later than 48 hours following the person's arrest, unless probable cause has been determined prior to such arrest.
- (b) How Determined. The court shall determine probable cause on evidence presented by a peace officer or prosecuting authority in the same manner as provided for a warrant of arrest in CrRLJ rule 2.2(a). In making the probable cause determination, the court may consider an affidavit, a document as provided in RCW 9A.72.085 or any law amendatory thereto, or sworn testimony, and further may examine under oath the affiant and any witnesses the affiant may produce. Sworn testimony, including telephonic statements, shall be recorded electronically, stenographically, or by any reliable method. The written or recorded evidence considered by the court may be hearsay in whole or part. The evidence shall be preserved and shall be subject to constitutional limitations for probable cause determinations may consist of an electronieally recorded telephonic statement. The court's probable cause determination may be recorded through any reliable method. If the court finds that release without bail should be denied or that conditions should attach to the release on personal recognizance, other than the promise to appear for a court hearing trial, the court shall proceed to determine whether probable cause exists to believe that the accused committed the offense charged crime alleged, unless this determination has previously been made by a court. Before making the determination, the court may consider an affidavit, a document as provided in RCW 9A.72.085 or any law amendatory thereto, or sworn testimony, and further may examine under oath the affiant and any witnesses the affiant may produce. Sworn testimony shall be electronically or stenographically recorded. The evidence shall be preserved and shall be subject to constitutional limitations for probable cause determinations, and may be hearsay in whole or in part.

[39] Miscellaneous

- (c) Court Days. For the purpose of section (a), Saturday, Sunday and holidays may be considered judicial days.
 - (d) Preliminary Appearance.
- (1) Adult. Unless an accused has appeared or will appear before the superior court for a preliminary appearance, any accused detained in jail must be brought before a court of limited jurisdiction as soon as practicable after the detention is commenced, but in any event before the close of business on the next court day.
- (2) Juveniles. Unless an accused has appeared or will appear before the superior court for a preliminary appearance, any accused in whose case the juvenile court has entered a written order declining jurisdiction and who is detained in custody, must be brought before a court of limited jurisdiction as soon as practicable after the juvenile court order is entered, but in any event before the close of business on the next court day.
- (3) Unavailability. If an accused is unavailable for preliminary appearance because of physical or mental disability, the court may, for good cause shown and recorded by the court, enlarge the time prior to preliminary appearance.
 - (e) Procedure at Preliminary Appearance.
- (1) At the preliminary appearance, the court shall provide for a lawyer pursuant to rule 3.1 and for pretrial release pursuant to rule 3.2, and the court shall orally inform the accused:
 - (i) of the nature of the charge against the accused;
- (ii) of the right to be assisted by a lawyer at every stage of the proceedings; and
- (iii) of the right to remain silent, and that anything the accused says may be used against him or her.
- (2) If the court finds that release should be denied or that conditions should attach to release on personal recognizance, other than the promise to appear in court at subsequent hearings, the court shall proceed to determine whether probable cause exists to believe that the accused committed the offense charged, unless this determination has previously been made by a court. Before making the determination, the court may consider affidavits filed or sworn testimony and further may examine under oath the affiant and any witnesses he or she may produce. Subject to constitutional limitations, the finding of probable cause may be based on evidence which is hearsay in whole or in part.
 - (f) Time Limits.
- (1) Unless a written complaint is filed or the accused consents in writing or on the record in open court, an accused, following a preliminary appearance, shall not be detained in jail or subjected to conditions of release for more than 72 hours after the accused's detention in jail or release on conditions, whichever occurs first. Computation of the 72-hour period shall not include any part of Saturdays, Sundays, or holidays.
- (2) If no complaint, information or indictment has been filed at the time of the preliminary appearance, and the accused has not otherwise consented, the court shall either:
- (i) order in writing that the accused be released from jail or exonerated from the conditions of release at a time certain which is within the period described in subsection (f)(1); or
- (ii) set a time at which the accused shall reappear before the court. The time set for reappearance must also be within

- the period described in subsection (f)(1). If no complaint, information or indictment has been filed by the time set for release or reappearance, the accused shall be immediately released from jail or deemed exonerated from all conditions of release.
 - (g) Preliminary Hearing on Felony Complaint.
- (1) When a felony complaint is filed, the court may conduct a preliminary hearing to determine whether there is probable cause to believe that the accused has committed a felony unless an information or indictment is filed in superior court prior to the time set for the preliminary hearing. If the court finds probable cause, the court shall bind the defendant over to the superior court. If the court binds the accused over, or if the parties waive the preliminary hearing, an information shall be filed without unnecessary delay. Jurisdiction vests in the superior court at the time the information is filed.
- (2) If at the time a felony complaint is filed with the district court the accused is detained in jail or subjected to conditions of release, the time from the filing of the complaint in district court to the filing of an information in superior court shall not exceed 30 days plus any time which is the subject of a stipulation under subsection (g)(3). If at the time the complaint is filed with the district court the accused is not detained in jail or subjected to conditions of release, the time from the accused's first appearance in district court which next follows the filing of the complaint to the time of the filing of an information in superior court shall not exceed 30 days, excluding any time which is the subject of a stipulation under subsection (g)(3). If the applicable time period specified above elapses and no information has been filed in superior court, the case shall be dismissed without prejudice.
- (3) Before or after the preliminary hearing or a waiver thereof, the court may delay a preliminary hearing or defer a bind-over date if the parties stipulate in writing that the case shall remain in the court of limited jurisdiction for a specified time, which may be in addition to the 30-day time limit established in subsection (g)(2).
 - (4) A preliminary hearing shall be conducted as follows:
- (i) the defendant may as a matter of right be present at such hearing:
- (ii) the court shall inform the defendant of the charge unless the defendant waives such reading;
- (iii) witnesses shall be examined under oath and may be cross-examined;
- (iv) the defendant may testify and call witnesses in the defendant's behalf.
- (5) If a preliminary hearing on the felony complaint is held and the court finds that probable cause does not exist, the charge shall be dismissed, and may be refiled only if a motion to set aside the finding is granted by the superior court. The superior court shall determine whether, at the time of the hearing on such motion, there is probable cause to believe that the defendant has committed a felony.
- (6) If a preliminary hearing is held, the court shall file the record in superior court promptly after notice that the information has been filed. The record shall include, but not be limited to, all written pleadings, docket entries, the bond, and any exhibits filed in the court of limited jurisdiction. Upon written request of any party, the court shall file the recording of any testimony.

