Effective Date: January 1, 2017.

Description: The health care authority (the agency) intends to submit Medicaid SPA 17-0001 to maintain standards for Medicaid programs that are based on the federal benefit rate (FBR). The annual FBR amount is based in part on cost-of-living adjustment, which increased by 0.3 percent for calendar year 2017. Due to an increase in FBR, income and resource eligibility standards for Medicaid programs that are based on FBR must also increase in accordance with federal requirements.

SPA 17-0001 is expected to have no impact on annual aggregate expenditures; it will not affect services or provider payments.

(b) Content. A party should arrange for the transcription of all those portions of the verbatim report of proceedings necessary to present the issues raised on review. A verbatim report of proceedings provided at public expense ~~will~~ should not include the voir dire examination or opening statements unless appellate counsel has reason to believe those sections are relevant to the appeal or they are requested by the client for preparing a Statement of Additional Grounds so ordered by the trial court. If the party seeking review intends to urge that a verdict or finding of fact is not supported by the evidence, the party should include in the record all evidence relevant to the disputed verdict or finding. If the party seeking review intends to urge that the court erred in giving or failing to give an instruction, the party should include in the record all of the instructions given, the relevant instructions proposed, the party's objections to the instructions given, and the court's ruling on the objections.

Submitted by the SB 5177 (Court Video Testimony)
Work Group

A. Name of Proponent: SB 5177 (Court Video Testimony) Work Group

B. Spokesperson: Judge Ronald Kessler, Work Group Chair

C. Purpose: CrR 3.4 governs issues regarding the presence of the defendant in Courts of Limited Jurisdiction. Senate Bill 5177, section 13, requested the Administrative Office of the Courts to convene and staff a work group "to consider and facilitate the use of video testimony by state competency evaluators and other representatives of the department of social and health services and the state hospitals in court matters under chapter 10.77 RCW". The work group was requested to complete its work by June 30, 2016.

The Administrative Office of the Courts formed a work group comprised of representatives from the Superior Court Judges' Association (SCJA), the District and Municipal Court Judge's Association, the Association of Washington Superior Court Administrators, the Washington Association of Prosecuting Attorneys, Disability Rights Washington, the Department of Social and Health Services (Western and Eastern State Hospitals), Washington State Association of County Clerks, the District and Municipal Court Management Association, Washington Defender Association, and the Washington State Association of Counties.

The Work Group met over the course of several months. Discussion included the question of whether or not the Confrontation Clauses were implicated. While courts have applied the Confrontation Clause to some pretrial hearings, it appears that the issue is whether or not the purpose of the hearing "retains a direct relationship with the trial," *Kentucky v. Stincer*, 482 U.S. 730, 740, 107 S. Ct. 2658, 2664, 96 L. Ed. 2d 631 (1987), *Pennsylvania v. Ritchie*, 480 U.S. 39, 52, 107 S.Ct. 989, 94 L.Ed.2d 40 (1987), *United States v. Hamilton*, 107 F.3d 499, 506 (7th Cir.1997), *United States v. Algere*, 457 F. Supp. 2d 695, 700 (E.D. La. 2005), *United States v. Makris*, 398 F.Supp. 507, 509-11 (D.C.Tex.1975), *aff'd*, 535 F.2d 899 (5th Cir.1976). The Work Group decided to request the proposed rule amendment. The proposed amendment presumes that the forensic evaluator will appear by video in hearings under 10.77 RCW. The proposed amendment assumes that all other parties will be physically present in the courtroom for the hearing. A party can file a written motion objecting to the hearing being conducted by video conference. The Department of Social and Health Services has some funding that may be available to assist courts in the purchase of video conference equipment.

Appearing by video allows the forensic evaluators to minimize travel time and maximize time spent conducting evaluations. It is hoped that this increased efficiency will shorten the amount of time a defendant spends waiting for an evaluation and that when necessary, the competency restoration process can begin earlier.

This proposed amendment was deemed necessary because the current rule would require the agreement of the parties and the approval of the trial court judge before conducting a competency hearing under 10.77 RCW. The Work Group did not believe this provision would provide the desired effect of making the competency hearing process more efficient and timely.

The Work Group requests that this proposed amendment be considered as expeditiously as possible.

