Effective Date of Rule: August 1, 2019.

Purpose: This CR-103P changes the effective date of June 1, 2019, included in the CR-103P for the permanent rule adopted by the Washington state transportation commission on December 12, 2018 (WSR 19-01-066), to August 1, 2019. As presented at the public hearing for this rule making on July 17, 2018, the effective date of the rule was set to align with implementation of Washington state department of transportation's (WSDOT) new back office system. WSDOT has since revised the anticipated date this system will be implemented from May to June 2019.

Aligning the date this rule becomes effective with the implementation of the new back office system is consistent with provisions of law directing rate-setting responsibilities cited in RCW 47.46.100 and 47.56.850, as effectiveness of this rule before implementation of this system would increase administrative burden and related costs for this rule making, negatively impacting the ability of toll rates for each toll facility to generate sufficient revenues. The effective date of August 1, 2019, is consistent with these rate-setting responsibilities by providing further assurance that the effective date will follow implementation of the back office system.

The purpose of this rule making is to propose amendments to definitions, toll rate exemptions, and administrative fee rules in chapter 468-270 WAC to provide a consistent set of non-HOV exemptions and fees for all toll facilities in the state. This rule brings consistency to exemption definitions; expands transit, rideshare, private bus, and school bus exemptions to the Tacoma Narrows Bridge facility; eliminates the requirement that emergency vehicles be responding to or returning from a bona fide emergency; and removes the short-term account discount.

Changes Other than Editing from Proposed to Adopted Version: (1) New WAC 468-270-085 included references to WAC 468-270-100 and 468-270-110, which the proposed rule also repeals. The citations have been changed to WAC 468-270-105 and 468-270-115, which this rule creates as replacements to the repealed sections.

(2) In WAC 468-270-071, corrected reference to SR 520 Bridge toll rate table numbers in introduction, and removed reference to SR 520 Bridge short-term account rates in weekend section of Table 2 (SR 520 Two-Axle Vehicle Toll Rates).

(3) In WAC 468-270-300, removed proposed change to table number of "Customer Fees and Discounts" table from Table 12 to Table 7. An upcoming rule making for SR 99 Tunnel toll rates will add new tables 7-11 back to chapter

468-270 WAC, at which time table will again be Table 12. This change reduces the administrative burden for both rule-making processes.

Effective Date of Rule: Thirty-one days after filing.

Purpose: The purpose of this proposal is to provide sustainable hunting opportunities for the 2019 season. The department needs to retain general hunting opportunities while maintaining the balance among user groups. Also, the proposal provides clarification to boundaries and an increase and/or reduction to recreational opportunities based on game animal population changes. Last, the proposal mitigates wild-life conflicts, while maintaining sustainable game animal populations across the state.

WAC 220-410-060 Game management units (GMUs) boundary descriptions—Region six, 220-412-070 Big game and wild turkey auction, raffle, and special incentive permits, WAC 220-412-100 Landowner hunting permits, 220-413-

030 Importation and retention of dead nonresident wildlife, 220-413-180 Special closures and firearm restrictions, 220-413-200 Reducing the spread of hoof disease—Unlawful transport of elk hooves, 220-414-070 Archery requirements, 220-414-080 Hunting—Hunter orange clothing requirements, 220-415-070 2019 Moose seasons, permit quotas, and areas, 220-415-130 2019 Mountain goat seasons and permit quotas, 220-416-110 Use of game birds for training dogs, field trials—Marking requirements, and 220-450-010 Criteria for planting aquatic plants and releasing wildlife: No recommended adjustments for these WAC.

WAC 220-413-090 Field identification of wildlife—Evidence of sex—Definitions.

Change: Addition of "fully feathered" to clarify retention of head for Canada and cackling geese harvested in Goose Management Area 2 - Coast and Inland.

Rationale: Dusky Canada goose is closed to harvest. Measurement of the bill and feather coloration are required for subspecies verification.

WAC 220-415-020 2018-2020 Deer general seasons.

Change: Under modern firearm deer seasons, disabled and youth general seasons, change the legal deer for GMUs 101 - 121 from any white-tailed deer to any white-tailed buck.

Rationale: This change eliminates antlerless, white-tailed deer opportunity during the disabled and youth general seasons in GMUs 101 - 121 in response to increasing public concern about the white-tailed deer population in those GMUs.

Change: Under archery deer seasons, early archery general deer seasons, Eastern Washington white-tailed deer, change the legal deer for GMUs 101 - 121 from any white-tailed deer to any white-tailed buck.

Rationale: This change eliminates antlerless, white-tailed deer opportunity during the early archery general deer seasons in GMUs 101 - 121 in response to increasing public concern about the white-tailed deer population in those GMUs.

Change: Under archery deer seasons, late archery general deer seasons, Eastern Washington white-tailed deer, change the legal deer for GMU 101 from any white-tailed deer to any white-tailed buck.

Rationale: This change eliminates antlerless, white-tailed deer opportunity during the late archery general deer seasons in GMU 101 in response to increasing public concern about the white-tailed deer population in that GMU.

Change: Under archery deer seasons, late archery general deer seasons, Eastern Washington white-tailed deer, change the legal deer for GMUs 105 - 121 from any white-tailed deer to any white-tailed buck.

Rationale: This change eliminates antlerless, white-tailed deer opportunity during the late archery general deer seasons in GMUs 105 - 121 in response to increasing public concern about the white-tailed deer population in those GMUs.

Change: Under muzzleloader deer seasons, early muzzleloader general deer seasons, Eastern Washington white-tailed deer, change the legal deer for GMUs 101 - 121 from any white-tailed deer to any white-tailed buck.

Rationale: This change eliminates antlerless, white-tailed deer opportunity during the early muzzleloader general deer seasons in GMUs 101 - 121 in response to increasing public concern about the white-tailed deer population in those GMUs.

Change: Under muzzleloader deer seasons, late muzzleloader general deer seasons, Western Washington black-tailed deer, change the legal deer for GMU 654 from any deer to any buck.

Rationale: This change reverses the addition of antlerless opportunity during the late muzzleloader general season in GMU 654 that was proposed in the original filing. The initial proposal sought to provide additional opportunity for muzzleloaders to equate to opportunity for other user groups. Upon further review, harvest data in this GMU warrant a more conservative approach by maintaining the current "any buck" option for late muzzleloaders in this GMU.

WAC 220-415-030 Deer special permits.

Change: Under the quality category for Green River (GMU 485); change the season dates from Nov. 9-15 to Nov. 2-8.

Rationale: Season dates and permit number are negotiated annually with the Muckleshoot Indian Tribe and Tacoma Water. Proposed changes are a reflection of those negotiations, which consider managing hunter access, hunt quality, and management of the resource.

Change: Under the bucks category for Ritzville (GMU 284), modern; change the number of permits from seven (7) to nine (9).

Rationale: This change corrects an error in the initial filing, the changes originally submitted for inclusion in the initial filing to increase modern firearm, antlered special permit opportunity in GMU 284 were not added.

Change: Under the antlerless category for GMUs 101 - 121 to include Sherman, Kelly Hill, Douglas, Aladdin, Selkirk, 49 Degrees North, and Huckleberry; remove all antlerless permits.

Rationale: This change eliminates antlerless special permits for white-tailed deer in GMUs 101 - 121 in response to increasing public concern about the white-tailed deer population in those GMUs.

Change: Under the 2nd deer category for Colville River (Deer Area 1035), white-tailed, antlerless; remove all permits.

Rationale: This change eliminates second deer antlerless special permits for white-tailed deer in Deer Area 1035 in response to increasing public concern about the white-tailed deer population in GMUs 101 - 121.

Change: Under the Youth category for Green River (GMU 485); change the season dates from Nov. 9-15 to Nov. 2-8.

Rationale: Season dates and permit number are negotiated annually with the Muckleshoot Indian Tribe and Tacoma Water. Proposed changes are a reflection of those negotiations, which consider managing hunter access, hunt quality, and management of the resource.

Change: Under the senior 65+ category for GMUs 101-121 to include Sherman, Kelly Hill, Douglas, Aladdin, Selkirk, 49 Degrees North, and Huckleberry; remove all antlerless white-tailed deer permits.

Rationale: This change eliminates senior 65+ special permits for white-tailed deer in GMUs 101 - 121 in response to increasing public concern about the white-tailed deer population in those GMUs.

WAC 220-415-040 Elk area descriptions.

Change: For Elk Area No. 6054 Puyallup River (Pierce County); the south and southwest boundary of the elk area will follow the Nisqually River instead of State Route 706, Highway 7, and Alder Lake Park Road.

Rationale: We identified an issue where Alder Lake Park Road was also referred to by a different name on available road maps. This change avoids potential confusion regarding the boundary and simplifies the boundary description for hunters.

WAC 220-415-050 Elk general seasons and definitions.

Change: Under early archery general elk seasons for Eastern Washington in GMUs 328, 329, 336, 340, 352, 356, and 364; update the season dates under 2019 dates to be Sept. 14-19 and leave 2020 dates blank.

Rationale: Population surveys for the Yakima elk herd were completed recently and indicate that the population remains at levels similar to those observed in 2017 and is ~1,000 elk below objective. However, the number of cows in the population is near objective. In addition, harvest estimates for the 2018 season indicate the early archery season only accounted for ~60 of the 300-400 cows harvested in 2018. Collectively, this indicates the population should be able to sustain the level of cow harvest that occurs during the early archery season. That said, biologists are concerned about a delayed winter mortality event given the 2019 winter conditions and are cautious about committing to an early archery season in 2020.

Population surveys for the Colockum herd had not been completed at the time this document was prepared. However, given the Colockum herd was still within objective in 2018, biologists felt confident in offering this opportunity for the 2019 season and adjusting the recommendation in 2020 if pending survey results indicated a change was warranted.

Change: Under early archery general elk seasons for Western Washington; change the legal elk for GMU 663 from 3 pt. min. to 3 pt. min. or antlerless.

Rationale: The legal elk for all other general seasons including modern firearm is 3 pt. min. or antlerless to address damage issues in the eastern portion of GMU 663. Changing the legal elk for the early archery season was inadvertently missed.

Change: Under early archery general elk seasons for Eastern Washington in GMUs 328, 329, 336, 340, 352, 356, and 364; update the season dates under the 2019 dates to be Sept. 14-19 and leave 2020 dates blank.

Rationale: The Blue Mountains elk herd is below objective for the third straight year with lower than normal calf recruitment rates.

WAC 220-415-060 Elk special permits.

Change: Under the bulls category; update the legal hunt boundary for Alkali, muzzleloader (EM), to include GMU 334.

Rationale: We have expanded the legal boundary for several permits in the quality bull and bull categories to include GMU 334, and inadvertently missed this one.

Change: Under the hunters with disabilities category; update the legal hunt boundary for Alkali, (EF, EM, EA), to include GMU 334.

Rationale: We have expanded the legal boundary for several permits to include GMU 334, and inadvertently missed this one.

WAC 220-415-120 Bighorn sheep seasons and permit quotas.

Change: Reinstate Cleman Mountain B adult ewe only hunts (10 permits). Change the number of permits for Cleman Mountain C adult ewe only hunts from one (1) back to eight (8). Reinstate Cleman Mountain D adult ewe only (youth hunter) hunts (2 permits).

Rationale: The reduction in bighorn sheep ewe permits in the Cleman Mountain population in the original 2019 season proposals was premised on the department's ability to capture and translocate a number of animals out of state. Due to mild winter conditions, the department was unable to capture and translocate ewes this year, but the Cleman Mountain herd remains at a higher level than the department deems prudent and should be reduced. Thus, we propose offering the same number of bighorn ewe permits as in 2017.

Change: Suspend bighorn sheep permits for the Mt. Hull herd; one (1) ram permit, one (1) ewe permit, and one (1) ewe youth only permit.

Rationale: Pneumonia has recently been detected in this herd. We don't yet know the magnitude of mortality but the department recommends against issuing permits when the future of this herd is uncertain.

WAC 220-416-060 2019-2020 Migratory waterfowl seasons and regulations.

Change: The addition of a veterans and active military personnel hunting date to occur February 1, 2020, for duck seasons.

Rationale: Under the John D. Dingell, Jr. Conservation, Management, and Recreation Act (S.47) signed March 12, 2019.

Change: The addition of a veterans and active military personnel hunting date to occur February 1, 2020, for duck seasons. And, change of special youth days for goose seasons to Sept. 21, 2019, and Feb. 1, 2020, in Western Washington, and Sept. 28, 2019, and Feb. 1, 2020, in Eastern Washington.

Rationale: No state may allow more than one hundred seven days for any one migratory gamebird species. Washington State already maximizes these days by allowing a one hundred five day regular season and two youth hunting days. No additional youth days may be added, however, with the option of a special veterans and active military personnel hunting date, this allowed the opportunity to split the current Youth days to allow for both an early season and a later season opportunity, which allows more possible waterfowl species and hunting styles to be taught to youth waterfowl hunters.

