- (a) You have been determined to meet DDA eligibility criteria;
  - (b) You choose to receive services in the RHC;
  - (c) ((You need the level of care provided at the RHC; and
- (d))) DDA has determined that you can be supported safely in an RHC environment and will not pose a danger to other residents of the RHC; ((or)) and
- (d) You need the level of care provided at the RHC, which is either:
- (i) Nursing facility level of care under WAC 388-106-0355 for a client admitted to a state-operated nursing facility; or
- (ii) Intermediate care facility for individuals with intellectual disabilities (ICF/IID) level of care under WAC 388-828-1020 for a client admitted to a state-operated ICF/IID.
- (2) If you are sixteen through twenty years of age, and meet (1)(a) through (d) above you may not be admitted to receive services at a residential habilitation center unless there are no service options available in the community to appropriately meet your needs. Such admission is limited to the provision of short-term respite or crisis stabilization services.
- (3) If you are under age sixteen you are not eligible to receive services at a residential habilitation center.
- (4) Admission to a nursing facility at a RHC also requires completion of preadmission screening and resident review (PASRR) requirements as described in chapter 388-97 WAC.

WAC 388-837-9010 Must a client in an ICF/IID be able to benefit from active treatment? An individual admitted to a residential habilitation center's intermediate care facility for individuals with intellectual disabilities must be in need of and able to benefit from continuous and aggressive active treatment.

- (2) Catch Record Card Area 1 (Nearshore fishery); Those waters shoreward from 46°38.17'N. lat., 124°15.88'W. long., to the WA/OR border at 46°16.00'N. lat., 24°15.88'W. long. (then connecting to the 40 fathom depth contour in Oregon):
- (a) Open May 6, 2019, until further notice, Mondays through Wednesdays.
- (b) It is permissible to retain bottomfish while possessing halibut onboard boats in the nearshore area.

This rule making implements federal court orders governing Washington's relationship with treaty Indian tribes, federal law governing Washington's relationship with Oregon, and Washington fish and wildlife commission policy guidance for Columbia River fisheries.

Citation of Rules Affected by this Order: Repealing WAC 220-312-06000E; and amending WAC 220-312-060.

Statutory Authority for Adoption: RCW 77.04.012, 77.04.020, 77.04.130, 77.12.045, and 77.12.047.

Under RCW 34.05.350 the agency for good cause finds that immediate adoption, amendment, or repeal of a rule is necessary for the preservation of the public health, safety, or general welfare, and that observing the time requirements of notice and opportunity to comment upon adoption of a permanent rule would be contrary to the public interest.

Reasons for this Finding: Extends the 2019 spring recreational salmon season in the Columbia River in the area upstream of the Lewis River to Bonneville Dam, including shad and hatchery steelhead. ESA impacts for wild fish are available to recreational fisheries in order to access hatchery fish. The fishery is consistent with the *U.S. v. Oregon* Management Agreement and the associated biological opinion. Conforms Washington state rules with Oregon state rules. Regulation is consistent with compact action on February 20 and April 10, 2019.

Washington and Oregon jointly regulate Columbia River fisheries under the congressionally ratified Columbia River Compact. Four Indian tribes have treaty fishing rights in the Columbia River. The treaties preempt state regulations that fail to allow the tribes an opportunity to take a fair share of the available fish, and the states must manage other fisheries accordingly. *Sohappy v. Smith*, 302 F. Supp. 899 (D. Or. 1969). A federal court order sets the current parameters for sharing between treaty Indians and others. *United States v. Oregon*, Civil No. 68-513-KI (D. Or.), Order Adopting 2008-2017 *United States v. Oregon* Management Agreement (Aug. 12, 2008) (Doc. No. 2546).

Some Columbia River Basin salmon and steelhead stocks are listed as threatened or endangered under the federal ESA. On May 5, 2008, the National Marine Fisheries Service issued a biological opinion under 16 U.S.C. § 1536 that allows for some incidental take of these species in treaty and nontreaty Columbia River fisheries governed by the 2008-2017 U.S. v. Oregon Management Agreement. The 2008-2017 Management Agreement (MA) and Biological Opinion (BO) have been extended through February 2018 while the MA and BO covering 2018-2027 are finalized. The Washington and Oregon fish and wildlife commissions have developed policies to guide the implementation of such bio-

logical opinions in the states' regulation of nontreaty fisheries

Columbia River nontreaty fisheries are monitored very closely to ensure compliance with federal court orders, ESA, and commission guidelines. Because conditions change rapidly, the fisheries are managed almost exclusively by emergency rule. Representatives from the Washington (WDFW) and Oregon (ODFW) departments of fish and wildlife convene public hearings and take public testimony when considering proposals for new emergency rules. WDFW and ODFW then adopt regulations reflecting agreements reached. There is insufficient time to promulgate permanent rules.

