C. Purpose:

The purpose of the suggested amendment to IRLJ 3.3 is to codify in the IRLJ the currently accepted practice that a defendant need not personally appear at a contested infraction hearing when the defendant is represented by an attorney. The current practice is supported by Civil Rule 70.1(a), which permits an attorney "admitted to practice in this state" to "appear for a party by filing a notice of appearance." The suggested amendment to the IRLJ seeks to clarify that absent special circumstances, when an attorney appears for a defendant, the defendant is not failing to appear.

The language in the suggested amendment is a culmination of a multi-year process that began in 2015. The initial language that was presented to the IRLJ Subcommittee and Committee for review was sent to stakeholders for input on the proposed change. In light of the feedback that was received, the IRLJ Subcommittee redrafted the language to what is included here. The redraft was done with the input of six infraction practitioners. Even though stakeholders had been involved in the redrafting process, the updated language then was re-circulated to stakeholders, including the Washington Association of Prosecuting Attorneys, Washington Defenders' Association, a representative of the District Court Judge's Association, and many individual infraction defense attorneys and prosecutors.

The only objections received from stakeholders were concerns that prosecutors would be forced to resort to serving a subpoena on the defendant if the prosecutor wanted to call the defendant as a witness and this could lead to delays. The suggested amendment addresses this concern by requiring a lawyer to expressly include a waiver of defendant's presence in his/her notice of appearance. The prosecutor will then be on notice of the defendant's absence and can opt to subpoena the defendant if the prosecutor needs the defendant's presence.

The suggested amendment also expressly acknowledges that there are some scenarios where the defendant's presence may still be required, notwithstanding the waiver of presence. The last clause of the last sentence in the suggested amendment to IRLJ 3.3(b) provides that the defendant must still

personally appear if "the defendant's presence is otherwise required by statute or these court rules." It was felt that this more general reference to other court rules and statutes was better than attempting to list all of the specific court rules and statutes that could require a defendant's presence. This way, the rule would not need to be amended any time the statutes or court rules were changed, deleted, or renumbered or other court rules and statutes were added that affected this proposed language.

The Board of Governors ("BOG") considered the proposed amendment to IRLJ 3.3(b) at its March 9, 2017 meeting and voted not to accept the proposed amendment as submitted, and instead to remand it to the Committee to consider making one change. The BOG suggested to substitute "these" with "the" in the last sentence of the proposed amended language.

The Committee met on May 15, 2017, and voted unanimously to adopt the BOG's recommended change.

The BOG met on July 28, 2017, and voted to accept the proposed amended language.

To clarify in the RALJ how and when a mandate issues after cases are appealed to the Superior Court, and the procedure for notifying the court of limited jurisdiction of the issuance of the mandate. The proposed amendment to RALJ 9.2 is designed to provide better guidance to the Superior Court clerks about how mandates should be processed once the Superior Court issues its decision in a RALJ appeal.

The current language of RALJ 9.2 provides minimal guidance on how to process mandates, leading to inconsistency among jurisdictions and confusion among practitioners. If adopted, the proposed amendment will help standardize the RALJ appeal process to more closely mirror that of the Court of Appeals. The proposed language is taken almost verbatim from RAP 12.5 discussing the mandate process in the Court of Appeals. The proposed amendment will also provide more specific guidance to the Superior Court clerks in dealing with mandates in criminal cases.

The WSBA Court Rules and Procedures Committee contacted stakeholders, including the District and Municipal Court Judges' Association, Washington Association of Prosecuting Attorneys; Washington Defender Association, and the Washington State Municipal Attorneys. There was broad support for the proposed amendment among stakeholders and no opposition to the proposal.

The Board of Governors reviewed the proposed amendment to RALJ 9.2 in July 2017 and approved its submission to the Court.

Submitted by Kristy Healing

A. Name of Proponent: Kristy Healing, Commissioner, Washington State Supreme Court Commission on Children in Foster Care

B. Spokesperson: Kristy Healing

C. Purpose: APR 8 governs when lawyers admitted to practice law in other states or US territories may engage in the limited practice of law in Washington State. While the current law addresses various exceptions for indigent representation, military lawyers, and others, it fails to address the unique circumstance of a tribal attorney appearing as a matter of right under the Indian Child Welfare Act under federal law.

The Indian Child Welfare Act ("ICWA") 25 USC § 1901 *et seq.* sets minimum standards for the treatment of Indian children in state child custody proceedings and gives an Indian tribe the right to intervene and participate in any state child custody proceeding involving an Indian child from that tribe. Washington State adopted the Washington Indian Child Welfare Act ("WICWA") in 2011 to ensure state law provides the same rights of participation and intervention as the federal law. Chapter 13.38 RCW. Because tribes intervene in cases wherever the tribal children are, tribal attorneys are forced to appear in states where they are not licensed. While APR 8 is offered as solution, it has significant limitations, including the right of the state to deny the application. In addition, the high cost and requirements of local co-counsel can make appearing in a timely manner for a child welfare case nearly impossible. In child welfare matters, time is of the essence. To protect Indian children's tribal interests, tribes and their attorneys must be able to intervene as a matter of right and be protected from unauthorized practice of law charges.