Change: Possession limit description adjustments.

Rationale: Changes required to specify single-day bag limit possession limits for waterfowl species to be allowable

during the new Feb. 1 Youth, veterans and active military personnel hunting day.

Change: Addition of a veterans and active military personnel hunting date to occur February 1, 2020, for goose seasons.

Rationale: Under the John D. Dingell, Jr. Conservation, Management, and Recreation Act (S.47) signed March 12, 2019, Subtitle E, Section 4001 amends Section 3 of 16 U.S. Code §704 of the Migratory Bird Treaty Act to allow for the option of special hunting dates for veterans (as defined by Section 101 of Title 38, United States Code) and active military personnel.

Change: Date adjustments; daily bag limit adjustment for the Feb. 1 Youth, veterans and active military personnel day; date adjustments to white goose season in GMA 1; and an addition of Feb. 1, 2020, as an allowable brant hunting date.

Rationale: Changes required to allow the full potential waterfowl species list to be allowable during the new Feb. 1 Youth, veterans and active military personnel day.

Change: September goose seasons in Goose Management Area 2 - Coast and Inland changed to Sept. 7-15, 2019.

Rationale: A traditional necessary shift to avoid conflict with Labor Day weekend activities.

Change: Date adjustments to the third segment of goose seasons in Goose Management Area 2 - Coast to Feb. 8-22, 2020.

Rationale: Changes required to minimize conflict between regular goose season in GMA 2 - Coast and to allow the full potential waterfowl species list to be allowable during the new Feb. 1 Youth, veterans and active military personnel day.

Change: Adjustment to extended falconry season dates and allowable species.

Rationale: Changes required to account for new Feb. 1 Youth, veterans and active military personnel hunting day.

WAC 220-430-010 Game farm license provisions.

Change: Added language under subsection (2) to clarify that a game farm license does not authorize the licensee to purchase, possess, propagate, sell or transfer deleterious exotic wildlife.

Game farms licensed on or after January 1, 1992, may purchase, possess, propagate, sell or transfer the following wildlife, except species designated as deleterious exotic wildlife: ((+)) Game birds - Pheasant, of the genus Phasianus; gray partridge of the genus Perdix; chukar of the genus Alektoris; quail of the genus Colinus, Callipepla, and Oreortyx; waterfowl of the family Anatidae.

Rationale: This adjustment aligns WAC 220-430-010 with WAC 220-640-200 by providing consistency in treatment of deleterious exotic wildlife species (e.g., mute swan).

Species that may be harvested under this permit include: One additional any buck white-tailed deer, one additional any buck mule deer, one any ram California bighorn sheep, one additional any legal cougar, and one additional any legal black bear; total harvest not to exceed three animals.

(b) Hunt Area: For white-tailed deer, mule deer, cougar, and black bear, any 200 series GMU EXCEPT those GMUs closed to deer hunting by the fish and wildlife commission. For California bighorn sheep, the director is authorized to select areas open for this hunt based on population objectives, harvest objectives, and recent harvest parameters as identified by the department. The selection of hunt areas will be made no later than December 1 for the following year, and will be posted on the department's web site no later than January 1.

(c) Season dates:

(i) September 1 - December 31 for white-tailed deer, mule deer, and California bighorn sheep.

PERMIT ISSUANCE PROCEDURE

(28) Auction permits: The director will select a conservation organization(s) to conduct annual auction(s). Selection of the conservation organizations will be based on criteria adopted by the Washington department of fish and wildlife.

Big game and wild turkey auctions shall be conducted consistent with WAC 220-412-060.

(29) Raffle permits: Raffle permits will be issued to individuals selected through a Washington department of fish and wildlife drawing or the director may select a conservation organization(s) to conduct annual raffles. Selection of a conservation organization will be based on criteria adopted by the Washington department of fish and wildlife. Big game and wild turkey raffles shall be conducted consistent with WAC 220-412-040.

(30) Special incentive permits: Hunters will be entered into a drawing for special deer and elk incentive permits for prompt reporting of hunting activity in compliance with WAC 220-413-100.

(31) For permit hunts where the permittee may harvest multiple species, the permittee must select the species he/she wants to hunt within fourteen days of notification of being selected.

QUALIFICATIONS FOR PARTICIPATION AND REQUIREMENTS:

(32) Permittees shall contact the appropriate regional office of the department of fish and wildlife when entering the designated hunt area or entering the region to hunt outside the general season.

(33) The permittee may be accompanied by others; however, only the permittee is allowed to carry a legal weapon or harvest an animal.

(34) Any attempt by members of the permittee's party to herd or drive wildlife is prohibited.

(35) If requested by the department, the permittee is required to direct department officials to the site of the kill.

(36) The permit is valid during the hunting season dates for the year issued.

(37) The permittee will present the head and carcass of the bighorn sheep killed to any department office within ten days of date of kill.

(38) The permittee must abide by all local, state, and federal regulations including firearm restriction areas and area closures.

(2) It is unlawful for hunters to participate in landowner-permit hunts unless the hunters possess both an access permit from the landowner and a hunting permit from the department for the species covered under the landowner's contract. A violation of this section is punishable under RCW 77.15.410.

AMENDATORY SECTION (Amending WSR 18-11-061, filed 5/11/18, effective 6/11/18)

WAC 220-413-030 Importation and retention of dead nonresident wildlife. (1) It is unlawful:

(a) To import or possess dead wildlife, taken in another state or country, into Washington unless such wildlife was acquired lawfully. Proof of legal acquisition must be retained during the period of retention of the carcass or edible parts.

(b) For a person who imports a dead bighorn sheep, mountain goat, cougar or bear to fail to report such importation to the department in writing within ten days of the importation. The report must contain the name and address of the importer, the location where the dead wildlife is being stored, and general information describing where and how the wildlife was obtained.

(c) To import or possess deer, elk, or moose, or parts thereof, harvested in Pennsylvania, Texas, Missouri, Colorado, Wyoming, Utah, New Mexico, Wisconsin, Illinois, South Dakota, Nebraska, Kansas, New York, West Virginia, Virginia, North Dakota, Alberta, Maryland, Minnesota, Montana, Mississippi, Iowa, Arkansas, Michigan, ~~(and)~~ Saskatchewan, and Tennessee with the following exceptions:

(i) Meat that has been deboned in the state or province where it was harvested and is imported as boned-out meat;

(ii) Skulls and antlers, antlers attached to the skull plate, or upper canine teeth (buglers, whistlers, ivories) from which all soft tissue has been removed;

(iii) Hides or capes without heads attached;

(iv) Tissue imported for use by a diagnostic or research laboratory; and

(v) Finished taxidermy mounts.

(2) Violation of subsection (1) of this section is punishable under RCW 77.15.290 Unlawful transportation of fish or wildlife—Penalty.

(3) It is unlawful for an importer or receiver of deer or elk to fail to notify the department within twenty-four hours if a state or province alerts the importer or receiver that a harvested animal has tested positive for chronic wasting disease. Violation of this subsection is an infraction punishable under RCW 77.15.160 Infractions.

AMENDATORY SECTION (Amending WSR 17-05-112, filed 2/15/17, effective 3/18/17)

WAC 220-413-090 Field identification of wildlife—

Evidence of sex—Definitions. (1) It is unlawful to possess or transport game birds unless ~~((the feathered heads are))~~ a feathered wing or head is left attached to ~~((the))~~ each carcass, except Canada and cackling geese harvested in Goose Management Area 2 - Coast and Inland where the fully feathered head must be left attached for subspecies determination, and falconry-caught birds, until the carcass is processed and/or stored for consumption.

(2) It is unlawful to possess or transport big game animals unless evidence of the sex of the animal remains naturally attached to the carcass until the carcass is processed and/or stored for consumption.

(a) Evidence of sex means the head with antlers or horns attached or penis or testes of male big game animals or the head or udder of female big game animals any of which must be naturally attached to at least one quarter of the carcass or to the largest portion of meat.

(b) For the purpose of this rule, "stored for consumption" means at the final point of storage prior to consumption of the meat.

(3) It is unlawful to possess or transport goat, sheep, moose, deer or elk taken in hunting areas which have horn or antler restrictions unless the head or skull plate, with both horns or both antlers naturally attached, accompanies the carcass.

(4) The possession of a taxidermist's receipt which includes the taxidermist's name, address, and telephone number, the hunter's name, address, telephone number, license, and tag number, the species and sex of the game bird or big game animal taken, as well as antler points or horn size and the date and GMU location or special deer/elk permit area where taken, shall be deemed to constitute compliance with this section.

For the purpose of this rule "accompanies the carcass" means to remain with the carcass until it has reached the point of processing or storage.

(5) It is lawful for persons who have complied with the department of fish and wildlife's chronic wasting disease

sampling program to possess deer and elk without proof of sex under the following provisions:

- (a) The head of the deer or elk must have been surrendered to an authorized department collection site.
 - (b) The hunter is in possession of an official department disease testing program identification card, completely filled out and signed and dated by a department employee or authorized agent.
 - (c) The carcass of the deer or elk is transported directly from where the head has been surrendered to the point of processing or storage.
- Failure to comply with (a) through (c) of this subsection constitutes unlawful possession of big game and is punishable under RCW 77.15.410.

AMENDATORY SECTION (Amending WSR 18-11-061, filed 5/11/18, effective 6/11/18)

WAC 220-413-180 Special closures and firearm restriction areas. (1) RESTRICTED HUNTING AREAS.

It is unlawful to hunt in the following restricted hunting areas unless otherwise provided:

- (a) Parker Lake (GMU 117, Pend Oreille County): All lands south of Ruby Creek Road (USFS Road 2489), north of Tacoma Creek Road (USFS Road 2389), and west of Bonneville Power Administration power lines are designated as "CLOSED AREA" to hunting wild animals and wild birds year-round except for special hunts adopted by the fish and wildlife commission. The Parker Lake closure provides a protected area for the U.S. Air Force Military Survival Training Program.
- (b) Columbia River: The Columbia River, all islands except privately owned, in the river, the Benton County shoreline below the high water mark, Central Hanford Department of Energy property, and any peninsula originating on the Benton County shoreline, between Vernita Bridge on Highway 24 downstream to the Richland city limits are designated as a "CLOSED AREA" to hunting wild animals and wild birds except waterfowl hunting is open below the high water mark between the old Hanford townsite power line crossing (wooden towers) in Section 24, T 13 N, R 27 E, and the Richland city limits.
- (c) Green River (GMU 485): Except for special permit hunters, who may also take a black bear and/or cougar with the appropriate license/tag options, all lands within GMU 485 are designated as a "CLOSED AREA" to hunting big game year-round. During the general westside elk season and general and late deer seasons, all lands within GMU 485 year-round are also designated as a "CLOSED AREA" to hunting all wild animals, including wild birds, year-round. The city of Tacoma enforces trespass within GMU 485 year-round on lands owned or controlled by the city.

(d) McNeil Island (part of GMU 652): Closed to hunting all wild animals, including wild birds, year-round.

(e) Loo-wit (GMU 522): Closed to hunting and trapping, except for elk and mountain goat hunting by special permit holders during established seasons and in designated areas.

(2) A violation of subsection (1) of this section is punishable under RCW 77.15.400, 77.15.410, or 77.15.430, depending on the species hunted.

(3) CLOSED BIG GAME HUNTING AREAS.

It is unlawful to hunt big game in the following closed areas, unless otherwise specified:

- (a) Clark, Cowlitz, Pacific, and Wahkiakum counties: Closed to hunting for Columbian whitetail deer.
- (b) Cathlamet: Except for special permits issued by the department for nonendangered deer and elk, this area is closed to all deer and elk hunting to protect the Columbian whitetail deer. This area's boundaries are described as:

Beginning in the town of Skamokawa; then east along SR 4 to Risk Road; then south and east along Risk Road to Foster Road; then south along the Foster Road to the Elochoman River; then upstream along the Elochoman River to Elochoman Valley Road (old SR 407); then west along the Elochoman Valley Road to SR 4; then east along SR 4 to SR 409; then south along SR 409 to the Cathlamet Channel of the Columbia River; then east along the north shore of the Cathlamet Channel to Cape Horn; then south in the Columbia River to the state line; then west along the state line to a point directly south of the mouth of Skamokawa Creek; then north on Skamokawa Creek to SR 4 and the point of beginning.

(c) Walla Walla Mill Creek Watershed (GMU 157): All lands in the Mill Creek Watershed are designated as a "CLOSED AREA" to hunting all wild animals, including wild birds. The only exception is for deer or elk hunting by holders of GMU-157 special deer or elk permits during the established open season. These permit holders must have a U.S. Forest Service permit to enter the hunt area, and the area is closed to motorized vehicles. No entry into the Mill Creek Watershed is allowed at other times.

(d) Westport: Closed to hunting all big game animals on the part of Westport Peninsula lying north of State Highway 105 from the Elk River Bridge west end and the Schafer Island Road to the ocean beach.

