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STYLE AND FORMAT OF THE WASHINGTON STATE REGISTER

1. ARRANGEMENT OF THE REGISTER

Documents are arranged within each issue of the Register according to the order in which they are filed in the code reviser's office during the pertinent filing period. The three part number in the heading distinctively identifies each document, and the last part of the number indicates the filing sequence within an issue's material.

2. PROPOSED, ADOPTED, AND EMERGENCY RULES OF STATE AGENCIES AND INSTITUTIONS OF HIGHER EDUCATION

The three types of rule-making actions taken under the Administrative Procedure Act (chapter 34.04 RCW) or the Higher Education Administrative Procedure Act (chapter 28B.19 RCW) may be distinguished by the size and style of type in which they appear.

- (a) Proposed rules are those rules pending permanent adoption by an agency and set forth in eight point type.
- (b) Adopted rules have been permanently adopted and are set forth in ten point type.
- (c) Emergency rules have been adopted on an emergency basis and are set forth in ten point oblique type.

3. PRINTING STYLE—INDICATION OF NEW OR DELETED MATTER

RCW 34.04.058 requires the use of certain marks to indicate amendments to existing agency rules. This style quickly and graphically portrays the current changes to existing rules as follows:

- (a) In amendatory sections
 - (i) <u>underlined matter</u> is new matter;
 - (ii) deleted matter is ((lined out and bracketed between double parentheses));
- (b) Complete new sections are prefaced by the heading NEW SECTION:
- (c) The repeal of an entire section is shown by listing its WAC section number and caption under the heading <u>REPEALER</u>.

4. EXECUTIVE ORDERS, COURT RULES, NOTICES OF PUBLIC MEETINGS

Material contained in the Register other than rule-making actions taken under the APA or the HEAPA does not necessarily conform to the style and format conventions described above. The headings of these other types of material have been edited for uniformity of style; otherwise the items are shown as nearly as possible in the form submitted to the code reviser's office.

5. EFFECTIVE DATE OF RULES

- (a) Permanently adopted agency rules take effect thirty days after the rules and the agency order adopting them are filed with the code reviser. This effective date may be delayed, but not advanced, and a delayed effective date will be noted in the promulgation statement preceding the text of the rule.
- (b) Emergency rules take effect upon filing with the code reviser and remain effective for a maximum of ninety days from that date.
- (c) Rules of the state Supreme Court generally contain an effective date clause in the order adopting the rules.

6. EDITORIAL CORRECTIONS

Material inserted by the code reviser for purposes of clarification or correction or to show the source or history of a document is enclosed in brackets [].

7. INDEX AND TABLES

A combined subject matter and agency index and a table of WAC sections affected may be found at the end of each issue.

This 1981 edition of ANSI A17.1 is supplemented by the ANSI A17.1a – 1982 supplement for elevators, dumbwaiters, escalators, and moving walks installed on or after March 1, 1984. The 1981 edition of ANSI A17.1 and the 1982 edition of ANSI A17.1a is supplemented by the ANSI/ASME A17.1b – 1983 supplement for elevators, dumbwaiters, escalators, and moving walks installed on or after December 1, 1984, with the exception of portable escalators that are covered by Part VIII of ANSI/ASME A17.1b – 1983.

The request for hearing must be in writing, and must be accompanied by a certified or cashier's check for two hundred dollars payable to the department. The request for hearing must be postmarked, or must be received by the department, within fifteen days after the person receives the order of the department.

NEW SECTION

WAC 25-30-010 PURPOSE. The purpose of this chapter shall be to ensure compliance by the Washington state heritage council with the provisions of chapters 42.17 and 42.30 RCW in particular those sections which deal with procedures and meetings.

NEW SECTION

WAC 25-30-020 DEFINITIONS. (1) Public records. "Public record" includes any writing containing information relating to the conduct of government or the performance of any governmental or proprietary function prepared, owned, used or retained by any state or local agency, regardless of physical form or characteristics.

(2) Writing. Writing means handwriting, typewriting, printing, photostating, and every other means of recording, any form of communication or representation, including letters, words, pictures, sounds, or symbols, or combination thereof, and all papers, maps, magnetic or paper tapes, photographic films and prints, magnetic or punched cards, discs, drums and other documents.

Washington state heritage council. Washington state heritage council is the council established pursuant to RCW 27.34.030, and is hereinafter referred to as the "council."

(4) Office of archaeology and historic preservation. The office of archaeology and historic preservation is that agency established pursuant to RCW 27.34.210, and is hereinafter referred to as the "office." The office provides staff for the council.

(5) State historic preservation officer. The state historic preservation officer is that person appointed pursuant to RCW 27.34.030 to implement the purposes of that chapter, and hereinafter referred to as "SHPO."

(6) State historical agencies. State historical agencies are the four agencies identified in RCW 27.34.020.

NEW SECTION

WAC 25-30-030 DESCRIPTION OF PURPOSE AND STAFF. The council is of an advisory nature for the governor and the state historical agencies. Financial and administrative services including those related to budgeting, accounting, financial reporting, personnel and procurement shall be provided the council by the office. The administrative location of the council and that of its staff is at the Office of Archaeology and Historic Preservation, 111 West 21st Avenue, Olympia, Washington. The council meets at least quarterly. The meeting in the third quarter will be the one at which the regular meeting schedule for the following year will be set.

(1) The meetings of the council shall be carried out in accordance with Roberts Rules of Order.

WAC 25-36-010 PURPOSE. The purpose of this chapter shall be to ensure compliance by the Washington state heritage council with the provisions of RCW 42.17.250 through 42.17.320 dealing with public records.

WAC 25-36-020 DEFINITIONS. (1) "Public record" includes any writing containing information relating to the conduct of government or the performance of any governmental or proprietary function prepared, owned, used or retained by any state or local agency, regardless of physical form or characteristic.

NEW SECTION

WAC 25-36-040 PUBLIC RECORDS OFFICER. The council's public records shall be in the charge of the public records officer designated by the SHPO. The person so designated shall be located in the office. The public records officer shall be responsible for the following: The implementation of council policy in regard to the release of public records, coordinating the staff of the office in this regard, and generally insuring staff

compliance with the public disclosure requirements of chapter 1, Laws of 1973 (chapter 42.17 RCW).

NEW SECTION

WAC 25-36-050 OFFICE HOURS. Public records shall be available for inspection and copying during the customary office hours. For the purposes of this chapter, the customary office hours shall be from 9:00 a.m. to noon and from 1:00 p.m. to 4 p.m., Monday through Friday, excluding legal holidays. NEW SECTION

WAC 25-36-060 REQUESTS FOR PUBLIC RE-CORDS. In accordance with requirements of chapter 1, Laws of 1973, that agencies prevent unreasonable invasions of privacy, protect public records from damage or disorganization and prevent excessive interference with essential functions of the agency, public records may be inspected or copied, or copies of such records may be obtained, by members of the public upon compliance with the following procedure:

- (1) A request shall be made in writing upon a form prescribed herein which shall be available at the location indicated in WAC 25-36-050. The form shall be presented to the public records officer, or to another designated member of the staff if the public records officer is not available, during customary office hours. The request shall include the following information:
 - (a) The name of the person requesting the record;
- (b) The time of day and calendar date on which the request was made;
 - (c) The nature of the request;
- (d) An appropriate description of the record requested.
- (2) The public records officer, or staff member assisting the member of the public making the request, will ascertain whether or not the information requested is exempt from public inspection and copying as outlined in WAC 25-36-080 and further defined in RCW 42-17.310. Included therein, but not limited to, are such exemptions as personal information that may violate the right of privacy of the individual, national defense information, certain aspects of real estate appraisals as outlined in (g) of said section, and other particular information.
- (3) In all cases, it shall be the obligation of the public records officer, or staff member to whom the request is made, to:
- (a) Locate the specific document(s) requested by the member of the public in the most timely manner possible;
- (b) Assist the member of the public in appropriately identifying the public record requested;
- (c) Protect and otherwise prevent damage to the public record being inspected and copied;
- (d) Prevent disorganization of file folders or document containers;

- (e) Remain in the company of the member of the public at all times during which a public document is being inspected, and provide the fullest assistance possible;
- (f) Prevent excessive interference with the other essential functions of the agency.

NEW SECTION

WAC 25-36-070 COPYING. No fee shall be charged for the inspection of public records. The office shall charge a fee of ten cents per page for photocopies for single and multiple page documents. This charge is the amount necessary to reimburse the office for its actual cost incident to such copying.

NEW SECTION

WAC 25-36-080 EXEMPTIONS. (1) The office reserves the right to determine that a public record requested in accordance with the procedures outlined in WAC 25-36-060 is exempt under the provisions of RCW 42.17.310.

- (2) In addition, pursuant to RCW 42.17.260, the office reserves the right to delete identifying details when it makes available or publishes any public record in any cases where there is reason to believe that disclosure of such details would be an invasion of personal privacy protected by chapter 1, Laws of 1973 (chapter 42.17 RCW). The public records officer will justify such deletion in writing.
- (3) All denials of requests for public records must be accompanied by a written statement specifying the reason for the denial, including a statement of the specific exemption authorizing the withholding of the record and a brief explanation of how the exemption applies to the record withheld.

NEW SECTION

WAC 25-36-090 REVIEW OF DENIALS OF PUBLIC RECORDS REQUESTS. (1) Any person who objects to the denial of a request for a public record may petition for prompt review of such decision by rendering a written request for review. The written request shall specifically refer to the written statement by the public records officer or other staff member which constituted or accompanied the denial.

- (2) Immediately after receiving a written request for review of a decision denying a public record, the public records officer or other staff member denying the request shall refer it to the SHPO or his designee. The SHPO shall immediately consider the matter and either affirm or reverse such denial. In any case, the request shall be returned with a final decision, within two business days following the original denial.
- (3) Administrative remedies shall not be considered exhausted until the SHPO has returned the petition with a decision or until the close of the second business day following denial of inspection, whichever occurs first.

WAC 25-36-100 PROTECTION OF PUBLIC RECORDS. Records are available for inspection and copying at the location and during office hours identified in WAC 25-36-050 and then only in the presence of an authorized employee of the office and with the aid and assistance of such an employee.

NEW SECTION

COMMUNICATIONS. WAC 332-30-108 ESTABLISHMENT OF NEW HARBOR AREAS. (1) The policies and standards in this section apply to establishment of new harbor areas by the Harbor Line Commission under Article XV of the Washington Constitution and to establishment of new harbor areas in Lake Washington by the commissioner of public lands under RCW 79.94.240.

- (2) New harbor areas will only be established to serve the following purposes:
- (a) Reserving adequate urban space for navigation and commerce facilities: and
- (b) Preventing urban development from disrupting navigation.
- (3) New harbor areas will only be established when a need is demonstrated by existing development or by plans, studies, project proposals or other evidence of development potential in, or waterward of, the proposed harbor area.
- (4) Unless there is an overriding state-wide navigation and commerce need, new harbor areas will only be established when:
- (a) Compatible with local land use and shoreline management plans;
 - (b) Supported by the city, county and port district;
- (c) The area is physically and environmentally suitable for navigation and commerce purposes; and
- (d) Necessary support facilities and services are likely to be available.
- (5) The shoreline length of a new harbor area established along a city's waterfront will be determined by the need and purposes to be served and by conformance with subsection (4) of this section.
 - (6) Harbor line placement standards.
- (a) Harbor lines will be placed to serve constitutional harbor area purposes as they relate to the individual site in question.
- (b) Harbor lines will be placed to provide practical development guidance. Harbor lines will relate to navigation and commerce development which has occurred or can reasonably be expected to occur.
- (c) Inner harbor lines will be placed at the boundary of public aquatic land ownership. Inner harbor lines may be placed waterward of the boundary of public ownership to avoid conflicts with other guidelines in this section.
- (d) Outer harbor lines will generally be placed near the ends of existing conforming structures located on public aquatic lands. The lines shall provide adequate space for navigation and commerce and prevent development from interfering with navigation.
- (e) Unless there is an overriding state-wide navigation and commerce need, harbor lines will be placed in accordance with:
- (i) Local, state and federal land use plans and environmental regulations;
 - (ii) Maintenance of environmental quality;
 - (iii) Existing abutting harbor lines; and
 - (iv) Existing aquatic land development.

AMENDATORY SECTION (Amending Order FM 82-10, filed 11/2/82)

WAC 212-17-025 DEFINITION—"FIRE-WORKS." The term "fireworks" shall mean any composition or device for the purpose of producing a visible or an audible effect by combustion, deflagration, or detonation, and which meets the definition of "common" or "special" fireworks ((as set forth in the United States Department of Transportation's (DOT) Hazardous Materials Regulations, Title 49, Code of Federal Regulations, Parts 173.88 and 173.100, 1981, as of October 29, 1982)).