DIVISION OF BANKS

- Amend rules on limits on loans and extensions of credit (WAC 208-512A-010) to conform to statutory changes in chapter 76, Laws of 2013, which updated the "parity" provisions by which state-chartered banks and savings banks may exercise the powers and authorities of national banks and federal savings associations. The amendments to the statute changed the "parity date" from July 27, 2003, to effectively July 28, 2013. Accordingly, the rule needs to be amended to conform to the statutory changes. There may be other minor proposed amendments to the lending limits rules for clean-up or tweaking purposes.
- Amend chapter 208-512 WAC to modernize securities investment standards rules. Section 939A of the Dodd-Frank Act authorized federal banking regulators to eliminate statutory protections for national credit rating agencies associated with investments (i.e., Standard & Poors, Moody's, and Fitch) and to establish new standards of credit-worthiness. In reviewing its compliance with Section 939A of the Dodd-Frank Act, the division of banks identified one or more sections of chapter 208-512 WAC which need modernization to conform to the Dodd-Frank Act and to also assure "parity" for Washington state-chartered banks and savings banks with national banks in relation to securities investment standards. Accordingly, the division of banks is anticipating repealing WAC 208-512-110 through 208-512-117 inclusive. and to propose and adopt a modern, comprehensive set

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- of rules on bank investment standards set forth in a *new* chapter 208-512B WAC.
- Propose and adopt rules for a technical clean-up of the existing chapter 208-512 WAC consistent with the rule making to be proposed and adopted above. These rules benefit regulated entities.

DIVISION OF CONSUMER SERVICES

- Adopt rules to implement chapters 29 and 64, Laws of 2013, Consumer Loan Act. Rules are required by state law and necessary for consumer protection and are beneficial to or requested or supported by regulated entities. The exemption for retail sales is amended pursuant to changes to the law to limit the exemption to true RISA transactions, not transactions involving the sale of stored value; the licensing requirement section is amended to clarify that a license is required for entities located outside of Washington as well as inside Washington and that the main office, wherever located, must be licensed; and that third party companies providing loan processing and underwriting must license to be in compliance with federal law. A new section on seller financing is added to clarify the process for requesting a license waiver for small numbers of sales of residential real estate financed by the seller of the property; a new section is added requiring the licensing of managers, including branch managers, as mortgage loan originators if they conduct the following activities—Take residential mortgage loan applications, negotiate the terms or conditions of residential mortgage loans or hold themselves out as being able to conduct these activities, supervise loan processor or underwriting employees, or supervise licensed mortgage loan originators; books and records must be maintained for three years; a high school diploma is no longer required to obtain a mortgage loan originator license; the requirements for rate lock agreements are clarified; the use of license names and numbers is clarified; loan servicers must service a loan pursuant to the loan documents unless a change is agreed to by the borrower; the department may require the refund of fees and interest when a lender is not licensed; some amendments clarify and make the rules consistent with the Mortgage Broker Practices Act.
- Adopt rules to implement chapter 64, Laws of 2013, Escrow Agent Registration Act. Rules are required by state law and necessary for consumer protection and are beneficial to or requested or supported by regulated entities. The rules are amended to waive the escrow officer license test for escrow officers conducting activities only in contract collection or escrow transactions involving only personal property and to waive the test for certain prior licensed escrow officers who let their license expire but who remained in the industry. The closure process for offices is clarified; companies have new requirements to report on the status of their trust account; combinations of bonds are allowed to meet the bond requirements; licensee must provide declarations as to the types of employees they employ.
- Adopt rules to implement chapter 30, Laws of 2013, Mortgage Broker Practices Act. Rules are required by state law and necessary for consumer protection and are

- beneficial to or requested or supported by regulated entities. The definitions are amended to be consistent with federal law; a high school diploma is no longer required to obtain a mortgage loan originator license; the requirements for rate lock agreements are clarified; the use of license names and numbers is clarified; some amendments clarify and make the rules consistent with the Consumer Loan Act.
- Adopt rules to implement chapter 106, Laws of 2013, Uniform Money Services Act. Rules are required by state law and necessary for consumer protection and are beneficial to or requested or supported by regulated entities. Definitions are amended to better define for industry who is an executive officer and that the responsible individual must meet certain eligibility requirements; a licensee must have a bank account for the business at the time of application or must agree to surrender the license within a certain time frame if they are not able to get a bank account for the business; out-of-state authorized delegates are not allowed without prior approval of the department; new companies with no prior history can apply with unaudited financial statements; certain changes in control to the company may result in a requirement for a new application.

- Add new section to chapter 208-444 WAC addressing credit union corporate governance. These new rules will address compensation paid to credit union directors and supervisory committee members. Rules are required by state law to implement chapter 34, Laws of 2013.
