Purpose of the Proposal and Its Anticipated Effects, Including Any Changes in Existing Rules:

- Clarify and update the construction permitting (new source review) program regulations to reduce regulatory burden and focus on permitting projects where our permits provide significant air quality benefit (NWCAA Sections 300-305).
- Modify the registration program to improve transparency and equity (NWCAA Sections 320-321).
- Remove the ambient air quality standards from the regulation in favor of the state rule that already applies state-wide (NWCAA Sections 400-428).
- Clarify and update the sulfur dioxide requirements (monitoring, etc.) at certain sources to include only those requirements that add air quality benefit in the current conditions (NWCAA Section 460).
- Modify a few definitions to clarify applicability and to match the state rule (NWCAA Section 200).
- Update the adoption-by-reference date to allow us to implement the most recent version of the referenced state and federal rules (NWCAA Section 104).

AMENDATORY SECTION

SECTION 200 - DEFINITIONS

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ALLOWABLE EMISSIONS - The emission rate of a stationary source calculated using the maximum rated capacity of the stationary source (unless the stationary source is subject to federally enforceable limits which restrict the operating rate, or hours of operation, or both) and the most stringent of the following:

(A) The applicable standards as in 40 CFR Part 60, 61, 62, or 63;

(B) Any applicable SIP emissions limitation including those with a future compliance date; or

(C) The emissions rate specified as a federally enforceable permit condition, including those with a future compliance date.

...

FEDERALLY ENFORCEABLE - All limitations and conditions which are enforceable by EPA, including those requirements developed under 40 CFR Parts 60, 61, 62, and 63, requirements within the Washington SIP, requirements within any permit established under 40 CFR 52.21 or order of approval under a SIP-approved new source review regulation, or any voluntary limits on emissions pursuant to WAC 173-400-091.

...

LOWEST ACHIEVABLE EMISSION RATE (LAER) - For any stationary source, the more stringent emissions rate based on the following:

(A) The most stringent emission limitation which is contained in the implementation plan of any state for such class or category of stationary source, unless the owner or operator of the proposed new or modified stationary source demonstrates that such limitations are not achieved in practice; or

(B) The most stringent emissions limitation which is achieved in practice by such class or category of stationary sources. This limitation, when applied to a modification, means the lowest achievable emissions rate for the new or modified emissions units within a stationary source.

In no event shall the application of this term allow a proposed new or modified stationary source to emit any pollutant in excess of the amount allowable under an applicable New Source Performance Standards.

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ORDER - Any order issued by the NWCAA pursuant to chapter 70.94 RCW, including, but not limited to RCW 70.94.332, 70.94.152, 70.94.153, 70.94.154, and 70.94.141(3), and includes, where used in the generic sense, the terms order, compliance order, order of approval, and regulatory order.

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SOURCE - All of the emissions unit(s) including quantifiable fugitive emissions, that are located on one or more contiguous or adjacent properties, and are under the control of the same person or persons under common control, whose activities are ancillary to the production of a single product or functionally related groups of products. (~~Activities shall be considered ancillary to the production of a single product or functionally related group of products if they belong to the same major group (i.e., which have the same two digit code) as described in the Standard Industrial Classification Manual, 1972, as amended by the 1977 Supplement.~~)

SECTION 300 - NEW SOURCE REVIEW

~~((300.1 A Notice of Construction and/or PSD permit application must be filed by the owner or operator and an Order of Approval and/or PSD permit issued by the NWCAA, or other designated permitting agency, prior to the establishment of any new source, except for:~~

~~a) Those stationary sources exempt under NWCAA 300.4 (categorical) or NWCAA 300.5 (emission thresholds); and~~

~~b) Relocation of any temporary source operating in accordance with NWCAA Section 301.~~

~~For purposes of this section "establishment" shall mean to "begin actual construction", as that term is defined in NWCAA Section 200, and "new source" shall include any "modification" to an existing "stationary source", as those terms are defined in NWCAA Section 200.~~

~~300.2 Regardless of any other subsection of this section, a Notice of Construction or PSD permit application must be filed and an order of approval or PSD permit issued by the NWCAA prior to establishment of any of the following new sources:~~

~~a) Any project that qualifies as construction, reconstruction or modification of an affected facility, within the meaning of 40 CFR Part 60 (New Source Performance Standards), except Subpart AAA (Wood stoves) and such provisions of Subpart IIII pertaining to owners and operators of emergency stationary compression ignition internal combustion engines;~~

~~b) Any project that qualifies as a new or modified source within the meaning of 40 CFR 61.02 (National Emission Standards for Hazardous Air Pollutants), except for asbestos demolition and renovation projects subject to 40 CFR 61.145;~~

~~c) Any project that qualifies as a new source within the meaning of 40 CFR 63.2 (National Emission Standards for Hazardous Air Pollutants for Source Categories), except Subpart M (Dry Cleaning Facilities) pertaining to area source perchloroethylene dry cleaners, and Subpart ZZZZ pertaining to emergency and limited use stationary reciprocating internal combustion engines;~~

~~d) Any project that qualifies as a new major stationary source, or a major modification;~~

~~e) Any modification to a stationary source that requires an increase either in a plant wide cap or in a unit specific emission limit.~~

~~300.3 New source review of a modification shall be limited to the emission unit or units proposed to be added to an existing stationary source or modified and the air contaminants whose emissions would increase as a result of the modification; provided, however, that review of a major modification must comply with WAC 173-400-112 and/or 173-400-113, as applicable.~~

~~300.4 Emission unit and activity exemptions.~~

~~Except as provided in NWCAA 300.1 and 300.2 of this section, establishment of a new emission unit that falls within one of the categories listed below is exempt from new source~~

~~review. Modification of any emission unit listed below is exempt from new source review, provided that the modified unit continues to fall within one of the listed categories. The installation or modification of a unit exempt under this subsection does not require the filing of a Notice of Construction application:~~

~~a) Maintenance/construction:~~

~~1) Cleaning and sweeping of streets and paved surfaces;~~

~~2) Concrete application, and installation;~~

~~3) Dredging wet spoils handling and placement;~~

~~4) Paving application and maintenance, excluding asphalt plants;~~

~~5) Plant maintenance and upkeep activities (grounds keeping, general repairs, routine house-keeping, routine plant painting, welding, cutting, brazing, soldering, plumbing, retarring roofs, etc.);~~

~~6) Plumbing installation, plumbing protective coating application and maintenance activities;~~

~~7) Roofing application;~~

~~8) Insulation application and maintenance, excluding products for resale;~~

~~9) Janitorial services and consumer use of janitorial products.~~

~~b) Storage tanks:~~

~~Note: It can be difficult to determine requirements for storage tanks therefore it is recommended that the owner or operator contact the NWCAA to determine the exemption status of storage tanks prior to their installation.~~

~~1) Lubricating oil storage tanks except those facilities that are wholesale or retail distributors of lubricating oils;~~

~~2) Polymer tanks and storage devices and associated pumping and handling equipment, used for solids dewatering and flocculation;~~

~~3) Storage tanks, reservoirs, pumping and handling equipment of any size containing soaps, vegetable oil, grease, animal fat, and nonvolatile aqueous salt solutions;~~

~~4) Process and white water storage tanks;~~

~~5) Operation, loading and unloading of storage tanks and storage vessels, with lids or other appropriate closure and less than 260 gallon capacity (35 cft);~~

~~6) Operation, loading and unloading of storage tanks, less than or equal to 1100 gallon capacity, with lids or other appropriate closure, not for use with materials containing toxic air pollutants, as defined in chapter 173-460 WAC, max. VP 550 mm Hg @21° C;~~

~~7) Operation, loading and unloading storage of butane, propane, or liquefied petroleum gas with a vessel capacity less than 40,000 gallons;~~

~~8) Tanks, vessels and pumping equipment, with lids or other appropriate closure for storage or dispensing of aqueous solutions of inorganic salts, bases and acids.~~

~~e) A project with combined aggregate heat input capacity from combustion units, less than or equal to any of the following:~~

~~1) Less than or equal to 500,000 Btu/hr coal with less than or equal to 0.5% sulfur or other fuels with less than or equal to 0.5% sulfur;~~

~~2) Less than or equal to 500,000 Btu/hr used oil, per the requirements of RCW 70.94.610;~~

3) Less than or equal to 400,000 Btu/hr wood waste or paper;

4) Less than 1,000,000 Btu/hr kerosene, #1, or #2 fuel oil and with less than or equal to 0.05% sulfur;

5) Less than or equal to 10,000,000 Btu/hr natural gas, propane, or LPG.

Note: the heat input capacity of each combustion unit shall be based on the higher heating value of fuel to be used.

d) Material handling:

1) Continuous digester chip feeders;

2) Grain elevators not licensed as warehouses or dealers by either the Washington State Department of Agriculture or the U.S. Department of Agriculture;

3) Storage and handling of water-based lubricants for metal working where organic content of the lubricant is less than or equal to 10%;

4) Equipment used exclusively to pump, load, unload, or store high boiling point organic material in tanks less than one million gallon, material with initial atmospheric boiling point not less than 150°C or vapor pressure not more than 5 mm Hg @21°C, with lids or other appropriate closure.

e) Water treatment:

1) Septic sewer systems, not including active wastewater treatment facilities;

2) NPDES permitted ponds and lagoons used solely for the purpose of settling suspended solids and skimming of oil and grease;

3) De-aeration (oxygen scavenging) of water where toxic air pollutants as defined in chapter 173-460 WAC are not emitted;

4) Process water filtration system and demineralizer vents;

5) Sewer manholes, junction boxes, sumps and lift stations associated with wastewater treatment systems;

6) Demineralizer tanks;

7) Alum tanks;

8) Clean water condensate tanks.

f) Environmental chambers and laboratory equipment:

1) Environmental chambers and humidity chambers not using toxic air pollutant gases, as regulated under chapter 173-460 WAC;

2) Gas cabinets using only gases that are not toxic air pollutants regulated under chapter 173-460 WAC;

3) Installation or modification of a single laboratory fume hood;

4) Laboratory calibration and maintenance equipment.

g) Monitoring/quality assurance/testing:

1) Equipment and instrumentation used for quality control/assurance or inspection purpose;

2) Hydraulic and hydrostatic testing equipment;

3) Sample gathering, preparation and management;

4) Vents from continuous emission monitors and other analyzers.

h) Dry Cleaning: Unvented, dry-to-dry, dry-cleaning equipment that is equipped with refrigerated condensers and carbon absorption to recover the cleaning solvent.

i) Emergency Stationary Compression Ignition (CI) Internal Combustion Engines (ICE): Any stationary internal combustion engine whose operation is limited to emergency situations and required testing and maintenance and operat-

ing less than 500 hours a year. Examples include stationary ICE used to produce power for critical networks or equipment (including power supplied to portions of a facility) when electric power from the local utility (or the normal power source, if the facility runs on its own power production) is interrupted, or stationary ICE used to pump water in the case of fire or flood, etc. Stationary CI ICE used to supply power to an electric grid or that supply power as part of a financial arrangement with another entity are not considered to be emergency engines.

j) Miscellaneous:

1) Single family residences and duplexes;

2) Plastic pipe welding;

3) Primary agricultural production activities including soil preparation, planting, fertilizing, weed and pest control, and harvesting;

4) Comfort air conditioning;

5) Flares used to indicate danger to the public;

6) Natural and forced air vents and stacks for bathroom/toilet activities;

7) Personal care activities;

8) Recreational fireplaces including the use of barbecues, campfires, and ceremonial fires;

9) Tobacco smoking rooms and areas;

10) Noncommercial smokehouses;

11) Blacksmith forges for single forges;

12) Vehicle maintenance activities, not including vehicle surface coating;

13) Vehicle or equipment washing (see e) of this subsection for threshold for boilers);

14) Wax application;

15) Oxygen, nitrogen, or rare gas extraction and liquefaction equipment not including internal and external combustion equipment;

16) Ozone generators and ozonation equipment;

17) Solar simulators;

18) Ultraviolet curing processes, to the extent that toxic air pollutant gases as defined in chapter 173-460 WAC are not emitted;

19) Electrical circuit breakers, transformers, or switching equipment installation or operation;

20) Pulse capacitors;

21) Pneumatically operated equipment, including tools and hand held applicator equipment for hot melt adhesives;

22) Fire suppression equipment;

23) Recovery boiler blow-down tank;

24) Screw press vents;

25) Drop hammers or hydraulic presses for forging or metal working;

26) Production of foundry sand molds, unheated and using binders less than 0.25% free phenol by sand weight;

27) Kraft lime mud storage tanks and process vessels;

28) Lime grits washers, filters and handling;

29) Lime mud filtrate tanks;

30) Lime mud water;

31) Stock cleaning and pressurized pulp washing down process of the brown stock washer;

32) Natural gas pressure regulator vents, excluding venting at oil and gas production facilities and transportation marketing facilities;

33) Nontoxic air pollutant, as defined in chapter 173-460 WAC, solvent cleaners less than 10 square feet air-vapor interface with solvent vapor pressure not more than 30 mm Hg @21°C;

34) Surface coating, aqueous solution or suspension containing less than or equal to 1% (by weight) VOCs, and/or toxic air pollutants as defined in chapter 173-460 WAC;

35) Cleaning and stripping activities and equipment using solutions having less than or equal to 1% VOCs (by weight); on metallic substances, acid solutions are not exempt;

36) Dip-coating operations, using materials less than 1% VOCs (by weight) and/or toxic air pollutants as defined in chapter 173-460 WAC.

37) Gasoline dispensing facilities subject to chapter 173-491 WAC are exempt from toxic air pollutant analysis pursuant to chapter 173-460 WAC.

300.5 Exemptions Based on Emissions Thresholds

a) Except as provided in NWCAA 300.1 and 300.2 of this section and in this subsection:

1) A new emissions unit that has an uncontrolled potential to emit below each of the threshold levels listed in the table contained in (d) of this subsection is exempt from new source review provided that the conditions of (b) of this subsection are met.

2) A modification to an existing emissions unit that increases the unit's actual emissions by less than each of the threshold levels listed in the table contained in (d) of this subsection is exempt from new source review provided that the conditions of (b) of this subsection are met.

b) The owner or operator seeking to exempt a project from new source review under this section shall notify, and upon request, file a brief project summary with the NWCAA thirty (30) days prior to beginning actual construction on the project. If the NWCAA determines that the project will have more than a de Minimus impact on air quality as defined in 300.5 d), the NWCAA shall require the filing of a Notice of Construction or PSD permit application. The NWCAA may require the owner or operator to demonstrate that the emissions increase from the new emissions unit is smaller than all of the thresholds listed below. In accordance with NWCAA 324.2, a filing and NOC applicability determination fee shall apply when the NWCAA issues a written determination that a project is exempt for new source review.

c) The owner or operator may begin actual construction on the project thirty-one (31) days after the NWCAA receives the project summary, unless the NWCAA notifies the owner or operator within thirty (30) days that the proposed new source requires a Notice of Construction or PSD permit application.

d) Exemption threshold table:

9) Ozone Depleting Substances: total 1.0 (in effect on July 1, 2000)

10) Toxic Air Pollutants: as specified in chapter 173-460 WAC.

(e) Greenhouse gas emissions are exempt from new source review under this section except to the extent required under WAC 173-400-720, prevention of significant deterioration. The owner or operator of a source or emissions unit may request that NWCAA impose emission limits and/or operation limitations for greenhouse gas in any new source review Order of Approval.

300.6 The Control Officer may require that a new source, that would otherwise be exempt under this section, submit a Notice of Construction application and be granted approval as specified in this section. This discretionary determination shall be based on the nature of air pollution emissions from the stationary source and its potential effect on health, economic and social factors, or physical effects on property. Upon request, the proponent shall submit to the Control Officer, appropriate information as necessary to make this determination.

300.7 Notice of Construction—Submittal Requirements

Each Notice of Construction application shall:

a) be submitted on forms provided by the NWCAA;

b) be accompanied by the appropriate fee specified in NWCAA 324.2;

c) be accompanied by a completed State Environmental Policy Act (SEPA) checklist consistent with NWCAA 155; and

d) include a "top down" BACT analysis, as defined at the time of submittal, except where the Federal Clean Air Act requires LAER; and

e) An applicant filing a Notice of Construction application for a project described in WAC 173-400-117(2), Special protection requirements for Class I areas, shall send a copy of the application to the responsible federal land manager.

300.8 Notice of Construction—Completeness Determination:

a) Within thirty (30) days after receiving a Notice of Construction or PSD permit application, the NWCAA shall either notify the applicant in writing that the application is complete or notify the applicant in writing of additional information necessary to complete the application.

b) For a project subject to the Special protection requirements for federal Class I areas in WAC 173-400-117(2), a completeness determination includes a determination that the application includes all information required for review of that project under WAC 173-400-117(3).

c) For a project subject to PSD review under WAC 173-400-720 through 750, a completeness determination includes a determination that the application provides all information required to conduct the PSD review.

300.9 Notice of Construction—Final Determination

a) Within sixty (60) days of receipt of a complete Notice of Construction or PSD permit application, the NWCAA shall either issue a final decision on the application or initiate public notice under NWCAA Section 305 on a proposed decision, followed as promptly as possible by a final decision.

b) A person seeking approval to construct or modify a stationary source that requires an operating permit may elect to integrate review of the operating permit application or amendment required under RCW 70.94.161 and the Notice of Construction or PSD permit application required by this section. A Notice of Construction or PSD permit application designated for integrated review shall be processed in accordance with operating permit program procedures and deadlines in chapter 173-401 WAC. A PSD permit application under WAC 173-400-720 through 750, a notice of nonattainment area construction application for a major modification in a nonattainment area, or a Notice of Construction application for a major stationary source in a nonattainment area must also comply with WAC 173-400-171.

e) Every final determination on a Notice of Construction or PSD permit application shall be reviewed and signed prior to issuance by a professional engineer or staff under the direct supervision of a professional engineer in the employ of the NWCAA.

d) If the new source is a major stationary source or the change is a major modification, the application shall be processed in accordance with the applicable sections of WAC 173-400-112, 113, 117 and 171. The permitting agency shall:

- 1) Submit any control technology determination included in a final Order of Approval or PSD permit to the RACT/BACT/LAER clearinghouse maintained by EPA; and
- 2) Send a copy of the final Order of Approval or PSD permit to EPA.

300.10 Order of Approval - Appeals

An Order of Approval or PSD permit, any conditions contained in an Order of Approval or PSD permit, or the denial of a Notice of Construction or PSD permit application may be appealed to the Pollution Control Hearings Board as provided in chapter 43.21B RCW. The NWCAA shall promptly mail copies of each order approving or denying a Notice of Construction or PSD permit application to the applicant and to any other party who submitted timely comments on the application, along with a notice advising parties of their rights of appeal to the Pollution Control Hearings Board.

300.11 Order of Approval - Time Limitations:

An Order of Approval or PSD permit becomes invalid if construction is not commenced within eighteen months after receipt of the approval, if construction is discontinued for a period of eighteen months or more, or if construction is not completed within a reasonable time. The NWCAA may extend the eighteen month period upon a satisfactory showing that an extension is justified. An extension for a project operating under a PSD permit must also comply with public notice requirements in WAC 173-400-171. This provision does not apply to the time period between construction of the approved phases of a phased construction project. Each phase must commence construction within eighteen months of the projected and approved commencement date.

300.12 Order of Approval - Change of Conditions:

a) The owner or operator may request, at any time, a change in conditions of an Order of Approval or PSD permit and the NWCAA may approve the request provided the NWCAA finds that:

1) The change in conditions will not cause the stationary source to exceed an emissions standard;

2) No ambient air quality standard or PSD increment will be exceeded as a result of the change;

3) The change will not adversely impact the ability of Ecology or the NWCAA to determine compliance with an emissions standard;

4) The revised order will continue to require BACT, as defined at the time of the original approval, for each new source approved by the order except where the Federal Clean Air Act requires LAER; and

5) The revised order meets the requirements of this section and WAC 173-400-110, 173-400-112, 173-400-113 and 173-400-720 through 750, as applicable.

b) Actions taken under this subsection are subject to the public involvement provisions of NWCAA Section 305 or WAC 173-400-171 as applicable.

e) This rule does not prescribe the exact form such requests must take. However, if the request is filed as a Notice of Construction application, that application must be acted upon using the timelines found in NWCAA 300.8 and NWCAA 300.9 and the fee schedule found in NWCAA 324.300.13 Replacement or Substantial Alteration of Emission Control Technology at an Existing Stationary Source.

a) Any person proposing to replace or substantially alter the emission control technology installed on an existing stationary source or emission unit shall file a Notice of Construction application with the NWCAA. Replacement or substantial alteration of control technology does not include routine maintenance, repair or similar parts replacement.

b) For projects not otherwise reviewable under NWCAA Section 300, the NWCAA may:

1) Require that the owner or operator employ RACT for the affected emission unit;

2) Prescribe reasonable operation and maintenance conditions for the control equipment; and

3) Prescribe other requirements as authorized by chapter 70.94 RCW.

e) Within thirty (30) days of receipt of a Notice of Construction application under this section the NWCAA shall either notify the applicant in writing that the application is complete or notify the applicant in writing of all additional information necessary to complete the application. Within thirty (30) days of receipt of a complete Notice of Construction application under this section the NWCAA shall either issue an Order of Approval or a proposed RACT determination for the proposed project.

d) Construction shall not "commence," as defined in NWCAA Section 200, on a project subject to review under this section until the NWCAA issues a final Order of Approval. However, any Notice of Construction application filed under this section shall be deemed to be approved without conditions if the NWCAA takes no action within thirty (30) days of receipt of a complete Notice of Construction application.

e) Approval to replace or substantially alter emission control technology shall become invalid if construction is not commenced within eighteen months after receipt of such approval, if construction is discontinued for a period of eighteen months or more, or if construction is not completed

within a reasonable time. The NWCAA may extend the eighteen-month period upon a satisfactory showing that an extension is justified. This provision does not apply to the time period between construction of the approved phases of a phased construction project; each phase must commence construction within eighteen months of the projected and approved commencement date.

300.15 Order of Approval – Requirements to Comply

It shall be unlawful for an owner or operator of a source or emission unit to not abide by the operating and reporting conditions in the Order of Approval.)

300.1(A) A Notice of Construction (NOC) application must be filed by the owner or operator and an Order of Approval must be issued by the NWCAA, prior to beginning actual construction of any new source or making any modification, except for any of the following:

(1) Emissions units that are categorically exempt under NWCAA 300.3.

(2) Emissions units that are exempt under NWCAA 300.4.

(3) Any temporary sources operating under NWCAA 300.17.

(4) Any emissions unit covered under a General Order of Approval and operating in accordance with NWCAA 300.16.