D. Hearing: A hearing is not requested.

E. Expedited Consideration: Expedited consideration is requested as it is desirable to have hearings conducted under 10.77 RCW be heard as timely and efficiently as possible.

CrR RULE 3.4
PRESENCE OF THE DEFENDANT

(a) When Necessary. The defendant shall be present at the arraignment, at every stage of the trial including the

empaneling of the jury and the return of the verdict, and at the imposition of sentence, except as otherwise provided by these rules, or as excused or excluded by the court for good cause shown.

(b) **Effect of Voluntary Absence.** The defendant's voluntary absence after the trial has commenced in his or her presence shall not prevent continuing the trial to and including the return of the verdict. A corporation may appear by its lawyer for all purposes. In prosecutions for offenses punishable by fine only, the court, with the written consent of the defendant, may permit arraignment, plea, trial and imposition of sentence in the defendant's absence.

(c) **Defendant Not Present.** If in any case the defendant is not present when his or her personal attendance is necessary, the court may order the clerk to issue a bench warrant for the defendant's arrest, which may be served as a warrant of arrest in other cases.

(d) **Video Conference Proceedings.**

(1) **Authorization.** Preliminary appearances held pursuant to CrR 3.2.1, arraignments held pursuant to this rule and CrR 4.1, bail hearings held pursuant to CrR 3.2, and trial settings held pursuant to CrR 3.3, may be conducted by video conference in which all participants can simultaneously see, hear, and speak with each other. Such proceedings shall be deemed held in open court and in the defendant's presence for the purposes of any statute, court rule or policy. All video conference hearings conducted pursuant to this rule shall be public, and the public shall be able to simultaneously see and hear all participants and speak as permitted by the trial court judge. Any party may request an inperson hearing, which may in the trial court judge's discretion be granted.

(2) **Agreement.** Other trial court proceedings including the entry of a Statement of Defendant on Plea of Guilty as provided for by CrR 4.2 may be conducted by video conference only by agreement of the parties, either in writing or on the record, and upon the approval of the trial court judge pursuant to local court rule.

(3) **Standards for Video Conference Proceedings.** The judge, counsel, all parties, and the public must be able to see and hear each other during proceedings, and speak as permitted by the judge. Video conference facilities must provide for confidential communications between attorney and client and security sufficient to protect the safety of all participants and observers. In interpreted proceedings, the interpreter must be located next to the defendant and the proceeding must be conducted to assure that the interpreter can hear all participants.

(e) **Video Conference Proceedings under RCW 10.77**

(1) **Authorization.** Competency proceedings held pursuant to RCW 10.77 shall be conducted by video conference in which all participants can simultaneously see, hear, and speak with each other except as otherwise directed by the trial court judge. Parties and counsel shall be physically present in the courtroom. A forensic evaluator called as a witness by any party may appear by video conference. Such proceedings shall be deemed held in open court and in the defendant's presence for the purposes of any statute, court rule or policy. All video conference hearings conducted pursuant to this rule shall be public, and the public shall be able to simultaneously see and hear all participants and speak as permitted by the trial court judge. Any party may file a written motion which

shall be served upon other parties, the judge and the forensic evaluator not later than 5 days before the time specified for the hearing seeking an order requiring that the forensic evaluator shall be physically present in the courtroom; the judge shall rule on the motion without oral argument. If the judge grants the motion the hearing may be continued for the presence of the forensic evaluator.

(2) **Standards for Video Conference Proceedings under RCW 10.77.** The judge, counsel, all parties, and the public must be able to see and hear each other during proceedings, and speak as permitted by the judge. Video conference facilities must provide for confidential communications between attorney and client and security sufficient to protect the safety of all participants and observers. Such proceedings shall be deemed held in open court and in the defendant's presence for the purposes of any statute, court rule or policy. All video conference hearings conducted pursuant to this rule shall be public, and the public shall be able to simultaneously see and hear all participants and speak as permitted by the trial court judge. Any party may request an inperson hearing, which may in the trial court judge's discretion be granted.

(2) Agreement. Other trial court proceedings including the entry of a Statement of Defendant on Plea of Guilty as provided for by CrRLJ 4.2 may be conducted by video conference only by agreement of the parties, either in writing or on the record, and upon the approval of the trial court judge pursuant to local court rule.