AMENDATORY SECTION (Amending Order FM 82-10, filed 11/2/82)

WAC 212-17-035 DEFINITION AND CLASSI-FICATION—"COMMON FIREWORKS." The term "common fireworks" shall mean any ((small)) fireworks ((device)) designed primarily to produce visible or audible effects by combustion ((and which must comply with the construction, chemical composition, and labeling regulations of the United States Consumer Product Safety Commission, as set forth in Title 16, Code of Federal Regulations, Part 1507, 1981, as of October 29, 1982. Some small devices designed to produce audible effects are included, such as whistling devices, ground devices containing 50 mg or less explosive composition, and aerial devices containing 130 mg or less of explosive composition. Common fireworks are classified as Class

C explosives by the United States Department of Transportation and include the following)). The term includes:

- (1) Ground and hand-held sparkling devices.
- (a) Dipped stick, sparkler. Stick, or wire coated with pyrotechnic composition that produces a shower of sparks upon ignition. Total pyrotechnic composition may not exceed 100 grams per item. Those devices containing any perchlorate or chlorate salts may not exceed 5 grams of pyrotechnic composition per item. Wire sparklers which contain no magnesium and which contain less than 100 grams of composition per item, not Class C explosives under DOT regulations, are included in this category.
- (b) Cylindrical fountain. Cylindrical tubes not more than 3/4 inch (19 mm) inside diameter, containing up to 75 grams of pyrotechnic composition. Upon ignition, a shower of colored sparks, and sometimes a whistling effect is produced. This device may be provided with a spike for insertion into the ground (spike fountain), a wood or plastic base for placing on the ground (base fountain), or a wood or cardboard handle, if intended to be hand-held (handle fountain).
- (c) Cone fountain. Cardboard or heavy paper cone containing up to 50 grams of pyrotechnic composition. The effect is the same as that of a cylindrical fountain.
- (d) Illuminating torch. Cylindrical tube containing up to 100 grams of pyrotechnic composition. Upon ignition, colored fire is produced. May be spike, base, or hand-held.
- (e) Wheel. Pyrotechnic device attached to a post or tree by means of a nail or string. Each wheel may contain up to six "driver" units; tubes not exceeding 1/2 inch (12.5 mm) inside diameter and containing up to 60 grams of pyrotechnic composition. Total pyrotechnic composition of each wheel shall not exceed 240 grams. Upon ignition, the wheel revolves, producing a shower of color and sparks and, sometimes, a whistling effect.
- (f) Ground spinner. Small device similar to a wheel in design and effect and placed on the ground and ignited. A shower of sparks and color is produced by the rapidly spinning device.
- (g) Flitter sparkler. Narrow paper tube filled with pyrotechnic composition that produces color and sparks upon ignition. This device does not have a fuse for ignition. The paper at one end of the tube is ignited to make the device function.
 - (2) Aerial device((s)).
- (((a) Sky rocket. Tubes not exceeding 1/2 inch (12.5 mm) inside diameter that may contain up to 20 grams of pyrotechnic composition. Sky rockets contain a wooden stick for guidance and stability and rise into the air upon ignition. A burst of color or noise or both is produced at the height of flight.
- (b) Missile-type rocket. A device similar to a sky rocket in size, composition, and effect that uses fins rather than a stick for guidance and stability.
- (c)) (a) Helicopter, aerial spinner. A tube not more than 1/2 inch (12.5 mm) inside diameter and containing up to 20 grams of pyrotechnic composition. A propeller or blade is attached, which, upon ignition, lifts the rapidly spinning device into the air. A visible or audible effect is produced at the height of flight.

- (((d))) (b) Roman candles. Heavy paper or cardboard tube not exceeding 3/8 inch (9.5 mm) inside diameter and containing up to 20 grams of pyrotechnic composition. Upon ignition, up to ten "stars" (pellets of pressed pyrotechnic composition that burn with bright color) are individually expelled at several-second intervals.
- (((e))) (c) Mine, shell. Heavy cardboard or paper tube up to 2 1/2 inches (63.5 mm) inside diameter attached to a wood or plastic base and containing up to 40 grams of pyrotechnic composition. Upon ignition, "stars," firecrackers, or other devices are propelled into the air. The tube remains on the ground.
 - (3) ((Audible ground devices.
- (a) Firecrackers, salutes. Small paper-wrapped or cardboard tube containing not more than 50 mg of pyrotechnic composition. Upon ignition, noise and a flash of light is produced. External dimensions shall not exceed 1 1/2 inches in length or 1/4 inch in diameter.
- (b) Chaser. Small paper or cardboard tube that travels along the ground upon ignition. A whistling effect, or other noise, is often produced. The explosive composition used to create the noise may not exceed 50 mg.
- (4))) Combination items. Fireworks devices containing combinations of two or more of the effects described in ((subsections (1), (2) or (3) of this section)) this section.
- $\overline{(((5)))}$ (4) Smoke device. Tube or sphere containing pyrotechnic composition that, upon ignition, produces white or colored smoke as the primary effect.
- (5) Class C explosives classified on January 1, 1984, as common fireworks by the United States department of transportation except that the term shall not include firecrackers, salutes, chasers, skyrockets, or missile-type rockets.

AMENDATORY SECTION (Amending Order FM 82-10, filed 11/2/82)

- WAC 212-17-040 DEFINITION AND CLASSI-FICATION—"SPECIAL FIREWORKS." The term "special fireworks" shall mean large fireworks designed primarily ((to produce)) for exhibition display by producing visible or audible effects ((by combustion, deflagration, or detonation)). The term includes, but is not limited to((, firecrackers)):
- (1) Sky rocket. Tubes not exceeding 1/2 inch (12.5 mm) inside diameter that may contain up to 20 grams of pyrotechnic composition. Sky rockets contain a wooden stick for guidance and stability and rise into the air upon ignition. A burst of color or noise or both is produced at the height of flight.
- (2) Missile-type rocket. A device similar to a sky rocket in size, composition, and effect that uses fins rather than a stick for guidance and stability. Firework devices which use a cylindrical bore or rod for launching stability, even though the word "missile" may appear on the label, are not included in this category.
- (3) Firecrackers, salutes. Small paper-wrapped or cardboard tube containing not more than 2 grains (130 mg) of explosive composition. Upon ignition, noise and a flash of light is produced.
- (4) Chaser. Small paper or cardboard tube that travels along the ground upon ignition. A whistling effect, or

other noise, is often produced. The explosive composition used to create the noise may not exceed 50 mg.

(5) Display pieces. Fireworks containing more than 2 grains (130 mg) of explosive composition, aerial shells containing more than 40 grams of pyrotechnic composition, and other display pieces which exceed the limits for classification as "common fireworks." Special fireworks are classified as Class B explosives by the United States Department of Transportation.

AMENDATORY SECTION (Amending Order FM 82-10, filed 11/2/82)

WAC 212-17-045 DEFINITION AND CLASSI-FICATION—"AGRICULTURAL AND WILDLIFE FIREWORKS." The term "agricultural and wildlife fireworks" shall 'mean (1) fireworks devices, including but not limited to, firecrackers containing more than 50 mg (.772 grains) of pyrotechnic composition designed to produce audible effects, which are distributed to farmers, ranchers and growers through a wildlife management program administered by the United States Department of Interior (or by equivalent state or local governmental agencies); and, such distribution is in response to a written application describing the wildlife management problem that requires use of such devices, is of a quantity no greater than required to control the problem described, and is where other means of control is unavailable or inadequate or, (2) seal control units, purchased under a Certificate of Inclusion, issued by the United States Department of Commerce, National Oceanic and Atmosphere Administration, or sold by bona fide dealers to licensed commercial fishermen or licensed commercial fishing boat owners for marine mammal control.

AMENDATORY SECTION (Amending Order FM 82-10, filed 11/2/82)

WAC 212-17-050 FIREWORK DEVICE CHEMICAL CONTENT, CONSTRUCTION. All common fireworks devices shall meet the following chemical content, design, and construction requirements.

- (1) Prohibited chemicals. Fireworks devices shall not contain any of the following chemicals:
 - (a) Arsenic sulfide, arsenates, or arsenites.
 - (b) Boron.
 - (c) Chlorates, except:
- (i) In colored smoke mixtures in which an equal or greater amount of sodium bicarbonate is included;
 - (ii) In caps and party poppers;
- (iii) In those small items wherein the total powder content does not exceed four grams of which not greater than fifteen percent is potassium, sodium, or barium chlorate.
 - (d) Gallates or gallic acid.
- (e) Magnesium (magnesium/aluminum alloys, called magnalium, are permitted).
 - (f) Mercury salts.
- (g) Phosphorus (red or white). EXCEPT that red phosphorus is permissible in caps and party poppers.
 - (h) Picrates or picric acid.
 - (i) Thiocyanates.

- (j) Titanium, except in particle size greater than 100-mesh.
 - (k) Zirconium.
 - (2) Fuses.
 - (a) Fireworks devices that require a fuse shall:
- (i) Utilize only a fuse that has been treated or coated in such manner as to reduce the possibility of side ignition. Devices such as ground spinners that require a restricted orifice for proper thrust and contain less than 6 grams of pyrotechnic composition are exempt from this requirement.
- (ii) Utilize only a fuse which will burn at least three seconds but not more than six seconds before ignition of the device.
- (b) The fuse shall be securely attached so that it will support either the weight of the fireworks device plus eight ounces dead weight or double the weight of the device, whichever is less, without separation from the fireworks device.
- (3) Bases. The base or bottom of fireworks devices that are operated in a standing upright position shall have the minimum horizontal dimensions or the diameter of the base equal to at least one—third of the height of the device including any base or cap affixed thereto.
- (4) Pyrotechnic leakage. The pyrotechnic chamber in fireworks devices shall be sealed in a manner that prevents leakage of the pyrotechnic composition during shipping, handling and normal operation.
- (5) Burnout and blowout. The pyrotechnic chamber in fireworks devices shall be constructed in a manner to allow functioning in a normal manner without burnout or blowout.
- (6) Handles and spikes. Fireworks devices that are intended to be hand-held and are so labeled shall incorporate a handle at least four inches in length. Handles shall remain firmly attached during transportation, handling and full operation of the device, or shall consist of an integral section of the device at least four inches below the pyrotechnic chamber. Spikes provided with fireworks devices shall protrude at least two inches from the base of the device and shall have a blunt tip not less than 1/8 inch in diameter or 1/8 inch square.
- (7) Wheel devices. Drivers in fireworks devices commonly known as "wheels" shall be securely attached to the device so that they will not come loose in transportation, handling, and normal operation. Wheel devices intended to operate in a fixed location shall be designed in such a manner that the axle remains attached to the device during normal operation.
 - (8) Toy smoke devices and flitter devices.
- (a) Toy smoke devices shall be so constructed that they will neither burst nor produce external flame (excluding the fuse and firstfire upon ignition) during normal operation.
- (b) Toy smoke devices and flitter devices shall not be of such color and configuration so as to be confused with banned fireworks such as M-80 salutes, silver salutes, or cherry bombs.
- (c) Toy smoke devices shall not incorporate plastic as an exterior material if the pyrotechnic composition comes in direct contact with the plastic.

- (9) Rockets with sticks. Rockets with sticks (including sky rockets and bottle rockets) shall utilize a straight and rigid stick to provide a direct and stable flight. Such sticks shall remain straight and rigid and attached to the driver so as to prevent the stick from being damaged or detached during transportation, handling, or normal operation.
- (10) Party poppers. Party poppers (also known by other names such as "Champagne party poppers" and "party surprise poppers" shall not contain more than 0.25 grains of pyrotechnic composition. Such devices may contain soft paper or cloth inserts provided any such inserts do not ignite during normal operation.

AMENDATORY SECTION (Amending Order FM 82-10, filed 11/2/82)

WAC 212-17-055 FIREWORK DEVICE, LA-BELING. (1) Any common fireworks device not required to have a specific label by 16 CFR 1500.14(b)(7), 1981, as of October 29, 1982, shall carry a warning label indicating to the user where and how the item is to be used and necessary safety precautions to be observed.

- (2) Every fireworks device, or fireworks device container where the device is packaged in an immediate container intended or suitable for delivery to the ultimate consumer, shall be conspicuously labeled with the name and place of business of the manufacturer, packer, distributor, or seller and the United States department of transportation designation as "Class C common fireworks" or "Class B special fireworks."
- (3) All label wording shall be prominently located, in the English language, and in conspicuous and legible type in contrast by typography, layout, or color with the printed matter on the fireworks device or container.

AMENDATORY SECTION (Amending Order FM 82-10, filed 11/2/82)

WAC 212-17-060 PUBLIC PURCHASE OF FIREWORKS. (1) The public may purchase common fireworks only from licensed retail fireworks stands between noon, June 28th and noon, July 6th of each year. Purchase or discharge is prohibited between the hours of 11:00 p.m. and 9:00 a.m. Possession and discharge of fireworks is lawful during this period only, except as provided in subsection (2) of this section.

(2) Religious organizations or private organizations or adult persons may be authorized to purchase ((specific)) common fireworks or such audible ground devices as firecrackers, salutes, and chasers, as defined in WAC 212-17-040 (3) and (4) from licensed manufacturers, importers, or wholesalers for use on prescribed dates and locations for religious or ((private)) specific purposes, when ((approved by)) a permit is obtained from the fire chief or other designated local official. Application shall be on forms provided by the state fire marshal and shall contain the following information: (a) The name and mailing address of the organization or person desiring to purchase and discharge the fireworks; (b) the date and time of the proposed discharge; (c) the location of the

proposed discharge; (d) the quantity and type of fireworks desired to be purchased and discharged; (e) the reason or purpose of the discharge; and (f) the signature of the applicant, following a statement that: "The applicant understands and agrees to comply with all provisions of the application and requirements of the approving authority, will discharge the fireworks only in a manner that will not endanger persons or property or constitute a nuisance, and assumes full responsibility for all consequences of the discharge, intended or not." Upon approval by the fire official, the applicant may submit a copy of the approval to any licensed wholesaler as proof of authorization to purchase the fireworks listed therein. The applicant shall retain the approval and have it available for inspection by any public official at the actual discharge of the fireworks.

AMENDATORY SECTION (Amending Order FM 82-10, filed 11/2/82)

WAC 212-17-065 FIREWORKS MANUFAC-TURER—GENERAL. Persons intending to manufacture fireworks in this state shall procure a license from the state fire marshal and a permit from the local governmental agency having jurisdiction prior to engaging in business. Applications for license shall be made on forms provided by the state fire marshal and the annual license fee shall accompany the application. License applications shall be made on or before January 31 of the year for which the license is desired. Fireworks manufacturers domiciled in other than the state of Washington shall have a designated agent in the state of Washington, registered with the state fire marshal.

AMENDATORY SECTION (Amending Order FM 82-10, filed 11/2/82)

WAC 212-17-070 FIREWORKS MANUFAC-TURER—LICENSING. Upon receipt of application and license fee, the state fire marshal will cause an investigation to be made. If the investigation discloses compliance with state laws governing the manufacture of fireworks and that granting of a license would not be contrary to public safety or welfare, a license will be granted. If the license is denied, then the applicant shall be notified in writing of the reason why license was denied, and he shall be given an opportunity to make such alterations and corrections as are deemed necessary. License applications shall be either granted or denied by the state fire marshal within ninety days following receipt of a properly submitted or amended application.

AMENDATORY SECTION (Amending Order FM 82-10, filed 11/2/82)

WAC 212-17-115 FIREWORKS WHOLESAL-ER—GENERAL. Fireworks wholesaler licenses cover those persons engaged in the business of selling fireworks at wholesale to licensed persons in this state. Wholesale licensees may transport the class of fireworks for which they hold a valid license. Fireworks wholesalers domiciled in other than the state of Washington shall have a designated agent in the state of Washington, registered with the state fire marshal.