(e) Cottonwood and Howard islands (GMU 564): Closed to all deer hunting.

(4) A violation of subsection (3) of this section is a gross misdemeanor or a class C felony punishable under RCW 77.15.410, depending on the circumstances of the violation.

(5) FIREARM RESTRICTION AREAS.

(a) It is unlawful to hunt wildlife in the following firearm restriction areas with centerfire or rimfire rifles, or to fail to comply with additional firearm restrictions, except as established below:

WAC 220-413-200 Reducing the spread of hoof disease—Unlawful transport of elk hooves. (1) It is unlawful to transport the hooves of harvested elk beyond the site where the animal was killed in all 400, 500, and 600 series Game Management Units (~~((407, 418, 437, 454, 501 through 564, 568, 572, 574, 578, 633, 636 and 642 through 699))~~), except when specifically authorized by the department or when acting as an agent of the department in the limited capacity of cooperating with research or management actions regarding hoof disease as directed by the department.

(2) Violation of this section is an infraction under RCW 77.15.160 Infractions.

AMENDATORY SECTION (Amending WSR 17-05-112, filed 2/15/17, effective 3/18/17)

WAC 220-414-070 Archery requirements. (1) The following provisions apply to all archery hunting seasons:

(a) It is unlawful for any person to carry or have in his possession any firearm while archery hunting in the field during an archery season specified for that area, except for modern handguns carried for personal protection. Modern handguns cannot be used to hunt big game or dispatch wounded big game during an archery big game hunting season.

(b) It is unlawful to have any electrical equipment or electric device(s), except for illuminated nocks, attached to the bow or arrow while hunting.

(c) It is unlawful to discharge a bow from a vehicle or from, across, or along the maintained portion of a public highway.

(d) It is unlawful to use any device secured to or supported by the bow for the purpose of maintaining the bow at full draw or in a firing position.

(e) It is unlawful to hunt big game animals with any arrow or bolt that does not have a sharp broadhead, or with a broadhead blade or blades that are less than seven-eighths of an inch wide.

(f) It is unlawful to hunt wildlife with any bow equipped with a scope.

(2) The following provisions apply to long bow, recurve bow and compound bow archery equipment:

(a) It is unlawful for any person to hunt big game animals with a bow that does not produce a minimum of 40 pounds of pull measured at twenty-eight inches or at full draw.

(b) It is unlawful to hunt big game animals with any arrow measuring less than 20 inches in length ~~((or weighing less than 6 grains per pound of draw weight with a minimum arrow weight of 300 grains))~~.

(3) A violation of this section is punishable under RCW 77.15.400, 77.15.410, or 77.15.430, depending on the species hunted.

WAC 220-414-080 Hunting—Hunter orange clothing requirements. (5) ~~It is unlawful to hunt bear, cougar, bobcat, raccoon, fox, coyote, rabbit, forest grouse, turkey or hare during those times and in those places open to the taking of deer or elk during a modern firearm season, unless the hunter is wearing fluorescent hunter orange clothing.~~

(6) ~~Persons who are hunting upland game birds during an upland game bird season with a muzzleloading firearm, bow and arrow or falconry are not required to wear fluorescent hunter orange clothing.~~

(7) ~~Wearing fluorescent hunter orange clothing means: A minimum of 400 square inches of fluorescent hunter orange exterior clothing, worn above the waist and visible from all sides.~~

~~((8))~~ (5) A violation of this section is an infraction, punishable under RCW 77.15.160.

WAC 220-415-020 2018-2020 Deer general seasons and definitions. It is unlawful to fail to comply with the bag, possession, and season limits described below. Violations of this section are punishable under RCW 77.15.410 Unlawful hunting of big game—Penalty.

Bag Limit: One (1) deer per hunter during the license year except where otherwise permitted by department rule.

Hunting Method: Hunters must select one of the hunting methods: Modern firearm, archery, or muzzleloader.

Any Buck Deer Seasons: Open only to the taking of deer with visible antlers (buck fawns illegal).

Antler Point: To qualify as an antler point, the point must be at least one inch long, measured on the longest side.

Antler Restrictions: APPLIES TO ALL HUNTERS DURING ANY GENERAL SEASON AND DESIGNATED SPECIAL PERMIT SEASONS. Buck deer taken in antler restricted game management units (GMUs) must meet minimum antler point requirements. Minimum antler point requirements are antler points on one side only. Eye guards are antler points when they are at least one inch long.

3-point Minimum GMUs: All mule deer in 100, 200, and 300 series GMUs; white-tailed deer in GMUs 127, 130, 133, 136, 139, 142, 145, 149, 154, 162, 163, 166, 169, 172, 175, 178, 181, 186, and black-tailed deer in GMU 578.

Permit-only Units: The following GMUs require a special permit to hunt deer: 157 (Mill Creek Watershed), 290 (Desert), 329 (Quilomene), 371 (Alkali), and 485 (Green River).

GMUs Closed to Deer Hunting: 490 (Cedar River) and 522 (Loo-wit).

Types of deer that a person may legally hunt in Washington:

Black-tailed Deer: Any member of black-tailed/mule deer (species *Odocoileus hemionus*) found west of a line drawn from the Canadian border south on the Pacific Crest Trail and along the Yakama Indian Reservation boundary in Yakima County to the Klickitat River; south down Klickitat River to the Columbia River.

Mule Deer: Any member of black-tailed/mule deer (species *Odocoileus hemionus*) found east of a line drawn from the Canadian border south on the Pacific Crest Trail and along the Yakama Indian Reservation boundary in Yakima County to the Klickitat River; south down Klickitat River to the Columbia River.

White-tailed Deer: Any white-tailed deer (member of the species *Odocoileus virginianus*), except the Columbian whitetail deer (species *Odocoileus virginianus leucurus*).

MODERN FIREARM DEER SEASONS

License Required: A valid big game hunting license, which includes a deer species option.

Tag Required: A valid modern firearm deer tag for the area hunted.

Hunting Method: Modern firearm deer tag hunters may use rifle, handgun, shotgun, bow, crossbow, or muzzleloader, but only during modern firearm seasons.

Deer Special Permit Hunting Seasons (Open to Permit Holders Only)

Hunters must purchase a deer hunting license prior to purchasing a permit application. Hunters may only apply for permits consistent with the tag required for the hunt choice; however, Multiple Season Permit holders may apply for archery, muzzleloader, or modern firearm permit hunts. Hunters drawn for a special permit hunt must comply with weapon restrictions, dates, and other conditions listed for the hunt. Hunters drawn for a special permit designated "**Any tag**" under the "**Weapon/Tag**" restriction must use equipment consistent with the requirements of their transport tag and license.

Hunter Education Instructor Incentive Permits

- Special deer permits will be allocated through a random drawing to those hunter education instructors who qualify.
- Permit hunters must use archery equipment during archery seasons, muzzleloader equipment or archery equipment during muzzleloader seasons, and any legal weapon during modern firearm seasons. Hunter orange is required during modern firearm seasons.
- Except for online class incentive permits and chief instructor incentive permits, qualifying hunter education instructors must be certified and have been in active status for a minimum of three consecutive years, inclusive of the year prior to the permit drawing.
- Permittees may purchase a second license for use with the permit hunt only.

Qualified hunter education instructors may only receive one incentive permit each year.

AMENDATORY SECTION (Amending WSR 18-19-001, filed 9/5/18, effective 10/6/18)

WAC 220-415-040 Elk area descriptions.

The following areas are defined as elk areas:

Elk Area No. 1008 West Wenaha (Columbia County): That part of GMU 169 west of USFS trail 3112 from Tepee Camp (east fork of Butte Creek) to Butte Creek, and west of Butte Creek to the Washington-Oregon state line.

Elk Area No. 1009 East Wenaha (Columbia, Garfield, Asotin counties): That portion of GMU 169 east of USFS trail 3112 from Tepee Camp (east fork Butte Creek) to Butte

Creek, and east of Butte Creek to the Washington-Oregon state line.

Elk Area No. 1010 (Columbia County): GMU 162 excluding National Forest land and the Rainwater Wildlife Area.

Elk Area No. 1011 (Columbia County): That part of GMU 162 east of the North Touchet Road, excluding National Forest land.

Elk Area No. 1012 (Columbia County): That part of GMU 162 west of the North Touchet Road, excluding National Forest land and the Rainwater Wildlife Area.

Elk Area No. 1013 (Asotin County): GMU 172, excluding National Forest lands and the 4-O Ranch Wildlife Area.

Elk Area No. 1015 Turnbull (Spokane County): Located in GMU 130, designated areas within the boundaries of Turnbull National Wildlife Refuge.

Elk Area No. 1016 (Columbia County): GMU-162 Dayton, excluding the Rainwater Wildlife Area.

Elk Area No. 1040 (Asotin County): That area within GMU 172 designated as the WDFW-owned lands managed as the 4-O Ranch Wildlife Area.

AMENDATORY SECTION (Amending WSR 18-11-061, filed 5/11/18, effective 6/11/18)

WAC 220-415-050 2018-2020 Elk general seasons and definitions. It is unlawful to fail to comply with bag, possession, and season limits described below. A violation of this section is punishable under RCW 77.15.410 Unlawful hunting of big game—Penalty.

Bag Limit: One (1) elk per hunter during the license year, except where otherwise permitted by department rule. Any combination of seasons, tags, and permits set by the department will not exceed a maximum of two (2) elk per hunter during the license year.

Hunting Method: Elk hunters must select only one of the hunting methods: Modern firearm, archery, or muzzleloader.

Elk Tag Areas: Elk hunters must choose either Eastern or Western Washington to hunt in and buy the appropriate tag for that area.

Any Bull Elk Seasons: Open only to the taking of elk with visible antlers; bull calves are illegal.

Antler Point: To qualify as an antler point, the point must be at least one inch long, measured on the longest side.

Branch: A branch is defined as any projection off the main antler beam that is at least one inch long, measured on the longest side, and longer than it is wide.

Spike Bull Antler Restrictions: Bull elk taken in spike-only game management units (GMUs) must have at least one antler with no branches originating more than 4 inches above where the antler attaches to the skull.

Spike-only GMUs: 145-154, 162-186, 249, and 336-368.

True Spike - Bull Antler Restrictions: Neither antler of bull elk taken in GMUs 251, and 328-335 can have branching originating more than 4 inches above where the antlers attach

to the skull. Under the true-spike restriction, taking an elk that has two points on one side or antler points within one inch of the definitions regarding length of point, or point of origination, is an infraction under RCW 77.15.160. All other types of violations of the true-spike restriction are subject to current penalties and assessments under RCW 77.15.410 and 77.15.420.

True-spike GMUs: 251, 328-335.

3-point Antler Restrictions: Legal bull elk must have at least 3 antler points on one side. Eye guards are antler points when they are at least one inch long. Antler restrictions apply to all hunters during any open season.

3-point GMUs: All of Western Washington, except for GMUs 448, 454, 564, 652 for archers, 666, 684, and Elk Area 4941.

Permit-only Units: The following GMUs are closed to elk hunting during general elk seasons: 157, 371, 418, 485, 522, 556, 621, 636, and 653.

GMUs Closed to Elk Hunting: 437 (except for Elk Area 4941) and 490.

Areas with Special Restrictions: There are modern firearm restrictions in GMU 334 and portions of GMU 660. GMU 554 is open only for early archery and muzzleloader seasons. Elk Area 6064 in GMU 638 (Quinalt) is open to master hunters only.

WAC 220-415-060 ((2018)) 2019 Elk special permits. It is unlawful to fail to comply with the bag, possession, and season limits described below. A violation of this section is punishable under RCW 77.15.410 Unlawful hunting of big game—Penalty.

Special Elk Permit Hunting Seasons (Open to Permit Holders Only)

Hunters must purchase an elk hunting license prior to purchasing a permit application. Hunters may only apply for per-

mits consistent with the tag required for the hunt choice; however, Multiple Season Permit holders may apply for Eastern or Western Washington archery, muzzleloader, or modern firearm permit hunts. Applicants must have purchased the proper tag for these hunts. The elk tag prefixes required to apply for each hunt are shown in the following table. Hunters drawn for a special permit hunt must comply with weapon restrictions, dates, and other conditions listed for the hunt. AMENDATORY SECTION (Amending WSR 18-11-061, filed 5/11/18, effective 6/11/18)

WAC 220-415-070 ((2018)) 2019 Moose seasons, permit quotas, and areas. (1) It is unlawful to fail to comply with the provisions of this section. A violation of this section is punishable under RCW 77.15.410, Unlawful hunting of big game—Penalty.

(2) Moose Permit Hunts

(a) Who May Apply:

(i) **Any antlered bull moose category:** An individual may only harvest one moose under the "any antlered bull moose" or "any moose" category during his or her lifetime. Applications will not be accepted from hunters having previously harvested a moose in the "any moose" or "any antlered bull moose" category.

(ii) **Antlerless only, youth antlerless, over-65 antlerless, disabled-antlerless, ((master hunter any moose,)) hunter-education antlerless, auction moose, raffle moose:** Anyone may apply.