Five days prior to the hearing date, any party may request the forensic evaluator be physically present in the courtroom, which may in the trial court judge's discretion be granted.

The judge, counsel, all parties, and the public must be able to see and hear each other during proceedings, and speak as permitted by the judge. Video conference facilities must provide for confidential communications between attorney and client and security sufficient to protect the safety of all participants and observers. C. Purpose: Proposed General Rule 36 ("GR 36") is a new rule meant to protect Washington jury trials from intentional or unintentional, unconscious, or institutional bias in the empanelment of juries.

In *State v. Saintcalle*, the Washington State Supreme Court expressed concerns that the federal *Batson v. Kentucky* test provides insufficient protections to potential jurors of color from biased use of peremptory challenges.¹ *Batson* created a standard under which a court can only sustain a challenge to a peremptory strike after three conditions are satis-

fied: (1) "the person challenging the peremptory must 'make out a prima facie case of purposeful discrimination by showing that the totality of the relevant facts gives rise to an inference of discriminatory purpose'; (2) the striking party must 'come forward with a [race-]neutral explanation' for the challenge"; and (3) the court must "determine if the defendant has established *purposeful* discrimination."² *State v. Saintcalle*, 178 Wn.2d 34, 42, 309 P.3d 326 (2013) (citations omitted) (alteration in original) (emphasis added).

Batson was the United States Supreme Court's solution to the failures of the previous test for determining whether a peremptory strike was invalid because of bias. However, over the years it has become evident that *Batson* fails to adequately protect potential jurors and the justice system from biased use of peremptories.³ This is because *Batson* requires parties to meet an extremely high bar to show that a peremptory challenge was motivated by bias. *Batson* requires attorneys to allege, and judges to find, purposeful discrimination and fails to acknowledge that bias can be subtle, institutional, or inadvertent.⁴ The Washington State Supreme Court in *Saintcalle* explained that "it is evident that *Batson*, like *Swain* before it, is failing us."⁵ The Court recognized there was ample data demonstrating that racial bias in the jury selection process remained "rampant":

Twenty-six years after *Batson*, a growing body of evidence shows that racial discrimination remains rampant in jury selection. In part, this is because *Batson* recognizes only "purposeful discrimination," whereas racism is often unintentional, institutional, or unconscious. We conclude that our *Batson* procedures must change and that we must strengthen *Batson* to recognize these more prevalent forms of discrimination.

The *Saintcalle* court based its concerns on "[a] growing body of evidence ... that *Batson* has done very little to make juries more diverse."⁶ This evidence included empirical studies that indicate that discriminatory jury selection is a prob-

lem nationwide.⁷ It also included the fact that "[i]n over 40 cases since *Batson*, Washington appellate courts have *never* reversed a conviction based on a trial court's erroneous denial of a *Batson* challenge."⁸

Legal scholars have also long noted *Batson's* failure to effectively eradicate discrimination in peremptory challenges.⁹ This failure is especially pressing when one considers issues of unconscious racism.^{10, 11}

GR 36 addresses this problem by employing a test that utilizes an objective-observer standard. Under GR 36, the trial court would find a peremptory strike invalid if an objective observer could find that race or ethnicity was a factor for a peremptory challenge. GR 36 also gives trial courts the necessary latitude to protect the justice system from bias by granting courts the freedom to raise objections to a peremptory strike *sua sponte*. It would also bring greater diversity to juries, so that juries in Washington are more representative of the communities they serve.¹² The rule would also improve the appearance of fairness and promote the administration of justice.

The Washington State Supreme Court has the flexibility to "extend greater-than-federal *Batson* protections" through its rule-making authority.^{13, 14} Other states have adopted court rules dealing with the *Batson* issue.¹⁵

GR 36 preserves the use of peremptory challenges as part of the right to a jury trial while at the same time addressing racial bias in jury selection.¹⁶ The comment section provides guidance to the judiciary and attorneys about how to apply the rule. By adopting this rule, Washington will ensure that its justice system is not improperly tainted by bias, protect Washingtonians from discrimination, ensure diversity in juries, and address systemic, institutional, and unintentional racism in jury selection.

RULE 36. JURY SELECTION

(a) **Scope of rule.** This procedure is to be followed in all jury trials.