AMENDATORY SECTION (Amending Order FM 82-10, filed 11/2/82)

WAC 212-17-120 FIREWORKS WHOLESAL-ER—LICENSING. Persons intending to engage in the sale of fireworks at wholesale in this state shall procure a license from the state fire marshal. A permit from the local governmental agency having jurisdiction shall also be obtained for the storage of all classes and types of fireworks in possession of the wholesaler licensee. The application shall be made on forms provided by the state fire marshal and the annual license fee shall accompany the application. License applications shall be made on or before January 31 of the year for which the license is desired.

AMENDATORY SECTION (Amending Order FM 82-10, filed 11/2/82)

WAC 212-17-125 FIREWORKS WHOLESAL-ER—INVESTIGATION. Upon receipt of an application and the license fee, the state fire marshal will cause an investigation to be made. If the investigation discloses compliance with state laws governing fireworks and that granting of a license would not be contrary to public safety or welfare, a license will be granted. If the license is denied, then the applicant shall be notified in writing of the reason why the license was denied, and he shall be given an opportunity to make such alterations and corrections as are deemed necessary. License applications shall be either granted or denied by the state fire marshal within ninety days following receipt of a properly submitted or amended application.

AMENDATORY SECTION (Amending Order FM 82-10, filed 11/2/82)

WAC 212-17-165 IMPORTERS OF FIRE-WORKS—GENERAL. Importer fireworks licenses are for the importation of fireworks to this state. Such a license does not authorize the licensee to engage in wholesale or retail trade or in any other activity requiring a special fireworks license. Fireworks importers domiciled in other than the state of Washington shall have a designated agent in the state of Washington, registered with the state fire marshal.

AMENDATORY SECTION (Amending Order FM 82-10, filed 11/2/82)

WAC 212-17-170 IMPORTERS OF FIRE-WORKS—LICENSING. Every person who desires to import fireworks to this state shall file application and procure a license. Application shall be made on forms provided by the state fire marshal and shall be accompanied by the required license fee. License applications shall be made on or before January 31 of the year for which the license is desired. The application shall be either granted or denied by the state fire marshal within ninety days following receipt of a properly submitted or amended application.

AMENDATORY SECTION (Amending Order FM 82-10, filed 11/2/82)

WAC 212-17-185 RETAILERS OF FIRE-WORKS-GENERAL. Persons desiring to engage in the business of selling fireworks at retail shall secure a license from the state fire marshal. In addition to the state license, a permit must be obtained from the local governmental officials having jurisdiction. The application shall be made on forms provided by the state fire marshal and shall be accompanied by the license fee of ten dollars. License applications shall be made on or before June 10 of the year for which the license is desired. The state fire marshal shall grant or deny the license within fifteen days of receipt of the application. Applicants are cautioned to first determine whether a local retail sales permit for fireworks can be obtained. A retailer's license to sell fireworks shall not authorize licensee to engage in any other fireworks activity. Retailers are limited to selling only those fireworks which have been approved for sale to the public and appear on the list of approved fireworks published annually by the state fire marshal. A copy of the list shall be prominently posted at each retail outlet.

AMENDATORY SECTION (Amending Order FM 82-10, filed 11/2/82)

WAC 212-17-190 RETAILERS OF FIRE-WORKS—SALES DATES. Retail fireworks licenses are for the retail sales of fireworks from 12 noon on the twenty-eighth day of June to 12 noon on the sixth day of July except that no fireworks may be sold to the public between the hours of 11:00 p.m. and 9:00 a.m.

NEW SECTION

WAC 212-17-203 RETAILERS OF FIRE-WORKS—LIST TO BE POSTED. Retailers shall post prominently at each retail outlet a list of the fireworks that may be sold to the public. The posted list shall be in a form approved by the state fire marshal. The state fire marshal shall make available the list.

NEW SECTION

WAC 212-17-198 RETAILERS OF FIRE-WORKS—LIST. The following is the list of fireworks that may be sold to the public.

- (1) Ground and hand-held sparkling devices.
- (a) Dipped stick, sparkler. Stick, or wire coated with pyrotechnic composition that produces a shower of sparks upon ignition. Total pyrotechnic composition may not exceed 100 grams per item. Those devices containing any perchlorate or chlorate salts may not exceed 5 grams of pyrotechnic composition per item. Wire sparklers which contain no magnesium and which contain less than 100 grams of composition per item, not Class C explosives under DOT regulations, are included in this category.
- (b) Cylindrical fountain. Cylindrical tubes not more than 3/4 inch (19 mm) inside diameter, containing up to 75 grams of pyrotechnic composition. Upon ignition, a

shower of colored sparks, and sometimes a whistling effect is produced. This device may be provided with a spike for insertion into the ground (spike fountain), a wood or plastic base for placing on the ground (base fountain), or a wood or cardboard handle, if intended to be hand-held (handle fountain).

- (c) Cone fountain. Cardboard or heavy paper cone containing up to 50 grams of pyrotechnic composition. The effect is the same as that of a cylindrical fountain.
- (d) Illuminating torch. Cylindrical tube containing up to 100 grams of pyrotechnic composition. Upon ignition, colored fire is produced. May be spike, base, or hand-held
- (e) Wheel. Pyrotechnic device attached to a post or tree by means of a nail or string. Each wheel may contain up to six "driver" units; tubes not exceeding 1/2 inch (12.5 mm) inside diameter and containing up to 60 grams of pyrotechnic composition. Total pyrotechnic composition of each wheel shall not exceed 240 grams. Upon ignition, the wheel revolves, producing a shower of color and sparks and, sometimes, a whistling effect.
- (f) Ground spinner. Small device similar to a wheel in design and effect and placed on the ground and ignited. A shower of sparks and color is produced by the rapidly spinning device.
- (g) Flitter sparkler. Narrow paper tube filled with pyrotechnic composition that produces color and sparks upon ignition. This device does not have a fuse for ignition. The paper at one end of the tube is ignited to make the device function.
 - (2) Aerial devices.
- (a) Helicopter, aerial spinner. A tube not more than 1/2 inch (12.5 mm) inside diameter and containing up to 20 grams of pyrotechnic composition. A propeller or blade is attached, which, upon ignition, lifts the rapidly spinning device into the air. A visible or audible effect is produced at the height of flight.
- (b) Roman candles. Heavy paper or cardboard tube not exceeding 3/8 inch (9.5 mm) inside diameter and containing up to 20 grams of pyrotechnic composition. Upon ignition, up to ten "stars" (pellets of pressed pyrotechnic composition that burn with bright color) are individually expelled at several-second intervals.
- (c) Mine, shell. Heavy cardboard or paper tube up to 2 1/2 inches (63.5 mm) inside diameter attached to a wood or plastic base and containing up to 40 grams of pyrotechnic composition. Upon ignition, "stars," firecrackers, or other devices are propelled into the air. The tube remains on the ground.
- (3) Combination items. Fireworks devices containing combinations of two or more of the effects described in this section.
- (4) Smoke device. Tube or sphere containing pyrotechnic composition that, upon ignition, produces white or colored smoke as the primary effect.
- (5) Class C explosives classified on January 1, 1984 as common fireworks by the United States department of transportation except that the term shall not include firecrackers, salutes, chasers, skyrockets or missile—type rockets.

*Areas 10 and 11 - Closed except gill nets using 6-inch minimum mesh may fish from 4:00 PM to 8:00 AM Monday night, November 12 through the morning of November 13, and purse seines using the 5inch strip may fish from 5:00 AM to 8:00 PM, Monday, November 12. Fishery exclusion zones applicable to Areas 10 and 11 fisheries are described in WAC 220-47-307. *Area 10E (excluding the following portions: (1) Liberty Bay north of a line projected due east from the southernmost Keyport Dock; (2) Dyes Inlet north of the Manette Bridge; (3) Sinclair Inlet southwest of a line projected due east from Bremerton Ferry Terminal) - Closed except gill nets using 6-inch minimum mesh may fish from 4:00 PM to 8:00 AM Monday night, November 12 through the morning of November 13, and purse seines using the 5inch strip may fish from 5:00 AM to 8:00 PM Monday, November 12.

*Areas 4B, 5, 6, 6A, 6B, 6C, 6D, 7, 7A, 7C, 7D, 8, 8A, 9, 9A, 10A, 10C, 10D, 10F, 10G, 11A, 12, 12A, 12B, 12C, 12D, 13, 13A, 13C, 13D, 13E, 13F, 13G, 13H, 13I, 13J, and 13K and all freshwater areas – closed.

WSR 84-23-012 EMERGENCY RULES DEPARTMENT OF FISHERIES

[Order 84-192-Filed November 9, 1984]

I, William R. Wilkerson, director of the Department of Fisheries, do promulgate and adopt at Olympia, Washington, the annexed rules relating to commercial fishing regulations.

I, William R. Wilkerson, find that an emergency exists and that this order is necessary for the preservation of the public health, safety, or general welfare and that observance of the requirements of notice and opportunity to present views on the proposed action would be contrary to public interest. A statement of the facts constituting the emergency is restrictions in Areas 6, 6A, 7 and 7A provide protection for Canadian origin chum. Restrictions in Areas 6B and 9 provide protection for Stillaguamish—Snohomish chum. Restrictions in Area 10C and the Cedar River provide protection for local

coho stocks. Restrictions in Area 10D provide protection for sockeye while allowing harvest of surplus coho. Restrictions in Area 7C and the Samish River protect natural Samish origin coho after the high harvest rate on Nooksack River hatchery origin coho in Area 7B. Restrictions in the Dungeness, Sekiu, Hoko, Clallam, Pysht, and Lyre rivers, Deep and Salt creeks and Area 6D provide protection for local coho and chum stocks. Restrictions in Area 8 and the Skagit River provide protection for Skagit River origin chinook, chum and coho. Restrictions in Areas 12A and 12D provide secondary protection for Hood Canal natural chum stocks. Restrictions in Area 8A protect natural Stillaguamish River and Snohomish origin chum while allowing opportunity to harvest chum returning to Tulalip Bay. Restrictions in the Stillaguamish and Snohomish rivers protect Stillaguamish and Snohomish chum. Restrictions in Area 12C provide protection for milling chum returning to Hoodsport Hatchery. Restrictions in Area 13A and Minter Creek protect normal timed chum returning to Minter Creek Hatchery.

These rules are therefore adopted as emergency rules to take effect upon filing with the code reviser.

This rule is promulgated pursuant to RCW 75.08.080 and is intended to administratively implement that statute.

Area 6D – Closed to all commercial fishing. Area 7C – Closed to all commercial fishing. Area 8 – Closed to all commercial fishing. Skagit River – Closed to all commercial net gear except dip bag nets and beach seines, and all chinook greater than 24 inches, all coho greater than 20 inches in length and all chum must be released, when open.

Area 8A – Closed to all commercial fishing except in that portion easterly of a line projected from Mission Point to Red Nun Buoy #2 to Hermosa Point.

Snohomish River and Stillaguamish River – Closed to all commercial fishing.

Area 10C - Closed to all commercial fishing.

Area 10D – (1) All gear other than gillnet gear must release all sockeye when open. (2) Closed to all commercial fishing in that portion within 250 yards of the eastern and northern shores of Lake Sammamish between the Sammamish River and Issaquah Creek.

Areas 12A and 12D - Closed to all commercial fishing.

Area 12C – Closed to all commercial fishing in that portion within 1,000 feet of the western shore between Hoodsport Marina Dock and Glen Ayre Trailer Park.

*Area 13A - Closed to all commercial fishing.

*Dungeness River, Samish River, Cedar River, Sekiu River, Hoko River, Clallam River, Pysht River, Lyre River, Salt Creek, Minter Creek, Deep Creek – Closed to all commercial fishing.

NEW SECTION

WAC 253-12-010 PURPOSE. The purpose of this chapter shall be to ensure compliance by the Washington higher education facilities authority with the provisions of RCW 42.17.250 through 42.17.340, dealing with public records.

NEW SECTION

WAC 253-12-020 DEFINITIONS. (1) "Public record" includes any writing containing information relating to the conduct of government or the performance of any governmental or propriety function prepared, owned, used or retained by any state or local agency, regardless of physical form or characteristics.

(2) "Writing" means handwriting, typewriting, printing, photostating, photographing and every other means of recording any form of communication or representation, including letters, words, pictures, sounds or symbols, or any combination thereof, and all papers, maps, magnetic or paper tapes, photographic films and prints, magnetic or punched cards, discs, drums and other documents.

(3) "Washington higher education facilities authority" and "authority" each refers to that state agency described in WAC 247-02-030.

NEW SECTION

WAC 253-12-030 PUBLIC RECORDS AVAIL-ABLE. All public records of the authority are deemed to be available for public inspection and copying pursuant to these rules, except as otherwise provided by RCW 42.17.310.

WAC 253-12-040 PUBLIC RECORDS OFFI-CER. The authority's public records shall be under the charge of the public records officer designated by the executive director of the authority. The person so designated shall be located in the administrative office of the authority. The public records officer shall be responsible for implementing the authority's rules and regulations regarding release of public records, coordinating the staff of the authority in this regard and generally ensuring compliance by the staff with the public records disclosure requirements of chapter 42.17 RCW.

NEW SECTION

WAC 253-12-050 OFFICE HOURS. Public records shall be available for inspection and copying from 9:00 a.m. to noon and from 1:00 p.m. to 4:00 p.m., Monday through Friday, excluding legal holidays.

NEW SECTION

WAC 253-12-060 REQUESTS FOR PUBLIC RECORDS. In accordance with the requirements of chapter 42.17 RCW that agencies prevent unreasonable invasion of privacy, that they protect public records from damage or disorganization and that they prevent excessive interference with essential functions of the agency, public records may be inspected or copied or copies of such records may be obtained by members of the public upon compliance with the following procedures:

A request shall be made in writing upon a form prescribed by the authority, which form shall be available at its administrative office. The form shall be presented by the public records officer, or to any member of the authority's staff if the public records officer is not available, at the administrative office of the authority during the office hours specified in WAC 253-12-050. The request shall include the following information:

- (1) The name of the person requesting the record;
- (2) The time of day and calendar date on which the request was made;
 - (3) The nature of the request;
- (4) If the matter requested is referenced within the current index maintained by the public records officer, a reference to the requested record as it is described in such current index;
- (5) If the requested matter is not identifiable by reference to the authority's current index, an appropriate description of the record requested.