(B) New source review of a modification is limited to the emissions unit or units proposed to be added to or modified at an existing stationary source and the air contaminants whose emissions would increase above the emission thresholds in NWCAA 300.4 as a result of the modification.

(C) New source review is required for an increase in a plant-wide cap or an emissions-unit-specific emission limit.

(D) The Control Officer may require that a new source or modification, that would otherwise be exempt under this section, submit a Notice of Construction application and be issued an Order of Approval as specified in this section. The Control Officer may also require that individual pollutant emission increases that would otherwise be exempt under this section be included in the Order of Approval review. This discretionary determination will be based on the nature of air pollution emissions from the stationary source and its potential effect on health, economic and social factors, or physical effects on property. Upon request, the proponent shall submit to the Control Officer appropriate information as necessary to make this determination.

300.2 In lieu of this section, any new major stationary source or major modification located in an attainment or unclassifiable area as defined in WAC 173-400-030 shall be processed in accordance with the requirements of WAC 173-400-113 and WAC 173-400-700 through 173-400-750, as applicable, for the pollutant for which the project is major. Additionally, any new major stationary source or major modification located in a nonattainment area as defined in WAC 173-400-030 shall be processed in accordance with the requirements of WAC 173-400-112 and WAC 173-400-800 through 173-400-860, as applicable, for the pollutant and for precursors of the pollutant for which the area is in nonattainment.

300.3 Categorical Exemptions from New Source Review

Construction of a new emissions unit that falls within one of the categories listed in NWCAA 300.3 is exempt from

new source review. Modification of any emissions unit listed in NWCAA 300.3 is exempt from new source review, provided that the modified unit continues to fall within one of the listed categories. The owner or operator shall keep sufficient records to document the exemption under this subsection.

(A) Maintenance/construction:

(1) Cleaning and sweeping of streets and paved surfaces

(2) Concrete application, and installation

(3) Dredging wet spoils handling and placement

(4) Paving application and maintenance, excluding asphalt plants

(5) Plant maintenance and upkeep activities (grounds keeping, general repairs, routine house keeping, architectural or maintenance coatings to stationary structures, welding, cutting, brazing, soldering, plumbing, retarring roofs, etc.)

(6) Plumbing installation, plumbing protective coating application and maintenance activities

(7) Roofing application and maintenance

(8) Insulation application and maintenance, excluding products for resale

(9) Janitorial services and consumer use of janitorial products

(B) Storage tanks:

(1) Lubricating oil storage tanks except those facilities that are wholesale or retail distributors of lubricating oils

(2) Polymer tanks and storage devices and associated pumping and handling equipment, used for solids dewatering and flocculation

(3) Storage tanks, reservoirs, pumping and handling equipment of any size containing soaps, vegetable oil, grease, animal fat, and nonvolatile aqueous salt solutions

(4) Process and white water storage tanks

(5) Operation, loading and unloading of storage tanks and storage vessels, with lids or other appropriate closure and less than 260 gallon capacity

(6) Operation, loading, and unloading of storage tanks less than or equal to 1,100 gallon capacity, with lids or other appropriate closure, that store materials that do not contain Toxic Air Pollutants, as defined in chapter 173-460 WAC, or that have a maximum vapor pressure of 550 mm mercury at 21° C

(7) Operation, loading and unloading storage of butane, propane, or liquefied petroleum gas with a vessel capacity less than 40,000 gallons

(8) Tanks, vessels and pumping equipment, with lids or other appropriate closure for storage or dispensing of aqueous solutions of inorganic salts, bases and acids with no VOC content

(C) New or modified fuel burning equipment with a heat input capacity (higher heating value) less than all of the following:

(1) 500,000 Btu/hr coal or other solid fuels with less than or equal to 0.5% sulfur

(2) 500,000 Btu/hr used oil, per the requirements of RCW 70.94.610

(3) 400,000 Btu/hr wood

(4) 1,000,000 Btu/hr gasoline, kerosene, #1 or #2 fuel oil and with less than or equal to 0.05% sulfur

(5) 10,000,000 Btu/hr natural gas, propane, or LPG. This includes combustion units that have natural gas as a primary

fuel source and ultra-low sulfur diesel (less than 15 ppm by weight sulfur) as a secondary fuel source that is combusted only during testing or periods of natural gas curtailment beyond the control of the source.

(D) Material handling:

(1) Continuous digester chip feeders

(2) Grain elevators not licensed as warehouses or dealers by either the Washington State Department of Agriculture or the U.S. Department of Agriculture

(3) Storage and handling of water based lubricants for metal working where organic content of the lubricant is less than or equal to 10%

(4) Equipment used exclusively to pump, load, unload, or store high boiling point organic material in tanks less than one million gallon capacity with lids or other appropriate closure. The high boiling point organic material shall not have an atmospheric boiling point of less than 150°C or a vapor pressure more than 5 mm mercury at 21°C.

(E) Water treatment:

(1) Septic sewer systems, not including active wastewater treatment facilities

(2) NPDES permitted ponds and lagoons used solely for the purpose of settling suspended solids and skimming of oil and grease

(3) De-aeration (oxygen scavenging) of water where Toxic Air Pollutants as defined in chapter 173-460 WAC are not emitted

(4) Process water filtration system and demineralizer vents

(5) Sewer manholes, junction boxes, sumps, and lift stations associated with wastewater treatment systems

(6) Demineralizer tanks

(7) Alum tanks

(8) Clean water condensate tanks

(F) Laboratory testing and quality assurance/control testing equipment, including fume hoods, used exclusively for chemical and physical analysis, teaching, or experimentation, used specifically in achieving the purpose of the analysis, test, or teaching activity. Non-production bench scale research equipment is also included.

(G) Monitoring/quality assurance/testing:

(1) Equipment and instrumentation used for quality control/assurance or inspection purpose

(2) Hydraulic and hydrostatic testing equipment

(3) Sample gathering, preparation, and management

(4) Vents from continuous emission monitors and other analyzers

(H) Dry Cleaning: Unvented, dry-to-dry, dry-cleaning equipment that is equipped with refrigerated condensers and carbon absorption to recover the cleaning solvent

(I) Emergency Stationary Internal Combustion Engines (ICE): Any stationary internal combustion engine whose operation is limited to emergency situations and required testing and maintenance, and operates in these capacities for less than 500 hours a year. Examples include stationary ICE used to produce power for critical networks or equipment (including power supplied to portions of a facility) when electric power from the local utility (or the normal power source, if the facility runs on its own power production) is interrupted, or stationary ICE used to pump water in the case

of fire or flood, etc. Stationary ICE used to supply power to an electric grid or that supply power as part of a financial arrangement with another entity are not considered to be emergency engines.

(J) Miscellaneous:

(1) Single-family residences and duplexes

(2) Plastic pipe welding

(3) Primary agricultural production activities including soil preparation, planting, fertilizing, weed and pest control, and harvesting

(4) Comfort air conditioning

(5) Flares used to indicate danger to the public

(6) Natural and forced air vents and stacks for bathroom/toilet activities

(7) Personal care activities

(8) Recreational fireplaces including the use of barbecues, campfires, and ceremonial fires

(9) Tobacco smoking rooms and areas

(10) Noncommercial smokehouses

(11) Blacksmith forges for single forges

(12) Vehicle maintenance activities, not including vehicle surface coating

(13) Vehicle or equipment washing

(14) Wax application

(15) Oxygen, nitrogen, or rare gas extraction and liquefaction equipment not including internal and external combustion equipment

(16) Ozone generators and ozonation equipment

(17) Solar simulators

(18) Ultraviolet curing processes, to the extent that Toxic Air Pollutant gases as defined in chapter 173-460 WAC are not emitted

(19) Electrical circuit breakers, transformers, or switching equipment installation or operation

(20) Pulse capacitors

(21) Pneumatically operated equipment, including tools and hand held applicator equipment for hot melt adhesives, excluding pneumatic conveying

(22) Fire suppression equipment

(23) Recovery boiler blow-down tank

(24) Screw press vents

(25) Drop hammers or hydraulic presses for forging or metal working

(26) Production of foundry sand molds, unheated and using binders less than 0.25% free phenol by sand weight

(27) Natural gas pressure regulator vents, excluding venting at oil and gas production facilities and transportation marketing facilities

(28) Solvent cleaners less than 10 square feet air-vapor interface with solvent vapor pressure not more than 30 mm mercury at 21°C not emitting Toxic Air Pollutants as defined in chapter 173-460 WAC

(29) Surface coating and dip coating operations using materials containing less than or equal to 1% by weight VOC and 1% by weight Toxic Air Pollutants as defined in chapter 173-460 WAC

(30) Cleaning and stripping activities and equipment using solutions containing less than or equal to 1% by weight VOC and 1% by weight Toxic Air Pollutants as defined in

chapter 173-460 WAC. Acid solutions used on metallic substances are not exempt

(31) Gasoline dispensing facilities subject to chapter 173-491 WAC are exempt from Toxic Air Pollutant analysis pursuant to chapter 173-460 WAC

300.4 Emissions Threshold Exemptions from New Source Review

(A) Construction of a new emissions unit that has an uncontrolled potential to emit emission rate below all of the threshold levels listed in the table contained in NWCAA 300.4(D) is exempt from new source review.

(B) A modification to an existing emissions unit that increases the unit's actual emissions by less than all of the threshold levels listed in the table contained in NWCAA 300.4(D) is exempt from new source review.

(C) Greenhouse gas emissions are exempt from new source review under this section except to the extent required under WAC 173-400-720, Prevention of Significant Deterioration. The owner or operator of a source or emissions unit may request that the NWCAA issue an Order to impose emission limits and/or operation limitations for greenhouse gas emissions.

(D) Exemption threshold levels:

POLLUTANT THRESHOLD LEVEL (ton per year)

(1) Total Suspended Particulates: 1.25

(2) PM-10: 0.75

(3) PM-2.5: 0.5

(4) Sulfur Dioxide: 2.0

(5) Nitrogen Oxides: 2.0

(6) Volatile Organic Compounds, total: 2.0

(7) Carbon Monoxide: 5.0

(8) Lead: 0.005

(9) Ozone Depleting Substances, total: 1.0

(10) Toxic Air Pollutants: The small quantity emission rate (SQER) specified for each TAP in WAC 173-460-150

300.7 Notice of Construction - Submittal Requirements

Each Notice of Construction application shall be submitted on forms provided by the NWCAA and be accompanied by the appropriate new source review fee specified in NWCAA 324.2.

300.8 Notice of Construction - Completeness Determination.

(A) Within 30 days after receiving a Notice of Construction application, the NWCAA shall either notify the applicant in writing that the application is complete or notify the applicant in writing of the additional information necessary to complete the application.

(B) A complete application contains all the information necessary for processing the application. At a minimum, the application shall include information on the nature and amounts of emissions to be emitted by the proposed new source or increased as part of a modification, as well as the location, design, construction, and operation of the new source as needed to enable the NWCAA to determine that the construction or modification will meet the applicable requirements. Designating an application complete for purposes of permit processing does not preclude the NWCAA from requesting or accepting additional information.

(C) An application is not complete until the State Environmental Policy Act (SEPA) has been addressed under chapter 197-11 WAC and NWCAA Section 155.

(D) An application is not complete until the new source review fee specified in NWCAA 324.2 has been paid.

300.9 Notice of Construction - Final Determination

(A) Within 60 days after receipt of a complete Notice of Construction application, the NWCAA shall either issue a final decision on the application or initiate public notice under NWCAA Section 305 as applicable on a preliminary decision, followed as promptly as practicable by a final decision.

(B) An Order of Approval cannot be issued for the Notice of Construction application until the following criteria are met for those proposed emissions units and pollutants that triggered new source review, as applicable:

(1) Comply with all applicable New Source Performance Standards (NSPS), National Emission Standards for Hazardous Air Pollutants (NESHAP), National Emission Standards for Hazardous Air Pollutants for source categories (NESHAP), emission standards adopted under chapter 70.94 RCW and all applicable NWCAA emission standards.

(2) Employ Best Available Control Technology (BACT).

(3) Allowable emissions will not cause or contribute to a violation of any ambient air quality standard. In addition, if located in a nonattainment area, allowable emissions will not violate the requirements for reasonable further progress established by the State Implementation Plan (SIP). If NWCAA has reason to be concerned that the construction or modification would cause or contribute to a violation of a NAAQS, NWCAA may require modeling using the guideline models and procedures of Appendix W of 40 CFR Part 51 as referenced in NWCAA 104.2. Written approval from the EPA must be obtained for any modification to or substitution for a guideline model.

(4) Comply with the applicable requirements of NWCAA Section 305.

(5) Comply with the applicable requirements of WAC 173-400-200 and 173-400-205.

(6) All fees required under NWCAA 324.2 have been paid.

(C) In addition to the requirements of NWCAA 300.9(B), an Order of Approval cannot be issued until the new project meets the Toxic Air Pollutant requirements of WAC 173-400-110 (2)(d).

(D) A person seeking approval to construct a new source or modification that requires an operating permit may elect to integrate review of the operating permit application or amendment required under chapter 173-401 WAC and the Notice of Construction application required by this section. A Notice of Construction application designated for integrated review shall be processed in accordance with operating permit program procedures and deadlines in chapter 173-401 WAC and must comply with NWCAA Section 305.

(E) Every final determination on a Notice of Construction application shall be reviewed and signed prior to issuance by a professional engineer or staff under the direct supervision of a professional engineer in the employ of the NWCAA.

300.10 Order of Approval - Appeals

(A) The issuance of an Order of Approval, any conditions contained in an Order of Approval, or the denial of a Notice of Construction application may be appealed to the pollution control hearings board as provided in chapter 43.21B RCW.

(B) The NWCAA shall promptly mail copies of each Order approving or denying a Notice of Construction application to the applicant and to any other party who submitted timely comments on the application, along with a notice advising parties of their rights of appeal to the pollution control hearings board.

300.11 Order of Approval - Time Limitations

(A) An Order of Approval becomes invalid if the owner or operator has not begun actual construction within 18 months of approval, if construction is discontinued for a period of 18 months or more, or if construction is not completed within a reasonable time. The NWCAA may extend the approval period upon a satisfactory showing that an extension is justified. A written request for an extension shall include an updated BACT analysis submitted prior to the expiration of the current approval period. No single extension of time shall be longer than 18 months. The cumulative period between initial permit issuance and the end of any approved time extensions shall not exceed 54 months.

(B) This provision does not apply to the time period between construction of the approved phases of a phased construction project. Each phase must begin actual construction within 18 months of the approved commencement date.

300.12 Order of Approval - Revision

(A) The owner or operator may request a revision to an Order of Approval and the NWCAA may approve the request provided that the revision:

(1) Will not cause the source to exceed an emissions standard set by regulation or rule;

(2) Will not result in an exceedance of any ambient air quality standard;

(3) Will not adversely impact the ability to determine compliance with an emissions standard;

(4) Will continue to require Best Available Control Technology (BACT), Lowest Achievable Emission Rate (LAER), and Toxic Air Pollutant Best Available Control Technology (T-BACT), as applicable, for each new source or modification approved by the original Order of Approval (BACT and T-BACT as defined at the time of original approval); and

(5) Will meet the requirements of NWCAA 300.7 through 300.13 and NWCAA Section 305, as applicable.

(B) A revision under NWCAA 300.12 only addresses projects where the emissions increase from each emissions unit qualifies as exempt under NWCAA 300.4.

(C) Each Order of Approval revision request shall be submitted and will be processed as a Notice of Construction application. The application shall be submitted with the appropriate new source review fee specified in NWCAA 324.2.

300.13 Order of Approval - Requirements to Comply

Owners and operators of a source or emissions unit shall:

(A) Comply with the conditions in the Order of Approval or General Order of Approval, as applicable.

(B) Install and operate in accordance with the information submitted in the Notice of Construction application or application for coverage under a General Order of Approval.

300.14 Notice of Construction Application Inapplicability Determination

An owner or operator may submit a written request to the NWCAA to obtain a written determination that a project is exempt from new source review under NWCAA 300.1 or from replacement or substantial alteration of control technology under NWCAA 300.25. The request shall include a summary of the project, a narrative describing why the project should be exempt from applicability, and the appropriate fee in accordance with NWCAA 324.2.

Within 30 days after receiving a request under this subsection, the NWCAA shall either provide the written determination of inapplicability, notify the applicant in writing that the project requires an Order of Approval, or notify the applicant in writing of the additional information necessary to complete the request.

300.16 General Order of Approval

In lieu of filing a Notice of Construction application under NWCAA 300.7, the owner or operator of a qualifying emissions unit may apply for coverage under a General Order of Approval issued under this section.

(A) The NWCAA may issue a General Order of Approval applicable to a specific source type or emissions unit. A General Order of Approval shall identify criteria by which a source or emissions unit may qualify for coverage under the General Order of Approval and shall include terms and conditions under which the owner or operator agrees to install and/or operate the covered source or emissions unit.

(1) These terms and conditions shall include as appropriate:

(a) Emissions limitations and/or control requirements based on Best Available Control Technology (BACT) and/or BACT for Toxic Air Pollutants (T-BACT);

(b) Operational restrictions, such as:

(i) Criteria related to the physical size of the source or emissions unit(s) covered;

(ii) Criteria related to raw materials and fuels used;

(iii) Criteria related to allowed or prohibited locations; and

(iv) Other similar criteria as determined by the NWCAA;

(c) Monitoring, reporting, and recordkeeping requirements to ensure compliance with the applicable emission limits and/or control requirements;

(d) Initial and periodic emission testing requirements;

(e) Compliance with WAC 173-400-112, NWCAA 300.9(B), and 300.9(C), as applicable;

(f) Compliance with 40 CFR Parts 60, 61, 62, and 63; emission standards adopted under chapter 70.94 RCW; and all applicable NWCAA emission standards; and

(g) The application and approval process to obtain coverage under the specific General Order of Approval.

(2) The original issuance and any revisions to a General Order of Approval must comply with NWCAA Section 305, as applicable.

(3) The NWCAA may review and revise a General Order of Approval at any time. Revisions to General Orders of Approval shall only take effect prospectively.

(B) Application for coverage under a General Order of Approval.

(1) In lieu of applying for an individual Order of Approval under NWCAA 300.7, an owner or operator of a source or emissions unit may apply for and receive coverage from the NWCAA under a General Order of Approval if:

(a) The owner or operator of the source or emissions unit applies for coverage under a General Order of Approval in accordance with NWCAA 300.16 and any conditions of the specific General Order of Approval related to application for and the granting of coverage;

(b) The source or emissions unit meets all the applicability qualifications listed in the requested General Order of Approval;

(c) The requested source or emissions unit is not part of a new major stationary source or major modification subject to the requirements of WAC 173-400-113 (3) and (4), WAC 173-400-700 through 173-400-750, or 173-400-800 through 173-400-860; and

(d) The requested source or emissions unit does not trigger applicability of the Air Operating Permit program under NWCAA Section 322, or trigger a required modification of an existing Air Operating Permit.

(2) Owners or operators of sources or emissions units applying for coverage under a General Order of Approval shall do so using the forms provided by the NWCAA and include the application fee as specified in NWCAA 324.2. The application must include all information necessary to determine qualification for, and to assure compliance with, a General Order of Approval.

(3) An application is incomplete until the NWCAA has received all required fees.

(4) The owner or operator of the proposed source or emissions unit that qualifies for coverage under a General Order of Approval shall not begin actual construction of the proposed source or emissions unit until written confirmation of coverage from the NWCAA has been received in accordance with the procedures established in NWCAA 300.16 (C).

(C) Each General Order of Approval shall include a section on how an applicant is to request coverage and how the NWCAA will grant coverage.

(1) Within 30 days after receipt of an application for coverage under a General Order of Approval, the NWCAA shall either provide written confirmation of coverage under the General Order of Approval or notify the applicant in writing that the application is incomplete, inaccurate, or does not qualify for coverage under the General Order of Approval. If an application is incomplete, the NWCAA shall notify the applicant of the information needed to complete the application. If an application does not qualify for coverage under the General Order of Approval, the NWCAA shall notify the applicant of the reasons why the application does not qualify. Coverage under a General Order of Approval is effective as of the date of issuance of the written confirmation of coverage under the General Order.

(2) Failure of an owner or operator to obtain written confirmation of coverage under NWCAA 300.16 prior to beginning actual construction is considered failure to obtain an Order of Approval pursuant to NWCAA 300.1.

(D) An owner or operator who has received confirmation of coverage under a specific General Order of Approval may later request to be excluded from coverage under that General Order of Approval by applying to the NWCAA for an individual Order of Approval under NWCAA 300.7 or for coverage under another General Order of Approval. If the NWCAA issues an individual Order of Approval or confirms coverage under a different General Order of Approval, coverage under the original General Order of Approval is automatically terminated, effective on the effective date of the individual Order of Approval or confirmation of coverage under the new General Order of Approval.

(E) The Control Officer may require that a new source or modification, that would otherwise be covered under a General Order of Approval, submit a Notice of Construction application and be issued an individual Order of Approval under NWCAA 300.7 through 300.13. This discretionary determination shall be based on the nature of air pollution emissions from the source and its potential effect on health, economic and social factors, or physical effects on property. Upon request, the owner or operator shall submit to the Control Officer, appropriate information as necessary to make this determination.

300.17 Temporary Sources

(A) This section applies to temporary sources that do not qualify for exemption under NWCAA 300.3 or 300.4.

(B) Temporary sources shall submit a Notice of Construction application and an Order of Approval must be issued by the NWCAA in accordance with NWCAA 300.7 through 300.13 prior to beginning operation within the NWCAA jurisdiction except as provided under NWCAA 300.17(E).

(C) If a temporary source is locating in a nonattainment area within the NWCAA jurisdiction and if the source emits the pollutants or pollutant precursors for which the area is classified as nonattainment, the source must obtain an Order of Approval from the NWCAA regardless of the exemption in NWCAA 300.17(E).

(D) If a temporary source is a major stationary source then it must also comply with WAC 173-400-700 through 173-400-750 as applicable.

(E) Except as provided in 300.17 (C) and (D), temporary sources are allowed to operate within the NWCAA jurisdiction without obtaining an Order of Approval from the NWCAA provided that:

(1) A permitting authority in Washington State issued a Notice of Construction Order of Approval for the temporary source after July 1, 2010 identifying the emissions unit as a "portable" or "temporary" source.

(2) Operation within the NWCAA jurisdiction under this provision is limited to a single 12 consecutive month period commencing with initial startup within the NWCAA jurisdiction. For operation within the NWCAA jurisdiction after this initial 12 consecutive month period, the owner or operator must obtain an Order of Approval from the NWCAA in accordance with NWCAA 300.17(B).