(b) A party may object to an adverse party's use of a peremptory challenge on the grounds that the race or ethnicity of the prospective juror could be viewed as a factor in the use of the challenge, or the court may raise this objection *sua sponte*. When such an objection is made, the party exercising the peremptory challenge must articulate on the record the reasons for the peremptory challenge.

(c) Using an objective observer standard, the court shall evaluate the reasons proffered for the challenge. If the court determines that an objective observer could view race or ethnicity as a factor for the peremptory challenge, the challenge shall be denied.

Comment

[1] The purpose of this rule is to eliminate the unfair exclusion of potential jurors based on race. This rule responds to problems with the *Batson* test described in *State v. Saintcalte*, 178 Wn.2d 34 (2013), and provides a different standard for determining whether a peremptory challenge is invalid than that provided for in *Batson v. Kentucky*, 476 U.S. 79 (1986). For purposes of this rule it is irrelevant whether it can be proved that a prospective juror's race or ethnicity actually played a motivating role in the exercise of a peremptory challenge.

[2] An objective observer is one who is aware that purposeful discrimination and implicit, institutional, or unconscious bias have resulted in the unfair exclusion of potential jurors based on race in Washington.

[3] In determining whether an objective observer could view race or ethnicity as a factor in the use of the peremptory challenge, the court shall consider the following: (a) the number and types of questions posed to the prospective juror,

which may include consideration of whether the party exercising the peremptory challenge failed to question the prospective juror about the alleged concern or the type of questions asked about it; (b) whether the party exercising the peremptory challenge asked significantly more questions or different questions of minority jurors than other jurors; and (c) whether other prospective jurors provided similar answers but were not the subject of a peremptory challenge by that party.

[4] Because historically the following reasons proffered for peremptory challenges have operated to exclude racial and ethnic minorities from serving on juries in Washington, there is a presumption that the following are invalid reasons for a peremptory challenge: (a) having prior contact with law enforcement officers; (b) expressing a distrust of law enforcement or a belief that law enforcement officers engage in racial profiling; (c) having a close relationship with people who have been stopped, arrested, or convicted of a crime; (d) living in a high-crime neighborhood; (e) having a child outside of marriage; (f) receiving state benefits; and (g) not being a native English speaker.

[5] The following reasons proffered for peremptory challenges also have historically been used to perpetuate exclusion of minority jurors: allegations that the prospective juror was sleeping, inattentive, staring or failing to make eye contact, exhibited a problematic attitude, body language, or demeanor, or provided unintelligent or confused answers. If any party intends to offer one of those reasons or reasons similar to them as the justification for a peremptory challenge, that party must provide reasonable notice to the court and the opposing party so the behavior can be verified and addressed in a timely manner. A lack of corroborating evidence observed by the judge or opposing counsel verifying the behavior in issue shall be considered strongly probative that the reasons proffered for the peremptory challenge are invalid.

(C) Purpose:

The Court Management Council (CMC), created by Supreme Court Order 25700-B-217 as a statewide forum for enhancing the administration of the courts, has suggested changes to modernize GR 17 (Facsimile Transmission) and GR 30 (Electronic Filing).

The CMC suggested changes to these rules were endorsed by the Board for Judicial Administration (BJA) at their June 17, 2016 meeting.

The recommendations are the product of a CMC subcommittee that included the Clerk of the Supreme Court, a Clerk/Administrator from the Court of Appeals, two county clerks, and a municipal court administrator.

The changes would largely conform rules to current practice in many jurisdictions.

GR 17 Facsimile Transmission

The CMC anticipates that fax filing will be obsolete in the future. In the meantime, GR 17 is still needed. The CMC proposes minor changes to GR 17 which was adopted in 1993:

- Increase to 20 (from 10) the maximum number of pages that may be filed without prior approval from the clerk;
- Update agency name from "Office of the Administrator for the Courts" to "Administrative Office of the Courts", conforming to RCW 2.56.010;
- GR 17 (a)(2) requires that the filer attach an affidavit as the last page of the document. This requirement is frequently overlooked by filers and rarely enforced by courts. The suggested rules make this requirement optional "by local court rule";
- Delete the requirement of filing on "bond paper."