NEW SECTION

WAC 253-12-070 COPYING. No fee shall be charged for the inspection of public records. The authority shall charge a fee of twenty-five cents per page of copy for providing copies of public records and for use of the authority's copying equipment. This charge is the amount necessary to reimburse the authority for its actual costs incident to such copying.

NEW SECTION

WAC 253-12-080 EXEMPTIONS AND DENIALS OF REQUESTED PUBLIC RECORDS. (1) The authority reserves the right to determine that a public record requested in accordance with the procedures outlined in WAC 253-12-060 is exempt under the provisions of RCW 42.17.310.

- (2) In addition, pursuant to RCW 42.17.260, the authority reserves the right to delete identifying details when it makes available or publishes any public record in any cases when there is reason to believe that disclosure of such details would be an invasion of personal privacy protected by chapter 42.17 RCW. The public records officer will fully justify such deletion in writing.
- (3) All denials of requests for public records must be accompanied by a written statement specifying the reason for authorizing the withholding of the record and a brief explanation of how the exemption applies to the record withheld.

NEW SECTION

WAC 253-12-090 REVIEW OF DENIALS OF PUBLIC RECORDS REQUESTS. (1) Any person who objects to the denial of a request for a public record may petition for prompt review of such decision by tendering a written request for review. The written request shall specifically refer to the written statement by the public records officer or other staff member which constituted or accompanied the denial.

- (2) Immediately after receiving a written request for review of a decision denying a public record, the public records officer or other staff member denying the request shall refer it to the executive director of the authority. The executive director may request that a special meeting of the authority be called as soon as legally possible to review the denial. In any case, the request shall be returned with a final decision within two business days following the original denial.
- (3) Administrative remedies shall not be considered exhausted until the authority has returned the petition with a decision or until the close of the second business day following denial of inspection, whichever occurs first.

NEW SECTION

WAC 253-12-100 PROTECTION OF PUBLIC RECORDS. In order that public records maintained on the premises of the authority may be protected from damage or disorganization as required by chapter 42.17 RCW, the following procedures and practices are hereby instituted:

- (1) Upon receipt of a request by a member of the public for a public record, the public records officer or the staff member in the authority's office receiving the request shall review the request for a public record and the requested public record to determine whether deletions from such record should be made or the request for such record should be denied pursuant to WAC 253-12-080
- (2) Only after a determination has been made that all or such portion of a public record as is not deleted may

be inspected shall such public record or portion thereof be made available for inspection by a member of the public.

- (3) Only the staff and members of the authority may open authority files to gain access to authority records for either authority business or to respond to a request for a public record.
- (4) No public record of the authority may be taken from the premises of the authority by a member of the public.
- (5) Public inspection of authority records shall be done only in such locations as are approved by the public records officer, which locations must provide an opportunity for authority staff members to ensure that no public record of the authority is damaged, destroyed, unreasonably disorganized or removed from its proper location or order by a member of the public.
- (6) Public records of the authority may be copied only on the copying machines of the authority unless other arrangements are authorized by the public records officer.

NEW SECTION

WAC 253-12-101 RECORDS INDEX. (1) The authority shall establish a current index which provides identifying information as to the following records issued, adopted or promulgated since its inception:

- (a) Final opinions, including concurring and dissenting opinions, as well as orders, made in the adjudication of cases;
- (b) Those statements of policy and interpretations of policy statute and the constitution which have been adopted by the authority;
- (c) Administrative staff manuals and instructions to staff that affect a member of the public;
- (d) Planning policies and goals, and interim and final planning decisions;
- (e) Factual staff reports and studies, factual consultants' reports and studies, scientific reports and studies, and reports or surveys, whether conducted by public employees or others; and
- (f) Correspondence, and materials referred to therein, by and with the commission relating to any regulatory, supervisory or enforcement responsibilities of the authority whereby the authority determines, or opines upon, or is asked to determine or opine upon the rights of the state, the public, a subdivision of state government or any private party.
- (2) The current index promulgated by the authority shall be available to all persons under the same rules and on the same conditions as are applied to public records available for inspection.

NEW SECTION

WAC 253-02-010 PURPOSE. The purpose of this chapter shall be to ensure compliance by the Washington higher education facilities authority with the provisions of chapter 42.17 RCW (Initiative 276), and chapter 34.04 RCW.

NEW SECTION

WAC 253-02-020 RULES OF INTERPRETA-TION. (1) All adjectives and adverbs, including but not limited to the words "adequate," "approved," "qualified," "reasonable," "reputable," "satisfactory," "sufficiently," and "suitable," as used in this title to qualify a person, procedure, process or otherwise shall be as determined by the authority or its designee.

- (2) Where the word "shall" is used in this title, the subject rule or action to which the word relates is mandatory.
- (3) Where the word "should" is used in this title, it indicates suggestion or recommendation but not a requirement.
- (4) Where the word "may" is used in this title, the action or rule to which the word relates is permissive or discretionary.
- (5) Words importing the singular number may also be applied to the plural of persons and things; words importing the plural may be applied to the singular, and words importing the masculine gender or relating to a man may also be extended to the feminine gender and be considered to relate equally to a woman.

NEW SECTION

WAC 253-02-030 DEFINITIONS. (1) "Act" means chapter 169, Laws of 1983, and chapter 28B.07 RCW.

(2) "Washington higher education facilities authority" and "authority" each mean the corporate and politic public body created by the act and also refer to the staff and employees of the authority.

The terms defined in the act shall have the same meaning when used in this title.

NEW SECTION

WAC 253-02-040 DESCRIPTION OF ORGANIZATION. (1) The authority is a public entity established under the provisions of chapter 28B.07 RCW, which exercises essential governmental functions.

(2) Members. The authority shall consist of seven members as follows: The governor, lieutenant governor, executive coordinator of the state council for postsecondary education, and four public members, one of whom shall be the president of a higher education institution at the time of appointment. The public members shall be residents of the state and appointed by the governor, subject to confirmation by the senate, on the basis of their interest or expertise in the provision of higher education and the financing of higher education. The public members of the authority shall serve for terms of four

years. The initial terms of the public members shall be staggered in a manner determined by the governor. In the event of a vacancy on the authority due to death, resignation, or removal of one of the public members, and upon the expiration of the term of any public member, the governor shall appoint a successor for a term expiring on the fourth anniversary of the successor's date of the appointment. If any of the state offices are abolished, the resulting vacancy on the authority shall be filled by the state officer who shall succeed substantially to the power and duties of the abolished office. Any public member of the authority may be removed by the governor for misfeasance, malfeasance, wilful neglect of duty, or any other cause after notice and a public hearing, unless such notice and hearing shall be expressly waived in writing.

- (3) Officers. The governor shall serve as chairperson of the authority. The authority shall elect annually one of its members as secretary. If the governor shall be absent from a meeting of the authority, the secretary shall preside. However, the governor may designate an employee of the governor's office to act on the governor's behalf in all other respects during the absence of the governor at any meeting of the authority. If the designation is in writing and is presented to the person presiding at the meetings of the authority who is included in the designation, the vote of the designee has the same effect as if cast by the governor.
- (4) Authority staff: The staff of the authority shall consist of an executive director and such other employees as are determined by the authority as necessary to fulfill its responsibilities and duties. The executive director shall be the chief administrative officer of the authority and subject to its direction. All other staff shall be under his or her supervision and direction. The executive director shall keep a record of the proceedings of the authority and, when required by the authority, shall sign notes, contracts and other instruments. The executive director shall have custody of and be responsible for all moneys and securities of the authority and shall deposit all such moneys forthwith in such banks as the authority may designate from time to time.
- (5) Administrative office: The administrative office of the authority shall be located at 504 E. 14th, Suite 130 Mail Stop PK-11, Olympia, WA 98504 which office shall be open each day for the transaction of business from 8:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. (Saturdays, Sundays and legal holidays excepted, and except for business relating to public records, which is governed by WAC 253-12-050).
- (6) Address for communications: All communications with the authority, including but not limited to the submission of materials pertaining to its operations and these rules, requests for copies of the authority's decisions and other matters, shall be addressed as follows: Washington Higher Education Facilities Authority, 504 E. 14th, Suite 130 Mail Stop PK-11, Olympia, WA 98504.

NEW SECTION

WAC 253-02-050 OPERATIONS AND PROCEDURES. (1) Uniform procedure rules: Practice and

procedure in and before the authority are governed by the uniform procedural rules codified in the Washington Administrative Code, WAC 1–08–005 through 1–08–590, as now or hereafter amended, which rules the authority adopts as its own, subject to any additional rules the authority may add from time to time. The authority reserves the right to make whatever determination is fair and equitable should any question not covered by its rules come before the authority, said determination to be in accordance with the spirit and intent of the law.

- (2) Authority meetings: The meetings of the authority shall all be "regular" or "special meetings" as those designations are applied in chapter 42.30 RCW. They may be called at any time and place by the chairman or a majority of the members of the authority. Notice of all special meetings shall be given by delivering personally or by mail to each member a written notice specifying the time and place of the meeting and a copy of the agenda prepared by the executive director in consultation with the chairman, and by giving such notice to the public as may be required by law. If an emergency is deemed to exist, the chairman may shorten the notice period to not less than twenty-four hours. An executive session may be called by the chairman or by a majority of all members of the authority to consider the appointment, employment or dismissal of an officer or employee, and such other matters as are permitted by RCW 42.30.110.
- (3) Quorum: Four members shall constitute a quorum, and the act of a majority of the members present at any meeting, if there is a quorum, shall be deemed the act of the authority except as specified hereafter in subsection (7) of this section.
- (4) Chairperson's or secretary's voting rights: The chairperson or the chairperson's designee and the secretary shall have the right to vote on all matters before the authority, just as any other authority member.
- (5) Minutes of meetings: Minutes shall be kept of the proceedings of the authority.
- (6) Rules of order: The authority shall generally follow Robert's Rules of Order, newly revised, in conducting its business meetings.
- (7) Form of authority action: The authority may act on the basis of a motion except when authorizing issuance of bonds pursuant to WAC 253-16-070 and when otherwise taking official and formal action with respect to the creation of special funds and the issuance and sale of bonds for a project of a participant, in which case the authority shall act by resolution. Such resolutions shall be adopted upon the affirmative vote of a majority of the members of the authority and shall be signed by a majority of the members of the authority. Motions shall be adopted upon the affirmative vote of a majority of a quorum of members present at any meeting. All bonds and coupons shall bear either the manual or the facsimile signatures of the governor and executive director.
- ($\bar{8}$) Public participation in the meetings of the authority shall be as follows:
- (a) Any person or organization wishing to make a formal presentation at a scheduled meeting of the authority shall so notify the executive director in writing at least seventeen days prior to the time of the meeting.

The authority or executive director may waive the seventeen—day notice period in the event the proposed presentation is of critical importance to the operation of the authority.

- (i) Such notification shall contain the name of the person, association, corporation or organization that desires to make a presentation; the address of such person and, if applicable, the address of the entity to be represented in the presentation; and the topic to be presented or discussed.
- (ii) Permission to make a presentation to the authority shall be granted by the executive director as authorized by the authority.
- (iii) Confirmation of permission to make a presentation to the authority shall be made, if at all possible, by the authority staff prior to the meeting of the authority and shall include the date and time of the meeting and time set for the formal presentation.
- (b) The presiding officer of the authority shall have the discretion to recognize anyone in the audience who indicates in writing at the time of the meeting a desire to speak at such meeting, provided that remarks by any individual person shall be limited to five minutes unless a time extension is granted by the presiding officer.

NEW SECTION

WAC 253-16-010 PURPOSE. The purpose of this chapter shall be to set forth the procedures pursuant to which the authority determines those higher education institutions to which the authority will give financial assistance.

NEW SECTION

- WAC 253-16-020 DEFINITIONS. (1) "Applicant" means a participant which submits an application to the authority.
- (2) "Application" means a formal request for the providing of bonds for the financing of a higher education institution by the authority, in a format and containing such information as the authority shall specify in these rules or in the application instructions and which is signed and sworn to by a representative designated by formal action of the applicant's governing board or equivalent.

NEW SECTION

WAC 253-16-030 APPLICATIONS FOR FI-NANCIAL ASSISTANCE. Because the needs of higher education institutions in the state vary substantially, no application forms shall be provided by the authority. However, an applicant should furnish the following information to the authority, where applicable, with its request for financial assistance, and such other information as is deemed pertinent by the applicant or the executive director of the authority:

- (1) Identification of applicant:
- (a) Legal name and address of applicant;
- (b) Names, titles, and telephone numbers of chief executive officer, chief financial officer, and person assigned responsibility for liaison with the authority,
- (c) Names, addresses, and telephone numbers of applicant's legal counsel, outside accounting firm, and financial consultant or investment banking firm (if any);
- (d) Description of applicant's legal structure (e.g., private nonprofit corporation). Describe type and ownership of stock, if any, how assets held and by whom; and attach copies of articles of incorporation or similar documentation;
 - (e) Copy of IRS determination of 501(c)(3) status;
- (f) Accreditation status and name and address of accrediting body.
- (2) Project for which financial assistance is sought (if applicable):
- (a) Amount and requested terms of repayment for financing sought;
- (b) Description of project to be accomplished with authority financial assistance,
- (c) Current status of planning for project and dates proposed for (i) completion of drawings for project, if necessary (attach copies if completed); (ii) filing of environmental impact statement, if necessary, (iii) entry into construction contract; and (iv) completion or occupancy;
- (d) Cost of project (including simple breakdown of costs of general construction, site work, utilities, equipment, land acquisition, architects' and other fees, contingency, interim interest, other);
- (e) Sources of funds for payment of project costs and dates of expected receipt (assistance from authority, interim financing, grants, funds on hand, interest and profit on interim investment of construction funds, other);
- (f) Amount of projected revenues to be derived from project, the sources of such revenues, when expected to begin, and a three-year projection;
- (g) Feasibility studies on project, if any (attach copy if one has been completed);
 - (h) Proposed security for authority-issued bonds;
- (i) Contracts or preliminary arrangements with planners, architects, consultants, investment banking firm, if any, regarding project.
- (3) Debt to be refinanced with authority assistance (if applicable):
- (a) Amount, date, maturity or maturities, interest rate or rates, prepayment penalties, if any, debt service and form of applicant's existing debt to be refinanced;

- (b) Source of revenue for payment of existing debt, security for debt and rating, if any, assigned to debt instruments at time of debt issuance,
 - (c) Holder of debt (if ascertainable);
 - (d) Any negative debt service payment history,
 - (e) Proposed security for new authority-issued debt;
- (f) Proposed date schedule for accomplishing debt refinancing.
 - (4) Finances of applicant:
- (a) Audited (if audited) financial statements for past three years;
 - (b) Latest current financial statement,
- (c) Current year's budget of revenues, expenses and capital expenditures;
- (d) Projection of revenues, expenses, capital expenditures for next three-five years, including revenues and expenses of proposed project (if applicable);
- (e) Description of long-term debts of applicant, if not already given above, including date incurred, by whom held, debt service schedule, interest rate, form of debt, source of revenues for repayment, security for repayment;
- (f) Sources of institution revenues (tuition, grants, etc.) and approximate dollar volumes and percentages of total revenues for each source in last three years.
 - (5) Student populations:
- (a) Fall FTE enrollment for each of the preceding three years as well as projections for each of the next three to five years;
- (b) Number of freshmen and transfer students who have registered at the institution in each of the preceding three years as well as projections for each of the next three to five years;
- (c) Number of applications completed for admission as a freshman or transfer student in each of the past three years.
 - (6) General:
- (a) Pending or threatened litigation or administrative actions with potential of material adverse effect on applicant;
- (b) Brief description of existing institution facilities and location of such facilities,
- (c) Brief description of institution expansion plans, if any, in next ten years;
- (d) Estimate of aggregate savings over the life of the proposed financing to be realized by applicant through authority financing by tax-exempt bonds as compared to financing through taxable obligations. Specify interest assumptions on which savings calculations based;
- (e) Other information the authority or the applicant deem necessary and important.