(F) The owner or operator shall notify the NWCAA of the intent to relocate into or within the NWCAA jurisdiction at least 15 calendar days prior to beginning operation at a different location. Notification is not required for relocation

within the same major source. The notification shall include a copy of the applicable temporary source Order of Approval and estimated start and end dates at the new location. The owner or operator shall keep a record of the date of initial startup within the NWCAA jurisdiction along with durations and locations of operation.

(G) The first time the owner or operator locates the temporary source within the NWCAA jurisdiction, the initial relocation notice shall include the appropriate annual registered source fee specified in NWCAA 324.1. The owner or operator shall pay an annual registered source fee for each calendar year during which the temporary source operates within the NWCAA jurisdiction.

(H) The owner or operator shall submit the emission inventory required under NWCAA Section 150 to the NWCAA if the temporary source operated in the NWCAA jurisdiction during the preceding calendar year. The data must be sufficient in detail to enable the NWCAA to determine the emissions within its jurisdiction and the yearly aggregate.

(I) To change the conditions in an Order of Approval issued by a permitting authority other than the NWCAA while operating in the NWCAA jurisdiction, the owner or operator must obtain an Order of Approval from the NWCAA in accordance with NWCAA 300.7 through 300.13.

(J) Prior to modifying a temporary source while operating within the NWCAA jurisdiction under a non-NWCAA Order of Approval, the owner or operator must obtain an Order of Approval from the NWCAA in accordance with NWCAA 300.7 through 300.13.

(K) The NWCAA has authority to enforce the conditions of the Order of Approval that authorizes the temporary source operation, regardless of which permitting authority issued the Order of Approval. The owner or operator shall operate the temporary source in compliance with the conditions set forth in the Order of Approval and any other applicable requirements. Any reports required by the Order of Approval shall be submitted to the NWCAA.

(L) Temporary sources relying upon an Order of Approval issued by a permitting authority other than the NWCAA may be required to obtain an Order of Approval from the NWCAA in accordance with NWCAA 300.17(B) at the discretion of the Control Officer based on the source type, emission quantity, or suitability of the non-NWCAA Order of Approval requirements.

The internet notice shall remain on the NWCAA website for a minimum of 15 consecutive days and shall include the following information:

- (1) name and location of the affected facility,
- (2) brief description of the proposed action, and
- (3) a statement that a public comment period may be requested within 15 days of the initial date of the internet posting.

(B) Requests for a public comment period ~~((shall))~~ must be submitted in writing via letter, fax, or email and received by the NWCAA ~~((via letter, facsimile, or electronic mail within 15 days of))~~ during the ((initial date of the)) 15-day internet ((posting)) notice period. (B) At least 30 days prior to the hearing, the NWCAA shall provide notice of the hearing as follows:

(1) Post the public hearing notice on the NWCAA website as directed by NWCAA 305.3(A). The NWCAA may supplement the web posting by advertising in a newspaper of general circulation in the area of the proposed source or action, or by other methods appropriate to notify the local community. In the case of a permit action, the cost of providing all noticing shall be borne by the applicant.

(2) The hearing legal notice shall include the date, time, and location of the hearing along with the information in NWCAA 305.3(D).

(3) Distribute via email or written letter the notice of public hearing to any person who submitted written com-

ments on the application or requested a public hearing and, in the case of a permit action, to the applicant.

SECTION 320 - REGISTRATION PROGRAM

~~(320.1 Program Authority, Applicability and Purpose. As authorized by RCW 70.94.151, the Board, by this Regulation, classifies air contaminant sources which may cause or contribute to air pollution. This classification is made according to levels and types of emissions and other characteristics that cause or contribute to air pollution. The Board requires both registration and reporting for these classes of air contaminant sources. The classifications are made for the entire area of jurisdiction of the NWCAA and are made with special reference to effects on health, economic and social factors, and physical effects on property. Information collected through the registration program is used to evaluate the effectiveness of air pollution control strategies and to verify source compliance with applicable air pollution requirements.~~

~~320.2 Registration and Reporting. Any person operating or responsible for the operation of an air contaminant source for which registration and reporting are required, shall register the source with the NWCAA. The owner or operator shall make reports to the NWCAA containing information as may be required by the NWCAA concerning location, size, and height of contaminant outlets, processes employed, nature of the air contaminant emission, and such other information as is relevant to air pollution and available or reasonably capable of being assembled.~~

~~320.3 Annual Registration Fees. An annual registration fee shall be paid by all registered sources. The Board has determined the fee for each class of air contaminant source to~~

be as shown in Section 324.1. The amount of fees collected shall not exceed the costs of administering this registration program, which shall be defined as:

- a) initial registration and annual or other periodic reports from the source owner or operator providing the information directly related to air pollution registration;
- b) on-site inspections necessary to verify compliance with registration requirements;
- c) data storage and retrieval systems necessary for support of the registration program;
- d) emission inventory reports and emission reduction credits computed from information provided by sources pursuant to the requirements of the registration program;
- e) staff review, including engineering analysis for accuracy and completeness, of information provided by sources pursuant to the requirements of the registration program;
- f) clerical and other office support provided in direct furtherance of the registration program; and
- g) administrative support provided in directly carrying out the registration program.

320.4 Any registered source which does not pay the annual registration fee by the end of the registration period shall be considered a new source and shall submit a "Notice of Construction and Application for Approval" and receive approval from the Board prior to resumption of operation or re-entry into the jurisdiction of the NWCAA.

320.5 Registration Required

320.5.1 Source classification list. The following source categories shall register with the NWCAA:

- a) abrasive blasting operations;
- b) aerosol can filling facilities;
- c) agricultural chemical facilities engaged in the manufacturing of liquid or dry fertilizers or pesticides;
- d) agricultural drying and dehydrating operations;
- e) alumina processing;
- f) ammonium sulfate manufacturing plants;
- g) any source category subject to a federal standard of performance (NSPS) under 40 CFR Part 60, other than Subpart S (Primary Aluminum Reduction Plants), Subpart BB (Kraft Pulp Mills), or Subpart AAA (Standards of Performance for New Residential Wood Heaters);
- h) any source category subject to a federal standard under Section 112 of the Federal Clean Air Act (FCAA) other than 40 CFR Part 61 Subpart M;
- i) any source that has elected to opt out of the operating permit program by limiting its potential to emit (synthetic minor) or is required to report periodically to demonstrate nonapplicability to EPA requirements under Sections 111 or 112 of the FCAA;
- j) any source that has equipment or control equipment, with an approved Notice of Construction from the NWCAA;
- k) any source, stationary source or emission unit with significant emissions;
- l) any source or emission unit from which emissions exceed the threshold levels for toxic air pollutants as specified in Chapter 173-401-531 WAC;
- m) asphalt and asphalt products production facilities, not including asphalt laying equipment;
- n) automobile and light-duty truck surface coating operations;

- o) baker's yeast manufacturing;
- p) brick and clay manufacturing plants, including tiles and ceramics;
- q) casting facilities and foundries, ferrous and nonferrous;
- r) cattle feedlots with operational facilities which have an inventory of one thousand or more cattle in operation between June 1 and October 1, where vegetation forage growth is not sustained over the majority of the lot during the normal growth season;
- s) chemical manufacturing plants;
- t) coal preparation plants;
- u) coffee roasting facilities;
- v) composting operations, including commercial, industrial and municipal, but exempting residential and agricultural composting activities;
- w) concrete product manufacturers and ready mix and premix concrete plants;
- x) crematoria or animal carcass incinerators;
- y) dry-cleaning plants;
- z) ethylene dichloride, polyvinyl chloride, or vinyl chloride plants;
- aa) explosives production;
- bb) flexible polyurethane foam production;
- cc) flexible vinyl and urethane coating and printing operations;
- dd) gasoline stations (>200,000 gallons per year) and bulk gasoline plants (>200,000 gallons per year);
- ee) gecoat, polyester, resin, or vinyl ester coating manufacturing operations at commercial or industrial facilities;
- ff) glass manufacturing plants;
- gg) grain, seed, animal feed, legume, and flour processing operations and handling facilities;
- hh) graphic art systems;
- ii) hay cubers and pelletizers;
- jj) hazardous waste treatment and disposal facilities;
- kk) hospitals, specialty and general medical surgical;
- ll) ink manufacturers;
- mm) insulation fiber manufacturers;
- nn) lead-acid battery manufacturing plants;
- oo) lime manufacturing plants;
- pp) materials handling and transfer facilities that generate fine particulate, which may include pneumatic conveying, cyclones, baghouses, and industrial housekeeping vacuuming systems that exhaust to the atmosphere;
- qq) meat packing plants;
- rr) metal plating and anodizing operations;
- ss) metallic and nonmetallic mineral processing plants, including rock crushing plants, and sand and gravel operations;
- tt) mills: such as lumber, plywood, shingle, woodchip, veneer operations, dry kilns, pulpwood insulating board, or any combination thereof;

320.1 Program Authority, Applicability and Purpose. As authorized by RCW 70.94.151, the Board, by the NWCAA Regulation, requires registration and reporting for specified classes of stationary air contaminant sources (including temporary sources) which may cause or contribute to air pollution. This classification is made according to levels and types of emissions and other characteristics that cause or contribute to air pollution with special reference to effects on health, economic and social factors, and physical effects on property. The purpose of the registration program is to develop and maintain a current and accurate record of stationary air contaminant sources (including temporary sources) within the NWCAA jurisdiction. Information collected through the registration program is used to evaluate the effectiveness of air pollution control strategies and to verify source compliance with applicable air pollution requirements.

320.2 Registration and Reporting. The owner or operator of a stationary air contaminant source (including temporary sources) for which registration and reporting are required, shall register the source with the NWCAA. The owner or operator shall make reports to the NWCAA containing information as may be required by the NWCAA concerning location, size, and height of air contaminant outlets, processes employed, nature of the air contaminant emission, and such other information as is relevant to air pollution and available or reasonably capable of being assembled.

320.3 Annual Registration Fees. Registered sources shall pay an annual registration fee. The Board has determined the fee for registered sources as specified in Section 324.1. The amount of fees collected shall not exceed the costs of implementing this registration program. Implementing the registration program includes, but is not limited to:

(A) Review of registered source emission reports and other periodic reports and conducting related compilation and reporting activities;

(B) Conducting compliance inspections, complaint investigations, and other activities necessary to ensure that a registered source is complying with permit, Order, or regulatory requirements, as applicable, including determination of registration applicability;

(C) The share attributable to registered sources of the development and maintenance of emissions inventories;

(D) The share attributable to registered sources for data storage and retrieval systems necessary for support of the registration program;

(E) Registered source fee determinations, assessment, and collection, including the costs of necessary administrative dispute resolution and penalty collection;

(F) The share attributable to registered sources for administration of the program including costs of clerical support, supervision, and management; tracking of time, revenues and expenditures; accounting activities; required fiscal audits and reporting activities; enforcement activities and penalty assessment, excluding the costs of proceedings before the pollution control hearings board and all costs of judicial enforcement.

320.4 Any registered source that does not pay the applicable annual registration fee by the deadline shall be considered a new source and shall submit a Notice of Construction application and receive an Order of Approval prior to resumption of operation.

320.5 Registration Required

(A) Source categories. Except as provided in NWCAA Section 321, the owner or operator of a source that falls into at least one of the following source categories shall register with the NWCAA:

Any source subject to a National Emission Standard for Hazardous Air Pollutants (NESHAP) under 40 CFR Part 61 other than Subpart M (National Emission Standard for Asbestos).

Any source subject to 40 CFR Part 62.

Any affected source subject to a National Emission Standard for Hazardous Air Pollutants for Source Categories (NESHAP) under 40 CFR Part 63.

Any source that has elected to opt-out of the operating permit program by limiting its potential-to-emit (synthetic minor) or is required to report periodically to demonstrate nonapplicability of EPA requirements under 40 CFR Part 63.

Any source that is subject to an Order of Approval or has been confirmed to be covered by a General Order of Approval by the NWCAA.

Any source with a facility-wide uncontrolled potential to emit emission rate of one or more pollutants equal to or greater than the registered source exemption emission rates as specified in WAC 173-400-102(5) or the Small Quantity Emission Rates (SQER) for Toxic Air Pollutants as specified in chapter 173-460 WAC.

(B) Source types. Except as provided in NWCAA Section 321, the owner or operator of a source that falls into at least one of the following source types shall register with the NWCAA:

Abrasive blasting operations.

Agricultural chemical facilities engaged in the manufacturing of liquid or dry fertilizers or pesticides including, but not limited to, ammonium sulfate.

Agricultural drying and dehydrating operations.

Asphalt and asphalt products production facilities, not including asphalt laying equipment.

Casting facilities and foundries, ferrous and nonferrous.

Coffee roasting facilities.

Commercial smoke houses.

Composite fabrication and repair facilities including fiberglass boat building and repair, and miscellaneous parts fabrication.

Composting operations (commercial, industrial, and municipal).

Concrete product manufacturers and ready mix and pre-mix concrete plants.

Flexible vinyl and urethane coating and printing operations.

Gasoline dispensing facilities and bulk gasoline plants.

Glass manufacturing plants.

Grain, seed, animal feed, legume, and flour processing operations and handling facilities.

Graphic art systems including, but not limited to, lithographic and screen printing operations.

Material handling and transfer facilities that emit fine particulate to the atmosphere, which may include pneumatic conveying, cyclones, baghouses, and industrial housekeeping vacuuming systems.

Metal plating and anodizing operations.

Metallic and nonmetallic mineral processing plants, including rock crushing plants and sand and gravel operations.

Perchloroethylene dry cleaners.

Soil and groundwater remediation projects including soil vapor extraction (active), thermal soil desorption, or groundwater air stripping operations.

Surface coating operations, including coating of motor vehicles, mobile equipment, boats, ships, metal, cans, pressure sensitive tape, labels, coils, wood, plastic, rubber, glass, paper and other substrates.

Wastewater treatment plants.

Welding and metal cutting operations.

Wood products mills, including lumber, plywood, shingle, woodchip, veneer operations, dry kilns, pulpwood insulating board, cabinet works, casket works, furniture, wood byproducts, or any combination thereof.

(C) Equipment classification list. Except as provided in NWCAA Section 321, the owner or operator of the following equipment shall register with the NWCAA:

Any affected source subject to a New Source Performance Standard (NSPS) under 40 CFR Part 60, other than Subpart AAA (Standards of Performance for New Residential Wood Heaters).

Chemical concentration evaporators.

Crematoria or animal carcass incinerators.

Degreasers of the cold or vapor type where the solvent for which contains more than 5 percent halogenated compounds or Toxic Air Pollutants.

Ethylene oxide (ETO) sterilizers.

Fuel burning equipment (except natural gas only) with a heat input of more than 1 million Btu per hour, except comfort heating, air conditioning systems, or ventilation systems not designed to remove contaminants generated by or released from equipment.

Fuel burning equipment that fires only natural gas with a heat input of more than 10 million Btu per hour.

Gas collection systems with flares or other combustion devices.

Gas or odor control equipment having a rated capacity greater than or equal to 200 cfm including, but not limited to:

(1) Activated carbon adsorption

WAC 260-36-100 Fingerprints. (1) Every person, between the ages of eighteen and sixty-nine, applying for a license must furnish the commission his or her fingerprints upon making an initial application for a license.

Persons who have previously held a license while under the age of eighteen must furnish fingerprints in the license period which follows their eighteenth birthday whenever an application is submitted.

(2) Following the initial application, each person that meets the requirements in subsection (1) of this section must then submit fingerprints at an interval determined by the commission. This rule proposal, or portions of the proposal, is exempt from requirements of the Regulatory Fairness Act because the proposal:

Is exempt under RCW 19.85.025(3) as the rules relate only to internal governmental operations that are not subject to violation by a nongovernment party; and rule content is explicitly and specifically dictated by statute.

Is exempt under RCW 34.05.328 (5)(c)(i), (ii), and (iii)(C).

Explanation of exemptions: Statute provides an exemption for interpretive and procedural rules. RCW 34.05.328 (5)(c)(iii)(C) outlines conditions which must be met for a rule to require analysis. Portions of the proposal do not meet these requirements.

The proposed rule does impose more-than-minor costs on businesses.

Small Business Economic Impact Statement (SBEIS)

1. Provide a brief description of the requirements of the proposed rules: In 2017, the Washington state legislature passed SSB 5975 relating to paid family and medical leave. SSB 5975 was codified as Title 50A RCW.

Title 50A RCW creates a statewide paid family and medical leave insurance program that provides for at least partial wage replacement when a qualified employee takes leave for an approved reason related to family or medical leave.

The legislature requires the state to develop rules implementing the program.

These rules are being developed by the employment security department and will be filed in multiple phases. This filing comprises rules developed in phase three, which includes clarifications around initial applications for benefits, conditional waiver expirations, employee notice to employers, and procedure for employees to designate an authorized representative.

2. Costs to businesses to comply with the proposed rules: The majority of phase three rules do not require a calculation of cost for compliance.¹ The following rule was a candidate for this analysis: *WAC 192-610-020 What is required on the certification for medical leave or for family leave to care for a family member who has a serious health condition?*

¹ See chapter 2 of the Significance Analysis for a complete list of rules that do and do not require cost analysis in the SBEIS or the significance analysis.

Total estimated cost to health services businesses: Between \$2,244,376 and \$8,977,505.²

² See chapter 5 of the significance analysis for full details on the costs imposed on health care provider businesses for complying with WAC 192-610-020.

However, while this rule does impose a cost, it does not meet the threshold for imposing more than a minor cost on businesses in the affected industry (health care). The minor cost threshold defined in RCW 19.85.020 is a cost-per-business less than three-tenths of one percent of annual revenue or income. Per RCW 19.85.030, rules not imposing more-than-minor costs do not require an SBEIS.

Using the most recent annual data (2017) available from department of revenue (table below), income-per-business in the health care industry is \$2,142,028. Three-tenths of one percent of total business income per business is \$6,429.

The estimated cost-per-business of compliance with this rule is between \$104 and \$416, well under the threshold of \$6,429. Therefore, an SBEIS is not required.

3. Impact on sales or revenue: Any impact on sales or revenue is assumed to be a result of the passage of SSB 5975 by the state legislature rather than the result of agency rule making pertaining to its implementation.

4. Cost of compliance for small businesses versus ten percent of largest businesses: As WAC 192-610-020 is well under the minor cost threshold set by RCW 19.85.020 (see paragraph 2 above), analysis of a potential disproportionate impact on small businesses is not required.

5. Steps taken to reduce costs on small businesses: In creating WAC 192-610-020, the department attempted to reduce costs to health care provider businesses by requiring certifications of serious health conditions by health care providers to include the minimally necessary information to determine eligibility for medical leave or leave to care for a family member with a serious health condition.

6. How did agency involve small businesses? As part of its rule-making process, the employment security department consulted the paid family and medical leave advisory committee, which consists of advocates for both employer and employee interests. The team of advocates for employers represents business interests in the state, including those of small businesses. These advocates were integral in the development of both the law and the rules governing it.

In addition, several public meetings were held prior to filing the notice of proposed rules. An informal "listening session" was held where any member of the public, including small business owners and stakeholders, could voice their opinions on what should be covered by rule in each phase. The department also hosted two "pre-102 meetings" where representatives of the department presented drafts of rules and opened the floor for public comment.

All stakeholders, including small business representatives, were also allowed to post comments in response to agency draft rules online through a civic engagement portal.

7. List of industries affected: Title 50A RCW generally applies to all employers in Washington state, apart from the federal government. The candidate rule for small business impact analysis (WAC 192-610-020) affects the health services industry, NAICS codes 621, 622, 623.

8. Number of jobs lost/created: Any jobs lost or created are assumed to be a result of the passage of SSB 5975 by the state legislature rather than the result of agency rule making pertaining to its implementation.

NEW SECTION

WAC 192-500-050 De facto parent. A "de facto parent" is limited to those adults who have fully and completely undertaken a permanent, unequivocal, committed, and responsible parental role in a child's life where the natural or legal parent consented to and fostered the parent-like relationship.

NEW SECTION

WAC 192-500-060 In loco parentis. An individual stands "in loco parentis" when the individual acts in place of a parent, intentionally takes over parental duties, and is responsible for exercising day-to-day care and control fulfilling the child's physical and psychological needs.

NEW SECTION

WAC 192-500-070 Claim year. (1) "Claim year" is the fifty-two week period beginning Sunday of the week of:

- (a) The date of the birth or placement of a child; or
- (b) The date of the filing of a complete and timely application for all other qualifying events.

(2) For applications that are backdated, the claim year is the fifty-two week period beginning Sunday of the week to which the application was backdated.

(3) An employee may only have one valid claim year at a time.

NEW SECTION

WAC 192-500-080 Qualifying event. A "qualifying event" is:

- (1) For family leave, events described in RCW 50A.04-010(9).
- (2) For medical leave, events described in RCW 50A.04.010(14).

NEW SECTION

WAC 192-500-090 Health care provider. "Health care provider" means:

(1) A physician or an osteopathic physician who is licensed to practice medicine or surgery, as appropriate, by the state in which the physician practices;

(2) Nurse practitioners, nurse-midwives, midwives, clinical social workers, physician assistants, podiatrists, dentists, clinical psychologists, optometrists, and physical therapists licensed to practice under state law and who are performing within the scope of their practice as defined under state law by the state in which they practice;

(3) A health care provider listed above who practices in a country other than the United States, who is authorized to practice in accordance with the law of that country, and who is performing within the scope of the health care provider's practice as defined under such law; or

(4) Any other provider permitted to certify the existence of a serious health condition under the federal Family and Medical Leave Act of 1993 (Act Feb. 5, 1993, P.L. 103-3, 107 Stat. 6, as it existed on October 19, 2017).

NEW SECTION

WAC 192-500-100 Salaried employee. (1) A "salaried employee" is any employee who receives a fixed periodic compensation from an employer to be paid for hours worked full-time as defined by the employer.

(2) Employees that work less than full-time as defined by the employer are not considered a salaried employee for the purposes of Title 50A RCW.

AMENDATORY SECTION (Amending WSR 18-12-032, filed 5/29/18, effective 6/29/18)

WAC 192-510-010 Election, withdrawal, and cancellation of coverage. (1) Self-employed persons as defined in RCW 50A.04.105(1) and federally recognized tribes as defined in RCW 50A.04.110 may elect coverage under Title 50A RCW.

(2) Notice of election of coverage must be submitted to the department online or in another format approved by the department.

(3) Elective coverage begins on the first day of the (~~calendar~~) quarter immediately following the notice of election.

(4) A period of coverage is defined as:

(a) Three (~~calendar~~) years following the first day of elective coverage or any gap in coverage; and

(b) Each subsequent (~~calendar~~) year.