GR 30 Electronic Filing and Service

- Permit electronic filing of certified records of proceedings, conforming to practice;
- Strike the corresponding reference prohibiting such in the comment;
- The current rule permits electronic service of documents only when 1) local rule mandates electronic filing, and 2) the parties agree to accept electronic service. The CMC recommends striking the phrase "only by agreement" to reflect current practice;
- Current rule requires clerks to issue confirmation that an electronic document has been received. The CMC recommends changing this to "may" to reflect current practice while preserving court discretion;
- Strike the fax number from the required signature block.

(D) Hearing: Not recommended.

(E) Expedited Consideration: Not requested.

**SUGGESTED AMENDMENTS
GENERAL RULES**

GR 17 - FACSIMILE TRANSMISSION

(a) Facsimile Transmission Authorized; Exceptions.

(1) Except as set forth in subsection (a)(5), the clerks of the court may accept for filing documents sent directly to the clerk or to another by electronic facsimile (fax) transmission. A fax copy shall constitute an original for all court purposes. The attorney or party sending the document via fax to the clerk or to another shall retain the original signed document until 60 days after completion of the case. Documents to be transmitted by fax shall bear the notation: "SENT on _____ (DATE) VIA FAX FOR FILING IN COURT."

(2) If a document is transmitted by facsimile to another for filing with a court, by local court rule the person responsible for the filing ~~must~~ may be required to attach an original affidavit as the last page of the document. The affidavit must bear the name of the court, case caption, case number, the name of the document to be filed, and a statement that the individual signing the affidavit has examined the document, determined that it consists of a stated number of pages, including the affidavit page, and that it is complete and legible. The affidavit shall bear the original signature, the printed name, address, phone number and facsimile number of the individual who received the document for filing.

(3) The clerk of the court may use fax transmission to send any document requiring personal service to one charged with personally serving the document. Notices and other documents may be transmitted by the clerk to counsel of record by fax.

(4) Clerks may charge reasonable fees to be established by the ~~Office of the Administrator for the Courts~~ Administrative Office of the Courts, for receiving, collating, and verifying fax transmissions.

(5) Without prior approval of the clerk of the receiving court, facsimile transmission is not authorized for judge's working copies (courtesy copies) or for those documents for which a filing fee is required. Original wills and negotiable instruments may not be filed by facsimile transmission.

(6) Facsimile Machine Not Required. Nothing in this rule shall require an attorney or a clerk of a court to have a facsimile machine.

(b) Conditions.

(1) Documents transmitted to the clerk by fax shall be letter size (8-1/2 by 11 inches). Unless otherwise provided by local court rule, ~~Documents~~ documents over ~~40~~ 20 pages in length may not be filed by fax without prior approval of the clerk.

(2) Any document transmitted to the clerk by fax must be accompanied by a fax transmittal sheet in a format prescribed by the court. The form must include the case number (if any), case caption, number of pages, the sender's name, the sender's voice and facsimile telephone numbers, and fax fee remittance certification. Transmittal sheets are not considered legal filings.

(3) A document transmitted directly to the clerk of the court shall be deemed received at the time the clerk's fax machine electronically registers the transmission of the first page, regardless of when final printing of the document occurs, except that a document received after the close of normal business hours shall be considered received the next judicial day. If a document is not completely transmitted, it will not be considered received. A document transmitted to another for filing with the clerk of the court will be deemed filed when presented to the clerk in the same manner as an original document.

(4) Court personnel will not verify receipt of a facsimile transmission by telephone or return transmission and persons transmitting by facsimile shall not call the clerk's office to verify receipt.

~~(5) The clerk shall neither accept nor file a document unless it is on bond paper.~~

~~(5)~~ ~~(6)~~ (5) The clerk shall develop procedures for the collection of fax service fees for those documents transmitted directly to the clerk. Nonpayment of the fax service fee shall not affect the validity of the filing.

~~(6)~~ ~~(7)~~ (6) Agencies or individuals exempt from filing fees are not exempt from the fax service fees for documents transmitted directly to the clerk. [Adopted effective September 1, 1993.]

**SUGGESTED AMENDMENTS
GENERAL RULES
GR 30 - ELECTRONIC FILING AND SERVICE**

(a) Definitions.