(b) **Bag Limit:** One moose.

(c) **Weapon Restrictions:** Permit holders may use any legal weapon.

(d) **Submitting moose teeth:** Successful moose hunters must submit an incisor tooth from the lower jaw, either in person at a WDFW office, or via the postage-paid envelope supplied, no later than sixty days after harvest.

(e) **Any antlered bull moose seasons:** Open only to the taking of moose with visible antlers (bull calves illegal).

WAC 220-415-120 ((2018)) 2019 Bighorn sheep seasons and permit quotas. (1) It is unlawful to fail to comply with the provisions of this section. A violation of species, sex, size, number, area, season, or eligibility requirements is punishable under RCW 77.15.410, Unlawful hunting of big game—Penalty.

(2) Bighorn Sheep Permit Hunts

(a) Who May Apply: Anyone may apply, EXCEPT those who previously harvested a bighorn sheep in Washington state. An individual may only harvest one bighorn ram during his or her lifetime. However, this restriction is waived for hunters who have previously harvested a bighorn sheep under a ewe-only, juvenile ram, raffle, or auction permit, as well as for applications for a ewe-only, juvenile ram, raffle, or auction permit.

(b) Bag Limit: One bighorn ram, except in designated adult ewe hunts the limit is one bighorn adult ewe.

WAC 220-415-130 ((2018)) 2019 Mountain goat seasons and permit quotas. (1) Hunters must comply with the provisions of this section. A violation of species, sex, size, number, area, season, or eligibility requirements is punishable under RCW 77.15.410, Unlawful hunting of big game—Penalty.

(2) Mountain Goat Permit Hunts

(a) **Who May Apply:** Anyone may apply, except those who harvested a mountain goat in Washington state after 1998. Except for auction and raffle permitted hunts, an individual may only harvest one mountain goat during his or her lifetime.

(b) **Bag Limit:** One (1) adult goat of either sex with horns 4 inches or longer.

(c) It is unlawful for a person who kills a mountain goat in Washington to fail, within ten days after acquisition, to personally present the horns attached to the head for inspection at a department office or location designated by a departmental representative. After inspection, the head/horns of a mountain goat lawfully killed in Washington may be kept for personal use. A violation of this subsection is punishable under RCW 77.15.280 (1)(b).

(d) Applicants drawn for a permit may only purchase their license after successfully completing the WDFW mountain goat gender identification training (online or at a participating WDFW office).

If a hunter takes a dusky Canada goose or does not comply with requirements listed above regarding WDFW collection of subspecies information, authorization will be invalidated by the department and the hunter will not be able to hunt geese in Goose Management Area 2 Coast and Inland for the remainder of the season. Taking one dusky Canada goose is punishable as an infraction under RCW 77.15.160 (5)(b). Youth hunters are required to complete a HIP survey and possess a Washington migratory bird permit (free for youth) as evidence of compliance with this requirement when hunting migratory game birds.

AMENDATORY SECTION (Amending WSR 17-05-112, filed 2/15/17, effective 3/18/17)

WAC 220-416-110 Use of game birds for training dogs, field trials—Marking requirements. It is unlawful to possess game birds acquired from a licensed game farmer for the purpose of training dogs, field trials, or hunting unless the birds are marked in the following manner:

(1) Captive reared waterfowl shall be physically marked in at least one of the following manners:

(a) ~~((Removal of the hind toe from the right foot.))~~ Band-ing of one metatarsus with a seamless metal band; or

(b) Pinioning of a wing: Provided~~((:))~~ that this method shall be the removal of the metacarpal bones of one wing or a portion of the metacarpal bones which renders the bird permanently incapable of flight~~((:))~~; or

(c) ~~((Banding of one metatarsus with a seamless metal band.))~~ Removal of the hind toe from the right foot; or

(d) Tattooing of a readily discernible number or letter or combination thereof on the web of one foot.

(2) All other game birds shall be physically marked ~~((by))~~ in at least one of the following manners:

(a) Banding of one metatarsus with a band purchased from the department; or

(b) Nasal scarring: Provided that this scarring shall be a permanent, readily discernible deformity caused by an anti-pecking device; or

(c) Removal of the first joint of the outside toe on the right foot prior to four weeks of age ~~((or marked by a band purchased from the department))~~.

AMENDATORY SECTION (Amending WSR 17-05-112, filed 2/15/17, effective 3/18/17)

WAC 220-430-010 Game farm license provisions. It is unlawful to operate a game farm without a current, valid Washington state game farm license. It is unlawful to sell those species listed in subsection (2) of this section without a current, valid Washington state game farm license except with the written permission of the director.

(1) Under a current, valid license issued by the department, game farms licensed prior to January 1, 1992, may continue to possess, propagate, sell and transfer wildlife they lawfully possessed on January 1, 1992 ~~((under their license issued by the department))~~. Transfers of wildlife other than those species listed under subsection (2) are restricted to licensed game farms authorized by written license to possess said wildlife.

(2) Game farms licensed on or after January 1, 1992, may purchase, possess, propagate, sell or transfer the following wildlife, except species designated as deleterious wildlife: ~~((a))~~ Game birds - Pheasant, of the genus *Phasianus*; gray partridge of the genus *Perdix*; chukar of the genus *Alectoris*; quail of the genus *Colinus*, *Callipepla*, and *Oreortyx*; waterfowl of the family *Anatidae*.

(3) Application for a game farm license shall be made on a form provided by the department.

(4) The director or designee of the director may issue, with conditions or restrictions, a game farm license, if the applicant meets the requirements of subsection (1) or (2) above and complies with the following criteria:

(a) The applicant is the owner or tenant of or has a possessory interest in the lands, waters, and riparian rights shown in the application.

(b) The rearing and holding facilities are adequate and structurally sound to prevent the egress of game farm wildlife.

(c) Operating conditions are clean and humane.

(d) No hazards to state wildlife exist from the operation.

(e) The license covers only the immediate premises and areas described on the application where wildlife will be held.

(5) Holders of a game farm license must make annual reports no later than the 15th of January to the director on forms to be furnished by the department. Violation of this subsection is an infraction, punishable under RCW 77.15-160.

(6) A licensed game farm must be inspected annually. All inspection costs will be paid by the licensee. The inspection must occur during the months of June, July, or August.

An inspection form will be provided by the department and must be completed and signed by a licensed veterinarian or an agent authorized by the department. The inspection form must accompany the annual report and be submitted to the director no later than the 15th day of January.

(7) During June, July, or August, a licensed game farm must conduct annual avian influenza disease testing of ten percent or a maximum of thirty representative game birds on-site. Testing required under this subsection and subsection (8) of this section must be performed by a qualified testing agent approved by WDFW. Testing is not required for the year in which all birds on-site were transferred from a game farm that has complied with the testing requirements of this rule within one year of the transfer. Copies of testing records must be kept for one year. The licensee is responsible for all testing costs. Any test results indicating the presence of avian influenza disease must be reported immediately to the Washington state department of agriculture state veterinarian.

(8) If birds being held on the game farm exhibit symptoms of respiratory infection, diarrhea, central nervous system malfunction, or more than twenty-five percent flock mortality, licensed game farms must test for one or more of the following diseases as soon as possible upon the observation of symptoms: *Mycoplasma gallisepticum* and *Mycoplasma synoviae*, pullorum, salmonella, histomoniasis, and exotic Newcastle disease. The licensee is responsible for all testing costs.

(9) A game farm license is not required for captive-bred mink, *Mustela vison*, and captive-bred silver fox, *Vulpes fulva*, lawfully acquired from a licensed breeder or fur farm and held for fur farming purposes.

(10) A game farm license may be revoked and any future licenses may be denied by the director or director's designee if the department determines:

(a) Information contained in a game farm license application was inaccurate or false;

(b) The game farm licensee fails to comply with department statutes or rules.

(11) Revocation of a game farm license shall remain in effect until all issues pertaining to revocation are resolved.

(12) If the initial application or the application to renew a game farm license is denied or revoked, the department will provide the applicant, in writing, a notice containing a statement of the reason(s) for the denial or revocation.

(a) The applicant may request an appeal to contest the denial or revocation pursuant to chapter 34.05 RCW. The department must receive an appeal request in writing within twenty days from the mailing date of the notice of denial or revocation. Address appeal requests to WDFW Legal Services Office, P.O. Box 40100, Olympia WA 98504-0100.

(b) A notice contested by written appeal is final when that proceeding ends in a final order pursuant to chapter 34.05 RCW, or is otherwise dismissed.

(c) If there is no timely request for an appeal, then the department's denial or revocation of the permit is final and effective on the 21st calendar day following the mailing date of the notice of denial or revocation.

(13) A game farm license applicant who provides false or misleading information in their game farm license application may be subject to prosecution under RCW 9A.76.175 or

40.16.030. A game farm license holder who fails to comply with department statutes or rules as required by their game farm license may be subject to prosecution under RCW 77.15.340.

AMENDATORY SECTION (Amending WSR 17-05-112, filed 2/15/17, effective 3/18/17)

WAC 220-450-010 Criteria for planting aquatic plants and releasing wildlife. (1) Release by persons other than the director. It is unlawful for persons other than the director to plant aquatic plants or release any species, subspecies, or hybrids of animals which do not already exist in the wild in Washington. If such species, subspecies, or hybrid does already exist in the wild in Washington, it may be released within its established range by persons other than the director, but only after obtaining a permit from the director.

(a) Application for a permit must be made on a form provided by the department. It must be submitted at least thirty days prior to acquisition of the wildlife or aquatic plants intended for release or planting, and must provide all information indicated.

(b) Permits will only be issued if the director determines there will be no adverse impact on the wildlife or wildlife habitat of the state.

(c) Each permit shall require that at least thirty days prior to planting or release of wildlife or aquatic plants they must be made available for inspection by the director. It shall be the responsibility of the applicant to show that the wildlife will not pose a disease threat. If the director is not satisfied that the wildlife or aquatic plants do not pose a disease threat, they shall not be released or planted in the state. Director approval for release or planting may be withdrawn for cause.

(d) Each permit shall require that an applicant intending to release wildlife in the state shall report immediately to the director the outbreak of any disease among the wildlife intended to be released. If the director determines that such outbreak presents a threat to the wildlife of the state, the director may immediately order such action as necessary including quarantine or destruction of stock, sterilization of enclosures and facilities, cessation of activities, and disposal of wildlife in a manner satisfactory to the director.

(e) Each permit shall require that wildlife to be released shall not be branded, tattooed, tagged, fin clipped or otherwise marked for identification without approval of the director or as required in WAC 220-416-110.

(f) Legally acquired pheasant of the genus *Phasianus*; gray partridge of the genus *Perdix*; chukar of the genus *Alectoris*; quail of the genus *Callipepla* and *Colinus*; and mallards (*Anas platyrhynchos*) may be released without a permit for purposes of dog training, and hunting pursuant to WAC 220-416-110. Game birds of these species released for these purposes must be ~~((purchased from facilities that have))~~ acquired from a department facility, a state- or federally licensed game farm facility that has been inspected by a certified veterinarian within the past twelve months, or a facility with current National Poultry Improvement Plan certification. Rock doves and Eurasian collared doves may be released without a permit for purposes of bird dog training.

(2) Release by the director. The director may plant aquatic plants or release animal species, subspecies, or hybrids which have been planted or released previously in Washington if they do not pose a disease threat and if planting or release will not cause adverse impact on the wildlife or wildlife habitat of the state. Before releasing any species, subspecies, or hybrid of animal not already existing in the wild in Washington, the director shall report to the commission on the planned release, stating the basis for determining that the planned release fulfills the criteria set forth herein. The director may release nonnative species, subspecies, or hybrids not previously released in Washington only if the director in his or her sole discretion has determined that:

(a) There is no reasonable expectation of adverse impact on the wildlife or wildlife habitat of the state and there is an adequate plan for evaluating such impact following the release;

(b) The commission has classified the species, subspecies, or hybrids to be released pursuant to RCW 77.12.020;

(c) Suitable habitat is available;

(d) The nonnative species, subspecies, or hybrids to be released are free of exotic pathogens;

(e) The release serves the public interest.

(3) This section does not apply to release of classified or unclassified fish or shellfish by persons who have caught or taken the fish or shellfish, provided the fish or shellfish are released into the water or on the tidelands at the approximate location where taken, except that fishing contest participants may release fish at a contest-designated location in the same body of water from which the fish were taken.

WAC 246-272B-02000 Site review—Predesign report, soil characterization, and site inspection. (1) The owner proposing a new LOSS shall submit to the department:

(a) ~~((Two hard copies and one))~~ A copy, in electronic format acceptable to the department, of the predesign report that meets the requirements of WAC 246-272B-03000 ~~((and))~~ that is prepared, stamped, signed, and dated by a design engineer; and

(b) The base fee as established in ~~((chapter 246-272 WAC, Wastewater and reclaimed water use fees))~~ WAC 246-272-3000.