(5) Any self-employed person or federally recognized tribe may file a notice of withdrawal within thirty calendar days after the end of each period of coverage.

(6) A notice of withdrawal from coverage must be submitted to the department online or in another format approved by the department.

(7) Any levy resulting from the department's cancellation of coverage is in addition to the due and unpaid premiums and interest for the remainder of the period of coverage.

AMENDATORY SECTION (Amending WSR 18-22-080, filed 11/2/18, effective 12/3/18)

WAC 192-510-065 When can an employer deduct premiums from employees? (1) An employer may not deduct more than the maximum allowable employee share of the premium from wages paid for a pay period.

(2) If an employer fails to deduct the maximum allowable employee share of the premium from wages paid for a pay period, the employer is considered to have elected to pay that portion of the employee share under RCW 50A.04.115 (3)(d) for that pay period. The employer cannot deduct this amount from a future paycheck of the employee for a different pay period.

(3) Subsections (1) and (2) of this section do not apply if an employer was unable to deduct the maximum allowable employee share of the premium for a pay period due to a lack of sufficient employee wages for that pay period.

NEW SECTION

WAC 192-510-085 How will the department assess premiums when a conditional premium waiver expires?

(1) If an employee who is exempt from premiums under a conditional waiver works eight hundred twenty hours in any period of four consecutive quarters, the waiver will be determined to have expired.

(2) Upon expiration of a conditional premium waiver, the department will assess and notify:

(a) The employer of all the owed employer premiums; and

(b) The employee of all the owed employee premiums.

(3) Payment will be due upon receipt of the assessment.

(4) Failure to pay the assessment by the required date will result in the accrual of interest under RCW 50A.04.140.

(5) Upon payment of the employee premiums, the employee will be credited for the hours worked and will be eligible for benefits under Title 50A RCW as if the premiums were originally paid.

(6) Nothing in this section prevents the employer from paying part or all of the employee's share of the premiums.

Chapter 192-600 WAC

EMPLOYEE NOTICE TO EMPLOYER

NEW SECTION

WAC 192-600-005 When must an employee provide notice to the employer for foreseeable leave? (1)(a) An employee must provide the employer at least thirty days' written notice before paid family or medical leave is to begin if the need for the leave is foreseeable based on an expected birth, placement of a child, or planned medical treatment for a serious health condition.

(b) An employee must provide the employer written notice as soon as is practicable when thirty days' notice is not possible, such as because of a lack of knowledge of approximately when leave will be required to begin, a change in circumstances, or a medical emergency.

(2) An employee must provide the employer written notice as soon as is practicable for foreseeable leave due to a qualifying military exigency, regardless of how far in advance such leave is foreseeable.

(3) Whether paid family or medical leave is to be continuous or is to be taken intermittently or on a reduced schedule basis, written notice need only be given one time, but the employee must inform the employer as soon as is practicable if dates of the scheduled leave change, are extended, or were initially unknown.

NEW SECTION

WAC 192-600-010 When must an employee provide notice for unforeseeable leave?

(1) When the need for leave is not foreseeable, an employee must provide written notice to the employer as soon as is practicable under the facts and circumstances of the particular situation.

(2) If the employee is unable to provide notice personally, written notice may be given by another responsible party, such as the employee's spouse, neighbor, or coworker.

Example 1: An employee's spouse is in a car accident and is taken to the emergency room. The employee would not be required to leave the spouse in the emergency room in order to report the absence while the spouse is receiving emergency treatment. The employee would be expected to provide written notice, such as an email, to the employer as soon as is practicable.

Example 2: An employee is in a car accident and is taken to the emergency room for emergency surgery. The employee's parent may provide written notice on behalf of the employee as soon as is practicable.

NEW SECTION

WAC 192-600-015 What does "as soon as is practicable" mean for this chapter?

For the purposes of this chapter, "as soon as is practicable" means as soon as it is both possible and practical to provide notice, taking into account all of the facts and circumstances in the individual situation. When an employee becomes aware of a need for paid family or medical leave less than thirty days in advance, the determination of when an employee could practicably provide notice must take into account the individual facts and circumstances.

NEW SECTION

WAC 192-600-020 What must an employee's notice for leave to an employer include?

An employee must provide written notice to make the employer aware that the employee may need paid family or medical leave. The notice must contain at least the anticipated timing and duration of the leave. Written notice includes, but is not limited to, hand-written or typed notices, and all forms of written electronic communications such as text messages and email.

NEW SECTION

WAC 192-600-025 What happens if an employee fails to provide proper notice? If the department determines

that the employee failed to provide proper notice to the employer, the employee's benefits will be denied for a period of time equal to the number of days that notice was insufficient.

Example: If an employee should have provided thirty days' notice for a qualifying event the employee was aware of sixty days in advance, but instead the employee provided notice fifteen days prior to the scheduled leave, the department will deny paid family or medical leave benefits for fifteen days. The employee is not required to file a new initial application for benefits. After the required fifteen days, the employee may start receiving benefits upon proper filing of weekly claims if otherwise eligible.

Chapter 192-610 WAC

INITIAL APPLICATION FOR BENEFITS

NEW SECTION

WAC 192-610-005 How does an employee apply for benefits? (1) An employee may apply for paid family or medical leave benefits under the state plan by:

- (a) Using the department's online services;
 - (b) Contacting the paid family and medical leave customer care center by telephone; or
 - (c) Alternate methods authorized by the commissioner.
- (2) An employee who works for an employer with an approved voluntary plan must follow the application guidelines of the approved plan.

NEW SECTION

WAC 192-610-010 What information is an employee required to provide to the department when applying for benefits? (1) When an employee submits an application for paid family or medical leave benefits, the employee must provide information sufficient for the department to determine eligibility for benefits. This information includes, but is not limited to, information identifying the employee, the type and anticipated duration of leave, as well as certification or documentation to validate the qualifying event.

(2) If an employee is in a claim year and has need for successive periods of benefits for the same qualifying event beyond what was originally approved, the employee must update the application.

(3) If an employee experiences a new qualifying event during a claim year, the employee must reopen the claim and provide additional information required by the department before benefits can be paid.

NEW SECTION

WAC 192-610-015 When will the employee be required to provide documentation or certification to the department? (1) Any time an employee applies for paid family or medical leave benefits, the application must be supported by documentation or certification as required in Title 50A RCW and the rules adopted by the department.

(2) If an employee does not provide sufficient documentation or certification substantiating the employee's qualifica-

tion for benefits, the department will deny benefits until sufficient documentation or certification substantiating the qualifying event is provided.

(3) The department may require the employee to provide additional documentation or certification to substantiate the qualification for benefits if:

- (a) The employee requests an extension of the leave originally planned;
- (b) Circumstances of the serious health condition change;
- (c) Information is provided to the department that the employee may no longer be qualified for benefits; or
- (d) Other circumstances cause the department to question the employee's qualification for benefits.

NEW SECTION

WAC 192-610-020 What is required on the certification for medical leave or for family leave to care for a family member who has a serious health condition? When leave is taken because of an employee's own serious health condition or the serious health condition of a family member, certification from a health care provider will be required. Certification must include the following:

- (1) The name, address, telephone number, and contact information of the health care provider and type of medicine the health provider is licensed to practice;
- (2) The anticipated duration of leave;
- (3) Other information as requested by the department to determine eligibility for the qualifying event; and either
 - (a) For medical leave, information from a health care provider that the employee has a serious health condition; or
 - (b) For family leave, information sufficient to establish that the family member has a serious health condition requiring physical or psychological care.

NEW SECTION

WAC 192-610-025 Documenting the birth or placement of a child for family leave. When family leave is taken to bond with the employee's child after birth or placement, the department may request a copy of:

- (1) The child's birth certificate;
- (2) Certification from a health care provider;
- (3) Court documents to show placement; or
- (4) Other reasonable documentation to substantiate the qualifying event.

NEW SECTION

WAC 192-610-030 Documenting a military exigency for family leave. When family leave is taken because of a qualifying military exigency, the employee will be required to provide documents or information such as:

- (1) Active duty orders;
 - (2) The approximate dates in which leave will be needed;
- or
- (3) Other information to substantiate the qualifying event.

NEW SECTION

WAC 192-610-035 Documenting a family relationship. The department may request documentation or information from the employee that is sufficient to establish the familial relationship for the purposes of benefit eligibility and program integrity.

NEW SECTION

WAC 192-610-040 Can an employee backdate an application or a weekly claim for benefits? (1) Generally, paid family or medical leave benefits are payable on or after the date the employee applies for benefits. An application or weekly claim may be backdated for good cause or for the convenience of the department.

(2) For the purpose of this section:

(a)(i) "Good cause" means factors that prevented an employee from applying for benefits prior to or at the time of need for paid leave such as a serious health condition, a period of incapacity, or a natural disaster.

(ii) The burden of proof is on the employee to provide all pertinent facts and evidence to the department to determine good cause. The evidence must show that the factors prevented the employee from applying for or claiming benefits when the qualifying event occurred and any subsequent duration in which the employee did not apply for or claim benefits. This evidence may include, but is not limited to, medical certification from a health care provider, evidence of a natural disaster, or other information required by the department.

(b) "For the convenience of the department" means for the purpose of program administration or situations when accepting timely applications or weekly claims was difficult or impossible. These include, but are not limited to, equipment breakdown or lack of available staff.

(3) An employee who wants to backdate an application or weekly claim must file for benefits during the first week in which the factors that constitute good cause no longer exist.

NEW SECTION

WAC 192-610-045 May the department refuse to accept an employee's application, appeal, or petition? No employee or agent of the department may refuse to accept a properly filed application or weekly claim for paid family or medical leave benefits, a signed appeal, or a petition for review by the commissioner related to any program administered by this department regardless of the employee or agent's opinion concerning its merits.

NEW SECTION

WAC 192-610-050 How are typical workweek hours determined? (1) For salaried employees, the number of hours worked in a week are assumed to be forty, regardless of how many hours are actually worked. Typical workweek hours are determined by multiplying the number of weeks in the qualifying period the employee held the salaried position by forty, adding any other hours that were not salaried, if any, and then dividing that amount by fifty-two.

(2) For all other employees, typical workweek hours are determined by dividing the sum of all hours reported in the qualifying period by fifty-two.

NEW SECTION

WAC 192-610-055 What is an employee's maximum benefit length? (1) The maximum duration of paid family leave may not exceed twelve times the typical workweek hours during a claim year.

(2) The maximum duration of paid medical leave may not exceed twelve times the typical workweek hours during a claim year. This leave may be extended to fourteen times the typical workweek hours during a claim year if the employee experiences a serious health condition with a pregnancy that results in a period of incapacity.

(3) An employee is not entitled to paid family or medical leave benefits under this chapter that exceeds a combined total of sixteen times the typical workweek hours during a claim year. The combined total of family and medical leave may be extended to eighteen times the typical workweek hours during a claim year if the employee experiences a serious health condition with a pregnancy that results in a period of incapacity.

NEW SECTION

WAC 192-610-060 Will the employer be notified if an employee files an application for benefits? (1) The department will send a notice to the employee's current employer(s), if applicable, when an employee files an application for paid family or medical leave benefits.

(2) The department may, when necessary, send a notice to the employee's most recent employer(s).

(3) Any employer that receives such a notice must respond to the department as indicated on the notice. If the employer does not reply within the provided time frame, the department will determine eligibility without input from the employer.

NEW SECTION

WAC 192-800-003 Designating an authorized representative. (1) The department may authorize another individual to act on the employee's behalf for the purposes of paid family and medical leave benefits if:

(a) An employee designates an authorized representative by submitting written documentation as required by the department;

(b) A court-appointed legal guardian with authority to make decisions on a person's behalf submits documentation as required by the department;

(c) An individual designated as a power of attorney submits documentation satisfactory to the department to act on the employee's behalf; or

(d) If an employee is unable to designate an authorized representative due to a serious health condition, an individual may represent the employee by submitting a complete and signed authorized representative designation form made available by the department, which must include:

(i) Documentation from the employee's health care provider certifying that the employee is incapable of completing the administrative requirements necessary for receiving paid family and medical leave benefits and is unable to designate an authorized representative to act on the employee's behalf; and

(ii) An affidavit or declaration authorized by RCW 9A.72.085 attesting to the responsibility to act in the employee's best interest.

(2) The department will terminate the authority given to the authorized representative:

(a) When the employee or authorized representative notifies the department verbally or in writing; or

(b) At the department's discretion.

(3) For the purposes of paid family and medical leave the term employee is used for both employee and authorized representative.

AMENDATORY SECTION (Amending WSR 13-12-044, filed 5/31/13, effective 7/1/13)

WAC 246-831-040 Educational requirements. Training in reflexology must include a minimum of two hundred hours of instruction. One hour of instruction is defined as fifty minutes of actual instructional time. The two hundred hours shall consist of the following:

(1) Thirty hours of reflexology theory, history, zones, reflex (~~(points))~~ maps and relaxation response, and contraindications;

(2) Forty hours of in-person, classroom study of body systems as related to reflexology:

(a) The study of the leg, feet, hands and outer ears as structures;

(b) Hands-on palpation of landmarks and reflex points with sensory identification of palpated areas;

(c) A map of reflexes as they are anatomically reflected on the feet, hands and outer ears; and

(d) How the reflexes are affected by stimulation to the feet, hands and outer ears through hands-on experience.

(3) Thirty hours of anatomy and physiology;

(4) Five hours of business practice involving ethics, business standards and local/state laws and ordinances pertaining to the practice of reflexology;

(5) Twenty-five hours or more of supervised practicum or clinical work; and

(6) Seventy hours of additional (~~(homework hours that can include giving and)~~) course work which can include the practice of documenting client reflexology sessions ((as well as other written work)).

(k) Relevant courses or seminars offered by organizations or associations such as the American Society of Orthopedic Surgeons, the American Academy of Physical Medicine and Rehabilitation, the American College of Sports Medicine, the American Medical Association, the American Occupational Therapy Association, the American Physical Therapy Association, the American Osteopathic Association, and the American Podiatric Medical Association.

(2) Category 2. Acceptable documentation is a certificate issued by the sponsoring organization or author showing successful completion of the examination.

(ii) Scientific journals not requiring an examination ~~((s))~~. Each report qualifies for one continuing competency credit hour. A maximum of three continuing competency credit hours may be earned in this activity in any three-year reporting period. Acceptable documentation for each article is a written report identifying the publication source, author, publication date, and a summary of at least five points from the article.

(iii) Business journals ~~((s))~~. Each report qualifies for one continuing competency credit hour. A maximum of three continuing competency credit hours may be earned in this activity in any three-year reporting period. Acceptable documentation for each article, is a written report identifying the publication source, author, publication date, and a summary of at least five points from the article.

(d) Instruction video, videodisc or internet courses ~~((s))~~. A credit hour is fifty minutes spent in this activity. A maximum of three continuing competency credit hours may be earned in this activity in any three-year reporting period. Acceptable documentation is a written report identifying the source of the instruction, the release date, and summarizing at least five points presented in the instruction.

(e) Manufacturer courses sponsored by organizations not identified as Category 1 activities ~~((s))~~. A credit hour is fifty minutes spent in this activity. A maximum of three continuing competency credit hours may be earned in this activity in any three-year reporting period. Acceptable documentation includes certificates or receipts with an authorized signature, stamp or seal.

(f) Participating in peer review ~~((s))~~. For the purpose of this section, peer review means either serving on a formal peer review panel, committee or individual review of a sole provider, where the purpose of the review is to determine whether appropriate treatment was rendered, or whether the services rendered were within accepted standards. Each occurrence qualifies for three credit hours. A maximum of nine continuing competency credit hours may be earned in this activity in any three-year reporting period. Acceptable documentation is a certification signed by the facilitator of the peer review providing the date and the total time spent in the peer review process.

(g) Student or peer mentoring ~~((s))~~.

(i) Student mentoring. Each four-hour period spent in this activity qualifies for one credit hour. A maximum of three continuing competency credit hours may be earned in this activity in any three-year reporting period. Acceptable documentation is a copy of the mentoring contract or agreement and a certification from the student substantiating the date(s) engaged in mentoring and the total mentoring time.

(ii) Peer mentoring. Each four-hour period spent in this activity qualifies for one credit hour. A maximum of three continuing competency credit hours may be earned in this activity in any three-year reporting period. Acceptable docu-

mentation is a certification summarizing the subject of the mentoring, the date, and total mentoring time and signed by the licensee and at least one other practitioner participating in the mentoring activity.

(h) Documented group study((?)). A credit hour is fifty minutes spent in this activity. A maximum of six continuing competency credit hours may be earned in this activity in any three-year reporting period. Acceptable documentation is a summary of the group study topics, the date, and total group study time, signed by the facilitator or other authorized personnel.

Purpose of the Proposal and Its Anticipated Effects, Including Any Changes in Existing Rules: The proposed rule amendments update the listing of allowable duties a dentist may delegate to a licensed dental hygienist under general supervision. A licensed dental hygienist has appropriate education and training to competently perform the tasks in the proposed rule amendments after a dentist has examined and diagnosed the patient and provided subsequent instructions to be performed without the dentist physically present in the office. Additionally, several tasks in the proposed rule amendments may provide more opportunities for teledentistry when a dentist is not required to be on site. This would allow a dentist and dental hygienist to provide dental care to patients unable to be physically in the dental office.

Reasons Supporting Proposal: The commission considered a rule request in July 2017 to allow dental hygienists to perform certain tasks under general supervision that are typically completed by dental assistants under close supervision. Close supervision requires the dentist to be physically present in the treatment facility during the performance of a delegated task while general supervision does not. Identifying a list of acceptable tasks that may be delegated by a licensed dentist to a licensed dental hygienist in rule establishes enforceable practice standards while ensuring patient safety. Because a general supervision list of tasks already exists in current rule, rule making is necessary to amend the rule to include proposed tasks which are currently allowed under close supervision.

"Application guidelines" means the published document that provides the public with information on how to apply for commission programs, including eligibility requirements, review criteria used to evaluate and score applications, deadlines, timelines, and information on the appeal procedure. ~~((Application guidelines may be))~~ Published in ((a printed format)) print and/or ((in)) electronic format. guidelines are accessible through the commission's web site.

"Art advisory committee" means a committee formed by staff and a partner agency to develop plans and overall project specifications, and to make funding allocation decisions related to the state art collection.

"Art in public places program" means the visual art program of the commission established by the legislature in RCW 43.46.090 to acquire works of art and to develop, administer, and manage the state art collection.

"Art selection committee" means a committee formed by a partner agency, and approved by staff, to review and select artists to create works of art for the state art collection, or to review and select works of art for or from the state art collection, through a process facilitated by staff.

"Artistic disciplines" means dance, design, folk and traditional arts, media arts, music, literature, theater, visual arts, and interdisciplinary arts.

"Artistic excellence" means evidence of some or all of the following: Mastery of skills and techniques, communication of unique vision or perspective, professional approaches to process and presentation. Additionally, for groups and organizations, includes the contribution the artistic work(s) make to the development of the artists involved, the art form and the arts generally; or for services delivered, the contribution the services make to the development of a vibrant arts and cultural community in the state.

"Arts professional" means an individual who has professional work experience in the arts or an arts-related field.

"Board" means the board of commissioners, consisting of nineteen members appointed by the governor and four members of the legislature appointed to the Washington state arts commission pursuant to RCW 43.46.015.

"Chair" means the chair of the board, elected pursuant to WAC 30-08-050 and fulfilling duties as established in Title 30 WAC.

"Collections management" means the ongoing care, preservation, and maintenance of the state art collection, including activities such as the management of conservation, restoration, deaccession, documentation, inventory, labeling, loans, and resiting of works of art.

"Commission" means the collective entity of the Washington state arts commission, including the board, executive director, and staff.

"Commissioner" means an individual appointed to the board of the Washington state arts commission.

"Conservation" means treatment of malfunctioning or damaged works of art for the purpose of bringing them to a stable condition so that future routine and special maintenance can be effective. Conservation-related activities may also include examination and documentation.

"Eligibility requirements" means published standards ~~((by which applications are reviewed to determine if they meet the minimum required qualifications to apply for a commission program))~~ and/or minimum required qualifications which applicants and/or applications must meet in order for their application to be considered by the panel.

"Executive director" means that person employed pursuant to RCW 43.46.045 to carry out the functions of that chapter and Title 30 WAC.

"Grant" means a contract ~~((for arts or cultural services))~~ between the commission and an organization or individual, for arts or cultural services, awarded through a competitive application process and approved or ratified by the board.

"Inventory" means a periodic survey of the physical state and current location of works of art in the state art collection.

"Local government" means a local governing body, city, county, town, municipal county, tribal government, or other entity as approved.

"Nonprofit" means incorporation under the nonprofit laws of the state of Washington or another state, and determination by the Internal Revenue Service (IRS) that the incorporated entity is exempt from taxation under Section 501(c)(3) of the IRS code.

"Panel" means a group of individuals convened by staff to review applications(~~(;)~~ or nominations(~~(, or staff recommendations based on)~~ using published review criteria, (~~in order to~~) and make recommendations to the board or executive director.

"Partner agency" means a state agency, K-12 public school, university, college, community or technical college, or other public entity working with the art in public places program.

"Pilot program" means a limited scale, flexible program that evaluates administrative needs and costs, adverse and favorable events, and improves upon the design prior to launch of a full program or integration of pilot into an existing program.

"Professional artist" means an individual who has a history of paid work as an artist.

"Public artist roster" means the board approved list of professional artists eligible to create visual works of art for the state art collection.

"Public benefit" means ((evidence of)) project outcomes that have an impact on a community, including some or all of the following: ((Potential impact on the)) Broadening access to the arts or expanding and diversifying audiences for the arts; improving artistic, cultural, ((professional)) educational, or economic development ((of)) within a community ((or individuals; and/or potential to broaden access to, expand and diversify the audiences for, and/or strengthen communities through the arts)); and/or supporting specific community goals such as health and wellness, public safety, civic discourse, or other quality of life measures.

"Resiting" means the relocation of a work of art in the state art collection within the jurisdiction of a partner agency or between partner agencies.

"Restoration" means treatment that returns a malfunctioning or damaged work of art to a known or assumed state, often through the addition of nonoriginal material.

"Review criteria" means the standards used by panels to evaluate and score applications(~~(;)~~ or nominations(~~(, or staff recommendations)~~).

"Roster" means a list of approved arts professionals who have the skills and experience to address the needs of a specific commission program.

"Routine maintenance" means a regular procedure to preserve a work of art in the state art collection in proper condition: Clean, presentable, and in working order.

"Site responsive" means created, planned, or intended for a particular site. A site responsive work of art addresses both the physical characteristics of its location and the context of the community in which it is situated.