(1) "Digital signature" is defined in RCW 19.34.020.

(2) "Electronic Filing" is the electronic transmission of information to a court or clerk for case processing.

(3) "Electronic Document" is an electronic version of information traditionally filed in paper form, except for documents filed by facsimile which are addressed in GR 17. An electronic document has the same legal effect as a paper document.

(4) "Electronic Filing Technical Standards" are those standards, not inconsistent with this rule, adopted by the Judicial Information System committee to implement electronic filing.

(5) "Filer" is the person whose user ID and password are used to file an electronic document.

Comment: The form of "digital signature" that is acceptable is not limited to the procedure defined by chapter 19.34 RCW, but may include other equivalently reliable forms of authentication as adopted by local court rule or general.

(b) Electronic filing authorization, exception, service, and technology equipment.

(1) The clerk may accept for filing an electronic document that complies with the Court Rules and the Electronic Filing Technical Standards.

(2) A document that is required by law to be filed in non-electronic media may not be electronically filed.

Comment: Certain documents are required by law to be filed in non-electronic media. Examples are original wills, ~~certified records of proceedings for purposes of appeal~~, negotiable instruments, and documents of foreign governments under official seal.

(3) Electronic Transmission from the Court. The court or clerk may electronically transmit notices, orders, or other documents to all attorneys as authorized under local court rule, or to a party who has filed electronically or has agreed to accept electronic documents from the court, and has provided the clerk the address of the party's electronic mailbox. It is the responsibility of all attorneys and the filing or agreeing party to maintain an electronic mailbox sufficient to receive electronic transmissions of notices, orders, and other documents.

(4) A court may adopt a local rule that mandates electronic filing by attorneys and/or electronic service of documents on attorneys for parties of record, provided that the attorneys are not additionally required to file paper copies except for those documents set forth in (b)(2). Electronic service may be made either through an electronic transmission directly from the court (where available) or by a party's attorney. Absent such a local rule, parties may electronically serve documents on other parties of record, ~~only by agreement~~. The local rule shall not be inconsistent with this Rule and the Electronic Filing Technical Standards, and the local rule shall permit paper filing and/or service upon a showing of good cause. Electronic filing and/or service should not serve as a barrier to access.

Comment: When adopting electronic filing requirements, courts should refrain from requiring counsel to provide duplicate paper pleadings as "working copies" for judicial officers.

(c) Time of Filing, Confirmation, and Rejection.

(1) An electronic document is filed when it is received by the clerk's designated computer during the clerk's business hours; otherwise the document is considered filed at the beginning of the next business day.

(2) The clerk ~~shall~~ may issue confirmation to the filing party that an electronic document has been received.

(3) The clerk may reject a document that fails to comply with applicable electronic filing requirements. The clerk must notify the filing party of the rejection and the reason therefor.

(d) Authentication of Electronic Documents.

(1) Procedures

(A) A person filing an electronic document must have received a user ID and password from a government agency or a person delegated by such agency in order to use the applicable electronic filing service.

Comment: The committee encourages local clerks and courts to develop a protocol for uniform statewide single user ID's and passwords.

(B) All electronic documents must be filed by using the user ID and password of the filer.

(C) A filer is responsible for all documents filed with his or her user ID and password. No one shall use the filer's user ID and password without the authorization of the filer.

(2) Signatures

(A) Attorney Signatures. An electronic document which requires an attorney's signature may be signed with a digital signature or signed in the following manner:

(C) Non-attorney signatures on documents signed under penalty of perjury. Except as set forth in (d)(2)(D) of this rule, if the original document requires the signature of a non-attorney signed under penalty of perjury, the filer must either:

(i) Scan and electronically file the entire document, including the signature page with the signature, and maintain the original signed paper document for the duration of the case, including any period of appeal, plus sixty (60) days thereafter; or

(ii) Ensure the electronic document has the digital signature of the signer.

(D) Law enforcement officer signatures on documents signed under penalty of perjury.

(i) A citation or notice of infraction initiated by an arresting or citing officer as defined in IRLJ 1.2(j) and in accordance with CrRLJ 2.1 or IRLJ 2.1 and 2.2 is presumed to have been signed when the arresting or citing officer uses his or her user id and password to electronically file the citation or notice of infraction.