WAC 253-16-040 FEES. (1) Authorization to charge fees: The authority, pursuant to chapter 28B.07 RCW, shall require applicants to pay fees and charges to the authority to provide it with funds for expenses of issuance and sale of bonds, and other charges for services provided by the authority in connection with projects undertaken, as well as the operating and

- administrative expenses of the authority. In accordance with this authorization, an applicant shall pay to the authority such fees and charges as are necessary to meet any and all expenses incurred by the authority in connection with the processing of the application of the applicant, together with an annual service fee to defray expenses of the authority in administering and servicing the financing provided to the applicant and other allocable expenses of the authority. The authority shall assess an annual fee of one-tenth of one percent of the outstanding and unredeemed bonds of each applicant. The initial annual fee shall be paid to the authority on the date of closing of each tax exempt note or bond issue and in every anniversary date thereafter: PROVIDED, HOWEVER, That the authority by an adopted motion may set a different fee schedule and may waive or credit all or any part of the annual or application fee.
- (2) Fee obligations of the applicants: An applicant shall submit with its application an initial remittance of: (a) A three thousand seven hundred fifty dollar fee which shall accompany each application for a bond anticipation note, or (b) a seven thousand five hundred dollar fee which shall accompany all other applications for assistance. The authority shall, in its discretion make the final determination whether any application is for a bond anticipation note. The applicant shall pay such fees and charges as they are billed to it from time to time by the authority. These expenses may be reimbursed to the applicants from the bond proceeds if financing is consummated. In addition, the application shall contain an appropriate legal commitment to indemnify the authority against any expenses or costs incurred by it in connection with the processing of the applicant's application and the completion of any project or plan and system subsequently approved and undertaken by the authority, as well as to pay the authority an annual service fee to defray expenses of the authority in administering and servicing the financing provided to the applicant and other allocable expenses of the authority, which annual fee shall be imposed so long as financing is being provided by the authority to the applicant.
- (3) Refund of excess fees: The authority may from time to time, at its discretion refund any surplus fees paid or deposited by an applicant or participant which the authority believes exceeds the actual application-processing expenses and authority-determined pro rata administrative and operating costs of the authority.
- (4) All the costs and expenses of the authority shall be paid from fees assessed pursuant to this section. No moneys of the state of Washington shall be expended for such purposes.

NEW SECTION

WAC 253-16-050 PROCESSING OF APPLICA TION. An application will be reviewed by the executive director and such authority staff as he or she determines Upon completion of authority staff analysis and recommendations, such staff analysis and recommendation and the application shall be presented to the authority for appropriate action.

WAC 253-16-060 PRIORITIES REGARDING APPLICANT FUNDING. The authority will process higher educational facility applications for assistance in the order of their date of receipt. The date of receipt shall be the date the higher education facility application together with the application fee is received by the authority at its office.

The authority reserves the right to change priorities and scheduling when the authority determines that a "first come, first served" priority scheduling is detrimental to the sale of another higher educational facility's bond issue or when conditions of health and safety or public benefit require a different priority.

NEW SECTION

WAC 253-16-070 AUTHORITY ACTION ON APPLICATIONS. (1) The authority shall meet to review and consider the staff analysis and recommendations and the application.

- (2) The authority may approve an application where it determines:
- (a) It is necessary or advisable for the benefit of the higher education system for the authority to provide financing for the proposed project;
- (b) The applicant can reasonably be expected to achieve successful completion of the higher education facilities to be financed by the authority.
- (c) The proposed project and the issuance of bonds by the authority for such project are economically feasible and can be undertaken on terms economically satisfactory to the authority;
- (d) The proposed higher education facility, if completed as described in the application, will carry out the purposes and policies of the act;
- (e) The applicant has reasonably satisfied the requirements of the act and these regulations; and
- (f) Other criteria that the authority has determined are appropriate factors in its decision-making process have been met.
- (3) The authority may approve an application on a conditional basis where the criteria of subsection (2) of this section have been met and pending satisfaction of such other conditions or requirements as the authority shall determine to be reasonable and necessary in order to carry out the purposes, policies and requirements of the act and these regulations. The applicant shall be notified in writing of such conditions or requirements. which may include, but need not be limited to, the amendment of an application or proposed bond resolution in order to meet the availability of funds, changes in costs, or other purposes or circumstances which may enhance the ability of the authority or the applicant to complete the project or better serve the purposes and policies of the act. Upon the satisfaction of such additional conditions or requirements, the application shall be deemed approved pursuant to subsection (2) of this section.
- (4) The authority may also deny an application; in such event, it shall notify the applicant of such action, specifying in writing the reasons for its denial.

NEW SECTION

WAC 253-16-090 SELECTION OF INVEST-MENT BANKING FIRMS AS UNDERWRITERS. (1) The authority shall maintain an approved list of underwriters which it deems qualified to act as manager or co-manager on an authority bond issue. The applicants may select an investment banking firm as senior managing underwriter for its proposed financing, from this authority maintained list. However, such selection must be approved by the authority. In every instance, the senior manager selected must be able to demonstrate a familiarity, competence and experience in the sale and structuring of higher educational facility bond financing. The applicant shall not enter into any contractual agreement with an underwriter not on the approved list until written approval has been granted by the authority.

(2) To provide balanced management knowledge and sale distribution and to assure the most realistic bond terms and interest, the authority reserves the right to name investment banking firms as co-managers of any authority bond issue(s). The authority will not name an investment banking firm or firms as a co-managing underwriter or co-managing underwriters on bond issues of less than ten million dollars unless the authority determines that special circumstances so require. On each issue aggregating more than ten million dollars the authority may name a co-manager or co-managers. On each issue aggregating more than twenty million dollars the authority may name two or more co-managers. The authority will also review and approve the division of the management fee in each instance where a co-manager is named. While the authority will actually select the comanagers, it will consider recommendations from the applicant as to the selection of any co-manager or comanagers. In each instance, the applicant will be given a written notification fifteen days prior to the authority's actual designation of an investment banking firm or firms as a co-manager on a particular bond issue.

All compensation of the senior and co-managing underwriters, members of any underwriting syndicate, and placement agents shall be contingent upon the successful issuance and payment for the obligations and shall be paid from the proceeds of the sale or through the underwriting spread. The amount of the compensation for all such parties shall be determined by the authority, after considering the recommendations of the participant.

- (3) Each senior or co-manager firm selected must be able to demonstrate current competence and experience in the structuring and sale of higher educational facility bond financing. In addition the senior manager or co-manager firm must meet the following minimum standards:
- (a) The firm must have a minimum equity capital of twenty million dollars; and
- (b) The firm must currently possess the competence and ability to underwrite a higher education facility bond issue by demonstrating, among other things, that the firm or it's key underwriting personnel have either managed or co-managed two higher educational facility bond issues within the last three calendar years; or

(c) The firm has served as a credit facility for a higher education facility within the past three years; or

(d) The firm meets other criteria as the authority may adopt from time to time which establish a firms ability to prepare for issuance, underwrite and market bonds to be issued by the authority.

In all cases the firm should be familiar with higher educational facility financing in Washington state.

(4) For private placements the applicants may select a firm as placement agent for its proposed financing, subject to review and approval by the authority. In every instance, the placement agent selected must be able to demonstrate a familiarity with, and competence and experience in, the structuring and sale of higher education facility bonds. The applicant shall notify the authority in writing of its proposed placement agent selection fifteen days prior to the date it intends to enter into a formal contractual agreement. The authority will notify the applicant of its acceptance or rejection of the applicant's placement agent selection no later than ten days after receipt of the applicant's notification. If rejected, the authority will set forth the reasons for rejection, and the applicant will then propose another placement agent subject to authority approval in the same manner. The authority shall, in its discretion, make the final determination whether an issue is a private placement.

NEW SECTION

WAC 253-16-100 SELECTION OF BOND COUNSEL. The authority will establish a roster of bond counsels whom the authority believes possess the requisite special expertise and professional standing to provide bond counsel opinions which would be accepted by the underwriters, bond holders, rating agencies and other members of the financial community, and which would be in furtherance of the public interest in obtaining the lowest possible interest rates on bonds issued by the authority.

The authority will notify bond counsel firms that the authority is establishing an initial roster by publishing a notice in a publication commonly circulated among bond counsels, by sending notice to each of the bond counsel firms listed in the Washington state section of the "Red Book" (Bond Buyers' Directory of Municipal Bond Dealers of the United States — 1984 spring edition) and notifying the Washington state Bar Association. Interested firms will be requested to submit their qualifications for listing on the authority's initial roster, together with its proposal for serving as bond counsel, including a determination as to whether the firm believes that a test suit is necessary as a prerequisite to the issuance of any bonds.

The authority will upon receipt of these submissions establish an initial roster of bond counsel whom the authority believes possess the requisite special expertise and professional standing to provide bond counsel opinions.

Any firm or attorney wishing to be considered for the initial roster or added to the roster shall provide the

background, expertise, professional standing and a listing of approving bond counsel opinions previously written to the authority for its consideration in adding the firm's or attorney's name to the roster of bond counsel.

Law firms or attorneys may submit to the authority at any time the request to be included on the roster of approved bond counsel.

Before beginning the selection process for bond counsel from the approved roster, the authority will give notice of its intention to select bond counsel. Each firm or attorney listed on the approved roster will be asked to submit a proposal, including a fee schedule for providing bond counsel services if such proposal and fee schedule would be different from that previously submitted to the authority for establishing the approved roster. The authority when making the initial selection will review the submissions, determine the relative expertise of those who wish to be selected, and will review the fee schedule and whether the firm believes that a test case or litigation is necessary prior to the issuance of the bonds. The authority has wide discretion in selecting the attorney or attorneys or bond firm it considers to be most appropriate to provide the services, but in exercise of this discretion the authority shall consider all submitted fee schedules and the public interest in achieving the issuance of bonds on terms most favorable to the authority.

The authority will select initial bond counsel for up to a two-year period. Once every two calendar years the authority may select an attorney or bond firm to serve as new bond counsel, but the authority may retain an attorney for longer than two years when necessary to complete work on a particular bond issue. An attorney previously selected may be selected again, but the authority will provide other attorneys or bond counsel on the roster with an opportunity to be selected prior to this action being taken. The authority also reserves the right to appoint bond counsel with respect to only a particular bond issue or issues.

WSR 84-23-014 ADOPTED RULES DEPARTMENT OF NATURAL RESOURCES (Board of Natural Resources)

[Resolution No. 470—Filed November 9, 1984]

Be it resolved by the Board of Natural Resources, acting at the Public Lands Building, Olympia, Washington, that it does adopt the annexed rules relating to this order revises various sections of chapter 332—30 WAC, aquatic land management. These rules establish regulations to implement SSHB 1231 (chapter 221, Laws of 1984) which relates to aquatic lands. The regulations define new terms; establish new rental rate determination methods for state—owned aquatic lands (water dependent and nonwater dependent); provide guidelines from port management agreements covering state—owned aquatic lands; provide for stairstepping of rental increases, administrative review of new rental rates, lease rent time payments and interest payments for delinquent lease accounts.

This action is taken pursuant to Notice Nos. WSR 84-15-070 and 84-22-001 filed with the code reviser on July 18 and October 25. These rules shall take effect thirty days after they are filed with the code reviser pursuant to RCW 34.04.040(2).

This rule is promulgated pursuant to SSHB 1231, chapter 221, Laws of 1984 and RCW 79.90.540 and is intended to administratively implement that statute.

The undersigned hereby declares that the agency has complied with the provisions of the Open Public Meetings Act (chapter 42.30 RCW), the Administrative Procedure Act (chapter 34.04 RCW), and the State Register Act (chapter 34.08 RCW) in the adoption of these rules.