"Special maintenance" means anticipated but infrequent activities required to maintain aesthetic and/or structural

aspects of the works of art in the state art collection, including integrity of the overall surface and/or individual elements.

"Staff" means employees of the Washington state arts commission, under the direction of the executive director, pursuant to RCW 43.46.045, employed to carry out the functions of that chapter, and Title 30 WAC.

"State art collection" means all works of art and select design models commissioned or purchased under RCW 43.17.200, 28A.58.055, 28A.335.210, 43.46.090, and 43.19.455.

"State-certified creative district" means a creative district whose application for certification has been approved by the commission.

"Teaching artist" means a professional artist who is dedicated to arts education as an integral part of ((his/her)) their professional practice, and who has cultivated skills as an educator in concert with skills as an artist.

"Underserved" means populations whose opportunities to experience the arts are limited by geography, historical exclusion and marginalization due to race, ethnicity, sexual orientation, gender identity, economics, disability, or other social or institutionally imposed barriers.

"Under-resourced" means a lack of access to specialized, professional, financial, or institutional expertise and communal knowledge, and/or working with neglected or dated infrastructures and limited or absent assets and resources resulting in lack of recognition, competitiveness, and cyclical absent or diminished funding.

"Washington state arts commission" means the collective entity of the Washington state arts commission, including the board and staff.

Purpose of the Proposal and Its Anticipated Effects, Including Any Changes in Existing Rules: The proposal creating WAC 468-38-435 was initiated by the federal proposal in Fixing America's Surface Transportation Act (FAST Act).

The first section of the proposal exempts up to two thousand pounds for vehicles operated by an engine fueled primarily by natural gas up to eighty-two thousand pounds. This proposal is consistent with FAST Act §1410; 23 U.S.C. 127(s).

The second section of the proposal increases legal weights to emergency vehicles on the interstate including one mile access to and from the interstate. The proposal is consistent with FAST Act §1410; 23 U.S.C. 127(r).

Reasons Supporting Proposal: The FAST Act includes a number of provisions that modify federal requirements regarding the size and weight of vehicles that may travel on the interstate system. The federal requirements mandate that states adhere to these requirements. Failure to adhere to the requirements can result in loss of federal funding.

Statute Being Implemented: 23 U.S.C. 127.

WAC 468-38-435 Federal weight increases on the interstate system. (1) Are there any weight exemptions for natural gas engines?

Yes, for the interstate system and no more than one mile access to and from the interstate system, natural gas vehicles, if operated by an engine fueled primarily by natural gas, may exceed vehicle weight limits set in RCW 46.44.041 up to two thousand pounds with a maximum gross vehicle weight of eighty-two thousand pounds. The increase in weight shall equal the difference between:

- (a) The weight of the vehicle attributable to the natural gas tank and fueling system carried by that vehicle; and
- (b) The weight of a comparable diesel tank and fueling system.

(2) What weights are authorized for emergency vehicles to travel on the interstate system?

(a) Emergency vehicles may operate without a permit on the interstate system and no more than one mile to and from

the interstate system to a maximum gross vehicle weight of eighty-six thousand pounds and axle weights of:

- (i) Twenty-four thousand pounds on a single steering axle;
- (ii) Thirty-three thousand five hundred pounds on a single drive axle;
- (iii) Sixty-two thousand pounds on a tandem axle; or
- (iv) Fifty-two thousand pounds on a tandem rear drive steer axle.

(b) In this section, the term emergency vehicle means a vehicle designed to be used under emergency conditions:

- (i) To transport personnel and equipment; and
- (ii) To support the suppression of fires and mitigation of other hazardous situations.

(3) Operators of emergency vehicles described in this section shall check their route on Washington state department of transportation, commercial vehicle services web site for restrictions prior to travel. These vehicles shall obtain approval/permit from the local jurisdiction when traveling on any local roads. Any firefighting apparatus or emergency vehicle shall obtain a permit from commercial vehicles services office prior to traveling on state highways that are not part of the interstate system if their weights exceed what is prescribed in RCW 46.44.190(4).

WAC 143-06-170 Calculations of action costs of producing copies of public records declared to be unduly burdensome—Adoption of statutory fee schedule. (1) Consolidated Technology Services has deemed the actual calculation of costs to the agency for producing responsive records to a public records request is unduly burdensome, because:

- a) The office does not have the resources to conduct a study to determine all its actual copying costs;
- b) staff resources are insufficient to perform a study and to calculate such actual costs
- c) funds were not allocated for performing a study to calculate such actual costs and the agency lacks the necessary funds to perform a study and calculations;
- d) to conduct such a study would interfere with other essential agency functions

e) through the 2017 legislative process, the public and requesters have commented on and been informed of authorized fees and costs, including for electronic records, provided in RCW 42.56.120 (2)(b) and (c), (3) and (4).

As such, Consolidated Technology Services shall charge for copies of records pursuant to the default fees in RCW 42.56.120 (2)(b) and (c). Consolidated Technology Services will charge for customized services pursuant to 42.56.120(3). Under RCW 42.56.130, Consolidated Technology Services may charge other copy fees authorized by statutes outside of chapter 42.56 RCW. Consolidated Technology Services may enter into an alternative fee agreement with a requester under RCW 42.56.120(4).

(2) This fee schedule will be set forth on the Consolidated Technology Services Agency website and be updated with subsequent changes to RCW 42.56 or further Consolidated Technology rule-making.

(3) Consolidated Technology Services may include a customized service charge for certain public records requests. Requests that require the use of information technology expertise to prepare data compilations, or provide customized electronic access services when such customized access services are not used by the agency. The customized service charge may reimburse Consolidated Technology Services up to the actual cost of providing these services.

WAC 143-06-180 Fee waivers Requesters are required to pay for copies in advance of receiving records. Fee waivers are an exception and are available for some small requests under the following conditions.

(1) It is within the discretion of the public records officer to waive copying fees when: (a) all of the records responsive to an entire request are paper copies only and are twenty-five or fewer pages; or (b) all of the records responsive to an entire request are electronic and can be provided in a single email with attachments of a size totaling no more than the equivalent of 100 printed pages. If that email for any reason is not deliverable, records will be provided through another means of delivery, and the requester will be charged in accordance with this rule.

(2) Fee waivers are not applicable to records provided in installments.

NEW SECTION

WAC 143-06-190 Requestor fees and deposits Consolidated Technology Services shall require an advance deposit of ten percent of the estimated fees when the copying fees for an installment or an entire request, or customized service charge, exceeds twenty-five dollars.

All required fees must be paid in advance of release of the copies or an installment of copies, or in advance of when a deposit is required. Consolidated Technology Services will notify the requester of when payment is due.

Purpose of the Proposal and Its Anticipated Effects, Including Any Changes in Existing Rules: The legislature, in enacting ESSB 6091, directed ecology to develop a program to restore and enhance streamflows. In addition to fees collected from applicants for building permits and divisions of land where the development would rely on permit-exempt wells, the legislature authorized \$300,000,000 to be appropriated over fifteen years. The rule will establish process and criteria for prioritizing and approving funding applications, and developing and implementing funding contracts with chosen recipients. This will make funding decisions and contracting more transparent, consistent, and defensible.

Reasons Supporting Proposal: Prior to the legislature enacting ESSB 6091, rural residential development was nearly precluded in some areas of the state due to the potential of adversely impacting a closed water body or stream/river where instream flows adopted into rule were not always met. The intent of the legislation was to allow continued development while protecting and enhancing streamflows and instream habitat to benefit Endangered Species Act-listed salmonids and other aquatic species. The proposal will ensure that projects to meet the intent of the legislation are implemented effectively.

Statutory Authority for Adoption: RCW 90.54.040 Water Resources Act of 1971, 43.21A.080 Department of ecology, and chapter 90.94 RCW, Streamflow Restoration Act.

Statute Being Implemented: Chapter 90.94 RCW.

Chapter 173-566 WAC

STREAMFLOW RESTORATION FUNDING

NEW SECTION

WAC 173-566-010 Purpose. (1) In the adoption of the Streamflow Restoration Act, the legislature stated the intent to appropriate three hundred million dollars for projects to achieve the goals of the act until June 30, 2033. They further directed ecology to implement a program to restore and enhance streamflows by fulfilling obligations under the act to develop and implement plans to restore streamflows to levels necessary to support robust, healthy, and sustainable salmon populations.

(2) This chapter contains general rules for project grant eligibility, selection, issuance, and performance, and applies to projects statewide pursuant to and consistent with chapter 90.94 RCW to:

- (a) Protect and enhance streamflows.
- (b) Improve watershed functions that benefit instream fish and wildlife resources.
- (c) Offset the consumptive use impacts from new domestic permit-exempt wells.
- (d) Provide access to new water supplies when identified in a watershed plan adopted under RCW 90.94.020 or 90.94.-030.

NEW SECTION

WAC 173-566-020 Relation to other laws and rules.

(1) This chapter only applies to grants issued by ecology that are funded under chapter 90.94 RCW, Streamflow restoration.

(2) All grants shall be subject to existing accounting and auditing requirements of state laws and regulations applicable to the issuance of grants.

(3) **State Environmental Policy Act.** State Environmental Policy Act (SEPA) review must be completed before ecology may sign a funding agreement for construction projects or before construction begins for combined design/construction projects.

(4) **Cultural resource review.** Many proposed projects have the potential to significantly impact traditional cultural

properties or places, or historically significant locations or artifacts. Ecology staff coordinates with the Washington state department of archaeology and historic preservation (DAHP) to meet all state requirements regarding cultural and historic preservation.

(a) Grant recipients must follow the appropriate steps to work with DAHP and tribes, under ecology instruction, to determine if a site has the potential of disturbing or impacting cultural or historic resources, and to protect such resources.

(b) All activities associated with site assessments for historic properties are grant eligible.

(5) **Water quality.** All funded projects must protect water quality and comply with relevant water quality standards.

(6) **Permits.** Recipients must obtain and comply with all required permits.

(7) **Puget Sound action agenda.** Ecology may not fund projects designed to address the restoration of Puget Sound that are in conflict with the action agenda developed by the Puget Sound partnership under RCW 90.71.310.

NEW SECTION

WAC 173-566-030 Definitions. Definitions provided only apply to this chapter.

"Agreement effective date" means the date on which the grant or loan agreement becomes effective, as specified in the grant agreement.

"Agreement expiration date" means the latest date eligible costs can be incurred, as specified in the grant agreement.

"Agreement signature date" means the date the grant agreement is signed by ecology.

"Applicant" means an entity that applies for a grant. See "eligible applicants" and "ineligible applicant."

"Biennium" means the twenty-four-month fiscal period extending from July 1st of odd-numbered years to June 30th of odd-numbered years.

"Budget" means, for the purpose of grant agreements, a breakdown of eligible costs by task.

"Consumptive use" means that portion of withdrawn groundwater that is lost from the water source, rather than returned through a septic system or other means.

"Ecology" means the Washington state department of ecology.

"Eligible applicants" includes Washington state agencies, local governments and quasi-governments within Washington state, an agency of the federal government, tribal governments with reservation lands or treaty rights within Washington, and nonprofit organizations.

"Eligible cost" means a cost that meets all criteria established in the agreement and grant program funding guidelines.

"Funding cycle" means the period between announcements of grant opportunities.

"Grant agreement" or "agreement" means the formal, written, contractual document that details the terms and conditions, scope of work, budget, and schedule of the grant, and that is signed by authorized signatories of the recipient and ecology.

"Grant" means an award of financial assistance given to a recipient to carry out work for a public purpose or public good authorized by law.

"Ineligible applicant" means a private citizen, for-profit business including, but not limited to, all forms of private partnerships, incorporated entities, LLCs, or any agents acting on behalf of such entities or foreign or out-of-state governments.

"Instream resources" for the purposes of this chapter means fish and related aquatic resources.

"Local government" means any political subdivision of the state, including a town, city, county, special purpose district, or other municipal corporation.

"New domestic permit-exempt wells" means those wells used for indoor and outdoor residential purposes exempt from permitting under RCW 90.44.050, constructed between January 19, 2018, and January 18, 2038.

"Recipient" means an entity that has a grant agreement.

"Retroactive costs" means costs incurred before the agreement signature date.

"Scope of work" means the tasks and deliverables of the grant agreement.

"Site" means any building, structure, installation, equipment, pipe or pipeline (including any pipe into a sewer or publicly owned treatment works), well, pit, pond, lagoon, impoundment, ditch, landfill, storage container, motor vehicle, rolling stock, vessel or aircraft, or any area where project tasks take place.

"Watershed" means a geographic area draining to a stream or tributary.

"Watershed plan" means a plan under RCW 90.94.020 or 90.94.030.

"WRIA" means a water resource inventory area as established in chapter 173-500 WAC.

NEW SECTION

WAC 173-566-100 Grant award process. (1) Ecology will develop guidance to assist in implementing this chapter.

(2) Project solicitation. Ecology will provide notice of a new funding cycle, pursuant to WAC 173-566-110 at least once per biennium.

(3) Application. Grant applications must contain sufficient information to make the determinations in subsection (4) of this section.

(4) Project evaluation and ranking. Ecology will review projects and applications for completeness and to determine:

- (a) Project eligibility under WAC 173-566-310;
- (b) Project quality under WAC 173-566-140; and
- (c) Funding priority under WAC 173-566-150.

(5) Agreement development. After deciding to fund an eligible project, ecology will negotiate with the applicant the scope of work and budget for the grant and develop the agreement.

NEW SECTION

WAC 173-566-110 Grant announcements. (1) Ecology will announce the availability of funding opportunities for competitive grants. The announcement will include, at a minimum, a description of:

- (a) Purpose of the grants.
- (b) Funding cycle for the grants.
- (c) Amount of funding available or anticipated amount of funding available, if known.
- (d) Eligibility criteria for the grant solicitation.
- (e) Information about how to apply.
- (f) Application deadlines.
- (g) Ecology contact information.
- (2) To publicize funding opportunities, ecology will issue a news release, post information on our web site, and may use other methods, including social media.
- (3) **Unused funds.** Ecology may announce the availability of unused funds, or retain the funds for a future funding cycle or to cover future contingencies that meet the purposes and intent of this chapter and chapter 90.94 RCW.

NEW SECTION

WAC 173-566-120 Application. (1) All applicants must use the electronic system identified by ecology to apply for grants. Applicants without access to the electronic system must use a process approved by ecology.

(2) The applicant must complete the application process and provide all required information, including:

- (a) Applicant information.
- (b) Project location and description.
- (c) Requested funding amount and budget for the project.
- (d) Description of project benefit(s), including:
 - (i) Problem(s) or need(s) the project would address.
 - (ii) Timing, location, and extent that the project is expected to address the identified needs.
 - (iii) Applications for altered water management or infrastructure projects must estimate the volume of water that would be conserved or remanaged, and describe the method used to make the estimate.
 - (iv) Method(s) used to determine project benefits.
 - (v) How any monitoring, operations, maintenance, or other measures will be addressed to ensure benefits persist over time.
 - (vi) Metrics for project success, including quantitative metrics if available.

(e) Scope of work and tasks for the project.

(f) Source of project water, if applicable, and how water will be managed to ensure there will be no impairment to senior water rights.

(g) Identify permits that have been obtained and permits applied for to date.

(h) Address how aquatic species and water quality will be protected.

(i) Any other information required by ecology to evaluate the project.

(3) Ecology may require a feasibility study if the applicant cannot supply sufficient detail in the application. Applicants may apply for a grant to complete the feasibility study.

(4) The applicant must submit a complete application by the due date and time, if a due date and time are included in the announcement. Ecology may approve a later due date by posting notice of the extended application deadline on ecology's web site.

(5) Ecology may request additional information to assist in the application evaluation process. If the applicant fails to comply with the request, ecology may determine the application is incomplete and remove it from further consideration.

(6) Applicants may submit a new application for a project that was not funded for any reason in a prior funding cycle.

NEW SECTION

WAC 173-566-130 Phasing. (1) Applicants may choose to divide projects into phases, particularly when each phase can be shown to benefit streamflow or instream resources.

(2) Ecology reserves the right to divide a project into phases and fund initial project phase(s) due to funding availability and priorities, or other considerations.

(3) Funding for one or more phases of a project does not guarantee funding for subsequent phases.

NEW SECTION

WAC 173-566-140 Evaluation process. (1) Ecology will evaluate all complete applications submitted by the announced deadline.

(2) Ecology reviews applications to determine eligibility of the applicant under WAC 173-566-030, and whether the project meets the eligibility criteria.

(3) Those grant applications determined eligible, ecology will then evaluate for project quality. To complete this evaluation, ecology will consider:

(a) Benefits to streamflow and instream resources.

(b) Whether the application demonstrates all of the following:

(i) Appropriateness of the project to address the stated needs.

(ii) Feasibility of the project, including the likelihood of success and long-term sustainability.

(iii) Whether the project is an effective use of available funds, considering need, as well as costs and benefits.

(iv) Readiness to proceed.

(c) Information gathered from field visits that may be part of the evaluation.

(4) The funding priorities described in WAC 173-566-150, and related grant guidance and criteria for the current funding cycle, will be used to produce a final score. Total final scores of the eligible project applications, taking account of both project quality and funding priorities, will be used to determine relative ranking for awarding grants.

(5) Ecology may set a minimum score that an application has to receive for ecology to offer funds.

NEW SECTION

WAC 173-566-150 Funding priorities. In addition to the evaluation of project quality in WAC 173-566-140, ecology will prioritize projects under each of the following:

(1) Projects located in WRIs planning under RCW 90.94.020 or 90.94.030, or in a metering pilot project area in RCW 90.94.040.

(2) Projects identified in a watershed plan adopted under RCW 90.94.020 or 90.94.030 consistent with project priority and sequencing identified in the plan.

(3) Although not the highest priority consideration for funding, projects not identified in watershed plans under RCW 90.94.020 or 90.94.030 that do the following:

(a) Improve streamflows, or enhance instream resources and watershed functions that support the recovery of threatened and endangered salmonids.

(b) Improve streamflows, or enhance instream resources and watershed functions that support other fish and related aquatic resources.

NEW SECTION

WAC 173-566-200 Water right acquisitions. (1) Acquisition of all or a portion of a water right is eligible for funding. The projects must include:

(a) Changing the purpose of use to instream flow under RCW 90.03.380.

(b) Permanent conveyance of the water right to ecology to be held in the trust water rights program.

(2) Funding may be provided for work related to preliminary assessment and price valuation when ecology determines that such work is necessary to complete a suitable water right acquisition.

(3) Applicants proposing water right acquisition projects must have a preapplication meeting with ecology.

NEW SECTION

WAC 173-566-210 Water storage. Water storage projects eligible for funding include above ground storage, below ground storage, within natural formations, or be man-made. Examples include off-channel surface water storage, managed aquifer recharge, infiltration galleries or ponds, and cisterns.

NEW SECTION

WAC 173-566-220 Altered water management or infrastructure. (1) Water management and infrastructure improvement projects eligible for funding involve changes in how and when water is diverted, withdrawn, conveyed, or used to benefit streamflows and instream resources and carry out chapter 90.94 RCW. Examples include conservation and efficiency projects such as diversion modifications, lining and piping, sprinkler conversion, and other irrigation efficiencies, as well as source switches, and streamflow retiming projects. Innovative methods will be considered.

(2) Projects must include sufficient provisions and protections so that completed projects will provide:

(a) Permanent streamflow improvement; or

(b) Access to new water supplies when identified in a watershed plan adopted under RCW 90.94.020 or 90.94.030.

(3) To meet subsection (2) of this section, conservation and water use efficiency projects must permanently convey the saved water to ecology to be held in the trust water rights program for instream flow purposes.

NEW SECTION

WAC 173-566-230 Riparian and fish habitat improvements. Riparian and fish habitat improvements that might not directly increase streamflow, but do benefit instream resources, may be funded through this chapter. Examples include, but are not limited to, in-channel habitat improvements, riparian restoration, strategic land acquisitions, levee modifications, floodplain modifications, fish passage, and beaver introduction.

NEW SECTION

WAC 173-566-240 Environmental monitoring. (1) Environmental monitoring equipment is eligible for funding, including equipment for stream gauging and groundwater monitoring directly related to restoring, maintaining, or enhancing streamflows or instream resources and values.

(2) Effectiveness monitoring for projects funded under this chapter is eligible for funding.

(3) Recipients must follow all grant requirements for submittal of environmental monitoring data, and standards when geographic information system (GIS) data are collected, processed, and submitted to ecology.

NEW SECTION**WAC 173-566-300 Fiscal controls.****Determining allocation of funding.**

(1) For each funding cycle, ecology may allocate a percent of available funding to certain project types, which will be identified in the grant guidance. Funding allocation may be based on demonstrated need, previous funding awarded, or other criteria.

(2) Ecology may set aside a percentage of available funding each funding cycle for projects in each ecology region or other geographical areas. Ecology will update the funding guidance with set aside amounts prior to the beginning of the funding cycle.

(3) Ecology may set a ceiling amount to limit the amount of grant funding available to any one applicant per funding cycle. The ceiling amount will be included in the funding guidance.

Grant decisions.

(4) When awarding grants, ecology decisions are:

(a) Consistent with all state laws and rules authorizing the funding and any specific direction by the legislature.

(b) Subject to available funds.

(c) Based on evaluations of grant applications submitted and other relevant information available.

Funding discretion.

(5) Ecology retains the discretion to not provide a grant for an eligible project or to provide less funding for an eligible project than the amount requested.

(6) Ecology has the discretion to:

(a) Hold funds:

(i) To cover cost overruns on funded projects; or

(ii) To use in later funding cycles.

(b) With the exception of fees collected under RCW 90.94.020 or 90.94.030, award unused funds to lower ranked

projects, following the initial grant awards in the funding cycle.

Grant management.

(7) Ongoing management of most aspects of grant projects is subject to the most recent edition of administrative requirements for ecology grants, such as *Administrative Requirements for Recipients of Ecology Grants Managed in EAGL*.

(8) Retroactive costs. Any costs incurred before the agreement signature date are at the recipient's risk.

(9) Ecology will establish reasonable costs for all grants, and require recipients to manage projects in a cost-effective manner. Ecology may require grant recipients to periodically update a spending plan for the grant.

(10) Ecology may withdraw or modify a funding offer if the recipient makes a request to significantly change the scope of work after the award.

(11) Ecology has the right to withdraw funding and not approve expenditures that do not follow appropriate contracting process.

NEW SECTION**WAC 173-566-310 Ineligible projects and costs.**

Costs that are ineligible to receive grant funding under this chapter include, but are not limited to:

(1) Project elements previously funded by ecology.

(2) Projects that are otherwise required under statute, rule, or ordinance, or court order, except pursuant to this chapter and chapter 90.94 RCW.