(2) After reviewing all submitted information, the department shall provide a written notice of determination to the owner.

(a) If the conceptual treatment design appears to be viable, the notice of determination must include an invoice for the inspection fee as established in ~~((chapter 246-272 WAC, Wastewater and reclaimed water use fees))~~ WAC 246-272-3000, and instructions to proceed to the site inspection.

(b) If the conceptual treatment design is not viable, the notice of determination must include an invoice for all unpaid fees, the reasons for the determination, and a statement that the department is discontinuing review of the project.

(3) Upon receiving the notice to proceed, the owner may proceed with the site inspection. To proceed, the owner shall:

(a) Schedule the site inspection with the department, design engineer and the person who prepared the soil logs if different than the design engineer; and

(b) Pay the inspection fee established in ~~((chapter 246-272 WAC, Wastewater and reclaimed water use fees))~~ WAC 246-272-3000.

(4) After receiving the fee, the department shall inspect the proposed LOSS site with the design engineer and the person who prepared the soil logs, if different than the design engineer, to:

(a) View test pits;

(b) Verify soil type and other predesign report information; and

(c) Determine if more information or changes are needed, including laboratory analysis of soil consistent with WAC 246-272B-03400.

(5) After reviewing all submitted information, the department shall provide a written notice of determination to the owner.

(a) If the department determines that the soil and site information is consistent with the conceptual treatment design, the notice of determination must include the maximum loading rate and instructions to proceed to the environmental review.

(b) If the department determines that the soil and site information is not consistent with the conceptual treatment design, the notice of determination must include an invoice for all unpaid fees, the reasons for the decision, and a statement that the department is discontinuing review of the project. Once the department discontinues review, the LOSS project ends. The department shall treat any future LOSS project submittals involving the same location as a new LOSS project subject to the requirements of subsection (1) of this section.

AMENDATORY SECTION (Amending WSR 11-12-035, filed 5/25/11, effective 7/1/11)

WAC 246-272B-02100 Engineering. (1) Upon receiving the department determination that the HGR contains sufficient information to determine the public health and environmental impacts of the LOSS and the LOSS is feasible, the owner may proceed with engineering. To proceed, the owner shall submit ~~((two hard copies and one))~~ a copy, in ~~((an))~~ the electronic format acceptable to the department, of ~~((an))~~ the engineering report that meets the requirements of WAC 246-272B-04000, and a draft O&M manual that meets the requirements of WAC 246-272B-04200 that are prepared, stamped, signed, and dated by a design engineer.

(2) After reviewing all submitted information, the department shall provide a written notice of determination to the owner.

(a) If the department approves the engineering report and draft O&M manual, the notice of determination must include instructions to proceed to plans and specifications.

(b) If the department does not approve the engineering report and draft O&M manual, the notice of determination must include an invoice for all unpaid fees, the reasons for the decision, and a statement that the department is discontinuing review of the project.

(3) Upon receiving the notice to proceed, the owner may proceed with plans and specifications. To proceed, the owner shall submit ~~((to the department three hard copies and one))~~ a copy, in ~~((an))~~ the electronic format acceptable to the department, of plans and specifications that meet the requirements of WAC 246-272B-04400 that are prepared, stamped, signed, and dated by a design engineer.

(4) After reviewing all submitted information, the department shall provide a written notice of determination to the owner.

(a) If the department approves the plans and specifications, the notice of determination must include an invoice for unpaid fees, a copy of the department-approved plans and

specifications, and instructions to submit a completed operating permit application.

(b) If the department does not approve the plans and specifications, the notice of determination must include an invoice for all unpaid fees and the reasons for the decision, and the department shall discontinue review of the project.

(5) If the department approves the plans and specifications, the department shall send a copy of the department-approved plans and specifications to the design engineer.

(6) The owner shall use department-approved plans and specifications for bidding and construction purposes.

WAC 246-272B-02550 LOSS modifications. (1) When a LOSS owner proposes a modification to the design, operation, or physical facilities, or when the department requires the owner to make such a modification, the owner shall consult with the department to determine the appropriate site review, environmental review, or engineering documents to prepare and submit.

(2) Based on consultation with the department, the owner proposing a LOSS modification shall submit to the department:

(a) ~~((Two hard copies and one))~~ A copy, in electronic format acceptable to the department, ~~((that meets the requirements of this chapter of one or more of the following documents))~~ of one or more of the following documents that meets the requirements of this chapter: Pre-design report, SRS, HGR, engineering report, management plan, O&M manual; or

(b) ~~((Three hard copies and one))~~ A copy, in electronic format acceptable to the department, of plans and specifications that meet the requirements of WAC 246-272B-04400; or

(c) Documents identified in subsection (2)(a) and (b) of this section; and

(d) The base fee as established in ~~((chapter 246-272 WAC, Wastewater and reclaimed water use fees))~~ WAC 246-272-3000.

(3) The owner and department shall follow the process for preparing, submitting, reviewing, and approving site review, environmental review, and engineering submittals consistent with WAC 246-272B-02000, 246-272B-02050, and 246-272B-02100.

(4) The department shall notify the owner in writing of its decision to approve or deny the proposal to repair, expand, or otherwise modify a LOSS.

(5) If the department approves the proposal to repair, expand, or otherwise modify a LOSS where the existing and proposed design flow is 14,500 gpd or less, the department shall issue a notice to construct after receiving all unpaid fees, and the owner shall comply with the requirements of Part 5 of this chapter.

(6) If the department approves the proposal to repair or otherwise modify a LOSS where the existing design flow is more than 14,500 gpd, the flow will not increase, and waste strength will not change, the department shall issue a notice

to construct after receiving all unpaid fees, and the owner shall comply with the requirements of Part 5 of this chapter.

(7) If the department approves the proposal to repair, expand, or otherwise modify a LOSS, the owner shall submit an operating permit application consistent with WAC 246-272B-02200, and provide public notice consistent with WAC 246-272B-02250 when:

(a) The proposed modification expands the design flow from 14,500 gpd or less to greater than 14,500 gpd; or

(b) The existing design flow is greater than 14,500 gpd and:

(i) The design flow increases; or

(ii) The waste strength characteristics change.

(8) If the proposal is denied, the notification must include the reasons for the denial.

(9) LOSS owners proposing modifications to the design, operation, or physical facilities identified in subsection (7) of this section shall follow applicable requirements of WAC 246-272B-02300 and 246-272B-02350.

(10) LOSS owners shall report any change in ownership or management entity to the department a minimum of thirty days prior to the change taking effect.

(11) Any new owner shall submit an application for a new operating permit, the permit fee, and a new management plan that meets the requirements of WAC 246-272B-04100 thirty days prior to assuming ownership.

(12) The department may approve or deny the change in ownership, notifying the owner of the decision in writing.

(a) If the department approves the change in ownership, it shall issue the new owner an operating permit within thirty days of receiving the new application and management plan.

(b) If the department denies the change in ownership, the notice of the decision must include the reasons for the decision.

(13) If the change in ownership is denied:

(a) The owner to whom the operating permit is issued may continue to operate the LOSS;

(b) The department may allow another person to operate the LOSS under a compliance agreement or order; or

(c) The department may direct the person operating the LOSS without a valid operating permit to discontinue operating the LOSS.

WAC 246-272B-04400 Plans and specifications. (1) Construction plans and specifications must be clear and detailed documents ~~((Hard copies must use a common engineering drawing size of 22 x 34 inches, 24 x 36 inches, or 11 x 17 inches))~~ and in an electronic format acceptable to the department.

(2) Plans must include the following:

(a) Design flow, treatment level, drainfield and tank sizing, and hydraulic loading rate;

(b) LOSS schematic or flow diagram;

(c) Hydraulic profile of the LOSS; and

(d) Plan and profile views as applicable of all LOSS components.

(3) Plan sets must be scaled to clearly show all necessary information and include the following:

(a) A title sheet, plan and profile sheets, and other information that outlines and details the LOSS facilities design:

(i) Title block indicating the project title, owner's name, date, seal and signature of the design engineer;

(ii) Index to individual sheets;

(iii) Vicinity map with project site location;

(iv) Master site plan showing facilities served and general system layout; and

(v) List of abbreviations, definitions, and symbols used within the plans.

(b) A general statement that all work must be in conformance with the requirements of this chapter and other design and technical standards specified by the design engineer.

(4) Plan sheets must be consecutively numbered and include, as appropriate:

(a) A north arrow;

(b) Description of scale in text and with a graphical bar;

(c) A descriptive title and date;

(d) Plan views;

(e) Section views;

(f) Profile views;

(g) Elevations;

(h) Easement and franchise locations and boundaries;

(i) Component details;

(j) General layout; and

(k) Supplemental views.

(5) Sewage tanks and other treatment component plans and specifications must:

(a) Show location, dimensions, and elevations of all treatment and pumping units;

(b) Include detailed plan and cross-section views with dimensions;

(c) Include installation details including placement depth and bedding materials, and connections to the tank to minimize settling impacts;

(d) Include a detailed standard plan, including any related electrical components, and installation requirements for tanks designed for individual lots;

(e) Specify tank capacity, baffling, filters, risers and other appurtenances, liquid volume, emergency, scum and sludge volumes, float switch or other control component settings;

(f) Identify manufacturer and model for prefabricated tanks; and

(g) Include a statement that:

(i) Any substitutions must be approved by the design engineer; and

(ii) All prefabricated tanks must meet the requirements of chapter 246-272C WAC(~~(On-site sewage system tanks)~~).

(6) Plans and specifications must include design and structural calculations and all necessary construction information for tanks constructed on-site.

(7) Plans and specifications for collection and transmission piping must specify:

(a) Pipe type, material and size;

(b) Pipe elevations;

(c) Depth from grade and slope if applicable;

(d) Installation details including placement depth and bedding materials;

(e) Location and detail for all cleanouts and other appurtenances;

(f) Horizontal setbacks from all other utility piping; and

(g) All water-sewer crossing detail and instructions.

(8) Plans for the drainfield component must:

(a) Use an appropriate scale of 1:50 or less;

(b) Show plan view of trenches or beds in relation to site topography, showing contours on maximum two-foot intervals;

(c) Show trench or bed:

(i) Length;

(ii) Separations;

(iii) Pipe size, materials, and configuration; and

(iv) Detail of orifice size, spacing and orientation.

(d) Show locations of numbered test pits and test wells, if any, in relation to primary and reserve drainfields; and

(e) Show trench or bed profile with width, depth, piping, cover and any features such as sand, gravel, geotextile, chambers.

(9) Plans for alarm systems must:

(a) Show location of panels and alarms; and

(b) Identify manufacturer and model number of panel.

(10) Plans for flow metering must show:

(a) Valve locations;

(b) Access boxes to grade; and

(c) Any special installation instructions.

(11) Plans must show all electrical components and include a statement that all components meet applicable state or federal codes.

(12) Plan notes must include quality assurance, inspection, and testing:

(a) Where appropriate, the installer shall provide documentation to the design engineer that sand or other media meets specifications;

(b) The design engineer or authorized representative shall inspect the work during construction;

(c) The design engineer shall schedule a final inspection and drainfield pressure test witnessed by the department prior to cover; and

(d) The installer shall call for a special inspection for the following type of work:

(i) Poured-in-place septic tanks and pump chambers and other special containment vessels;

(ii) Proprietary treatment or distribution components;

(iii) Any special excavation requirements;

(iv) Placement of select fill material or final elevation of fill;

(v) Testing of the pressure distribution network prior to final inspection;

(vi) Pressure testing of all piping; and

(vii) Water tightness testing of all tanks.

(13) All LOSS construction specifications must be in conformance with state or nationally recognized standards. Examples include, American Public Works Association standards, Ten States Standards, Department of Ecology's Criteria for Sewage Works Design, Department of Transportation's Standard Specifications for Road, Bridge, and Municipi-

pal Construction, and the department's recommended standards and guidance.

(14) Specifications must include all construction information not shown on the plans and necessary to inform the installer of the design requirements including, but not limited to:

- (a) The quality of materials;
- (b) Workmanship and fabrication of the project;
- (c) Type, size, strength, operating characteristics, and rating of equipment;
- (d) Allowable leakage for testing gravity sewer pipe;
- (e) Electrical apparatus and wiring components;
- (f) Meters;
- (g) Operating tools;
- (h) Construction materials;
- (i) Special filter or drainfield media other than native soil;
- (j) Other appurtenances;
- (k) Instructions for testing materials and equipment as needed to meet design standards; and
- (l) LOSS component and process testing to confirm functionality prior to department final inspection.

The following SSM provisions in chapter 173-400 WAC would take effect on the effective date of Environmental Protection Agency's (EPA) removal of WAC 173-400-107 from the Washington state implementation plan (SIP):

- Alternative opacity emission standards for:
 - Soot blowing and grate cleaning;
 - Startup and shutdown of hog fuel or wood-fired boiler with dry particulate matter controls; and
 - Furnace refractory curing.
- Excess emissions reporting, WAC 173-400-108.
- Unavoidable excess emissions, WAC 173-400-109.