AMENDATORY SECTION (Amending Order 343, filed 7/3/80)

WAC 332-30-106 DEFINITIONS. All definitions in this section shall apply to the department and to port districts managing aquatic lands under a management agreement (WAC 332-30-114). For the purpose of this chapter:

- (1) "Accretion" means the natural buildup of shoreline through the gradual deposit of alluvium. The general principle of common law applicable is that a riparian or littoral owner gains by accretion and reliction, and loses by erosion. Boundary lines generally will change with accretion.
- (2) "Alluvium" means material deposited by water on the bed or shores.
- (3) "Anniversary date" means the month and day of the start date of an authorization instrument unless otherwise specified in the instrument.
- (4) "Aquaculture" means the culture and/or farming of food fish, shellfish, and other aquatic plants and animals in fresh water, brackish water or salt water areas. Aquaculture practices may include but are not limited to hatching, seeding or planting, cultivating, feeding, raising, harvesting of planted crops or of natural crops so as to maintain an optimum yield, and processing of aquatic plants or animals.
- (((4))) (5) "Aquatic lands" means ((department of natural resources managed)) all state-owned tidelands, shorelands, harbor areas, ((bedlands,)) and the beds of navigable waters (RCW 79.90.010). Aquatic lands are part of the public lands of the state of Washington (see subsection (49) of this section). Included in aquatic lands are public places subsection (51) of this section, waterways subsection (74) of this section, bar islands, avulsively abandoned ((river)) beds and channels of ((all)) navigable ((river areas of the state. Aquatic land is also known as public lands (RCW 79.01.004). Such lands may be leased)) bodies of water, managed by the department of natural resources directly, or indirectly through management agreements with other governmental entities.
- (((5))) (6) "Aquatic land use classes" means classes of uses of tideland, shorelands and beds of navigable

waters that display varying degrees of water dependency. See WAC 332-30-121.

- (((6) "Aquatic resources advisory committee" means an ad hoc committee which provides advice on aquatic land management problems to the commissioner of public lands. The committee is composed of representatives from the Washington departments of ecology, fisheries, planning and community affairs, game, office of fiscal management, social and health services (shellfish protection group), and parks and recreation commission; Association of Washington Counties, Association of Washington Cities, Washington Public Ports Association, Association of Washington Business; Federal Corps of Engineers, Fish and Wildlife Service, National Marine Fisheries Service, Environmental Protection Agency, and Coast Guard; Division of Marine Resources of the University of Washington; Oceanographic Commission of Washington; Pacific Northwest River Basins Commission:))
- (7) "Authorization instrument" means a lease, material purchase, easement, permit, or other document authorizing use of state-owned aquatic lands and/or materials.
- (8) "Avulsion" means a sudden and perceptible change in the ((channel)) shoreline of a body of water. Generally no change in boundary lines occurs.
- (((8))) (9) "Beds of navigable waters" means those submerged lands lying ((below)) waterward of the line of extreme low tide in navigable tidal waters and waterward of the line of navigability in navigable lakes, rivers and streams. The term, "bedlands" ((is synonymous with)) means beds of navigable waters.
- (((9))) (10) "Commerce" means the exchange or buying and selling of ((commodities involving transportation from place to place)) goods and services. As it applies to aquatic land, commerce ((to be successful requires the)) usually involves transport and a land/water interface.
- (((10))) (11) "Covered moorage" means slips and mooring floats that are covered by a single roof with no dividing walls.
- $((\frac{11}{11}))$ (12) "Department" means the department of natural resources.
- (((12))) (13) "Dredging" means enlarging or cleaning out a river channel, harbor, etc., for navigation purposes.
- (((13))) (14) "Educational reserves" means accessible areas of aquatic lands typical of selected habitat types which are suitable for educational projects.
- (((14))) (15) "Enclosed moorage" means moorage that has completely enclosed roof, side and end walls similar to a car garage i.e. boathouse.
- (((15))) (16) "Environmental reserves" means areas of ((key)) environmental importance ((which are threatened with degradation)), sites established for the continuance of environmental baseline monitoring, and/or areas of historical, geological or biological interest ((which are threatened with degradation by over-use and require)) requiring special protective management.
- (((16))) (17) "Erosion" means the gradual cutting away of a shore by natural processes. Title is generally lost by erosion, just as it is gained by accretion.

(((17))) (18) "Extreme low tide" means the line as estimated by the federal government below which it might reasonably be expected that the tide would not ebb. In Puget Sound area generally, this point is estimated by the federal government to be a point in elevation 4.50 feet below the datum plane of mean lower low water, (0.0). Along the Pacific Ocean and in the bays fronting thereon and the Strait of Juan de Fuca, the elevation ranges down to a minus 3.5 feet in several locations.

(19) "Fair market value" means the amount of money which a purchaser willing, but not obligated, to buy the property would pay an owner willing, but not obligated, to sell it, taking into consideration all uses to which the property is adapted and might in reason be applied (Donaldson v. Greenwood, 40 Wash.2d 238, 1952). Such uses must be consistent with applicable federal, state and local laws and regulations affecting the property as of the date of valuation.

(((18))) (20) "First class shorelands" means ((lands bordering on)) the shores of a navigable ((river or)) lake or river belonging to the state not subject to tidal flow, lying between the line of ordinary high water and the line of navigability, or the inner harbor line where established and within or in front of the corporate limits of any city, or within two miles thereof upon either side (RCW ((79.01.028)) 79.90.040). These boundary descriptions represent the general rule; however exceptions do exist. To determine if the shorelands are within two miles of the corporate limits of a city, the distance is measured along the shoreline from the intersection of the corporate limit with the shoreline.

 $((\frac{19}{19}))$ (21) "First class tidelands" means the ((lands)) shores of navigable tidal waters belonging to the state lying within((;)) or in front of((;)) the corporate limits of any city, or within one mile thereof((;)) upon either side and between the line of ordinary high tide and the inner harbor line ((where harbor lines have been established)); and within two miles of the corporate limits on either side and between the line of ordinary high tide and the line of extreme low tide (RCW ((79= .01.020)) 79.90.030). In general, the line of ordinary high tide is the landward boundary. The line of extreme low tide, or the inner harbor line where established, is the waterward boundary. To determine if the tidelands are within two miles of the corporate limits of a city, the distance is measured along the shoreline from the intersection of the corporate limit with the shoreline.

((20))) (22) "Fiscal year" means a period of time commencing on the first day of July and ending on the thirtieth day of June of the succeeding year. A fiscal year is identified by the year in which it ends, e.g., fiscal year 1985 is the period July 1, 1984 through June 30, 1985.

(23) "Governmental entity" means the federal government, the state, or a municipal corporation or political subdivision thereof.

(24) "Harbor area" means ((a constitutionally defined)) the area of ((normally)) navigable waters ((between the inner and outer harbor lines where established in front of and within one mile of the corporate limits of

an incorporated city or town by the board of natural resources acting as the state harbor lines commission in accordance with the provisions of)) determined as provided in section 1 of Article ((15)) XV of the state Constitution (((RCW 79.01.012). The purpose of the harbor area is to provide)) which shall be forever reserved for landings, wharves, streets, and other conveniences of navigation and commerce (RCW 79.90.020). Harbor areas exist between the inner and outer harbor lines as established by the state harbor line commission.

(((21))) (25) "Harbor area use classes" means classes of uses of harbor areas that display varying degrees of conformance to the purpose for which harbor areas were established under the Constitution.

(((22))) (26) "Harbor line" means either or both: (a) A line (((+)) [outer harbor line((+))] located and established in navigable waters as provided for in section 1 of Article ((+5)) XV of the state Constitution beyond which the state shall never sell or lease any rights whatever to private persons (RCW 79.90.015). (b) A line (((+1)) [inner harbor line((+1))] located and established in navigable waters between the line of ordinary high tide and the outer harbor line ((and)), constituting the inner boundary of the harbor area (RCW ((79.01.008 and 79.01.016)) 79.90.025).

(((23))) (27) "Houseboat" means a floating structure normally incapable of self propulsion and usually permanently moored that serves as a place of residence or business. Otherwise called a floating home.

(28) "Inflation rate" means, for a given year, the percentage rate of change in the previous calendar year's all commodity producer price index of the bureau of labor statistics of the United States department of commerce (RCW 79.90.465). The rate published by the bureau during May of each year for the previous calendar year shall be the rate for the previous calendar year.

(29) "Interest rate" means, for a given year, the average rate of return for the prior calendar year on conventional real property mortgages as reported by the federal home loan bank board (RCW 79.90.520).

((24))) (30) "Interim nonconforming uses" means an activity which is not authorized by the state Constitution in harbor areas. However because of short term need it is permitted to occur for a period of time less than that for a constitutional use of the harbor area.

(((25))) (31) "Inventory" means both a compilation of existing data on man's uses, and the biology and geology of aquatic lands as well as the gathering of new information on aquatic lands through field and laboratory analysis. Such data is usually presented in map form such as the "Washington Marine Atlas."

(((26))) (32) "Island" means a body of land entirely and customarily surrounded by water. Land in navigable waters which is only surrounded by water in times of high water, is not an island within the rule that the state takes title to newly formed islands in navigable waters.

(((27))) (33) "Line of navigability" means a measured line at that depth sufficient for ordinary navigation as determined by the board of natural resources for the body of water in question.

- (((28) "Management area" means tidelands, shorelands, harbor areas and beds of navigable waters managed by the department of natural resources, except those areas withdrawn to other governmental agencies.))
- (34) "Log booming" means placing logs into and taking them out of the water, assembling and disassembling log rafts before or after their movement in water-borne commerce, related handling and sorting activities taking place in the water, and the temporary holding of logs to be taken directly into a processing facility (RCW 79.90.465).
- (35) "Log storage" means the water storage of logs in rafts or otherwise prepared for shipment in water-borne commerce, but does not include the temporary holding of logs to be taken directly into a vessel or processing facility (RCW 79.90.465).
- (((29))) (36) "Marine land" means those lands from the mean high tide mark waterward in marine and estuarine waters, including intertidal and submerged lands. Marine lands represents a portion of aquatic lands.
- (((30))) (37) "Meander line" means fixed determinable lines run by the federal government along the banks of all navigable bodies of water and other important rivers and lakes for the purpose of defining the sinuosities of the shore or bank and as a means of ascertaining the areas of fractional subdivisions of the public lands bordering thereon.
- (((31))) (38) "Motorized vehicular travel" means movement by any type of motorized equipment over land surfaces.
- (((32))) (39) "Multiple use management" means a management philosophy which seeks to insure that several uses or activities can occur at the same place at the same time. The mechanism involves identification of the primary use of the land with provisions such as performance standards to permit compatible secondary uses to occur.
- (((33))) (40) "Navigability or navigable" means that a body of water is capable or susceptible of having been or being used for the transport of useful commerce. The state of Washington considers all bodies of water meandered by government surveyors as navigable unless otherwise declared by a court.
- (((34))) (41) "Navigation" means the movement of vessels to and from piers and wharves.
- (42) "Nonwater-dependent use" means a use that can operate in a location other than on the waterfront. Examples include, but are not limited to, hotels, condominiums, apartments, restaurants, retail stores, and warehouses not part of a marine terminal or transfer facility (RCW 79.90.465).
- ((35))) (43) "Open moorage" means moorage slips and mooring floats that have completely open sides and tops.
- (((36))) (44) "Optimum yield" means the yield which provides the greatest benefit to the state with particular reference to food production and is prescribed on the basis of the maximum sustainable yield over the state—wide resource base as modified by any relevant economic, social or ecological factor.

- (((37))) (45) "Ordinary high tide" means the same as mean high tide or the average height of high tide. In Puget Sound, the mean high tide line varies from 10 to 13 feet above the datum plane of mean lower low water (0.0).
- (46) "Ordinary high water" means, for the purpose of asserting state ownership, the line of permanent upland vegetation along the shores of nontidal navigable waters. In the absence of vegetation, it is the line of mean high water.
- (47) "Port district" means a port district created under Title 53 RCW (RCW 79.90.465).
- (((38))) (48) "Public benefit((, public interest and state-wide interest))" means that all of the citizens of the state may derive a direct benefit from departmental actions in the form of environmental protection; ((food, fiber,)) energy and mineral production; ((revenue,)) utilization of renewable resources; promotion of navigation and commerce by fostering water-dependent uses; and ((public recreation and education. All of which are of equal importance)) encouraging direct public use and access; and generating revenue in a manner consistent with RCW 79.90.455.
- (49) "Public lands" means lands belonging to or held in trust by the state, which are not devoted to or reserved for a particular use by law, and include state lands, tidelands, shorelands and harbor areas as herein defined, and the beds of navigable waters belonging to the state (RCW 79.01.004).
 - (50) "Public interest" means ... [reserved]
- (((39))) (51) "Public place" means a part of ((a harbor area)) aquatic lands set aside for public access through ((the)) platted tidelands, shorelands, and/or harbor areas to the beds of navigable waters.
- (((40))) (52) "Public tidelands" means tidelands belonging to and held in public trust by the state for the citizens of the state, which are not devoted to or reserved for a particular use by law.
- (((41))) (53) "Public trust" means that certain state owned tidelands, shorelands and all beds of navigable waters are held in trust by the state for all citizens with each citizen having an equal and undivided interest in the land. The department has the responsibility to manage these lands in the best interest of the general public.
- (((42))) (54) "Public use" means to be made available daily to the general public on a first-come, first-served basis, and may not be leased to private parties on any more than a day use basis.
- (((43))) (55) "Public use beach((=general))" means a state-owned beach ((identified)) available for free public use ((generally associated with some upland development)) but which may be leased for other compatible uses.
- (((44) "Public use beach-wilderness" means a stateowned beach not associated with upland development or if there is any development there is a significant physical barrier between the beach and that development:))
- (56) "Public utility line" means pipes, conduits, and similar facilities for distribution of water, electricity, natural gas, telephone, other electronic communication, and sewers, including sewer outfall lines (RCW 79.90.465).