(3) Costs to meet an individual or general National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System (NPDES) permit.

(4) Staff time is only eligible if directly related to the project.

(5) Major and capital equipment purchases without pre-approval from ecology.

(6) Contaminated soils removal or remediation.

(7) Projects that conflict with other ecology rules, projects, or guidance.

(8) Aquatic plant control for aesthetic purposes, navigational improvements, or any other reason that does not provide increased streamflow, nor benefit ecological functions or critical stream habitat.

(9) Bond costs for debt issuance.

(10) Operation and maintenance costs.

(11) Bonus or acceleration payments to contractors to meet contractual completion dates for construction.

(12) Compensation or damages for any claim or injury of any kind arising out of the project, including any personal injury, damage to any kind of real or personal property, or any kind of contractual damages, whether direct, indirect, or consequential.

(13) Dispute resolution under the grant agreement.

(14) Office furniture not included in the recipient's indirect rate.

(15) Operating expenses of local government, such as the salaries and expenses of a mayor, city councilmember, and city attorney.

(16) Overtime differential paid to employees of a public body to complete administrative or force account work.

- (17) Permit fees not directly required for the completion of the project.
- (18) Professional dues.
- (19) Property purchases without prior approval from ecology.
- (20) Refinance of existing debt.

NEW SECTION

WAC 173-566-320 Grant agreement. (1) Ecology works with the recipient to prepare the grant agreement.

(2) A grant agreement issued and managed in ecology's electronic system must include, at a minimum:

- (a) Project description.
- (b) Expected outcomes.
- (c) Project budget and funding distribution.
- (d) Agreement effective date and expiration date.
- (e) Description of tasks and deliverables.
- (f) Contact information for ecology and the recipient.
- (g) Signatures of authorized signatories.
- (h) General terms and conditions that specify requirements related, but not limited to:
 - (i) Amendments and modifications.
 - (ii) Assignment limits on transfer of rights or claims.
 - (iii) Inadvertent discovery plan for human remains and/or cultural resources.
 - (iv) Compliance with all laws.
 - (v) Conflict of interest.
 - (vi) Disputes.
 - (vii) Environmental data standards.
 - (viii) Governing law.
 - (ix) Indemnification.
 - (x) Independent status of the parties to the agreement.
 - (xi) Order of precedence for laws, rules, and the agreement.
 - (xii) Property rights, copyrights, and patents.
 - (xiii) Records, audits, and inspections.
 - (xiv) Recovery of funds.
 - (xv) Severability.
 - (xvi) Suspension.
 - (xvii) Sustainable practices.
 - (xviii) Termination.
 - (xix) Third-party beneficiary.
 - (xx) Waiver of agreement provisions.
- (i) Special terms and conditions, if any.
- (j) Agreement-specific terms and conditions, if any.
- (k) Other items, if any, necessary to meet the goals of the grant program.

(3) All grant agreements under this chapter will include the latest version, as of the original agreement date, of ecology's grant general terms and conditions.

(4) Ecology may choose to extend a grant agreement at our sole discretion.

NEW SECTION

WAC 173-566-330 Amendments to the grant agreement. (1) A change to any of the following items requires an executed amendment to the agreement prior to the grantee being eligible for cost reimbursement due to such change:

- (a) Scope of work or the objectives of the project.

(b) Total project budget, whether for an increase or decrease.

(c) Grant funding, whether for an increase or decrease.

(d) Redistributing costs among budget tasks that exceed ten percent deviation of the total eligible costs of the funding distribution.

(e) Funding distributions.

(f) Agreement effective or expiration date, whether to shorten or extend.

(g) Special terms and conditions or agreement-specific terms and conditions.

(2) Administrative changes do not require an amendment. Examples of administrative changes include updates to contact names, addresses, and phone numbers.

(3) An amendment must be signed by all parties before it is effective.

NEW SECTION**WAC 173-566-340 Performance standards.****General provisions.**

(1) Nothing in this chapter influences, affects, or modifies existing ecology programs, rules, or enforcement of applicable laws and rules relating to activities funded by a grant.

(2) Ecology, or an auditor authorized by the state of Washington, may audit or inspect a recipient's grant agreements and records.

(3) New ecology grant agreements signed after the effective date of this chapter must be managed using ecology's designated electronic system. A recipient who cannot access the electronic system to meet a deadline or agreement requirements must use a process approved by ecology.

(4) ecology may perform site visits to monitor the project, evaluate performance, and document compliance or any other conditions of the agreement.

Recipient standards.

(5) Recipients must:

- (a) Follow all applicable accounting and auditing laws and rules related to grants.
- (b) Use funds according to the agreement.
- (c) Use funds according to the recipient's own policies and procedures, and according to all applicable laws and rules.
- (d) Comply with all applicable laws, rules, orders, and permits when carrying out activities authorized by the agreement.

(e) Obtain preapproval for equipment purchases over the amount specified in the agreement.

(6) As specified in the grant agreement, the recipient must submit the following to ecology:

- (a) Progress reports.
- (b) Payment requests.
- (c) Equipment purchase reports.
- (d) Documentation.
- (e) A final closeout report.
- (f) Any other required information.

Ecology standards.

(7) Ecology will:

(a) Follow all applicable accounting and auditing laws and rules related to grants.

(b) Monitor projects and review progress reports to assure compliance with applicable laws, rules, orders, permits, and terms and conditions of the agreement.

(c) Confirm that ecology has received required documentation and the project is satisfactorily completed before approving final payment.

NEW SECTION**WAC 173-566-350 Closing out the agreement. (1)**

The recipient must follow the closeout requirements in the agreement.

(2) Ecology is not obligated to reimburse the recipient the final payment if the recipient does not meet all closeout requirements within the time frames in the agreement.

(3) Ecology will close out the grant agreement when it determines the recipient has met the closeout requirements or when the agreement has been terminated (see WAC 173-566-360).

NEW SECTION**WAC 173-566-360 Termination of agreement. (1)**

Failure by the recipient to comply with a grant agreement may result in termination of the agreement.

(2) Ecology will attempt to contact the recipient regarding any issues with agreement compliance prior to terminating an agreement.

(3) Ecology's ability to make payments is contingent on availability of funding. In the event funding from state or other sources is withdrawn, reduced, or limited in any way after the effective date and prior to completion or expiration date of the agreement, ecology, at its sole discretion, may elect to:

(a) Terminate the agreement, in whole or part;

(b) Renegotiate the agreement, subject to new funding limitations or conditions; or

(c) Suspend performance of the agreement until ecology determines the funding insufficiency is resolved.

(4) Ecology will document the termination of an agreement.

NEW SECTION**WAC 173-566-370 Appeals process. (1)**

Grant applicants and recipients may formally appeal a written decision by ecology. A recipient cannot bring a lawsuit to superior court unless the aggrieved party adheres to the following procedures. The procedures are intended to encourage the informal resolution of disputes.

(a) The applicant may seek review of an initial funding decision within thirty days of the decision. The applicant or recipient makes the request for review in writing to the water resources program manager.

(b) The program manager will consider the appeal information and will issue a written decision within thirty days from the date the appeal is received.

(c) If the applicant or recipient is not satisfied with the program manager's decision, the applicant or recipient has thirty days to submit a written request to ecology's deputy director for a review of the decision.

(d) Ecology's director or deputy director will consider the appeal information and will issue a written decision within thirty days from the date the request is received. This decision will be ecology's final decision.

(2) If the applicant or recipient is not satisfied with ecology's final decision, the applicant or recipient may appeal to the Thurston County superior court, pursuant to RCW 34.05.570(4), judicial review; see <http://app.leg.wa.gov/rcw/default.aspx?cite=34.05.570>.

(3) Unless all parties to such appeal agree that a different time frame is appropriate, the parties shall attempt to bring the matter for a superior court determination within four months of the date in which the administrative record is filed with the court. This time frame is to ensure minimal disruptions to the funding program.

Purpose of the Proposal and Its Anticipated Effects, Including Any Changes in Existing Rules: WAC 220-410-040 Game management units (GMUs) boundary descriptions—Region four, the purpose of the proposal is to clarify boundary language as it pertains to GMU 485 Green River. The existing language can be somewhat complicated. The proposed changes take advantage of the well-marked boundaries of the Green River watershed which are identical to the GMU boundary.

WAC 220-410-060 Game management units (GMUs) boundary descriptions—Region six, the purpose of the proposal is to clarify boundary language as it pertains to the boundary shared by GMU 653 White River and GMU 485 Green River. The existing language can be somewhat complicated. The proposed changes take advantage of the well-marked boundaries of the Green River watershed which are identical to the GMU boundary.

WAC 220-412-070 Big game and wild turkey auction, raffle, and special incentive permits, proposed change (1) would allow holders of an Eastside Elk Auction Permit, Eastside Elk Raffle Permit, South-Central Washington Big Game Raffle Permit, or Eastern Washington Elk Incentive Permit to hunt elk in GMU 334 (Ellensburg). This GMU is currently excluded from the legal hunt area.

Proposed change (2) would redirect the holder of the "Rocky Mountain" bighorn sheep raffle permit to a portion of the Wenaha-Mountain View herd complex with a greater number of mature rams.

WAC 220-412-100 Landowner hunting permits, this proposal modifies hunt dates on properties enrolled in the Washington department of fish and wildlife's (WDFW) landowner hunting permit (LHP) program for the 2019 hunting seasons. These sites offer special hunting opportunities to the public through permits issued by WDFW, raffles, or selection by the landowner.

WAC 220-413-030 Importation and retention of dead nonresident wildlife, the proposal will ban the importation and retention of specific parts of dead nonresident wildlife that could contain chronic wasting disease from Tennessee. Specific circumstances are fully set forth in WAC 220-413-030 to include the state of Tennessee.

WAC 220-413-090 Field identification of wildlife—Evidence of sex—Definitions, the proposal will be changing subsection (1), related to the possession and transport of game birds by adding the fully feathered wing as an acceptable field identification requirement, with the exception of Canada and cackling geese harvested in Goose Management Area 2 Coast and Inland where the head must be left attached for subspecies determination.

WAC 220-413-180 Special closures and firearm restrictions, the proposed changes to the special closures and firearm restriction areas WAC are administrative changes that clarify firearm restrictions in portions of Grays Harbor

County and Pacific County only apply during modern firearm general deer and/or elk seasons. It also clarifies that Key Peninsula and Longbranch Peninsula are the same location in Pierce County.

WAC 220-413-200 Reducing the spread of hoof disease—Unlawful transport of elk hooves, this rule is an attempt to reduce the potential risk of inadvertently spreading the causative agents of treponeme associated hoof disease (TAHD) in elk.

WAC 220-413-200 was most recently updated in September 2018. Since that time, TAHD has been confirmed along the border of GMUs 638 and 618, in the upper Wynoochee Valley (GMU 636) just south of Olympic National Park, and in GMU 621, necessitating the addition of GMUs 618, 621, and 638. With the addition of these three GMUs, the rule would apply in all but fifteen of the sixty-one western Washington GMUs that are not islands in Puget Sound. The department believes it prudent to add all western Washington GMUs to the restriction.

New GMUs are being proposed in which transport of elk hooves from harvested elk would be restricted. These new GMUs include all 400, 500, and 600 GMUs. The rule does allow, under certain circumstances, the legal transport of elk hooves to facilitate research by the department and/or our collaborators.

WAC 220-414-070 Archery requirements, the purpose of the proposal is to eliminate the restriction that makes it unlawful to hunt big game animals with any arrow weighing less than six grains per pound of draw weight with a minimum arrow weight of three hundred grains. Such a rule change will ensure hunters are not unknowingly in violation of a restriction, while in no way negatively affecting the kill efficacy of modern archery equipment commonly in use today.

WAC 220-414-080 Hunting—Hunter orange clothing requirements, this proposal clarifies the hunter orange rule to address the overlap between turkey hunting and general season modern firearm deer and elk seasons. This proposed change will allow turkey hunters not to wear orange except during the general modern deer and elk seasons. This change will allow turkey hunters more flexibility and maintain safety during the general modern firearm seasons. This proposal adds turkey to the hunter orange rule and requires turkey hunters that are hunting during a modern deer or elk firearm season to wear florescent orange.

WAC 220-415-020 2018-2020 Deer general seasons and definitions, the purpose of this proposal is to retain general season deer hunting opportunity for 2019. In addition, the purpose of the proposal is to balance the hunting opportunity between user groups. The proposal also increases the opportunity when deer populations allow, and reduces the opportunity when declining deer numbers warrant a change.

WAC 220-415-030 2019 Deer special permits, the purpose of this proposal is to retain special permit deer hunting opportunity for 2019. In addition, the purpose of the proposal is to balance the hunting opportunity between user groups. The proposal also increases the opportunity when deer populations allow, and reduces the opportunity when declining deer numbers warrant a change.

WAC 220-415-040 Elk area descriptions, the purpose of this proposal is to allow the department to focus elk hunting pressure on a smaller scale than the GMU. Elk areas help expand hunting opportunity that would normally not be available. Elk areas also help accommodate wildlife conflict mitigation using hunting as a tool. The purpose of the proposal is to adjust the boundaries of Elk Area 6054, such that harvest is focused in areas where conflicts are most frequent.

WAC 220-415-050 2018-2020 Elk general seasons and definitions, the purpose of the proposal and its anticipated effects, including any changes in existing rules: The elk seasons for fall of 2019 represent the second year of the 2018-2020 three-year hunting season package. The purpose of the proposal is to increase opportunities in some areas to assist with efforts to mitigate elk damage. The proposal also corrects typographical errors associated with season dates for the western Washington and Elk Area 3722 general elk modern firearm seasons.

WAC 220-415-060 2019 Elk special permits, the purpose of this proposal is to retain elk special permit hunting opportunity for 2019. The purpose is also to balance the elk hunting opportunity between user groups. The proposal also increases elk hunting opportunity when elk populations allow, and reduces elk hunting opportunity when declining elk numbers warrant a change.

WAC 220-415-070 2019 Moose seasons, permit quotas, and areas, the purpose of this proposal is to adjust moose permit limits to reflect population changes and recent harvest.

WAC 220-415-120 2019 Bighorn sheep season, the purpose of this proposal is to adjust bighorn sheep hunt permit limits to reflect population changes and recent harvest.

WAC 220-415-130 2019 Mountain goat seasons and permit quotas, the purpose of this proposal is to adjust mountain goat hunt permit limits to reflect population changes and recent harvest.

WAC 220-416-060 2019-2020 Migratory waterfowl seasons and regulations, the proposal amends WAC 220-416-060 2018-19 Migratory waterfowl seasons and regulations to specify legal season dates, bag limits for the 2019-20 season.

Changes include:

- Adjusting season dates relative to 2019-2020 calendar dates.
- Lowering Northern Pintail bag-limit to 1 pintail per day and associated possession limits per the United States Fish and Wildlife Service (USFWS) Northern Pintail Harvest Strategy.
- Proposed shift of 12-days for white goose hunting from the beginning of the season to February 22 - March 4, 2020, in Goose Management Area 4.
- Proposed addition of dates to brant season in Pacific County, contingent upon the most recent three-year average results per the Pacific Brant Population Management Plan harvest strategy.

WAC 220-416-110 Use of game birds for training dogs, field trials—Marking requirements, the proposed changes clarify that only one method is required for marking game birds and adds an additional method option, which is nasal scarring caused by an antipecking device. In addition, the

proposal adjusts the ordering of existing options for marking nonwaterfowl game birds.

WAC 220-417-030 Wild animal trapping, the proposed changes clarify that restraining traps (live capture traps) must be checked every twenty-four hours, whether or not an animal has been captured.

WAC 220-430-010 Game farm license provisions, the proposed changes clarify that a game farm license is required to sell species listed in subsection (2) (game birds and waterfowl). Also, the proposed changes clarify that a current, valid license is required to continue to possess, propagate, sell and transfer wildlife that was lawfully possessed on January 1, 1992. Lastly, the proposed changes add conditions for revocation or denial of a game farm's license and grounds for prosecution under existing RCW.

WAC 220-450-010 Criteria for planting aquatic plants and releasing wildlife, the proposed changes clarify that game birds released for dog training and hunting pursuant to WAC 220-416-110 do not need to be purchased. Instead, they simply need to be acquired from certain facilities. These facilities include a department facility, a state- or federally-licensed game farm facility that has been inspected by a certified veterinarian within the past twelve months, or a facility with current National Poultry Improvement Plan certification.

Reasons Supporting Proposal: WAC 220-410-040 and 220-410-060, the proposed amendments will make the boundaries more discernable for hunters. The proposed changes will also make enforcement of hunting season rules and trespass rules more straightforward.

WAC 220-412-070, (1) GMU 334 has historically been excluded from the legal hunt area for auction, raffle, and special incentive permits, in addition to Quality Elk and Bull Elk special permits because it primarily consists of private residential and agricultural properties within and/or immediately adjacent to the city limits of Ellensburg, which makes it difficult for most hunters to find an area within the GMU where they have permission to hunt. In addition, the potential for human-elk conflicts within this GMU is high and the department limits elk numbers by providing numerous opportunities to harvest spike bull (or true spike) and antlerless elk during general seasons. However, with no opportunities to harvest branch-antlered bulls, the number of mature bulls has steadily increased and they are frequently the source of damage complaints from agricultural producers. Including opportunities to harvest branch-antlered bulls in GMU 334 would provide increased opportunity to hunters, reduce the number of branch-antlered bulls, and reduce the number of human-elk conflicts that occur in association with branch-antlered bulls.

(2) These bighorn herds are closely managed, so biologists typically have good data on the number and distribution of the large-sized rams sought by auction and raffle holders. WDFW also comanages these herds with Oregon and the Nez Perce Tribes, so fine-scale distribution of hunters is helpful.

WAC 220-412-100, several years ago, the fish and wildlife commission developed a policy to expand the private lands available to the general public for hunting. One of the programs that was authorized is the landowner hunting permit program. This program encourages landowners to pro-

vide opportunity to the general hunter in exchange for customized hunting seasons and the ability to generate funding to offset the cost of providing public access.

WAC 220-413-030, because Tennessee has identified chronic wasting disease in wild, free-ranging deer, the department seeks to mitigate the risk to public health and safety by adding the state of Tennessee to WAC 220-413-030.

WAC 220-413-090, the proposed amendment to WAC 220-416-090 [220-413-090], brings field identification of game birds in line with federal possession and transport identification requirements. Identification of migratory waterfowl by wing is a typical training component for federal and state enforcement and should be allowed as an appropriate method of identification for game bird hunters in Washington. The exception of Canada and cackling geese harvested in Goose Management Area 2 Coast and Inland where the head must be left attached for subspecies determination must be required due to the use of a bill measurement criteria set in WAC 220-413-060 2019-2020 Migratory waterfowl seasons and regulations, that differentiates the dusky Canada goose subspecies which is closed to harvest.

WAC 220-413-180, the added language was needed to clarify that modern firearms could be used within these areas to mitigate damage issues during established permit and/or damage hunts, which increases the department's ability to accommodate both firearm restriction needs and wildlife conflict mitigation. The Key Peninsula is also known to some as Longbranch Peninsula; the proposed change clarifies they are the same location.

WAC 220-413-200, this proposal adds GMUs where transport of elk hooves will be restricted in order to reduce the potential risk of the disease spreading.

WAC 220-414-070, Washington is the only state that has a minimum arrow weight to draw weight ratio and only one of five that have a similar regulation of minimum overall weight of three hundred grains. With the advent of carbon arrow technology, which dominates today's market, it is likely a vast majority of archery hunters are unknowingly in violation of the arrow weight to draw weight ratio restriction. In addition, it is highly unlikely any archer would shoot an arrow that weighed less than 300 grains. Lastly, we have no additional information that indicates either of these restrictions increases kill efficacy.

WAC 220-414-080, this proposal will increase turkey hunter success and maintain safety. Turkey seasons in the past did not overlap with modern deer or elk firearm season. New proposals to control growing turkey populations make it necessary to overlap those seasons. Last year we modified the hunter orange rule to include turkey. We have since found that the rule as written was too broad and turkey hunters had to wear orange throughout the fall season. This recommended rule adjustment provides more flexibility for turkey hunters, while maintaining the hunter orange requirement during the deer and elk modern firearm seasons.

WAC 220-415-020, this proposal provides for recreational deer hunting opportunity and protects deer from overharvest. The proposal would maintain sustainable general deer hunting season opportunities for 2019. The proposal

helps address deer agricultural damage problems and provides for deer population control when needed.

WAC 220-415-030, this proposal provides for recreational deer hunting opportunity and protects deer from overharvest. The proposal would also maintain sustainable deer special permit hunting season opportunities for 2019. The proposal helps address deer agricultural damage problems and provides for deer population control when needed.

WAC 220-415-040, this proposal allows the department to use hunting as a management tool and expands elk hunting opportunity.

WAC 220-415-050, the proposal provides for recreational elk hunting opportunity and helps address elk agricultural damage problems and provides for elk population control when needed.

WAC 220-415-060, this proposal provides for recreational elk hunting opportunity and protects elk from overharvest. The proposal would maintain sustainable elk special permit hunting opportunity for 2019. The proposal helps address elk agricultural damage problems and provides for elk population control when needed.

WAC 220-415-070, 220-415-120, and 220-415-130, population abundance estimates and document of recent past harvest.

WAC 220-416-060, waterfowl seasons and regulations are developed based on cooperative management programs among states of the Pacific Flyway and USFWS, considering population status and other biological parameters. The rule establishes waterfowl seasons and regulations to provide recreational opportunity, control waterfowl damage, and conserve the waterfowl resources of Washington.

WAC 220-416-110, the proposal provides clarity so that the WAC is not misinterpreted to mean that game birds must be marked by all methods.

The use of antipecking devices is standard among game farms in the western United States, particularly for pheasants which can be aggressive in captivity. By allowing nasal scarring caused by these devices to meet the marking requirements, the department is reducing the burden on game farmers to apply an additional mark to game birds. This proposed change will also improve compliance in marking requirements.

The proposal to adjust the order of the listed marking requirements is intended to emphasize less invasive methods.

WAC 220-417-030 Wild animal trapping.

The current WAC states that an animal captured in a restraining trap must be removed within twenty-four hours but doesn't state that traps must be checked every twenty-four hours. The proposed change clarifies that the traps must be checked every twenty-four hours and captured animals may not be restrained for more than twenty-four hours.

WAC 220-430-010, the proposed changes support game farm license holders by emphasizing that certain species cannot be sold without a game farm license. This is intended to reduce confusion and to ensure that unlicensed individuals are not selling these species.

In addition, the proposed changes provide clarity regarding license requirements to game farm license holders who maintain species that were lawfully possessed prior to January 1, 1992.