Although many tribes receive federal grants for child and family services, those funds cannot be used for legal representation or for legal fees for litigation. See, e.g., 25 U.S.C. § 1931 (a)(8); 25 CFR §§ 89.40-41. Other federal moneys for social services are similarly restricted and cannot be used to pay for legal services for litigation. 25 U.S.C. §§ 450 *et seq.* This court rule amendment provides a solution to these funding restrictions. The Washington Court Rules ensure that those who appear in court, including Indian children, receive due process and equal treatment under the law. Accordingly, this amendment improves the welfare of Indian children in ICWA custody proceedings by ensuring that tribes can meaningfully participate in Washington child custody proceedings related to their children.

In addition, it is important to note that this amendment to the Washington Court Rules is not unprecedented. Both Oregon and Michigan recently adopted waivers for *pro hac vice* requirements for attorneys participating in ICWA cases. Michigan's amended rule MCR 8.126 goes into effect September 1, 2017. Oregon's amended rule UTCR 3.170 goes into effect January 1, 2018. The state of Nebraska has codified this in their state ICWA law at Neb. Rev. St. 43-

1504(3) ("The Indian child's tribe or tribes and their counsel are not required to associate with local counsel or pay a fee to appear pro hac vice in a child custody proceeding under the Nebraska Indian Child Welfare Act.")

Furthermore, many courts addressing the issue have held that a requirement that an Indian Tribe be represented by an attorney licensed in the state court is pre-empted by ICWA. See e.g., *J.P.H. v. Fla. Dep't of Children & Families*, 39 So.3d 560 (Fla. Dist. Ct. App. 2010) (per curiam); *State v. Jennifer M. (In re Elias L.)*, 767 N.W.2d 98, 104 (Neb. 2009); *In re N.N.E.*, 752 N.W.2d 1, 12 (Iowa 2008); *State ex rel. Juvenile Dep't of Lane Cty. v. Shuey*, 850 P.2d 378 (Or. Ct. App. 1993). The Nebraska Supreme Court noted that the Tribe's representative, while not a licensed attorney in Nebraska, was familiar with ICWA's procedural and substantive requirements, which mitigated the State's concern in having parties represented by counsel, and that the Tribe had authorized her to speak for it. The holding says:

"We conclude that tribal participation in state custody proceedings involving Indian children is essential to achieving the goals of ICWA. The tribal interests represented by ICWA and the Tribes right to intervene under § 1911(c) and § 43-1504(3) outweigh the State interest represented by § 7-101. Thus we determine that federal law preempts the requirement of § 7-101 that the Tribe be represented by a Nebraska licensed attorney in these proceedings."

State v. Jennifer M. (In re Elias L.), 767 N.W.2d 98, 104 (Neb. 2009) at 104. The state of Nebraska has since codified this provision. Neb. Rev. St. 43-1504(3). In order to prevent Washington Courts and parties in ICWA cases from having to expend time and resources litigating on a case by case basis whether an out of state Indian Tribe may send its tribal attorney as a representative, the proposed amendment would resolve the issue and preserve the due process rights of the parties in the ICWA case.

This proposed amendment is necessary because under ICWA Indian Tribes have a right to participate in proceedings, and the rule as written presents significant barriers to out of state Tribes seeking to timely intervene in an ICWA case. The Washington State Supreme Court Commission on Children in Foster Care is in support of the proposed amendment.

The Proponent requests that this proposed amendment be considered expeditiously.

PROPOSED AMENDMENT
APR 8
LIMITED ADMISSIONS

(a) In General. Lawyers admitted to the practice of law in any state or territory of the United States or the District of Columbia or in any foreign jurisdiction, who do not meet the requirements of rule 1(b) or 3(c), may engage in the limited practice of law in this state as provided in this rule.

(b) Exception for Particular Action or Proceeding. A lawyer member in good standing of, and permitted to practice law in, the bar of any other state or territory of the United States or of the District of Columbia, or a lawyer who is providing legal services for no fee through a qualified legal services provider pursuant to rule 8(f), may appear as a lawyer in any action or proceeding only

(i) with the permission of the court or tribunal in which the action or proceeding is pending, and

(ii) in association with an active member of the Washington State Bar Association, who shall be the lawyer of record therein, responsible for the conduct thereof, and present at proceedings unless excused by the court or tribunal. The requirement in (ii) is waived for a lawyer who is a full-time active duty military officer serving in the office of a Staff Judge Advocate of the United States Army, Air Force, Navy, Marines, or Coast Guard, or a Naval Legal Service Office or a Trial Service Office, located in the State of Washington.