- (57) "Real rate of return" means the average for the most recent ten calendar years of the average rate of return on conventional real property mortgages as reported by the federal home loan bank board or any successor agency, minus the average inflation rate for the most recent ten calendar years (RCW 79.90.465).
- (((45))) (58) "Reliction" means the gradual withdrawal of water from a shoreline leaving the land uncovered. Boundaries usually change with reliction.
- (((46))) (59) "Renewable resource" means a natural resource which through natural ecological processes is capable of renewing itself.
- (((47))) (60) "Riparian" means relating to or living or located on the bank of a natural water course, such as a stream, lake or tidewater.
- (((48))) (61) "Scientific reserves" means sites set aside for scientific research projects and/or areas of unusually rich plant and animal communities suitable for continuing scientific observation.
- (((49))) (62) "Second class shorelands" means ((lands bordering on)) the shores of a navigable ((river or)) lake or river belonging to the state, not subject to tidal flow, lying between the line of ordinary high water and the line of navigability, and more than two miles from the corporate limits of any city ((or town)) (RCW ((79.01-032)) 79.90.045). These boundary definitions represent the general rule; however, exceptions do exist. To determine if shorelands are more than two miles from the corporate limits of a city, the distance is measured along the shoreline from the intersection of the corporate limit with the shoreline.
- (((50))) (63) "Second class tidelands" means the ((area)) shores of navigable tidal waters belonging to the state, lying outside of and more than two miles from the corporate limits of ((an incorporated)) any city ((or town extending from)) and between the line of ordinary high tide ((line to)) and the line of extreme low tide (RCW ((79.01.024)) 79.90.035). In general, the line of ordinary high tide is the landward boundary. The line of extreme low tide is the waterward boundary. To determine if the tidelands are more than two miles from the corporate limits of a city, the distance is measured along the shoreline from the intersection of the corporate limit with the shoreline.
- (((51))) (64) "Shore" means that space of land which is alternately covered and left dry by the rising and falling of the water level of a lake, river or tidal area.
- (65) "State-owned aquatic lands" means those aquatic lands and waterways administered by the department of natural resources or managed under department agreement by a port district. "State-owned aquatic lands" does not include aquatic lands owned in fee by, or withdrawn for the use of, state agencies other than the department of natural resources (RCW 79.90.465).
 - (66) "State-wide interest" means ... [reserved]
- ((52))) (67) "Streamway" means stream dependent corridor of single or multiple, wet or dry channel, or channels within which the usual seasonal or storm water run—off peaks are contained, and within which environment the flora, fauna, soil and topography is dependent on or influenced by the height and velocity of the fluctuating river currents.

- (68) "Terminal" means a point of interchange between land and water carriers, such as a pier, wharf, or group of such, equipped with facilities for care and handling of cargo and/or passengers (RCW 79.90.465).
- (((53))) (69) "Thread of stream thalweg" means the center of the main channel of the stream at the natural and ordinary stage of water.
- (((54) "Waterways" means an area platted across harbor areas providing for access to open water.
- (55) "Water dependent" means all uses that cannot logically exist in any other location but on the water. See WAC 332-30-115 (1), (3), and 332-130-121 (1)(a).
- (56) "Water oriented" means all uses for which a location on or near the water front facilitates their operation. However it is possible for these activities with existing technology to locate away from the waterfront. See WAC 332-30-115(2) and 332-30-121 (1)(b).
- (57) "Wetted perimeter" means a fluctuating water line which separates submerged river beds from the dry shoreland areas at any given time.))
- (70) "Town" means a municipal corporation of the fourth class having not less than three hundred inhabitants and not more than fifteen hundred inhabitants at the time of its organization (RCW 35.01.040).
- (71) "Water-dependent use" means use which cannot logically exist in any location but on the water. Examples include, but are not limited to, waterborne commerce; terminal and transfer facilities; ferry terminals; watercraft sales in conjunction with other water dependent uses; watercraft construction, repair, and maintenance; moorage and launching facilities; aquaculture; log booming; and public fishing piers and parks (RCW 79.90.465).
- (72) "Waterfront" means a parcel of property with upland characteristics which includes within its boundary, a physical interface with the existing shoreline of a body of water.
- (73) "Water oriented use" means use which historically has been dependent on a waterfront location, but with existing technology could be located away from the waterfront. Examples include, but are not limited to, wood products manufacturing, watercraft sales, fish processing, petroleum refining, sand and gravel processing, log storage, and house boats (RCW 79.90.465).
- (74) "Waterway" means an area platted across aquatic lands or created by a waterway district providing for access between the uplands and open water, or between navigable bodies of water.
- (75) "Wetted perimeter" means a fluctuating water line which separates submerged river beds from the dry shoreland areas at any given time.

NEW SECTION

WAC 332-30-114 MANAGEMENT AGREE-MENTS WITH PORT DISTRICTS. By mutual, formal, written agreement the department may authorize a port district to manage some or all of those aquatic lands within the port district meeting the criteria stated in subsection (2) of this section. The port district shall adhere to the aquatic land management laws and policies of the state as specified in chapters 79.90 through 79.96 RCW. Port district management of state aquatic lands shall be consistent with all department regulations contained in chapter 332–30 WAC. These requirements shall govern the port's management of state aquatic lands. The administrative procedures used to carry out these responsibilities shall be those provided for port districts under Title 53 RCW.

- (1) Interpretations. Phrases used in legislation (RCW 79.90.475) providing for management agreements with ports shall have the following interpretation:
- (a) "Administrative procedures" means conducting business by the port district and its port commission.
- (b) "Aquatic lands abutting or used in conjunction with and contiguous to" means state—owned aquatic lands which share a common or coincident boundary with an upland parcel or in the event the state aquatic land does not attach to an upland parcel (i.e., bedlands, harbor areas, etc.), this term shall include the aquatic land adjacent to and waterward of the port owned or controlled aquatic parcel which has a common or coincident boundary to the upland parcel.
- (c) "Diligently pursued" means such steady and earnest effort by the port district and the department which results in the resolution of any deficiencies preventing the issuance of a management agreement to the port.
- (d) "Leasehold interest" means the benefits and obligations of both the lessor and lessee resulting from a lease agreement.
- (e) "Model management agreement" means a document approved by the board of natural resources to be used for all individual management agreements with port districts.
- (f) "Operating management" means the planning, organizing, staffing, coordinating, and controlling for all activities occurring on a property.
- (g) "Otherwise managed" means having operating management for a property.
- (h) "Revenue attributable" means all rentals, fees, royalties, and/or other payments generated from the use of a parcel; or the most likely amount of money due for the use of a parcel as determined by procedures in chapter 332-30 WAC, whichever is greater.
- (2) Criteria for inclusion. State-owned parcels of aquatic lands, including those under lease or which may come under lease to a port, abutting port district uplands may be included in a management agreement if criteria set forth in RCW 79.90.475 are met and if there is documentation of ownership, a lease in good standing, or agreement for operating management, in the name of the port district for the upland parcel.
- (3) A model management agreement and any amendments thereto shall be developed by the department and representatives of the port industry. The board of natural resources shall review and approve the model management agreement and any subsequent amendments.
- (4) Processing requests. The following application requirements, review procedures, and time frame for responses involved in the issuance of a management agreement to a port district shall apply.

- (a) Application requirements. The following items must be submitted to the department by the port district in order for its request to be an application for a management agreement:
- (i) A copy of a resolution of the port commission that directs the port district to seek a management agreement;
- (ii) An exhibit showing the location of and a description adequate to allow survey for each parcel of state—owned aquatic land to be included in the agreement, plus sufficient information on abutting port parcels to satisfy the requirements of subsection (2) of this section;
- (iii) The name, address, and phone number of the person or persons that should be contacted if the department has any questions about the application.
 - (b) Time frames for responses:
- (i) Within thirty days of receipt of an application, the department shall notify the port district if its application is complete or incomplete;
- (ii) Within thirty days of receipt of notification by the department of any incompleteness in their application, the port district shall submit the necessary information:
- (iii) Within ninety days of receipt of notification by the department that the application is complete, the port district and department shall take all steps necessary to enter into an agreement.

NEW SECTION

WAC 332-30-122 AQUATIC LAND USE AUTHORIZATION. All requirements in this section shall apply to the department. Subsection (2) of this section (except subsection (2)(a)(iii) and (b)(iii) of this section), subsections (3)(a), and (4)(a) shall apply to port districts managing aquatic lands under a management agreement (WAC 332-30-114).

- (1) General requirements.
- (a) In addition to other requirements of law, aquatic land activities that interfere with the use by the general public of an area will require authorization from the department by way of agreement, lease, permit, or other instrument.
- (i) Suitable instruments shall be required for all structures on aquatic lands except for those federal structures serving the needs of navigation.
- (ii) The beds of navigable waters may be leased to the owner or lessee of the abutting tideland or shoreland. This preference lease right is limited to the area between the landward boundary of the beds and the −3 fathom contour, or 200 feet waterward, whichever is closer to shore. However, the distance from shore may be less in locations where it is necessary to protect the navigational rights of the public.
- (iii) When proposing to lease aquatic lands to someone other than the abutting property owner, that owner shall be notified of the intention to lease the area. When not adverse to the public's ownership, the abutting owner's water access needs may be reasonably accommodated.
- (b) Determination of the area encumbered by an authorization for use shall be made by the department based on the impact to public use and subsequent management of any remaining unencumbered public land.

- (i) Operations involving fixed structures will include the area physically encumbered plus the open water area needed to operate the facility.
- (ii) Areas for individual mooring buoys will be a circle with a radius equal to the expected swing of the vessel or object moored. Only the area encumbered at any given point in time shall be used to calculate any rentals due.
- (iii) Areas for utility line easements will normally be ten feet wider than the overall width of the structure(s) placed in the right of way.
- (c) All necessary federal, state and local permits shall be acquired by those proposing to use aquatic lands. Copies of permits must be furnished to the department prior to authorizing the use of aquatic lands. When evidence of interest in aquatic land is necessary for application for a permit, an authorization instrument may be issued prior to permit approval but conditioned on receiving the permit.
- (2) Application review. In addition to other management considerations, the following special analysis shall be given to specific proposed uses:
 - (a) Environment.
- (i) Authorization instruments shall be written to insure that structures and activities on aquatic lands are properly designed, constructed, maintained and conducted in accordance with sound environmental practices.
- (ii) Uses which cause adverse environmental impacts may be authorized on aquatic lands only upon compliance with applicable environmental laws and regulations and appropriate steps as may be directed are taken to mitigate substantial or irreversible damage to the environment.
- (iii) Nonwater-dependent uses which have significant adverse environmental impacts shall not be authorized.
 - (b) Public use and access.
- (i) Wherever practical, authorization instruments for use of aquatic lands shall be written to provide for public access to the water.
- (ii) Areas allocated for first-come, first-served public use shall not be managed to produce a profit for a concessionaire or other operator without a fee being charged.
- (iii) Notice will be served to lessees of tidelands and shorelands allocated for future public use that prior to renewal of current leases, such leases will be modified to permit public use or will be terminated.
- (c) Authorization to use aquatic lands shall not be granted to any person or organization which discriminates on the basis of race, color, creed, religion, sex, age, or physical or mental handicap.
- (d) Authorization instruments for the installation of underwater pipelines, outfalls and cables may be granted when proper provisions are included to insure against substantial or irreversible damage to the environment and there is no practical upland alternative.
 - (3) Rents and fees.
- (a) When proposed uses of aquatic lands requiring an authorization instrument (other than in harbor areas) have an identifiable and quantifiable but acceptable adverse impact on state—owned aquatic land, both within and without the authorized area, the value of that loss or impact shall be paid by the one so authorized in addition

- to normal rental to the department or port as is appropriate.
- (b) Normal rentals shall be calculated based on the classification of the aquatic land use(s) occurring on the property. Methods for each class of use are described in specific WAC sections.
- (c) Advance payments for two or more years may be collected in those situations where annual payments are less than document preparation and administration costs.
- (d) Rentals for leases will normally be billed annually, in advance. If requested by a lessee in good standing, billings will be made:
- (i) Quarterly on a prorated basis when annual rental exceeds four thousand dollars; or
- (ii) Monthly on a prorated basis when annual rental exceeds twelve thousand dollars.
- (e) A one percent per month charge shall be made on any amounts which are more than thirty days past due, unless those amounts are appealed. Users of aquatic properties shall not be considered in good standing when they have amounts more than thirty days past due.
 - (4) Structures and improvements on aquatic lands.
- (a) Authorization for placing structures and improvements on public aquatic lands shall be based on the intended use, other uses in the immediate area, and the effect on navigational rights of public and private aquatic land owners. Structures and improvements shall:
- (i) Conform to the laws and regulations of any public authority;
- (ii) Be kept in good condition and repair by the authorized user of the aquatic lands;
 - (iii) Not be, nor become, a hazard to navigation;
- (iv) Be removed by the authorized user as stipulated in the authorization instrument.
- (b) In addition to aquatic land rentals and fees, rent shall be charged for use of those structures and improvements:
- (i) Owned by the department, under contract to the department for management; or that become state property under RCW 79.94.320;
- (ii) As may be agreed upon as part of the authorization document;
- (iii) Installed on an authorized area without written concurrence of the department; or
- (iv) Not covered by an application for use of aquatic lands, or a lawsuit challenging such requirements, within ninety days after the date of mailing of the department's written notification of unauthorized occupancy of public aquatic lands.
- (c) Only land rental and fees shall be charged for public aquatic lands occupied by those structures and improvements that are:
 - (i) Authorized in writing by the department;
- (ii) Installed prior to June 1, 1971 (effective date of the Shoreline Management Act) on an area authorized for use from the department; or
- (iii) Covered by an application for use of aquatic lands within ninety days after the date of mailing of the department's written notification of unauthorized occupancy of public aquatic lands.
 - (5) Insurance, bonds, and other security.

- (a) The department may require authorized users of aquatic lands to carry insurance, bonding, or provide other forms of security as may be appropriate for the use or uses occurring on public property, in order to ensure its sustained utility and future value.
- (b) Proof of coverage shall be acceptable to the department if provided by any of the following:
- (i) Insurance and/or bonding companies licensed by the state:
- (ii) Recognized insurance or bonding agent for the authorized user;
- (iii) Savings account assignment from authorized user to department; or
 - (iv) Cash deposit.
- (c) The amount of security required of each user shall be determined by the department and adjusted periodically as needed.
- (i) Any portion of the required security relating to payment of rent or fees shall be limited to an amount not exceeding two year's rental or fees.
- (ii) Required security related to other terms of the agreement shall be based on the estimated cost to the department of enforcing compliance with those terms.
- (iii) Cash deposits shall not be required in an amount exceeding one-twelfth of the annual rental or fees. If this amount is less than the total required security, the remainder shall be provided through other forms listed in (b) of this subsection.
- (d) Security must be provided on a continual basis for the life of the agreement. Security arrangements for less than the life of the agreement shall be accepted as long as those arrangements are kept in force through a series of renewals or extensions.

WAC 332-30-123 AQUATIC LAND USE RENTALS FOR WATER-DEPENDENT USES. All requirements in this section shall apply to the department and to port districts managing aquatic lands under a management agreement (WAC 332-30-114). The annual rental for water-dependent use leases of stateowned aquatic land shall be: The per unit assessed value of the upland tax parcel, exclusive of improvements, multiplied by the units of lease area multiplied by thirty percent multiplied by the real rate of return. Expressed as a formula, it is: UV x LA x .30 x r = AR. Each of the letter variables in this formula have specific criteria for their use as described below. This step by step presentation covers the typical situations within each section first, followed by alternatives for more unique situations.