The proposed changes also provide the department with the necessary tools to ensure that game farm license holders are compliant with the game farm license provisions.

WAC 220-450-010, the proposed changes simplify requirements for obtaining game birds for dog training and hunting pursuant to WAC 220-416-110. The changes also seek to ensure that game birds are acquired from facilities that undergo appropriate inspections and follow appropriate guidelines to reduce the risk of disease transmission.

QUALIFICATIONS FOR PARTICIPATION AND REQUIREMENTS:

(32) Permittees shall contact the appropriate regional office of the department of fish and wildlife when entering the designated hunt area or entering the region to hunt outside the general season.

(33) The permittee may be accompanied by others; however, only the permittee is allowed to carry a legal weapon or harvest an animal.

(34) Any attempt by members of the permittee's party to herd or drive wildlife is prohibited.

(35) If requested by the department, the permittee is required to direct department officials to the site of the kill.

(36) The permit is valid during the hunting season dates for the year issued.

(37) The permittee will present the head and carcass of the bighorn sheep killed to any department office within ten days of date of kill.

(38) The permittee must abide by all local, state, and federal regulations including firearm restriction areas and area closures.

(39) Hunters awarded the special incentive permit will be required to send the appropriate license fee to the department of fish and wildlife headquarters in Olympia. The department will issue the license and transport tag and send it to the special incentive permit winner.

AMENDATORY SECTION (Amending WSR 18-11-061, filed 5/11/18, effective 6/11/18)

WAC 220-413-030 Importation and retention of dead nonresident wildlife. (1) It is unlawful:

(a) To import or possess dead wildlife, taken in another state or country, into Washington unless such wildlife was acquired lawfully. Proof of legal acquisition must be retained during the period of retention of the carcass or edible parts.

(b) For a person who imports a dead bighorn sheep, mountain goat, cougar or bear to fail to report such importation to the department in writing within ten days of the importation. The report must contain the name and address of the importer, the location where the dead wildlife is being stored, and general information describing where and how the wildlife was obtained.

(c) To import or possess deer, elk, or moose, or parts thereof, harvested in Pennsylvania, Texas, Missouri, Colorado, Wyoming, Utah, New Mexico, Wisconsin, Illinois, South Dakota, Nebraska, Kansas, New York, West Virginia, Virginia, North Dakota, Alberta, Maryland, Minnesota, Montana, Mississippi, Iowa, Arkansas, Michigan, ~~((and))~~ Saskatchewan, and Tennessee with the following exceptions:

(i) Meat that has been deboned in the state or province where it was harvested and is imported as boned-out meat;

(ii) Skulls and antlers, antlers attached to the skull plate, or upper canine teeth (buglers, whistlers, ivories) from which all soft tissue has been removed;

(iii) Hides or capes without heads attached;

(iv) Tissue imported for use by a diagnostic or research laboratory; and

(v) Finished taxidermy mounts.

(2) Violation of subsection (1) of this section is punishable under RCW 77.15.290 Unlawful transportation of fish or wildlife—Penalty.

(3) It is unlawful for an importer or receiver of deer or elk to fail to notify the department within twenty-four hours if a state or province alerts the importer or receiver that a harvested animal has tested positive for chronic wasting disease. Violation of this subsection is an infraction punishable under RCW 77.15.160 Infractions.

AMENDATORY SECTION (Amending WSR 17-05-112, filed 2/15/17, effective 3/18/17)

WAC 220-413-090 Field identification of wildlife—Evidence of sex—Definitions. (1) It is unlawful to possess or transport game birds unless ~~((the feathered heads are))~~ a feathered wing or head is left attached to ((the)) each carcass, except Canada and cackling geese harvested in Goose Management Area 2 Coast and Inland where the head must be left attached for subspecies determination, and falconry-caught birds, until the carcass is processed and/or stored for consumption.

(2) It is unlawful to possess or transport big game animals unless evidence of the sex of the animal remains naturally attached to the carcass until the carcass is processed and/or stored for consumption.

(a) Evidence of sex means the head with antlers or horns attached or penis or testes of male big game animals or the head or udder of female big game animals any of which must be naturally attached to at least one quarter of the carcass or to the largest portion of meat.

(b) For the purpose of this rule, "stored for consumption" means at the final point of storage prior to consumption of the meat.

(3) It is unlawful to possess or transport goat, sheep, moose, deer or elk taken in hunting areas which have horn or antler restrictions unless the head or skull plate, with both horns or both antlers naturally attached, accompanies the carcass.

(4) The possession of a taxidermist's receipt which includes the taxidermist's name, address, and telephone number, the hunter's name, address, telephone number, license, and tag number, the species and sex of the game bird or big game animal taken, as well as antler points or horn size and the date and GMU location or special deer/elk permit area where taken, shall be deemed to constitute compliance with this section.

For the purpose of this rule "accompanies the carcass" means to remain with the carcass until it has reached the point of processing or storage.

(5) It is lawful for persons who have complied with the department of fish and wildlife's chronic wasting disease sampling program to possess deer and elk without proof of sex under the following provisions:

(a) The head of the deer or elk must have been surrendered to an authorized department collection site.

(b) The hunter is in possession of an official department disease testing program identification card, completely filled out and signed and dated by a department employee or authorized agent.

(c) The carcass of the deer or elk is transported directly from where the head has been surrendered to the point of processing or storage.

Failure to comply with (a) through (c) of this subsection constitutes unlawful possession of big game and is punishable under RCW 77.15.410.

WAC 220-413-180 Special closures and firearm restriction areas. (1) **RESTRICTED HUNTING AREAS.**

It is unlawful to hunt in the following restricted hunting areas unless otherwise provided:

(a) Parker Lake (GMU 117, Pend Oreille County): All lands south of Ruby Creek Road (USFS Road 2489), north of Tacoma Creek Road (USFS Road 2389), and west of Bonne-

ville Power Administration power lines are designated as "CLOSED AREA" to hunting wild animals and wild birds year-round except for special hunts adopted by the fish and wildlife commission. The Parker Lake closure provides a protected area for the U.S. Air Force Military Survival Training Program.

(b) Columbia River: The Columbia River, all islands except privately owned, in the river, the Benton County shoreline below the high water mark, Central Hanford Department of Energy property, and any peninsula originating on the Benton County shoreline, between Vernita Bridge on Highway 24 downstream to the Richland city limits are designated as a "CLOSED AREA" to hunting wild animals and wild birds except waterfowl hunting is open below the high water mark between the old Hanford townsite power line crossing (wooden towers) in Section 24, T 13 N, R 27 E, and the Richland city limits.

(c) Green River (GMU 485): Except for special permit hunters, who may also take a black bear and/or cougar with the appropriate license/tag options, all lands within GMU 485 are designated as a "CLOSED AREA" to hunting big game year-round. During the general westside elk season and general and late deer seasons, all lands within GMU 485 year-round are also designated as a "CLOSED AREA" to hunting all wild animals, including wild birds, year-round. The city of Tacoma enforces trespass within GMU 485 year-round on lands owned or controlled by the city.

(d) McNeil Island (part of GMU 652): Closed to hunting all wild animals, including wild birds, year-round.

(e) Loo-wit (GMU 522): Closed to hunting and trapping, except for elk and mountain goat hunting by special permit holders during established seasons and in designated areas.

(2) A violation of subsection (1) of this section is punishable under RCW 77.15.400, 77.15.410, or 77.15.430, depending on the species hunted.

(3) CLOSED BIG GAME HUNTING AREAS.

It is unlawful to hunt big game in the following closed areas, unless otherwise specified:

(a) Clark, Cowlitz, Pacific, and Wahkiakum counties: Closed to hunting for Columbian whitetail deer.

(b) Cathlamet: Except for special permits issued by the department for nonendangered deer and elk, this area is closed to all deer and elk hunting to protect the Columbian whitetail deer. This area's boundaries are described as:

Beginning in the town of Skamokawa; then east along SR 4 to Risk Road; then south and east along Risk Road to Foster Road; then south along the Foster Road to the Elochoman River; then upstream along the Elochoman River to Elochoman Valley Road (old SR 407); then west along the Elochoman Valley Road to SR 4; then east along SR 4 to SR 409; then south along SR 409 to the Cathlamet Channel of the Columbia River; then east along the north shore of the Cathlamet Channel to Cape Horn; then south in the Columbia River to the state line; then west along the state line to a point directly south of the mouth of Skamokawa Creek; then north on Skamokawa Creek to SR 4 and the point of beginning.

(c) Walla Walla Mill Creek Watershed (GMU 157): All lands in the Mill Creek Watershed are designated as a "CLOSED AREA" to hunting all wild animals, including wild birds. The only exception is for deer or elk hunting by holders

of GMU-157 special deer or elk permits during the established open season. These permit holders must have a U.S. Forest Service permit to enter the hunt area, and the area is closed to motorized vehicles. No entry into the Mill Creek Watershed is allowed at other times.

(d) Westport: Closed to hunting all big game animals on the part of Westport Peninsula lying north of State Highway 105 from the Elk River Bridge west end and the Schafer Island Road to the ocean beach.

(e) Cottonwood and Howard islands (GMU 564): Closed to all deer hunting.

(4) A violation of subsection (3) of this section is a gross misdemeanor or a class C felony punishable under RCW 77.15.410, depending on the circumstances of the violation.

(5) FIREARM RESTRICTION AREAS.

(a) It is unlawful to hunt wildlife in the following firearm restriction areas with centerfire or rimfire rifles, or to fail to comply with additional firearm restrictions, except as established below:

(d) Modern firearm tag holders may hunt during established modern firearm seasons with bows and arrows; crossbows; muzzleloaders; revolver-type handguns; semiautomatic handguns of .40 (10 mm) caliber or larger; or shotguns, so long as the equipment and ammunition complies with department rules.

(6) A violation of subsection (5) of this section is punishable under RCW 77.15.400, 77.15.410, or 77.15.430, depending on the species hunted.

WAC 220-413-200 Reducing the spread of hoof disease—Unlawful transport of elk hooves. (1) It is unlawful to transport the hooves of harvested elk beyond the site where the animal was killed in all 400, 500, and 600 series Game Management Units (~~((407, 418, 437, 454, 501 through 564, 568, 572, 574, 578, 633, 636 and 642 through 699))~~), except when specifically authorized by the department or when acting as an agent of the department in the limited capacity of cooperating with research or management actions regarding hoof disease as directed by the department.

(2) Violation of this section is an infraction under RCW 77.15.160 Infractions.

AMENDATORY SECTION (Amending WSR 17-05-112, filed 2/15/17, effective 3/18/17)

WAC 220-414-070 Archery requirements. (1) The following provisions apply to all archery hunting seasons:

(a) It is unlawful for any person to carry or have in his possession any firearm while archery hunting in the field during an archery season specified for that area, except for modern handguns carried for personal protection. Modern handguns cannot be used to hunt big game or dispatch wounded big game during an archery big game hunting season.

(b) It is unlawful to have any electrical equipment or electric device(s), except for illuminated nocks, attached to the bow or arrow while hunting.

(c) It is unlawful to discharge a bow from a vehicle or from, across, or along the maintained portion of a public highway.

(d) It is unlawful to use any device secured to or supported by the bow for the purpose of maintaining the bow at full draw or in a firing position.

(e) It is unlawful to hunt big game animals with any arrow or bolt that does not have a sharp broadhead, or with a broadhead blade or blades that are less than seven-eighths of an inch wide.

(f) It is unlawful to hunt wildlife with any bow equipped with a scope.

(2) The following provisions apply to long bow, recurve bow and compound bow archery equipment:

(a) It is unlawful for any person to hunt big game animals with a bow that does not produce a minimum of 40 pounds of pull measured at twenty-eight inches or at full draw.

(b) It is unlawful to hunt big game animals with any arrow measuring less than 20 inches in length ~~((or weighing less than 6 grains per pound of draw weight with a minimum arrow weight of 300 grains))~~.

(3) A violation of this section is punishable under RCW 77.15.400, 77.15.410, or 77.15.430, depending on the species hunted.

WAC 220-414-080 Hunting—Hunter orange clothing requirements. ~~(5) It is unlawful to hunt bear, cougar, bobcat, raccoon, fox, coyote, rabbit, forest grouse, turkey or hare during those times and in those places open to the taking of deer or elk during a modern firearm season, unless the hunter is wearing fluorescent hunter orange clothing.~~

~~(6) Persons who are hunting upland game birds during an upland game bird season with a muzzleloading firearm, bow and arrow or falconry are not required to wear fluorescent hunter orange clothing.~~

~~(7)) Wearing fluorescent hunter orange clothing means: A minimum of 400 square inches of fluorescent hunter orange exterior clothing, worn above the waist and visible from all sides.~~

~~((8)) (5) A violation of this section is an infraction, punishable under RCW 77.15.160.~~

AMENDATORY SECTION (Amending WSR 18-11-061, filed 5/11/18, effective 6/11/18)

WAC 220-415-020 2018-2020 Deer general seasons and definitions. It is unlawful to fail to comply with the bag, possession, and season limits described below. Violations of this section are punishable under RCW 77.15.410 Unlawful hunting of big game—Penalty.

Bag Limit: One (1) deer per hunter during the license year except where otherwise permitted by department rule.

Hunting Method: Hunters must select one of the hunting methods: Modern firearm, archery, or muzzleloader.

Any Buck Deer Seasons: Open only to the taking of deer with visible antlers (buck fawns illegal).

Antler Point: To qualify as an antler point, the point must be at least one inch long, measured on the longest side.

Antler Restrictions: APPLIES TO ALL HUNTERS DURING ANY GENERAL SEASON AND DESIGNATED SPECIAL PERMIT SEASONS. Buck deer taken in antler restricted game management units (GMUs) must meet minimum antler point requirements.

Minimum antler point requirements are antler points on one side only. Eye guards are antler points when they are at least one inch long.

3-point Minimum GMUs: All mule deer in 100, 200, and 300 series GMUs; white-tailed deer in GMUs 127, 130, 133, 136, 139, 142, 145, 149, 154, 162, 163, 166, 169, 172, 175, 178, 181, 186, and black-tailed deer in GMU 578.

Permit-only Units: The following GMUs require a special permit to hunt deer: 157 (Mill Creek Watershed), 290 (Desert), 329 (Quilomene), 371 (Alkali), and 485 (Green River).

GMUs Closed to Deer Hunting: 490 (Cedar River) and 522 (Loo-wit).

Types of deer that a person may legally hunt in Washington:

Black-tailed Deer: Any member of black-tailed/mule deer (species *Odocoileus hemionus*) found west of a line drawn from the Canadian border south on the Pacific Crest Trail and along the Yakama Indian Reservation boundary in Yakima County to the Klickitat River; south down Klickitat River to the Columbia River.

Mule Deer: Any member of black-tailed/mule deer (species *Odocoileus hemionus*) found east of a line drawn from the Canadian border south on the Pacific Crest Trail and along the Yakama Indian Reservation boundary in Yakima County to the Klickitat River; south down Klickitat River to the Columbia River.

White-tailed Deer: Any white-tailed deer (member of the species *Odocoileus virginianus*), except the Columbian whitetail deer (species *Odocoileus virginianus leucurus*).

MODERN FIREARM DEER SEASONS

License Required: A valid big game hunting license, which includes a deer species option.

Tag Required: A valid modern firearm deer tag for the area hunted.

Hunting Method: Modern firearm deer tag hunters may use rifle, handgun, shotgun, bow, crossbow, or muzzleloader, but only during modern firearm seasons.

AMENDATORY SECTION (Amending WSR 18-11-061, filed 5/11/18, effective 6/11/18)

WAC 220-415-030 ((2018)) 2019 Deer special permits. It is unlawful to fail to comply with the bag, possession, and season limits described below. A violation of this section is punishable under RCW 77.15.410 Unlawful hunting of big game—Penalty.

Deer Special Permit Hunting Seasons (Open to Permit Holders Only)

Hunters must purchase a deer hunting license prior to purchasing a permit application. Hunters may only apply for permits consistent with the tag required for the hunt choice; however, Multiple Season Permit holders may apply for archery, muzzleloader, or modern firearm permit hunts. Hunters drawn for a special permit hunt must comply with weapon restrictions, dates, and other conditions listed for the hunt. Hunters drawn for a special permit designated "**Any tag**" under the "**Weapon/Tag**" restriction must use equipment consistent with the requirements of their transport tag and license.

Hunter Education Instructor Incentive Permits

- Special deer permits will be allocated through a random drawing to those hunter education instructors who qualify.
- Permit hunters must use archery equipment during archery seasons, muzzleloader equipment or archery equipment during muzzleloader seasons, and any legal weapon during modern firearm seasons. Hunter orange is required during modern firearm seasons.
- Except for online class incentive permits and chief instructor incentive permits, qualifying hunter education instructors must be certified and have been in active status for a minimum of three consecutive years, inclusive of the year prior to the permit drawing.
- Permittees may purchase a second license for use with the permit hunt only.

Qualified hunter education instructors may only receive one incentive permit each year.

The following areas are defined as elk areas:

Elk Area No. 1008 West Wenaha (Columbia County): That part of GMU 169 west of USFS trail 3112 from Tepee Camp (east fork of Butte Creek) to Butte Creek, and west of Butte Creek to the Washington-Oregon state line.

Elk Area No. 1009 East Wenaha (Columbia, Garfield, Asotin counties): That portion of GMU 169 east of USFS trail 3112 from Tepee Camp (east fork Butte Creek) to Butte

Creek, and east of Butte Creek to the Washington-Oregon state line.

Elk Area No. 1010 (Columbia County): GMU 162 excluding National Forest land and the Rainwater Wildlife Area.

Elk Area No. 1011 (Columbia County): That part of GMU 162 east of the North Touchet Road, excluding National Forest land.

Elk Area No. 1012 (Columbia County): That part of GMU 162 west of the North Touchet Road, excluding National Forest land and the Rainwater Wildlife Area.

Elk Area No. 1013 (Asotin County): GMU 172, excluding National Forest lands and the 4-O Ranch Wildlife Area.

AMENDATORY SECTION (Amending WSR 18-11-061, filed 5/11/18, effective 6/11/18)

WAC 220-415-050 2018-2020 Elk general seasons and definitions. It is unlawful to fail to comply with bag, possession, and season limits described below. A violation of this section is punishable under RCW 77.15.410 Unlawful hunting of big game—Penalty.

Bag Limit: One (1) elk per hunter during the license year, except where otherwise permitted by department rule. Any combination of seasons, tags, and permits set by the department will not exceed a maximum of two (2) elk per hunter during the license year.

Hunting Method: Elk hunters must select only one of the hunting methods: Modern firearm, archery, or muzzleloader.

Elk Tag Areas: Elk hunters must choose either Eastern or Western Washington to hunt in and buy the appropriate tag for that area.

Any Bull Elk Seasons: Open only to the taking of elk with visible antlers; bull calves are illegal.

Antler Point: To qualify as an antler point, the point must be at least one inch long, measured on the longest side.

Branch: A branch is defined as any projection off the main antler beam that is at least one inch long, measured on the longest side, and longer than it is wide.

Spike Bull Antler Restrictions: Bull elk taken in spike-only game management units (GMUs) must have at least one antler with no branches originating more than 4 inches above where the antler attaches to the skull.

Spike-only GMUs: 145-154, 162-186, 249, and 336-368.

True Spike - Bull Antler Restrictions: Neither antler of bull elk taken in GMUs 251, and 328-335 can have branching originating more than 4 inches above where the antlers attach

to the skull. Under the true-spike restriction, taking an elk that has two points on one side or antler points within one inch of the definitions regarding length of point, or point of origination, is an infraction under RCW 77.15.160. All other types of violations of the true-spike restriction are subject to current penalties and assessments under RCW 77.15.410 and 77.15.420.

True-spike GMUs: 251, 328-335.

3-point Antler Restrictions: Legal bull elk must have at least 3 antler points on one side. Eye guards are antler points when they are at least one inch long. Antler restrictions apply to all hunters during any open season.

3-point GMUs: All of Western Washington, except for GMUs 448, 454, 564, 652 for archers, 666, 684, and Elk Area 4941.

Permit-only Units: The following GMUs are closed to elk hunting during general elk seasons: 157, 371, 418, 485, 522, 556, 621, 636, and 653.

GMUs Closed to Elk Hunting: 437 (except for Elk Area 4941) and 490.

Areas with Special Restrictions: There are modern firearm restrictions in GMU 334 and portions of GMU 660. GMU 554 is open only for early archery and muzzleloader seasons. Elk Area 6064 in GMU 638 (Quinalt) is open to master hunters only.

AMENDATORY SECTION (Amending WSR 18-11-061, filed 5/11/18, effective 6/11/18)

WAC 220-415-060 ((2018)) 2019 Elk special permits. It is unlawful to fail to comply with the bag, possession, and season limits described below. A violation of this section is punishable under RCW 77.15.410 Unlawful hunting of big game—Penalty.

Special Elk Permit Hunting Seasons (Open to Permit Holders Only)

Hunters must purchase an elk hunting license prior to purchasing a permit application. Hunters may only apply for per-

mits consistent with the tag required for the hunt choice; however, Multiple Season Permit holders may apply for Eastern or Western Washington archery, muzzleloader, or modern firearm permit hunts. Applicants must have purchased the proper tag for these hunts. The elk tag prefixes required to apply for each hunt are shown in the following table. Hunters drawn for a special permit hunt must comply with weapon restrictions, dates, and other conditions listed for the hunt. Hunters drawn for a special permit designated "**Any tag**" under the "**Weapon/Tag**" restriction must use equipment consistent with the requirements of their transport tag and license.

AMENDATORY SECTION (Amending WSR 18-11-061, filed 5/11/18, effective 6/11/18)

WAC 220-415-070 ((2018)) 2019 Moose seasons, permit quotas, and areas. (1) It is unlawful to fail to comply with the provisions of this section. A violation of this section is punishable under RCW 77.15.410, Unlawful hunting of big game—Penalty.

(2) Moose Permit Hunts

(a) Who May Apply:

(i) **Any antlered bull moose category:** An individual may only harvest one moose under the "any antlered bull moose" or "any moose" category during his or her lifetime. Applications will not be accepted from hunters having previously harvested a moose in the "any moose" or "any antlered bull moose" category.

(ii) **Antlerless only, youth antlerless, over-65 antlerless, disabled-antlerless, ((master-hunter any moose,)) hunter-education antlerless, auction moose, raffle moose:** Anyone may apply.

(b) **Bag Limit:** One moose.

(c) **Weapon Restrictions:** Permit holders may use any legal weapon.

(d) **Submitting moose teeth:** Successful moose hunters must submit an incisor tooth from the lower jaw, either in person at a WDFW office, or via the postage-paid envelope supplied, no later than sixty days after harvest.