(1) An application to appear as such a lawyer shall be made by written motion to the court or tribunal before whom the action or proceeding is pending, in a form approved by the Board of Governors, which shall include certification by the lawyer seeking admission under this rule and the associated Washington lawyer that the requirements of this rule have been complied with, and shall include an indication on which date the fee and assessment required in part (2) were paid, or indicating that the fee and assessment were waived pursuant to part (2). The motion shall be heard by the court or tribunal after such notice to the Washington State Bar Association as is required in part (2) below, together with the required fee and assessment, unless waived pursuant to part (2), and to adverse parties as the court or tribunal shall direct. Payment of the required fee and assessment shall only be necessary upon a lawyer's first application to any court or tribunal in the same case. The court or tribunal shall enter an order granting or refusing the motion, and, if the motion is refused, the court or tribunal shall state its reasons.

(2) The lawyer making the motion shall submit a copy of the motion to the Washington State Bar Association accompanied by,

(A) a nonrefundable fee in each case in an amount equal to the license fee required of active lawyer members of the Bar, and

(B), the Client Protection assessment as required of active lawyer members of the Bar.

(3) Payment of the fee and assessment shall only be necessary upon a lawyer's first motion to any court or tribunal in the same case. The associated Washington counsel shall be jointly responsible for payment of the fee and assessment. The fee and assessment shall be waived for:

(A) a lawyer providing legal services for no fee through a qualified legal services provider pursuant to rule 8(f).

(B) a lawyer rendering service for no fee in either a bar association or governmentally sponsored legal services organization or in a public defender's office or similar program providing legal services to indigents and only in that capacity, or

(C) a lawyer who is a full-time active duty military officer serving in the office of a Staff Judge Advocate of the United States Army, Air Force, Navy, Marines, or Coast Guard, a Naval Legal Service Office or a Trial Service Office, located in the State of Washington, and who is not receiving any compensation from clients in addition to the military pay to which they are already entitled.

(4) The Bar shall maintain a public record of all motions for permission to practice pursuant to this rule.

(5) No member of the Bar Association shall lend his or her name for the purpose of, or in any way assist in, avoiding the effect of this rule.

(6) Exception for Indian Child Welfare Cases. A member in good standing of, and permitted to practice law in, the bar of any other state or territory of the United States or of the District of Columbia, may appear as a lawyer in an action or proceeding, and shall not be required to comply with the association of counsel and fee and assessment requirements of subsection (b) of this rule, if the applicant establishes to the satisfaction of the Court that:

(A) The applicant seeks to appear in a Washington Court for the limited purpose of participating in a child custody proceeding as defined by RCW 13.38.040, pursuant to the Washington State Indian Child Welfare Act, Ch.13.38 RCW or by 25 U.S.C. § 1903, pursuant to the Indian Child Welfare Act of 1978, 25 U.S.C. § 1901 et seq.:

(B) The applicant represents an Indian tribe as defined by RCW 13.38.040 or 25 U.S.C. § 1903;

(C) The Indian child's tribe has executed an affidavit asserting the tribe's intent to intervene and participate in the state court proceeding and affirming that under tribal law (i) the child is a member or (ii) the child is eligible for membership and the biological parent of the child is a member; and,

(D) The applicant has, or will within seven (7) days of appearing on the case, provided written notice to the Washington State Bar of their appearance in the case. Such written notice shall be by providing in writing the following information: the cause number and name of the case, the attorney's name, employer, and contact information, and the bar number and jurisdiction of the applicant's license to practice law.

Effective Date: January 1, 2018.

Description: The health care authority (the agency) intends to submit medicaid SPA 18-0010 to implement a pilot to comply with SHB 1520. SHB [1520] directs the agency to implement an optional pilot to promote value-based purchasing options for Washington rural health access preservation (WRHAP) public hospital district participants. The pilot will affect a subset of critical access hospitals in rural communities, the majority of which operate rural health clinics. The intent of the pilot is to create an alternative, value-based payment methodology that (1) provides sufficient funding to sustain essential services in the areas served, including but not limited to emergency and primary care services; and (2) adjusts payment amounts based on measures of quality and value rather than volume.

Funds were appropriated to help participating hospitals transition to the new payment methodology during a three-year pilot period which begins January 1, 2018. Currently, for the 2017-2019 state fiscal biennium (July 1, 2017, through June 30, 2018), the legislature appropriated \$1,186,000 from the state general fund and \$1,043,000 in federal medicaid funds (total of \$2,129,000). SPA 18-0010 is expected to increase the annual aggregate payment to affected providers upon achievement of quality measures.