The following provisions remain in effect until EPA removes WAC 173-400-107 from SIP:

- Unavoidable excess emissions, WAC 173-400-107; and
- Exemptions from opacity emission standards for soot blowing/grate cleaning and orchard heating.

Purpose: The amendments focused on the following statewide air quality rules that are enacted under RCW 70.94.395 to set requirements and standards for pulping mills and primary aluminum plants:

- Chapter 173-405 WAC, Kraft pulping mills;
- Chapter 173-410 WAC, Sulfite pulping mills; and
- Chapter 173-415 WAC, Primary aluminum plants.

The primary purpose of this revision is to align these three statewide rules with the general regulations for air pollution sources (chapter 173-400 WAC), the federal Clean Air Act (CAA), and EPA SSM policy.

CAA and EPA's SSM policy require emission standards to apply continuously without automatic or discretionary exemptions, even during periods of SSM. Contrary to CAA requirements and EPA SSM policy, chapter 173-400 WAC exempted or allowed a source to avoid an enforcement action for exceedances of emission standards during periods of startup, shutdown, and scheduled maintenance (80 F.R. 33840). EPA determined WAC 173-400-107 had overly broad enforcement discretion that potentially barred enforcement action by EPA and citizens in federal courts (80 F.R. 33840). On August 16, 2018, ecology adopted amendments to chapter 173-400 WAC to correct EPA-identified deficiencies, and meet CAA requirements and SSM policy that allow comprehensive enforcement of applicable requirements.

This rule making harmonizes chapters 173-405, 173-410, and 173-415 WAC with chapter 173-400 WAC through adoption by reference of SSM related provisions to:

- Remove impermissible provisions that shield sources from civil penalties for excess emissions during startup, shutdown, and scheduled maintenance.
- Establish alternative emission standards for soot-blowing and grate cleaning, refractory curing, and startup and shutdown of hog-fuel boilers with dry particulate controls.
- Outline the process for establishing facility-specific alternative emission limits for specific short-term operation modes like SSM that exceed the otherwise applicable emission standards in SIP.
- Simplify the excess emission notification and reporting requirements.

We also made other amendments that include:

- Extending the time allowed for submission of source testing reports to sixty days instead of fifteen days for pulping mills and thirty days for primary aluminum plants. We did this to provide a more realistic time frame to complete and submit a source test report to ecology.
- Deleting provisions that are outdated and not applicable to facilities covered by these rules.
- Correcting typos and citations, and clarifying rule language without changing the intent of the rules.

Changes Other than Editing from Proposed to Adopted Version: **WAC 173-415-030 Emission standards:** After considering the public comments on the proposed rule, ecology decided not to adopt the amendments in WAC 173-415-030(7) that are related to performance testing frequency for secondary total fluoride emissions from potlines of primary aluminum plants. We decided this in order to achieve the primary purpose of this rule making within our established timeline. The primary purpose of this rule making is to align the three rules with the new SSM requirements adopted in chapter 173-400 WAC, CAA and EPA's SSM policy. Ecology will continue to evaluate the options to address fluoride emissions monitoring frequency in a future action, in a manner that protects human health and the environment and meets the needs of the stakeholders.

For the purposes of this regulation "kraft mill" is equivalent to "source."

((2)) (3) "Noncondensibles" means gases and vapors from the digestion and evaporation processes of a mill that

are not condensed with the equipment used in those processes.

~~((3))~~ (4) "Recovery furnace stack" means the stack from which the products of combustion from the recovery furnace are emitted to the ambient air.

WAC 173-405-040 Emission standards. In addition to the general applicability of chapters 173-400 and 173-490 WAC to all emission sources; no kraft pulp mill shall cause or permit air contaminant emissions in excess of the limits listed below. Specific emission standards listed in this chapter will take precedence over the general emission standards of chapter 173-400 WAC.

(1) Recovery furnaces.

(a) The particulate emissions from each recovery furnace stack shall not exceed 0.23 grams of particulate per dry cubic meter at standard conditions (0.10 grains/dscf) corrected to eight percent oxygen averaged over three one hour tests.

(b) The TRS emissions from each recovery furnace stack constructed before January 1, 1970, and for recovery furnaces that have direct contact evaporators, shall not exceed 17.5 ppm corrected to eight percent oxygen for a daily average.

(c) The TRS emissions from each recovery furnace constructed after January 1, 1970, which does not have a contact evaporator, shall not exceed 5.0 ppm corrected to eight percent oxygen for a daily average.

(2) Smelt dissolver tank vent. The particulate emissions from smelt dissolver tank vents shall not exceed 0.15 grams per kilogram (0.30 pounds per ton) of solids fired at the associated recovery furnace.

(3) Lime kilns.

(a) The particulate emission from each lime kiln stack shall not exceed 0.30 grams of particulate per dry cubic meter (0.13 grains/dscf) at standard conditions corrected to ten percent oxygen.

(b) The TRS emissions from any lime kiln stack shall not exceed eighty ppm expressed as hydrogen sulfide for more than two consecutive hours in any one day.

(c) The average daily emission of TRS from any lime kiln stack shall not exceed fifty ppm. After January 1, 1985, TRS emissions from each lime kiln stack shall not exceed twenty ppm corrected to ten percent oxygen for a daily average.

(4) Other TRS emissions units.

(a) Noncondensibles from digesters, multiple-effect evaporators and condensate stripper system shall ~~((at all times))~~ be treated to reduce the emissions of TRS equal to the reduction achieved by thermal oxidation in a lime kiln.

(b) A backup treatment system or equivalent approved by ecology must be installed to assure continual treatment of noncondensibles.

(5) Other particulate emissions units. The emission of particulates from emissions units other than kraft recovery furnaces, lime kilns, or smelt dissolving tank vents, shall not exceed the following maximums:

(a) 0.46 grams per dry cubic meter at standard conditions (0.2 grains/dscf) corrected to seven percent oxygen, for units which combust wood and wood residue to produce steam and which commenced construction prior to January 1, 1983.

(b) 0.12 grams per dry cubic meter at standard conditions (0.05 grains/dscf) corrected to seven percent oxygen, for units which combust fuel other than wood and wood residue to produce steam, and which commenced construction after January 1, 1983.

(c) 0.23 grams per dry cubic meter at standard conditions (0.1 grains/dscf) corrected to seven percent oxygen in the case of combustion units, for units not classified under (a) or (b) of this subsection.

(6) Opacity.

(a) No person shall cause or allow the emission of a plume from any kraft recovery furnace, smelt dissolver tank, or lime kiln, which has an average opacity greater than thirty-five percent for more than six consecutive minutes in any sixty minute period, except as described in WAC 173-405-040(7).

(b) No person shall cause or allow the emission of a plume, from any emissions unit other than a kraft recovery furnace, smelt dissolver tank, or lime kiln, which has an average opacity greater than twenty percent for more than six consecutive minutes in any sixty minute period ~~((, except that these provisions do not apply when the emissions occur due to soot blowing/grate cleaning and the operator can demonstrate that the emissions will not exceed twenty percent opacity for more than fifteen minutes in any eight consecutive hours. The intent of this provision is to permit soot blowing and grate cleaning necessary to the operation of the boiler facility. This practice, except for testing and trouble shooting, is to be scheduled for the same approximate times each day and ecology shall be advised of the schedule)).~~ The emissions unit shall comply with the alternative visible emission standard for:

(i) Soot blowing or grate cleaning in WAC 173-400-040 (2)(a);

(ii) Hog fuel or wood fired boiler in operation before January 24, 2018, in WAC 173-400-040 (2)(c); and/or

(iii) Furnace refractory in WAC 173-400-040 (2)(f).

(c) There shall be no more than one violation notice issued in any sixty minute period.

(d) These provisions (of WAC 173-405-040(6)) shall not apply when the presence of uncombined water is the only reason for the opacity of the plume to exceed the applicable maximum.

For the purposes of this regulation "sulfite pulping mill" is equivalent to "source."

(d) Emissions from the recovery system and acid plant shall not exceed 800 ppm of sulfur dioxide for any hourly average.

(e) Emissions from recovery systems constructed after January 24, 1972, shall not exceed 300 ppm of sulfur dioxide for any hourly average.

(f) Emissions from any emissions unit, other than a recovery system, a blow system or an acid plant, shall not exceed 1000 ppm of sulfur dioxide, corrected to seven percent oxygen in the case of combustion unit, for any hourly average.

(2) Particulate.

(a) Emissions of particulate from recovery systems constructed before January 24, 1972, shall not exceed 0.23 grams per dry cubic meter of exhaust at standard conditions (0.10 grains/dscf) corrected to eight percent oxygen.

(b) Emissions of particulate matter from recovery systems constructed after January 24, 1972, shall not exceed 0.14 grams per dry cubic meter of exhaust at standard conditions (0.06 grains/dscf) corrected to eight percent oxygen.

(c) The emission of particulates from emissions units other than acid plants or recovery systems shall not exceed the following maximums:

(i) 0.46 grams per dry cubic meter at standard conditions (0.2 grains/dscf) corrected to seven percent oxygen, for units which combust wood and wood residue to produce steam and which commenced construction prior to January 1, 1983.

(ii) 0.12 grams per dry cubic meter at standard conditions (0.05 grains/dscf) corrected to seven percent oxygen, for units which combust fuel other than wood and wood residue to produce steam, and which commenced construction after January 1, 1983.

(iii) 0.23 grams per dry cubic meter at standard conditions (0.1 grains/dscf) corrected to seven percent oxygen in the case of combustion units, for units not classified under (c) (i) or (ii) of this subsection.

(3) Opacity.

(a) No person shall cause or allow the emission of a plume from a recovery system or acid plant which has an average opacity greater than thirty-five percent, for more than six consecutive minutes in any sixty minute period, ~~(except as allowed per RCW 70.94.331 (2)(e))~~.

(b) Visible emissions from units other than acid plants or recovery systems shall comply with WAC 173-400-040(2), except when an alternative opacity limit established under WAC 173-400-081 or 173-400-082 is applicable.

(4) Operation and maintenance. At all times, including periods of abnormal operations and upset conditions, owners and operators shall, to the extent practicable, maintain and operate any affected facility, including associated air pollution control equipment, in a manner consistent with good air pollution control practice. Determination of whether acceptable operating and maintenance procedures are being used will be based on information available to ecology which may include, but is not limited to, monitoring results, opacity observations, review of operating and maintenance procedures, and inspection of the source.

(5) No recovery system shall emit total reduced sulfur (TRS) gases in excess of 17.5 ppm for a daily average.

(6) More restrictive limits. Ecology may set more restrictive emissions limits than the specific limits set in this chapter (after public involvement and hearing), if there is reason to believe that the emission(s) from a source is a cause of public nuisance or a cause of violation of ambient air quality standards. The source shall, within ninety days from notification of the more restrictive limits, achieve operation that will prevent further recurrence of the nuisance or violation.

(7) Source testing. To demonstrate compliance with this chapter, the provisions of WAC 173-400-105 shall apply to all sources to which this chapter is applicable.

(8) Alternative emission limitation. An owner or operator may request an alternative emission limitation (as defined in WAC 173-400-030) under:

(a) WAC 173-400-081 for an action covered under a notice of construction application; or

(b) WAC 173-400-082 for a permit modification.

(b) Daily average concentration of sulfur dioxide.

(c) The date, time and concentration for each sulfur dioxide emission violation and the total number of hours that exceed the standard.

(d) The results of particulate tests conducted during the month.

(2) For the blow system:

(a) The grams of sulfur dioxide per minute, on a fifteen minute average, per kilogram of air dried, unbleached pulp discharged from the digester.

(b) The average daily production of air dried, unbleached pulp.

(3) Each mill shall furnish, upon request of ecology, such other pertinent data required to evaluate the mill's emission control program.

(4) All measurements shall be made in accordance with WAC 173-400-105.

(5) Each mill shall be required to establish a program approved by ecology for continuous opacity monitoring to demonstrate compliance with WAC 173-410-040(3) and to report the results to ecology in a format and on a schedule set by regulatory order. If equipment for continuous monitoring of opacity is not available, continuous monitoring of operating parameters may be required as an alternate until continuous opacity monitoring equipment is available.

WAC 173-415-020 Definitions. The definitions of terms contained in chapter 173-400 WAC are incorporated into this chapter by reference. Unless a different meaning is clearly required by context, the following words and phrases as used in this chapter((:)) shall have the following meanings:

(1) "Ecology" means the department of ecology.

(2) "Potline" means a single discreet group of electrolytic reduction cells connected in series, in which alumina is reduced to form aluminum.

((2)) (3) "Primary aluminum reduction plant" means any facility manufacturing aluminum by electrolytic reduction. The primary aluminum reduction plant includes the following processes and their emission control systems: Pitch storage tanks, paste production plant, anode bake furnaces and potlines. For the purposes of this regulation, "primary aluminum reduction plant" is equivalent to "source."