(e) **Any antlered bull moose seasons:** Open only to the taking of moose with visible antlers (bull calves illegal).

WAC 220-415-120 ((2018)) 2019 Bighorn sheep seasons and permit quotas. (1) It is unlawful to fail to comply with the provisions of this section. A violation of species, sex, size, number, area, season, or eligibility requirements is punishable under RCW 77.15.410, Unlawful hunting of big game—Penalty.

(2) **Bighorn Sheep Permit Hunts**

(a) **Who May Apply:** Anyone may apply, EXCEPT those who previously harvested a bighorn sheep in Washington state. An individual may only harvest one bighorn ram during his or her lifetime. However, this restriction is waived for hunters who have previously harvested a bighorn sheep under a ewe-only, juvenile ram, raffle, or auction permit, as well as for applications for a ewe-only, juvenile ram, raffle, or auction permit.

(b) **Bag Limit:** One bighorn ram, except in designated adult ewe hunts the limit is one bighorn adult ewe.

WAC 220-415-130 ((2018)) 2019 Mountain goat seasons and permit quotas. (1) Hunters must comply with the provisions of this section. A violation of species, sex, size, number, area, season, or eligibility requirements is punishable under RCW 77.15.410, Unlawful hunting of big game—Penalty.

(2) Mountain Goat Permit Hunts

(a) **Who May Apply:** Anyone may apply, except those who harvested a mountain goat in Washington state after 1998. Except for auction and raffle permitted hunts, an indi-

vidual may only harvest one mountain goat during his or her lifetime.

(b) **Bag Limit:** One (1) adult goat of either sex with horns 4 inches or longer.

(c) It is unlawful for a person who kills a mountain goat in Washington to fail, within ten days after acquisition, to personally present the horns attached to the head for inspection at a department office or location designated by a departmental representative. After inspection, the head/horns of a mountain goat lawfully killed in Washington may be kept for personal use. A violation of this subsection is punishable under RCW 77.15.280 (1)(b).

(d) Applicants drawn for a permit may only purchase their license after successfully completing the WDFW mountain goat gender identification training (online or at a participating WDFW office).

A person who prevents department personnel from collecting samples of tissue or other bodily parts is subject to prosecution under RCW 77.15.360 Unlawful interfering in department operations—Penalty. If a hunter takes a dusky Canada goose or does not comply with requirements listed above regarding WDFW collection of subspecies information, authorization will be invalidated by the department and the hunter will not be able to hunt geese in Goose Management Area 2 Coast and Inland for the remainder of the season. It is unlawful to fail to comply with all provisions listed above for Goose Management Area 2 Coast and Inland. Taking one dusky Canada goose is punishable as an infraction under RCW 77.15.160 (5)(b). WAC 220-416-110 Use of game birds for training dogs, field trials—Marking requirements. It is unlawful to possess game birds acquired from a licensed game farmer for the purpose of training dogs, field trials, or hunting unless the birds are marked in the following manner:

(1) Captive reared waterfowl shall be physically marked in at least one of the following manners:

(a) ~~((Removal of the hind toe from the right foot.))~~ Band-
ing of one metatarsus with a seamless metal band; or

(b) Pinioning of a wing: Provided(~~(s)~~) that this method shall be the removal of the metacarpal bones of one wing or a portion of the metacarpal bones which renders the bird permanently incapable of flight(~~(s)~~); or

(c) (~~(Banding of one metatarsus with a seamless metal band.)~~) Removal of the hind toe from the right foot; or

(d) Tattooing of a readily discernible number or letter or combination thereof on the web of one foot.

(2) All other game birds shall be physically marked (~~(by)~~) in at least one of the following manners:

(a) Banding of one metatarsus with a band purchased from the department; or

(b) Nasal scarring: Provided that this scarring shall be a permanent, readily discernible deformity caused by an anti-pecking device; or

(c) Removal of the first joint of the outside toe on the right foot prior to four weeks of age (~~(or marked by a band purchased from the department)~~).

AMENDATORY SECTION (Amending WSR 17-05-112, filed 2/15/17, effective 3/18/17)

WAC 220-417-030 Wild animal trapping. (1) The trapping season authorizes the taking of furbearing animals for their hides and pelts only. Furbearers may not be taken from the wild and held alive for sale or personal use without a special permit from the director.

(2) Any wildlife trapped for which the season is not open shall be released unharmed. Any wildlife that cannot be released unharmed must be left in the trap, and the department of fish and wildlife must be notified immediately.

(3) Lawfully trapped wild animals must be lethally dispatched or immediately released. A firearm may be used to dispatch trapped animals.

(4) It is unlawful to trap for wild animals:

(a) With body-gripping traps without a special permit from the director.

(b) Unless kill traps are checked and animals removed within seventy-two hours.

(c) Unless (~~(animals captured in)~~) restraining traps (any nonkilling set) are (~~(removed within)~~) checked every twenty-four hours and captured animals are restrained in a trap for no more than twenty-four hours (~~(of capture)~~).

(d) Using game birds, game fish or game animals for bait, except nonedible parts of game birds, game fish or game animals may be used as bait.

For purposes of this section, the meat of animals classified as furbearing animals in WAC 220-400-020 is not considered edible.

(e) Within thirty feet of any exposed meat bait or nonedible game parts which are visible to flying raptors.

(5) Game bird feathers may be used as an attractor.

AMENDATORY SECTION (Amending WSR 17-05-112, filed 2/15/17, effective 3/18/17)

WAC 220-430-010 Game farm license provisions. It is unlawful to operate a game farm without a current, valid Washington state game farm license. It is unlawful to sell those species listed in subsection (2) of this section without a

current, valid Washington state game farm license except with the written permission of the director.

(1) Under a current, valid license issued by the department, game farms licensed prior to January 1, 1992, may continue to possess, propagate, sell and transfer wildlife they lawfully possessed on January 1, 1992(~~, under their license issued by the department~~). Transfers of wildlife other than those species listed under subsection (2) are restricted to licensed game farms authorized by written license to possess said wildlife.

(2) Game farms licensed on or after January 1, 1992, may purchase, possess, propagate, sell or transfer the following wildlife: (~~((a))~~) Game birds - Pheasant, of the genus *Phasianus*; gray partridge of the genus *Perdix*; chukar of the genus *Alectoris*; quail of the genus *Colinus*, *Callipepla*, and *Oreortyx*; waterfowl of the family *Anatidae*.

(3) Application for a game farm license shall be made on a form provided by the department.

(4) The director or designee of the director may issue, with conditions or restrictions, a game farm license, if the applicant meets the requirements of subsection (1) or (2) above and complies with the following criteria:

(a) The applicant is the owner or tenant of or has a possessory interest in the lands, waters, and riparian rights shown in the application.

(b) The rearing and holding facilities are adequate and structurally sound to prevent the egress of game farm wildlife.

(c) Operating conditions are clean and humane.

(d) No hazards to state wildlife exist from the operation.

(e) The license covers only the immediate premises and areas described on the application where wildlife will be held.

(5) Holders of a game farm license must make annual reports no later than the 15th of January to the director on forms to be furnished by the department. Violation of this subsection is an infraction, punishable under RCW 77.15.-160.

(6) A licensed game farm must be inspected annually. All inspection costs will be paid by the licensee. The inspection must occur during the months of June, July, or August. An inspection form will be provided by the department and must be completed and signed by a licensed veterinarian or an agent authorized by the department. The inspection form must accompany the annual report and be submitted to the director no later than the 15th day of January.

(7) During June, July, or August, a licensed game farm must conduct annual avian influenza disease testing of ten percent or a maximum of thirty representative game birds on-site. Testing required under this subsection and subsection (8) of this section must be performed by a qualified testing agent approved by WDFW. Testing is not required for the year in which all birds on-site were transferred from a game farm that has complied with the testing requirements of this rule within one year of the transfer. Copies of testing records must be kept for one year. The licensee is responsible for all testing costs. Any test results indicating the presence of avian influenza disease must be reported immediately to the Washington state department of agriculture state veterinarian.

(8) If birds being held on the game farm exhibit symptoms of respiratory infection, diarrhea, central nervous system malfunction, or more than twenty-five percent flock mortality, licensed game farms must test for one or more of the following diseases as soon as possible upon the observation of symptoms: *Mycoplasma gallisepticum* and *Mycoplasma synoviae*, pullorum, salmonella, histomoniasis, and exotic Newcastle disease. The licensee is responsible for all testing costs.

(9) A game farm license is not required for captive-bred mink, *Mustela vison*, and captive-bred silver fox, *Vulpes fulva*, lawfully acquired from a licensed breeder or fur farm and held for fur farming purposes.

(10) A game farm license may be revoked and any future licenses may be denied by the director or director's designee if the department determines:

(a) Information contained in a game farm license application was inaccurate or false;

(b) The game farm licensee fails to comply with department statutes or rules.

(11) Revocation of a game farm license shall remain in effect until all issues pertaining to revocation are resolved.

(12) If the initial application or the application to renew a game farm license is denied or revoked, the department will provide the applicant, in writing, a notice containing a statement of the reason(s) for the denial or revocation.

(a) The applicant may request an appeal to contest the denial or revocation pursuant to chapter 34.05 RCW. The department must receive an appeal request in writing within twenty days from the mailing date of the notice of denial or revocation. Address appeal requests to WDFW Legal Services Office, P.O. Box 40100, Olympia WA 98504-0100.

(b) A notice contested by written appeal is final when that proceeding ends in a final order pursuant to chapter 34.05 RCW, or is otherwise dismissed.

(c) If there is no timely request for an appeal, then the department's denial or revocation of the permit is final and effective on the 21st calendar day following the mailing date of the notice of denial or revocation.

(13) A game farm license applicant who provides false or misleading information in their game farm license application may be subject to prosecution under RCW 9A.76.175 or 40.16.030. A game farm license holder who fails to comply with department statutes or rules as required by their game farm license may be subject to prosecution under RCW 77.15.340.

AMENDATORY SECTION (Amending WSR 17-05-112, filed 2/15/17, effective 3/18/17)

WAC 220-450-010 Criteria for planting aquatic plants and releasing wildlife. (1) Release by persons other than the director. It is unlawful for persons other than the director to plant aquatic plants or release any species, subspecies, or hybrids of animals which do not already exist in the wild in Washington. If such species, subspecies, or hybrid does already exist in the wild in Washington, it may be released within its established range by persons other than the director, but only after obtaining a permit from the director.

(a) Application for a permit must be made on a form provided by the department. It must be submitted at least thirty days prior to acquisition of the wildlife or aquatic plants intended for release or planting, and must provide all information indicated.

(b) Permits will only be issued if the director determines there will be no adverse impact on the wildlife or wildlife habitat of the state.

(c) Each permit shall require that at least thirty days prior to planting or release of wildlife or aquatic plants they must be made available for inspection by the director. It shall be the responsibility of the applicant to show that the wildlife will not pose a disease threat. If the director is not satisfied that the wildlife or aquatic plants do not pose a disease threat, they shall not be released or planted in the state. Director approval for release or planting may be withdrawn for cause.

(d) Each permit shall require that an applicant intending to release wildlife in the state shall report immediately to the director the outbreak of any disease among the wildlife intended to be released. If the director determines that such outbreak presents a threat to the wildlife of the state, the director may immediately order such action as necessary including quarantine or destruction of stock, sterilization of enclosures and facilities, cessation of activities, and disposal of wildlife in a manner satisfactory to the director.

(e) Each permit shall require that wildlife to be released shall not be branded, tattooed, tagged, fin clipped or otherwise marked for identification without approval of the director or as required in WAC 220-416-110.

(f) Legally acquired pheasant of the genus *Phasianus*; gray partridge of the genus *Perdix*; chukar of the genus *Alectoris*; quail of the genus *Callipepla* and *Colinus*; and mallards (*Anas platyrhynchos*) may be released without a permit for purposes of dog training, and hunting pursuant to WAC 220-416-110. Game birds of these species released for these purposes must be ~~((purchased from facilities that have))~~ acquired from a department facility, a state- or federally licensed game farm facility that has been inspected by a certified veterinarian within the past twelve months, or a facility with current National Poultry Improvement Plan certification. Rock doves and Eurasian collared doves may be released without a permit for purposes of bird dog training.

(2) Release by the director. The director may plant aquatic plants or release animal species, subspecies, or hybrids which have been planted or released previously in Washington if they do not pose a disease threat and if planting or release will not cause adverse impact on the wildlife or wildlife habitat of the state. Before releasing any species, subspecies, or hybrid of animal not already existing in the wild in Washington, the director shall report to the commission on the planned release, stating the basis for determining that the planned release fulfills the criteria set forth herein. The director may release nonnative species, subspecies, or hybrids not previously released in Washington only if the director in his or her sole discretion has determined that:

(a) There is no reasonable expectation of adverse impact on the wildlife or wildlife habitat of the state and there is an adequate plan for evaluating such impact following the release;

- (b) The commission has classified the species, subspecies, or hybrids to be released pursuant to RCW 77.12.020;
- (c) Suitable habitat is available;
- (d) The nonnative species, subspecies, or hybrids to be released are free of exotic pathogens;
- (e) The release serves the public interest.
- (3) This section does not apply to release of classified or unclassified fish or shellfish by persons who have caught or taken the fish or shellfish, provided the fish or shellfish are released into the water or on the tidelands at the approximate location where taken, except that fishing contest participants may release fish at a contest-designated location in the same body of water from which the fish were taken.

WAC 458-61A-103 Transfers involving an underlying debt. (1) **Introduction.** The real estate excise tax applies to transfers of real property when the grantee relieves the grantor from an underlying debt on the property or makes payments on the grantor's debt. The measure of the tax is the combined amount of the underlying debt on the property and any other consideration.

~~((For example,))~~ (2) **Consideration.** Consideration includes the amount of any lien, mortgage, contract indebtedness, or other encumbrance remaining unpaid on the property at the time of sale. It does not include the amount of any outstanding lien or encumbrance in favor of the United States, the state, or a municipal corporation for taxes, special benefits, or improvements. RCW 82.45.030(3).

(3) **Examples.** This rule includes a number of examples that identify a set of facts, and then state a conclusion. These examples are only a general guide. The tax results of other situations must be determined after a review of all facts and circumstances.

(a) **Example 1.** Yen transfers property to Lee that is subject to an underlying debt (i.e., mortgage). ((Yen is personally liable for the debt, meaning that if Yen does not make the

payments the lender may foreclose on the property and obtain a judgment against Yen if the value of the property is insufficient to pay the debt.) Lee agrees to make all future mortgage payments on Yen's debt, but gives no other consideration for the property. Yen owes real estate excise tax on the amount of the underlying debt. Lee's payments on the underlying debt relieve Yen of her debt obligation. Therefore, Yen receives consideration.

~~((2) **Transfers where grantor has no personal liability for the underlying debt.** Real estate excise tax does not apply to transfers of real property subject to an underlying debt when the grantor has no personal liability for the debt and receives no other consideration for the transfer.~~

~~For example, Yen purchases property with funds obtained from PSP Corporation and secured only by the property. Yen has no personal liability for this debt. If Yen fails to make payments on the debt, PSP may foreclose on the property but it may not obtain a judgment against Yen. Yen transfers the property to Lee subject to the underlying debt. Lee takes the property subject to the underlying debt, and does not give any other consideration for the property. If Lee fails to make payments, PSP may foreclose on the property but it may not obtain a judgment against Lee (who, like Yen before, has no personal liability for the debt). Because Yen is not personally liable for the debt, Lee's payments on the underlying debt to PSP do not relieve Yen of any liability for the debt. The real estate excise tax does not apply to this transfer because there is no consideration.~~

~~(3) **Documentation.** In order to avoid the incidence of the tax, the grantor must present and maintain proper documentation to verify the type of debt and to confirm that fact that the grantor is not personally liable for the debt.) (b) **Example 2.** Same facts as above, except Lee also paid Yen \$10,000 in addition to making the mortgage payments. In this circumstance, the measure of the real estate excise tax is the amount of the mortgage outstanding at the time of sale, plus the additional consideration paid of \$10,000.~~

The proposed rule does not impose more-than-minor costs on businesses. Following is a summary of the agency's analysis showing how costs were calculated. The costs of hearing aids are paid out of the medical aid fund. While individual changes to the medical aid fund do not change rate assumptions by themselves and cost increases are only one of many components in determining rate, costs to businesses associated with the proposed rule can be determined by calculating an increase to employers' medical aid fund premiums. Using a very conservative estimate, the proposed rule could increase annual expenditures to the medical aid fund by up to \$3.3 million. \$3.3 million represents 0.5 percent of all medical costs in fiscal year 2018. For 2019, the average premium rate for the medical aid fund is \$0.1959 per hour. Employers pay fifty percent of the medical aid premium, and a five percent increase in costs equates to \$0.0049 per hour increase in the medical premium rates per hour for an employer. Since the proposed rule impacts replacement costs of hearing aids after five years, there is no impact on individual employers' experience ratings as the costs are beyond the three year experience rating period.

In addition, employers pay premiums on a per worker-hour/unit basis for each assigned risk class so there is no potential for any disproportionate impact on small businesses.

AMENDATORY SECTION (Amending WSR 08-05-093, filed 2/15/08, effective 3/22/08)

WAC 296-20-1101 Hearing aids and masking devices. The department or self-insurer is responsible for replacement or repair of hearing aids damaged or lost due to an industrial accident only to the extent of restoring the damaged item to its condition at time of the accident. If the hearing aid is repairable and the worker determines he prefers replacement, the department or self-insurer is responsible only to the extent of the cost to repair the original and the worker is responsible for the difference between repair and replacement costs.

When the department or self-insurer has accepted a hearing loss condition either as a result of industrial injury or occupational exposure, the department or self-insurer will furnish a hearing aid (hearing aids when bilateral loss is present) when prescribed or recommended by a physician.

The department or self-insurer will bear the cost of ~~((repairs or replacement due to normal wear and the cost of))~~:

(1) Repairs due to normal wear;

(2) Replacement due to normal wear;

(3) Replacement upon request five years after the issue date of the current hearing aid; and

(4) Battery replacement for the life of the hearing aid.

If the worker has been issued a linear analog hearing aid and it becomes inoperable or if the worker is unable to hear, the department or self-insurer will replace the linear analog hearing aid with a nonlinear digital or nonlinear analog hearing aid in accordance with existing medical aid rules and fee schedules and at no cost to the worker even if the linear analog hearing aid is repairable.

In cases of accepted tinnitus, the department or self-insurer may provide masking devices under the same provisions as outlined for hearing aids due to hearing loss.

Provision of masking devices and hearing aids require prior authorization.

WAC 192-140-090 What happens if I do not schedule or report for reemployment services as provided in RCW 50.20.010 (1)(e)? (1) Written directives.

(a) The commissioner may direct you in writing to schedule a time to report in person for reemployment services. ~~((+))~~ The written directive will contain a deadline by which you must schedule and participate in reemployment services.

(b) If you fail to schedule a time to participate in reemployment services by the deadline, you will be ineligible to receive benefits for the week containing the date of the deadline, unless you show justifiable cause.

(c) If you fail to participate in reemployment services at the time you scheduled, you will be ineligible to receive benefits for the week containing the time you scheduled, unless you show justifiable cause.

(d) The department may verify the reasons you failed to schedule or participate in reemployment services. In all such cases, your ability to or availability for work may be questioned.

(2) Exceptions. You will not be required to participate in reemployment services if you:

(a) Are a member of a full referral union and are eligible for dispatch and referral according to union rules;

(b) Are attached to an employer as provided in WAC 192-180-005; ~~((+))~~

(c) Participating in a training program approved by the commissioner; or

(d) Within the previous year have completed, or are currently scheduled for or participating in, similar services.

~~((2))~~ **(3) Minimum services.** The services will consist of one or more sessions which include, but are not limited to:

(a) Local labor market information;

(b) Available reemployment and training services;

(c) Successful job search attitudes;

(d) Self assessment of job skills and interests;

(e) Job interview techniques;

(f) The development of a resume or fact sheet; and

(g) The development of a plan for reemployment.

~~((3))~~ **Penalty.** ~~If you have received a directive, and fail to participate in reemployment services during a week, you will be disqualified from benefits for that week unless justifiable cause is demonstrated.)~~

(4) Justifiable cause. AMENDATORY SECTION (Amending WSR 17-05-112, filed 2/15/17, effective 3/18/17)

WAC 220-353-080 Testing commercial fishing gear.

(1) It is unlawful to test commercial fishing gear, except as follows:

(a) Bellingham Bay - Inside and northerly of a line from Governor's Point to the south tip of Eliza Island to Point Frances, in waters 10 fathoms and deeper.

(b) Boundary Bay - North of a line from Birch Point to Point Roberts, and south of the international boundary, in waters 10 fathoms and deeper during times not under control of the Pacific Salmon Commission.

(c) San Juan Channel - Within a 1-mile radius of Point Caution during times not under control of the Pacific Salmon Commission.

(d) Port Angeles - Inside and westerly of a line projected from the east tip of Ediz Hook through buoy C "1" to the mainland.

(e) Port Gardner - Within a 2-mile radius of the entrance to Everett breakwater, in waters 10 fathoms and deeper.

(f) Central Puget Sound - Between lines from Meadow Point to Point Monroe, and Skiff Point to West Point, in waters 50 fathoms and deeper.

(g) East Pass - Between lines from Point Robinson true east to the mainland, and from Dash Point to Point Piner, in waters 50 fathoms and deeper.

(h) Port Townsend - Westerly of a line from the Coast Guard station in Port Townsend to Kala Point, in waters 10 fathoms and deeper.

(i) All tows or sets are limited to 20 minutes, exclusive of setting and retrieving time.

(j) All testing must only occur between 8:00 a.m. and 4:00 p.m.

(k) Cod ends of trawl nets must be left open, all hooks of set line gear must be unbaited, and no lures or baited hooks may be used with jig or troll gear.

(l) All incidentally caught fish and shellfish must be returned to the waters immediately. It is unlawful to retain fish or shellfish aboard the vessel at any time during a gear test operation.

(2) It is unlawful for any person conducting gear testing operations to fail to notify fish and wildlife enforcement in Olympia (~~(at 360-902-2936 prior to testing)~~) at least twenty-four hours in advance of testing. The individual may call the department at 360-902-2936 and speak to an enforcement program representative or leave a voice mail message. The individual may also send an email to the department at WILDCOMM@dfw.wa.gov. In their voice mail, or their email to the department, the individual must provide their name or point of contact, phone number, location where they

plan to conduct testing, date and approximate time of testing and either their vessel's registration number or vessel name.

(3) Violation of this section is punishable under RCW 77.15.520, 77.15.550, or 77.15.580, depending on the circumstances of the violation.