SPA 18-0010 is in the development process; therefore a copy is not yet available for review. The agency would appreciate any input or concerns regarding this SPA. PUBLIC RECORDS ACT RULE MAKING

- Public Records Act. Finalize adoption of rules under chapter 208-12 WAC (public records) to be consistent with recent amendments to the Public Records Act, chapter 42.56 RCW (EHB 1595, chapter 304, Laws of 2017). The rules will be amended to adopt the statutory fee schedule, update information that is out-of-date (e.g., agency address), update statutory references that are out-of-date, add some definitions, and update information related to the public records request process. Technical amendments may be made and there will likely be some small housekeeping changes as well. This chapter applies to all divisions within the agency.

DIVISION OF BANKS

- Banks and trusts. Amend chapter 208-536 WAC for technical clean-up and compatibility with the enabling provisions of Title 30B RCW, Washington Trust Institutions Act, which became effective on January 5, 2015. Contemplated revisions include additional clarification on:
 - Frequency of trust company examinations.
 - Insurance requirements.
 - Background checks requirements for officers, directors, and principal shareholders.
 - Additional "outside" director requirements.
 - Call report definitions and submission requirements.
 - Capital requirements.
 - Dividends.
 - Pledging prohibitions and exceptions.
 - Patriot Act, Bank Secrecy Act, and antimoney laundering requirements.
 - Compatibility with OCC collective investment trust fund rules.
 - Other miscellaneous changes including updating to gender-neutral language, updating internal citations to RCW and WAC, and any other technical clean up, as needed.

DIVISION OF CONSUMER SERVICES

- Consumer Loan Act. Begin rule making under chapter 208-620 WAC to allocate the residential mortgage loan servicing requirements in the act between investors, master servicers and subservicers.
- Uniform Money Services Act. Begin rule making under chapter 208-690 WAC to implement chapter 30, Laws of 2017. Examples include clarifying, if necessary, the new definition of virtual currency; further clarifying the payment processing and other exemptions; delineating when a currency exchange company must have a bond for their

online activity; further clarifying the new time frame by which companies must identify and report their authorized delegates to the department; further clarifying the permissible investment requirements for companies that transmit virtual currency; and further clarifying the disclosure requirements for virtual currency transmitters.

DIVISION OF CREDIT UNIONS

- Member business lending. On March 14, 2016, the National Credit Union Administration (NCUA) published in the Federal Register its approved final rule amending NCUA's member business loans rule (federal MBL rule) to provide federally insured credit unions (including Washington state-chartered credit unions), as NCUA describes it, "greater flexibility and individual autonomy in safely and soundly providing commercial and business loans to serve members." DFI is engaged and will continue rule making to update the state MBL to be more consistent with the federal MBL rule and to modernize the state MBL rule.
- Low income designated credit unions. Initiate rule making on low-income designated credit unions in RCW 31.12.413 to authorize a five year period to come back into compliance if the credit union no longer meets the criteria for the designation, similar to requirements for federal credit unions as shown below. 12 C.F.R. 701.34 (a)(4) reads: If NCUA determines a low-income designated federal credit union no longer meets the criteria for the designation, NCUA will notify the federal credit union in writing, and the federal credit union must, within five years, meet the criteria for the designation or come into compliance with the regulatory requirements applicable to federal credit unions that do not have a low-income designation. The designation will remain in effect during the five-year period. If a federal credit union does not requalify and has secondary capital or nonmember deposit accounts with a maturity beyond the five-year period, NCUA may extend the time for a federal credit union to come into compliance with regulatory requirements to allow the federal credit union to satisfy the terms of any account agreements. A federal credit union may appeal NCUA's determination that the credit union no longer meets the criteria for a low-income designation to the board within sixty days of the date of the notice from NCUA. An appeal must be submitted through NCUA.

DIVISION OF SECURITIES

- Electronic offering documents and electronic signatures. Amendments to WAC 460-16A-205, which sets forth the North American Securities Administrators Association (NASAA) statements of policy adopted by the securities administrator. Since the rule was last amended, NASAA has recently amended or promulgated statements of policy in connection with state-registered securities offerings. The division intends to amend its rules to reference the updated statements of policy and incorporate a reference to a new statement of policy relating to electronic offering documents and electronic signatures in connection with registered securities offerings.

- Investment adviser rules. Amendments to investment adviser rules contained in chapter 460-24A WAC to adopt newly promulgated NASAA model rules applicable to investment advisers, make revisions to reflect changes in state and federal law, and make other clarifying and technical updates.
- Municipal securities. Amendment of WAC 460-42A-030, which establishes an exemption from registration for municipal securities that are highly rated and to make technical corrections.
- Franchise registration. Amendment to chapter 460-80 WAC to mandate electronic filing of applications for franchise registration.