(ii) Any document initiated by a law enforcement officer is presumed to have been signed when the officer uses his or her user ID and password to electronically submit the document to a court or prosecutor through the Statewide Electronic Collision & Traffic Online Records application, the Justice Information Network Data Exchange, or a local secured system that the presiding judge designates by local rule. Unless otherwise specified, the signature shall be presumed to have been made under penalty of perjury under the

laws of the State of Washington and on the date and at the place set forth in the citation.

(E) Multiple signatures. If the original document requires multiple signatures, the filer shall scan and electronically file the entire document, including the signature page with the signatures, unless:

(i) The electronic document contains the digital signatures of all signers; or

(ii) For a document that is not signed under penalty of perjury, the signator has the express authority to sign for an attorney or party and represents having that authority in the document. If any of the non-digital signatures are of non-attorneys, the filer shall maintain the original signed paper document for the duration of the case, including any period of appeal, plus sixty (60) days thereafter.

(F) Court Facilitated Electronically Captured Signatures. An electronic document that requires a signature may be signed using electronic signature pad equipment that has been authorized and facilitated by the court. This document may be electronically filed as long as the electronic document contains the electronic captured signature.

(3) An electronic document filed in accordance with this rule shall bind the signer and function as the signer's signature for any purpose, including CR 11. An electronic document shall be deemed the equivalent of an original signed document if the filer has complied with this rule. All electronic documents signed under penalty of perjury must conform to the oath language requirements set forth in RCW 9A.72.085 and GR 13.

(e) Filing fees, electronic filing fees.

(1) The clerk is not required to accept electronic documents that require a fee. If the clerk does accept electronic documents that require a fee, the local courts must develop procedures for fee collection that comply with the payment and reconciliation standards established by the Administrative Office of the Courts and the Washington State Auditor.

(2) Anyone entitled to waiver of non-electronic filing fees will not be charged electronic filing fees. The court or clerk shall establish an application and waiver process consistent with the application and waiver process used with respect to non-electronic filing and filing fees.

RULE 28. LIMITED PRACTICE RULE FOR LIMITED LICENSE LEGAL TECHNICIANS
REGULATION 4. LIMITED TIME WAIVERS

A. Limited Time Waiver, Defined. For the limited time between the date the Board begins to accept applications and December 31, ~~2023~~ ~~2016~~, the Board shall grant a waiver of the minimum associate-level degree requirement and/or the core curriculum education requirement set forth in APR 28 (D)(3) if an applicant meets the requirements set forth in Regulation 4(B). The Board shall not grant waivers for applications filed after December 31, ~~2023~~ ~~2016~~. The Board shall not waive the practice area curriculum requirement. The limited time waiver application will be separate from the application process for licensure set forth in these regulations.

B. Waiver Requirements and Applications. To qualify for the limited time waiver, an applicant shall pay the required fee, submit the required waiver application form, and provide proof, in such form and manner as the Board requires, that he/she has:

1. Passed a Board approved national paralegal certification examination.
2. Active certification from a Board approved national paralegal certification organization; and

3. Completed 10 years of substantive law-related experience supervised by a licensed lawyer within the 15 years preceding the application for the waiver. Proof of 10 years of substantive-law related experience supervised by a licensed lawyer shall include the following:

- a. the name and bar number of the supervising lawyer(s),
- b. certification by the lawyer that the work experience meets the definition of substantive law-related work experience as defined in APR 28, and
- c. the dates of employment or service.

C. Review of Limited Time Waiver Application. The Association shall review each limited time waiver application to determine if the application meets the waiver requirements. Any application that does not meet the limited time waiver requirements as established by this Regulation shall be denied by the Association on administrative grounds, with a written statement of the reason(s) for denial.

D. Review of Denial. An applicant whose application for waiver has been denied by the Association may request review by the Board chair. Such request shall be filed with the Association within 14 days of the date of the notification of denial. The applicant shall be provided with written notification of the chair's decision, which is not subject to review.

E. Expiration of Limited Time Waiver Approval. Approval of the limited time waiver application shall expire December 31, ~~2025~~ 2018. After expiration of the approval, any subsequent application for licensure by the applicant shall meet all of the standard requirements for licensure without waiver.