# WSR 19-09-053 EMERGENCY RULES DEPARTMENT OF FISH AND WILDLIFE

[Order 19-73—Filed April 12, 2019, 3:45 p.m., effective April 15, 2019]

Effective Date of Rule: April 15, 2019.

Purpose: Amend recreational clam and mussel rules in Puget Sound.

Citation of Rules Affected by this Order: Repealing WAC 220-330-11000H; and amending WAC 220-330-110.

Statutory Authority for Adoption: RCW 77.04.012, 77.04.020, 77.12.045, and 77.12.047.

Under RCW 34.05.350 the agency for good cause finds that immediate adoption, amendment, or repeal of a rule is necessary for the preservation of the public health, safety, or general welfare, and that observing the time requirements of notice and opportunity to comment upon adoption of a permanent rule would be contrary to the public interest.

Reasons for this Finding: This emergency rule is necessary to close the clam and mussel season at Point Whitney Tidelands and Point Whitney Lagoon, and to maintain the open clam and mussel seasons at North Bay (Case Inlet) and Oak Bay County Park. A decrease in the clam populations at Point Whitney Lagoon and Point Whitney Tidelands requires a reduced season to meet conservation objectives agreed upon with tribal comanagers. At North Bay (Case Inlet), an earlier opening date provides daylight recreational harvest opportunity and aligns with capacity of beach facilities. At Oak Bay County Park, a decrease in the littleneck and butter clam populations requires adjusting the season to meet conservation objectives agreed upon with tribal comanagers, while providing recreational opportunity in this region. Maintains the clam and mussel closure at Dosewallips State Park. There is insufficient time to adopt permanent rules.

#### **NEW SECTION**

WAC 220-330-11000I Clams other than razor clams, mussels—Areas and seasons. Notwithstanding the provisions of WAC 220-330-110, effective April 15, 2019 until further notice:

- (1) Point Whitney Lagoon: Closed until further notice.
- (2) Point Whitney Tidelands: Closed until further notice.
- (3) North Bay (Case Inlet): All state-owned tidelands north of the power transmission lines and those extending 1900 feet south of the power transmission lines along the eastern shore are open immediately through April 30, from one hour before official sunrise until one hour after official sunset only.
- (4) Oak Bay County Park: Open immediately through April 30 only.
- (5) Dosewallips State Park, as defined by boundary markers and signs posted on the beach, is closed until further notice.

Effective Date of Rule: Immediately upon filing. Purpose: Amend recreational razor clam rules.

Citation of Rules Affected by this Order: Repealing WAC 220-330-16000D; and amending WAC 220-330-160.

Statutory Authority for Adoption: RCW 77.04.012, 77.04.020, 77.12.045, and 77.12.047.

Under RCW 34.05.350 the agency for good cause finds that immediate adoption, amendment, or repeal of a rule is necessary for the preservation of the public health, safety, or general welfare, and that observing the time requirements of notice and opportunity to comment upon adoption of a permanent rule would be contrary to the public interest.

Reasons for this Finding: This emergency rule is needed to open the recreational razor clam season. Survey results show that adequate clams are available for harvest in Razor Clam Areas 1, 3, 4 and 5 for recreational harvest. Washington department of health has certified clams from this beach to be safe for human consumption. There is insufficient time to adopt permanent rules.

#### **NEW SECTION**

WAC 220-330-16000D Razor clams—Areas and seasons. Notwithstanding the provisions of WAC 220-330-160, it is unlawful to take, dig for or possess razor clams taken for personal use from any beaches in any razor clam area except as provided for in this section:

- (1) Effective 12:01 a.m. April 20, 2019 through 11:59 a.m. April 21, 2019, razor clam digging is permissible in Razor Clam Area 1. Digging is permissible from 12:01 a.m. to 11:59 a.m. each day only.
- (2) Effective 12:01 a.m. April 20, 2019 through 11:59 a.m. April 22, 2019, razor clam digging is permissible in Razor Clam Area 3. Digging is permissible from 12:01 a.m. to 11:59 a.m. each day only.
- (3) Effective 12:01 a.m. April 20, 2019 through 11:59 a.m. April 20, 2019, razor clam digging is permissible in Razor Clam Area 4. Digging is permissible from 12:01 a.m. to 11:59 a.m. each day only.
- (4) Effective 12:01 a.m. April 21, 2019 through 11:59 a.m. April 22, 2019, razor clam digging is permissible in

Razor Clam Area 5. Digging is permissible from 12:01 a.m. to 11:59 a.m. each day only.

(5) It is unlawful to dig for razor clams at any time in the Twin Harbors Razor Clam sanctuaries defined in WAC 220-320-130.