((3)) (4) "Primary emission control system" means the equipment used to capture and remove the gases and particulate matter evacuated directly from the reduction cell ((and the emission control device(s) used to remove pollutants)) prior to discharge of the cleaned gas to the atmosphere((-A roof scrubber is not part of the primary control system)).

~~((4))~~ (5) "Secondary emission control system" means the equipment used to collect and treat the gases and particulate matter that escape from the reduction cells into the potroom prior to discharge of the cleaned gas to the atmosphere. Roof scrubbers are part of the secondary emission control system.

(6) "Total fluorides (TF)" means elemental fluorine and all fluoride compounds as measured by Methods 13A, 13B or 14A in 40 C.F.R. Part 60 Appendix A or by an EPA approved alternative method.

WAC 173-415-030 Emission standards. (1) Fluoride.

(a) The emission of total fluorides from a primary aluminum reduction plant shall meet the ~~((MACT))~~ requirements ~~((specified))~~ in 40 C.F.R. 63 Subpart LL.

(b) In addition to meeting the requirements in (a) of this subsection, the emission of fluorides from a primary aluminum reduction plant shall meet the requirements in chapter 173-481 WAC.

(c) ~~If ((the department))~~ ecology has reason to believe that adverse fluoride impacts are occurring ~~((in violation of chapter 173-481 WAC))~~, a primary aluminum reduction plant must establish, in response to a request from ~~((the department))~~ ecology, an ambient air and/or forage monitoring program approved by ~~((the department))~~ ecology as required by WAC 173-481-150.

(2) Particulate. Facilities shall reduce the total emission of particulate matter to the atmosphere from the reduction process (potlines) ~~((shall be reduced))~~ to the lowest level consistent with reasonably available control technology (RACT) for primary aluminum reduction plants. The emission of solid particulate shall not exceed 7.5 grams per kilogram (fifteen pounds per ton) of aluminum produced on a daily basis. Facilities shall calculate aluminum produced ~~((shall be calculated by))~~ using the method in 40 C.F.R. 63.847 (e)(6) used ~~((to determine))~~ for determining aluminum production rate ~~((in 40 C.F.R. 63.847 (e)(6)))~~.

(3) Visible emissions. Visible emissions from any emissions unit in a primary aluminum reduction plant shall not exceed an average twenty percent opacity for more than six consecutive minutes in any sixty-minute period. This provision shall not apply:

(a) When the presence of uncombined water is the only reason for the opacity of the plume to exceed twenty percent; or

(b) When an alternate opacity limit has been established under ~~((RCW 70.94.331 (2)(e)))~~ WAC 173-400-040, 173-400-081, or 173-400-082.

(4) Fugitive emissions. Each primary aluminum reduction plant shall use RACT to prevent fugitive emissions. Fugitive dust is included in fugitive emissions.

(5) Sulfur dioxide.

(a) Total emissions of sulfur dioxide from all emissions units shall not exceed thirty grams of sulfur dioxide per kilogram of aluminum produced on a monthly average (sixty pounds per ton). ~~((Those primary aluminum plants which were in excess of the above sulfur dioxide limit on January 1,~~

~~1978, will be allowed to emit at the January 1, 1978, level of emissions provided that the owners or operators did demonstrate to ecology by July 1, 1981, by use of modeling and ambient measurements, that the emissions will not cause the ambient standard to be exceeded, and that the limits are placed in a regulatory order(s-))~~

(b) In no case shall any plant cause or permit the emission of a gas containing sulfur dioxide in excess of one thousand parts per million corrected to dry standard conditions for an hourly average.

(6) Operation and maintenance (O&M). At all times, including periods of abnormal operation and upset conditions, owners and operators shall, to the extent practicable, maintain and operate an affected facility, including associated air pollution control equipment, in a manner consistent with good air pollution control practice. Determination of whether acceptable operating and maintenance procedures are being used will be based on information available to ecology, which may include, but is not limited to, monitoring results, opacity observations, review of operating and maintenance procedures, and inspection of the source. The means for demonstrating ongoing compliance with good O&M may include, but not be limited to: More frequent source testing, prescriptive procedures or inspections, control values for emissions at values less than the applicable regulatory requirements and that function as an investigative trigger rather than as a limit, collection and efficiency requirements, or the use of CEMs.

(7) Source testing. To demonstrate compliance with this chapter, the testing provisions of chapters 173-400, 173-481 WAC and ~~((MACT))~~ the requirements ~~((as specified))~~ in 40 C.F.R. Part 63, Subpart LL shall be ~~((used as))~~ applicable.

(8) Alternative emission limitation. An owner or operator may request an alternative emission limitation (as defined in WAC 173-400-030) under:

(a) WAC 173-400-081 for an action covered under a notice of construction application; or

(b) WAC 173-400-082 for a permit modification.

WAC 173-415-060 Monitoring and reporting. (1)

When requested by ~~((the department))~~ ecology, each primary aluminum reduction plant shall conduct routine monitoring of emissions, ambient air, and forage in accordance with a program that has been approved by ~~((the department of))~~ ecology. Facilities shall report results of monitoring ~~((shall be reported))~~ monthly within thirty days of the end of each calendar month. Facilities shall submit source testing results within sixty days of completion of each source testing. In addition to the information required by ~~((the Primary Aluminum MACT,))~~ 40 C.F.R. Part 63, Subpart LL and chapter 173-481 WAC, the approved program shall include data as follows:

(a) Particulate emissions:

(i) Results of all emission sampling conducted during the month for particulates, shall be expressed in units used in the applicable requirements or in units specified in the monitoring plan. ~~((The method of calculating))~~

(ii) Facilities shall determine particulate emissions in units of pounds per ton ((shall be as)) using the methods specified in the approved monitoring programs.

(iii) For each potline, facilities shall report particulate data ((shall be reported)) as total particulates and percentage of fluoride ion contained therein. For other units at a primary aluminum reduction plant, facilities shall report particulate data ((shall be reported)) as total particulates.

(iv) Compliance with WAC 173-415-030(2) shall be determined by measurements of emissions from the potline primary emission control system plus measurements of emissions from the potline ((roof)) secondary emission control system.

(b) Fluoride emissions: Facilities shall report results of all sampling conducted during the month for fluoride emissions ((shall be reported)) in pounds of total fluoride per ton of aluminum produced. Facilities shall calculate aluminum produced ((shall be calculated by)) using the method ((used to determine)) for determining aluminum production rate in 40 C.F.R. 63.847 (e)(6).

(c) Other emission and ambient air data as specified in the approved monitoring program.

(2) Other data: Each primary aluminum reduction plant shall furnish other data requested by ((the department of)) ecology to evaluate a plant's emission control program.

(3) Change in raw materials or fuel: Any change or series of changes in raw material or fuel which results in a cumulative increase in emissions of sulfur dioxide of five hundred tons per year or more over that stated in the 1979 emissions inventory shall require the submittal of sufficient information to ((the department of)) ecology so that the effect upon ambient concentrations of sulfur dioxide can be determined. ((The department of)) Ecology may issue regulatory orders requiring controls to reduce the effect of such increases.

NEW SECTION

WAC 173-415-075 Excess emissions. The applicable provisions of WAC 173-400-107, or 173-400-108 and 173-400-109 shall apply to all sources to which this chapter is applicable.

WAC 458-20-263 Exemptions from retail sales and use taxes for qualifying electric generating systems using renewable energy sources. RCW 82.08.962 and 82.12.962 provide exemptions from the "retail sales tax" described in chapter 82.08 RCW and the "use tax" described in chapter 82.12 RCW paid with respect to the sale or use of machinery and equipment used directly in generating electricity using qualified renewable energy sources. This rule explains how these exemptions apply and is divided into three parts as follows:

PART 1: Exemptions as Applied to Qualified Solar Systems;

PART 2: Exemptions as Applied to Qualified Nonsolar Renewable Energy Systems; and

PART 3: General Provisions.

PART 1

Exemptions as Applied to Qualified Solar Systems

(101) **Solar systems that generate ~~((one kilowatt or))~~ more than 500 kilowatts.**

(a) **Partial exemptions.** RCW 82.08.962 and 82.12.962 provide an exemption, in the form of a remittance (refund) from the department, equal to seventy-five percent of the retail sales and use taxes paid with respect to the sale or use of machinery and equipment used directly in solar energy systems capable of generating ~~((at least 1000 watts (one kilowatt)))~~ more than 500 kilowatts of electricity. The exemption also applies to amounts paid for labor and services rendered in respect to installing such machinery and equipment. The nameplate DC power rating of a system, which is an industry standard, is used to determine whether the solar energy system is capable of generating ~~((1000 watts (one kilowatt) or))~~ more than 500 kilowatts of electricity. The buyer must pay the total amount of the retail sales or use taxes due with the respect to the sale or use of the qualifying machinery, equipment, and labor charges to install the same. The buyer may then apply to the department for a refund of seventy-five percent of the state and local retail sales and use taxes paid. This

partial exemption is effective beginning July 1, 2011, and expires January 1, 2020.

(b) **Required annual tax performance report.** Beginning January 1, 2018, buyers applying for a refund must complete and submit an annual tax performance report. The annual tax performance report must be filed with the department by May 31st of the year immediately following the year for which the refund is claimed. For more information see Part 3, subsection (301)(c) of this rule.

(102)(a) Solar systems that generate at least one kilowatt and no more than 500 kilowatts.

(b) Partial exemptions. RCW 82.08.962 and 82.12.962 provide an exemption, in the form of a remittance (refund) from the department, equal to seventy-five percent of the retail sales and use taxes paid with respect to the sale or use of machinery and equipment used directly in solar energy systems capable of generating at least one kilowatt and no more than 500 kilowatts of electricity. The exemption also applies to amounts paid for labor and services rendered in respect to installing such machinery and equipment. The nameplate DC power rating of a system, which is an industry standard, is used to determine whether the solar energy system is capable of generating at least one kilowatt and no more than 500 kilowatts of electricity. The buyer must pay the total amount of the retail sales or use taxes due with the respect to the sale or use of the qualifying machinery, equipment, and labor charges to install the same. The buyer may then apply to the department for a refund of seventy-five percent of the state and local retail sales and use taxes paid. This partial exemption is effective beginning July 1, 2011, and expired September 30, 2017.

PART 2

Exemptions as Applied to Qualified Nonsolar Renewable Energy Systems

(201) **Qualified nonsolar renewable energy systems generating one kilowatt or more.**

(a) **Partial exemptions.** RCW 82.08.962 and 82.12.962 provide an exemption equal to seventy-five percent of the retail sales and use taxes paid with respect to the sale or use of machinery and equipment used directly in a renewable energy system employing a qualified power source that generates at least 1000 watts (one kilowatt) or more of electricity. This exemption also applies to amounts paid for labor and services rendered in respect to installing such machinery and equipment. The buyer is eligible for the exemption in the form of a remittance (refund) from the department and must have paid to the seller or to the department the total amount of retail sales or use taxes due with respect to the sale or use of the machinery, equipment, and labor charges to install the same. To claim the exemption, the buyer must apply to the department for a refund. See Part 3, subsection (301) of this rule for instructions on how to file a claim for refund. This partial exemption is effective beginning July 1, 2011, and expires January 1, 2020.

(b) **Refund procedure.** Beginning July 1, 2011, the buyer is eligible for the exemption in the form of a remittance (refund) from the department. The buyer must pay the total amount of the retail sales or use taxes due with the respect to the sale or use of qualifying machinery or equipment and

labor charges to install the same. The buyer may then apply to the department for a refund of seventy-five percent of the state and local retail sales and use taxes paid. These exemptions expire on January 1, 2020.

(c) **Required tax performance report.** Beginning January 1, 2018, buyers applying for a refund must complete and submit an annual tax performance report. The annual tax performance report must be filed with the department by May 31st of the year immediately following the year for which the refund is claimed. For more information see Part 3, subsection (301)(c) of this rule.

(202) **Qualified power sources.** The partial exemption permitted under Part 2, subsection (201)(a) of this rule applies only with respect to a renewable energy system that employs one of the following qualified power sources:

- Fuel cells;
- Wind;
- Biomass energy;
- Tidal or wave energy;
- Geothermal resources; and
- Technology that converts otherwise lost energy from exhaust.

(203) **Definitions for these power sources.** For purposes of Part 2 of this rule, the terms below are defined as or include within their definition the following:

(a) **Biomass energy.** "Biomass energy" includes:

- (i) By-products of pulping and wood manufacturing processes;
- (ii) Animal waste;
- (iii) Solid organic fuels from wood;
- (iv) Forest or field residues;
- (v) Wooden demolition or construction debris;
- (vi) Food waste;
- (vii) Liquors derived from algae and other sources;
- (viii) Dedicated energy crops;
- (ix) Biosolids; and
- (x) Yard waste.

"Biomass energy" does not include wood pieces that have been treated with chemical preservatives such as creosote, pentachlorophenol, or copper-chrome-arsenic; wood from old growth forests; or municipal solid waste.

(b) **Fuel cell.** "Fuel cell" means an electrochemical reaction that generates electricity by combining atoms of hydrogen and oxygen in the presence of a catalyst.

PART 3

General Provisions

(301) **Requirements for a refund from the department of taxes paid, referred to as the seventy-five percent remittance.**

(a) **Required application.** This exemption, in the form of a remittance (refund) from the department, equals seventy-five percent of the retail sales and use taxes paid with respect to the sale or use of the qualifying machinery and equipment. The form that the buyer must submit to the department is the *Application for Sales Tax Refund on Purchases & Installation of Qualified Renewable Energy Equipment*. This form is available through the department's web site at dor.wa.gov under *Get a form or publication*. The application must be

completed in full and mailed to the address provided on the form.

(b) **Required records.** The purchaser must provide records that will allow the department to determine whether the purchaser is entitled to a refund. The records include:

- Invoices;
- Proof of tax paid;
- Documents describing the machinery and equipment; and
- Electrical capacity of the system.

(c) **File annual tax performance report.** Effective January 1, 2018, any person claiming a seventy-five percent refund must electronically file an annual tax performance report with the department each year. This applies to buyers of solar systems generating electricity of more than ten kilowatts and other qualified renewable energy systems generating electricity of one kilowatt or more.

(d) **Separate tax performance report for each system.** The buyer must file a separate tax performance report for each system owned or operated in Washington. The annual tax performance report is due by May 31st of the year immediately following the year for which the exemption is claimed. (Systems installed in 2017 require a tax performance report to be completed by May 31, 2018.)

(e) **Limitation on frequency for claiming exemption.** A buyer may not apply to the department for a remittance (refund) more frequently than once per quarter.

(f) **Qualified retail sales and use taxes.** These exemptions apply to both state and local retail sales and use taxes.

(302) **What is "machinery and equipment"?** For purposes of RCW 82.08.962 and 82.12.962, "machinery and equipment" means fixtures, devices, and support facilities that are integral and necessary to the generation of electricity from qualifying sources of power.

A "support facility" is a part of a building, structure, or improvement used to contain or steady a fixture or device. A support facility must be specially designed and necessary for the proper functioning of the fixture or device and must perform a function beyond being a building, structure, or improvement. It must have a function relative to a fixture or a device. To determine if some portion of a building is a support facility, the department examines those parts of the building. For example, a highly specialized structure, like a vibration reduction slab under generators in a landfill gas generating facility, is a support facility. Without the slab, the generators would not function properly. The ceiling and walls of the building housing the generator are not support facilities if they only serve to define the space and do not have a function relative to a fixture or a device.

"Machinery and equipment" does not include:

- (a) The utility grid system;
- (b) Hand-powered tools;
- (c) Property with a useful life of less than one year;
- (d) Repair parts required to restore machinery and equipment to normal working order;

(e) Replacement parts that do not increase productivity, improve efficiency, or extend the useful life of the machinery and equipment;

(f) Buildings; or

(g) Building fixtures that:

(i) Are permanently affixed to and become a physical part of a building; but

(ii) Are not integral and necessary to the generation of electricity.

(303) When is machinery and equipment "used directly" in generating electricity? Machinery and equipment is used directly to generate electricity when it is used to:

(a) Capture the energy of the qualifying source of power;

(b) Convert that energy to electricity; and

(c) Store, transform, or transmit that electricity for entry into or operation in parallel with electric transmission and distribution systems.

(304) Examples of qualifying machinery and equipment. This section provides examples of machinery and equipment that may be used directly in generating electricity and could qualify for the exemptions from retail sales and use taxes. This list is illustrative only and is not intended to provide an exhaustive list of possible qualifying machinery and equipment.

(a) **Solar.** Where solar energy is the principal source of power: Solar modules; inverters; Stirling converters; power conditioning equipment; batteries; transformers; power poles; power lines; and connectors to the utility grid system or point of use.

(b) **Wind.** Where wind is the principal source of power: Turbines; blades; generators; towers and tower pads; substations; guy wires and ground stays; power conditioning equipment; anemometers; recording meters; transmitters; power poles; power lines; and connectors to the utility grid system or point of use.

(c) **Fuel cells.** Where fuel cells are the principal source of power: Fuel cell assemblies; fuel storage and delivery systems; power inverters; transmitters; transformers; power poles; power lines; and connectors to the utility grid system or point of use.

(305) Installation charges. The exemptions from retail sales and use taxes addressed in this rule apply to installation charges for qualifying machinery and equipment, including charges for labor and services. There are no exemptions from retail sales and use taxes for:

(a) Charges for labor and services rendered in respect to constructing buildings or access roads that may be necessary to install or use qualifying machinery and equipment;

(b) Tangible personal property, such as a crane or forklift, purchased or rented by the buyer, the contractor, or the installer to be used to install qualifying machinery and equipment; or

(c) Services that were included in the construction contract for design, planning, studies, project management, or other charges not directly related to the actual labor for installing the qualifying machinery and equipment.

Other conditions may be considered at a later date based on labor and industries' review of the available scientific and clinical evidence.

WAC 296-20-01505 Provider types and services not covered. The department will not pay for services performed by the following practitioners:

((Acupuncturists))

Herbalists

Christian Science practitioners or theological healers

Certified surgical technicians

Certified surgical assistants

Any other licensed or unlicensed practitioners not otherwise specifically provided for by the department.

AMENDATORY SECTION (Amending WSR 12-12-059, filed 6/5/12, effective 7/6/12)

WAC 296-20-03002 Treatment not authorized. The department or self-insurer will not allow nor pay for following treatment:

(1) Use of diapulse, thermatic (standard model only), spectrowave and superpulse machines on workers entitled to benefits under the Industrial Insurance Act.

(2) Iontophoresis; prolotherapy; ((acupuncture;)) injections of colchicine; injections of fibrosing or sclerosing agents; and injections of substances other than anesthetic or contrast into the subarachnoid space (intra-theal injections).

(3) Treatment to improve or maintain general health (i.e., prescriptions and/or injection of vitamins or referrals to special programs such as health spas, swim programs, exercise programs, athletic-fitness clubs, diet programs, social counseling).

(4) Continued treatment beyond stabilization of the industrial condition(s), i.e., maintenance care, except where necessary to monitor prescription of medication necessary to maintain stabilization i.e., anti-convulsive, anti-spasmodic, etc.

(5) After consultation and advice to the department or self-insurer, any treatment measure deemed to be dangerous or inappropriate for the injured worker in question.

(6) Treatment measures of an unusual, controversial, obsolete, or experimental nature (see WAC 296-20-045). Under certain conditions, treatment in this category may be approved by the department or self-insurer. Approval must be obtained prior to treatment. Requests must contain a description of the treatment, reason for the request with benefits and results expected.

(7) Therapeutic medial branch block injections, therapeutic intradiscal injections, and therapeutic facet injections of the spine.

(8) Transcutaneous, interferential, and percutaneous nerve stimulators used in the home setting, and all associated supplies and equipment.

NEW SECTION

WAC 296-23-238 Acupuncture rules. (1) The department or self-insurer may pay for acupuncture treatment when

ordered by the worker's attending provider or physician assistant and only for specific conditions related to the accepted condition on a claim and per department policy.

(2) For the purposes of this section, "acupuncture" is the insertion of needles or lancets, with or without electrical stimulation, to directly or indirectly stimulate acupuncture points and meridians.

(3) The department may amend the list of covered conditions for acupuncture treatment as documented in the medical coverage decision on acupuncture.

(4) Acupuncture services may be administered by a provider acting within the scope of their licensure.

(5) The department or self-insurer will pay for a maximum of one acupuncture treatment per day for not more than ten visits per worker's compensation claim.

(6) The acupuncture provider must submit documentation of functional status to the attending provider and the department or the self-insurer at baseline, at the middle visit and following the end of treatment or ten visits, whichever comes first. Providers must use validated instruments per department policy to track and document the worker's pain and functional status during the course of acupuncture treatment.

(7) The department or self-insurer may review the quality of acupuncture services provided to workers.

(8) Providers should refer to WAC 296-20-01002 for the definition of "proper and necessary treatment." See WAC 296-20-010 for general information and WAC 296-20-125 for billing procedures.

(9) Billing codes, reimbursement levels and payment policies for acupuncture are listed in the department's *Medical Aid Rules and Fee Schedules*.

The WSLCB will provide the required notices, or licensees may design their own notices as long as they are legible and contain the required language.

(2) Signs provided by the WSLCB)) All licensed marijuana processors, producers, and retailers, with the exception of licensed retailers with a medical marijuana endorsement, must conspicuously post a notice provided by the board about persons under twenty-one years of age at each entry to all licensed premises. The notice must contain all of the following language: "Persons under twenty-one years of age not permitted on these premises."

(2) All licensed retailers with a medical marijuana endorsement must conspicuously post a notice provided by the board regarding persons under twenty-one years of age at each entry to all licensed medical marijuana premises. The notice must contain all of the following language: "Persons under twenty-one years of age not permitted on these premises without a valid qualifying patient card. Qualifying patients under the age of eighteen must be accompanied by their designated provider at all times."

(3) All licensed marijuana retailers must conspicuously post a sign provided by the board regarding the use of marijuana during pregnancy and breastfeeding as follows:

- (a) At each point of sale; and
- (b) In a location easily visible to employees.

(4) All licensed marijuana retailers must conspicuously post a notice provided by the board prohibiting the opening of a package of marijuana or marijuana-infused product in public or consumption of marijuana or marijuana-infused products in public(;;). The notice must be posted ((as follows:

Type of premises	Required location of sign
Marijuana retail	Posted in plain view at the main entrance to the establishment.

(3) The premises' current and valid master license with appropriate endorsements must be conspicuously posted on the premises and available for)) in plain view at the main entrance of the marijuana retail establishment.

AMENDATORY SECTION (Amending WSR 18-21-034, filed 10/8/18, effective 11/8/18)

WAC 4-30-062 ((How do I apply)) Applying to take the CPA examination((?)). (1) **Application process and due dates:** Your application to take the CPA examination must be submitted to the board's examination administrator. Applicants must submit all required information, documents, and fees to complete their application within sixty days of the date their application is submitted to the board's examination administrator. Your application is not considered complete until all of the following are provided:

- Complete application information and requested documents;
- Fee(s).

(2) **Fee refund and forfeiture:** Upon submission of your application to the examination administrator, no portion of the board's administrative fee is refundable. Upon the

examination administrator's authorization to test, no portion of the total exam fee (both administrative fee and section fee(s)) is refundable. If you fail to meet the board's scheduling or admission requirements, you forfeit all of the exam fee(s) and you must reapply to take the section(s) of the exam.

(3) **Notice of admittance to the examination or denial of your application:** You must contact the approved test provider to schedule the time and location for your examination. The notice of eligibility to take the examination is called a Notice to Schedule (NTS), the NTS will be valid for one taking of the examination within the six months following the date of the NTS.

Notice of a denial of your application, or notice of your eligibility to take the examination will be sent to you by the examination administrator.

(4) **Examination content and grading:** The CPA examination shall test the knowledge and skills required for performance as an entry-level certified public accountant. The examination shall include the subject areas of accounting and auditing and related knowledge and skills as the board may require. The examination will consist of the following four sections: Auditing and attestation; financial, accounting and reporting; regulation; and business environment and concepts. The board may accept the advisory grading services of the American Institute of Certified Public Accountants.

(5) **Examination process:**

(a) **Conditions for examinations held prior to January 1, 2004:** Contact a customer service representative at customerservice@acb.wa.gov or by phone at 360-753-2586.

(b) **For examinations taken after December 31, 2003:** The board uses all parts of the uniform CPA examination and the advisory grading services of the American Institute of Certified Public Accountants.

(i) To satisfy the examination requirement for a license you must have achieved a score of seventy-five on all four sections of the examination within a rolling eighteen-month period.

(ii) You may take the required four sections individually and in any order. Credit for any section(s) taken and passed after December 31, 2003, will be valid for eighteen months from the actual date you successfully passed any particular section of the examination.

(iii) You must pass all four sections of the examination within a rolling eighteen-month period, which begins on the date that the first section(s) is passed. A section is considered passed on the date that you took the exam section and not the date that your grade is released.

(iv) You may not retake a failed section(s) in the same examination window. An examination window refers to a three-month period in which candidates have an opportunity to take the examination (comprised of two months in which the examination is available to be taken and one month in which the examination will not be offered while routine maintenance is performed and the examination is refreshed).

(v) If the board determines that the examination system changes necessary to eliminate the test window limitations have been implemented, (iv) of this subsection will no longer be effective, and a candidate can retake a test section once

their grade for any previous attempt of that same section has been released.

(vi) In the event you do not pass all four sections of the examination within the rolling eighteen-month period, credit for any section(s) passed prior to the eighteen-month period will expire and you must retake any expired section.