- (1) Overall considerations.
- (a) Criteria for use of formula. The formula:
- (i) Shall be applied to all leases having structural uses that require a physical interface with upland property when a water—dependent use occurs on such uplands (in conjunction with the water—dependent use on the aquatic lands);
- (ii) Shall be used for remote moorage leases by selecting an upland parcel as detailed in subsection (2) of this section:
- (iii) Shall not be used for areas of filled state-owned aquatic lands having upland characteristics where the

- department can charge rent for such fills (see WAC 332-30-125), renewable and nonrenewable resource uses, or areas meeting criteria for public use (see WAC 332-30-130); and
- (iv) Shall cease being used for leases intended for water-dependent uses when the lease area is not actively developed for such purposes as specified in the lease contract. Rental in such situations shall be determined under the appropriate section of this chapter.
- (b) Criteria for applicability to leases. The formula shall be used to calculate rentals for:
- (i) All new leases and all pending applications to lease or re-lease as of October 1, 1984;
- (ii) All existing leases, where the lease allows calculation of total rent by the appropriate department methods in effect at the time of rental adjustment. Leases in this category previously affected by legislated rental increase limits, shall have the formula applied on the first lease anniversary date after September 30, 1984. Other conditions of these leases not related to rent shall continue until termination or amendment as specified by the lease contract. Leases in this category not previously affected by legislated rental increase limits and scheduled for a rent adjustment after October 1, 1985, shall have the option of retaining the current rent or electing to pay the formula rent under the same conditions as specified in (iii) of this subsection.
- (iii) Leases containing specific rent adjustment procedures or schedules shall have the rent determined by the formula when requested by the lessee. Holders of such leases shall be notified prior to their lease anniversary date of both the lease contract rent and formula rent. A selection of the formula rent by the lessee shall require an amendment to the lease which shall include all applicable aquatic land laws and implementing regulations.
 - (2) Physical criteria of upland tax parcels.
- (a) Leases used in conjunction with and supportive of activities on the uplands. The upland tax parcel used shall be waterfront and have some portion with upland characteristics. If no upland tax parcel meets these criteria, then an alternative shall be selected under the criteria of subsection (4) of this section.
- (b) Remote moorage leases. The upland tax parcel used shall be waterfront, have some portion with upland characteristics; and
- (i) If the remote moorage is associated with a local upland facility, be an appropriate parcel at the facility; or
- (ii) If the remote moorage is similar in nature of use to moorages in the area associated with a local upland facility, be an appropriate parcel at the facility; or
- (iii) If the remote moorage is not associated with a local upland facility, be the parcel closest in distance to the moorage area.
- (c) Priority of selection. If more than one upland tax parcel meets the physical criteria, the priority of selection shall be:
- (i) The parcel that is structurally connected to the lease area;
 - (ii) The parcel that abuts the lease area;
 - (iii) The parcel closest in distance to the lease area.

If more than one upland tax parcel remains after this selection priority, then each upland tax parcel will be used for its portion of the lease area. If there is mutual agreement with the lessee, a single upland tax parcel may be used for the entire lease area. When the unit value of the upland tax parcels are equal, only one upland tax parcel shall be used for the lease area.

- (d) The unit value of the upland tax parcel shall be expressed in terms of dollars per square foot or dollars per acre, by dividing the assessed value of the upland tax parcel by the number of square feet or acres in the upland tax parcel. This procedure shall be used in all cases even if the value attributable to the upland tax parcel was assessed using some other unit of value, e.g., front footage, or lot value. Only the "land value" category of the assessment record shall be used; not any assessment record category related to improvements.
- (3) Consistent assessment. In addition to the criteria in subsection (2) of this section, the upland tax parcel's assessed value must be consistent with the purposes of the lease and method of rental establishment. On this basis, the following situations will be considered inconsistent and shall either require adjustment as specified, or selection of an alternative upland tax parcel under subsection (4) of this section:
- (a) The upland tax parcel is not assessed. (See chapter 84.36 RCW Exemptions);
- (b) Official date of assessment is more than four years old. (See RCW 84.41.030);
- (c) The "assessment" results from a special tax classification not reflecting fair market value. Examples include classifications under: State-regulated utilities (chapter 84.12 RCW), reforestation lands (chapter 84.28 RCW), timber and forest lands (chapter 84.33 RCW), and open space (chapter 84.34 RCW). This inconsistency may be corrected by substituting the full value for the parcel if such value is part of the assessment records:
- (d) If the assessed valuation of the upland tax parcel to be used is under appeal as a matter of record before any county or state agency, the valuation on the assessor's records shall be used, however, any changes in valuation resulting from such appeal will result in an equitable adjustment of future rental;
- (e) The majority of the upland tax parcel area is not used for a water-dependent purpose. This inconsistency may be corrected by using the value and area of the portion of the upland tax parcel that is used for water-dependent purposes if this portion can be segregated from the assessment records; and
- (f) The size of the upland tax parcel in acres or square feet is not known or its small size results in a nominal valuation, e.g., unbuildable lot.
- (4) Selection of the nearest comparable upland tax parcel. When the upland tax parcel does not meet the physical criteria or has an inconsistent assessment that can't be corrected from the assessment records, an alternative upland tax parcel shall be selected which meets the criteria. The nearest upland tax parcel shall be determined by measurement along the shoreline from the inconsistent upland tax parcel.

- (a) The alternative upland tax parcel shall be located by order of selection priority:
- (i) Within the same city as the lease area, and if not applicable or found;
- (ii) Within the same county and water body as the lease area, and if not found;
- (iii) Within the same county on similar bodies of water, and if not found;
 - (iv) Within the state.
- (b) Within each locational priority of (a) of this subsection, the priority for a comparable upland tax parcel shall be:
- (i) The same use class within the water-dependent category as the lease area use;
- (ii) Any water-dependent use within the same upland zoning;
 - (iii) Any water-dependent use; and
 - (iv) Any water-oriented use.
- (5) Aquatic land lease area. The area under lease shall be expressed in square feet or acres.
- (a) Where more than one use class separately exist on a lease area, the formula shall only be applied to the water—dependent use area. Other use areas of the lease shall be treated according to the regulations for the specific use.
- (b) If a water-dependent and a nonwater-dependent use exist on the same portion of the lease, the rent for such portion shall be negotiated taking into account the proportion of the improvements each use occupies.
 - (6) Real rate of return.
- (a) Until July 1, 1989, the real rate of return to be used in the formula shall be five percent.
- (b) On July 1, 1989, and on each July 1 thereafter the department shall calculate the real rate of return for that fiscal year under the following limitations:
- (i) It shall not change by more than one percentage point from the rate in effect for the previous fiscal year; and
- (ii) It shall not be greater than seven percent nor less than three percent.
- (7) Annual inflation adjustment of rent. The department shall use the inflation rate on a fiscal year basis e.g., the inflation rate for calendar year 1984 shall be used during the period July 1, 1985 through June 30, 1986. The rate will be published in a newspaper of record. Adjustment to the annual rent of a lease shall occur on the anniversary date of the lease except when the rent is redetermined under subsection (9) of this section. The inflation adjustment each year is the inflation rate times the previous year's rent except in cases of stairstepping.
 - (8) Stairstepping rental changes.
- (a) Initial increases for leases in effect on October 1, 1984. If the application of the formula results in an increase of more than one hundred dollars and more than thirty-three percent, stairstepping to the formula rent shall occur over the first three years in amounts equal to thirty-three percent of the difference between each year's inflation adjusted formula rent and the previous rent.

(b) Initial decreases for leases in effect on October 1, 1984. If the application of the formula results in a decrease of more than thirty-three percent, stairstepping to the formula rent shall occur over the first three years in amounts equal to thirty-three percent of the difference between the previous rent and each year's inflation adjusted formula rent.

- (c) If a lease in effect on October 1, 1984, contains more than one water-dependent or water-oriented use and the rental calculations for each such use (e.g., log booming and log storage) result in different rentals per unit of lease area, the total of the rents for those portions of the lease area shall be used to determine if the stairstepping provisions of (a) or (b) of this subsection apply to the lease.
- (d) If a lease in effect on October 1, 1984, contains a nonwater-dependent use in addition to a water-dependent or oriented use, the stairstepping provisions of (a) or (b) of this subsection:
- (i) Shall apply to the water-dependent use area if it exists separately (see subsection (5)(a) of this section);
- (ii) Shall not apply to any portion of the lease area jointly occupied by a water-dependent and nonwater-dependent use (see subsection (5)(b) of this section).
- (e) Subsequent increases. After completion of any initial stairstepping under (a) and (b) of this subsection due to the first application of the formula, the rent for any lease or portion thereof calculated by the formula shall not increase by more than fifty percent per unit area from the previous year's per unit area rent.
- (f) All initial stairstepping of rentals shall only occur during the term of existing leases.
- (9) The annual rental shall be redetermined by the formula every four years or as provided by the existing lease language. If an existing lease calls for redetermination of rental during an initial stairstepping period, it shall be determined on the scheduled date and applied (with inflation adjustments) at the end of the initial stairstep period.

AMENDATORY SECTION (Amending Order 343, filed 7/3/80)

WAC 332-30-125 AQUATIC LAND USE RENTAL RATES FOR NONWATER-DEPENDENT USES. All requirements in this section shall apply to the department and to port districts managing aquatic lands under a management agreement (WAC 332-30-114).

- (1) The value of ((department managed tidelands, shorelands, harbor areas, and beds of navigable waters)) state-owned aquatic lands withdrawn from general public use for ((limited public or)) private nonwater-dependent use shall be recognized by charging lessees the full fair market rental. No rent shall be charged for improvements, including fills, on aquatic lands unless owned by the state. The fair market rental is based on: (a) Comparable non-DNR market rents, whether based on land value exclusive of improvements, a percent of gross revenues, or other appropriate basis, or if not available (b) ((on)) the full market value (same as true and fair value) multiplied by the use rate percentage as ((approved by the commissioner of public lands. In addition to fair market rental fee for the land utilized, a charge (royalty) may be made for units of resource removed and/or a resource withdrawal fee (see WAC 332-30-125(7))) determined under subsection (2) of this section and published in the Washington State Register.
 - (2) Use rate percentage.
- (a) The percentage rate will be based on nondepartmental market rental rates of return for comparable ((aquatic)) properties leased on comparable terms in the locality, or when such do not exist;
- (b) The percentage rate of return shall be ((equivalent to)) based on the average rate charged by lending institutions in the area for long term (or term equivalent to the length of the lease) mortgages for comparable uses of ((the)) real property.
- (3) Appraisals: The determination of fair market value ((of aquatic lands)) shall be based on the indications of value resulting from the application of as many of the following techniques as are appropriate for the use to be authorized:
- (a) Shore contribution((s,)); utilizing differences in value between waterfront properties and comparable nonwaterfront properties((;-)). Generally best for related land-water uses which are independent of each other ((e.g. recreational docks)) or not needed for the upland use to exist.
- (b) Comparable upland use (substitution)((;)); utilizing capacity, development, operation, and maintenance ratios between a use on upland and similar use on aquatic land with such ratios being applied to upland value to provide indication of aquatic land value for such use((; =)). Generally best for aquatic land uses which are totally independent of adjacent upland yet may also occur on upland totally independent of direct contact with water((, e.g. log storage)).
- (c) Extension((;)); utilizing adjacent upland value necessary for total use as the value of aquatic lands needed for use on a unit for unit basis((;—)). Generally best for aquatic land uses which are integrated with and inseparable from adjacent upland use((; e.g. industrial shipping pier)).
- (d) Market data((;)); utilizing verified transactions between knowledgeable buyers and sellers of comparable properties((;—)). Generally best for tidelands or shorelands where <u>sufficient</u> data exists between knowledgeable buyers and sellers.

- (e) Income((\(\frac{1}{2}\)); utilizing residual net income of a commercial venture as the indication of investment return to the aquatic land((\(\frac{1}{2}\))). This can be expressed either as a land rent per acre or as a percent of gross revenues. Generally best for income producing uses where it can be shown that an owner or manager of the operation is motivated to produce a profit while recognizing the need to obtain returns ((\(\frac{1}{2}\))) on all factors of production.
- (((f) Such other techniques or procedures as may be needed to equitably)) (4) Negotiation of rental amounts may occur when necessary to address the uniqueness of a particular site or use ((so long as such techniques or procedures are based on valuation principles described in accredited appraisal textbooks, or conform to techniques or procedures used by the state board of tax appeals, or as negotiated as result of a significant difference in value as demonstrated by user's appraiser)).
- (((4) Fair market)) (5) Rental ((on tidelands, shorelands and beds may be reduced depending on the amount of area which the public may be allowed to use. Total withdrawal for private use requires full fair market rental value)) shall always be more than the amount that would be charged if the aquatic land parcel was used for water-dependent purposes.
 - (((5) Rental adjustments.
- (a) Rentals of leases shall be subject to adjustment at the end of every fourth year (or as presently stated in existing leases) of the lease term. Such adjustment shall use the same change in total assessed land values, during the four-year period (newly issued leases) of the tax area code(s) in which the lease area occurs, as reported by the county assessor's office, to adjust the lease area value. Adjustment of the rental shall be the adjusted lease area value times the aquatic land lease percentage rate (WAC 332-30-125(2)) in effect at the time of adjustment. Rentals shall be adjusted every twelfth year (newly issued leases) based on an appraisal of the fair market value of the lease area at the time of adjustment.
- (b) If the adjusted rental exceeds an increase of fifty percent over the previous rental, the annual rental shall be stair—stepped in increments of fifty percent over the each preceding year's rental until the full adjusted rental is achieved. In the event that the full adjusted rental is not achieved prior to the next adjustment date, the annual rental (under a four—year adjustment) shall be thirty percent of the adjusted rental for the first year, forty—five percent for the second year, sixty—seven percent for the third year, and one hundred percent of the adjusted rental for the fourth year:
 - (6) Rental of public access and use areas.
- (a) Reduction in rental shall be allowed for the actual area within the lease that meets public access and use requirements.
- (b) The amount of reduction shall be the percentage of the public access and use area to the total leased area.
 - (7) Resource withdrawal.
- (a) Where federal, state, and local regulatory agencies grant permit approval to persons or corporations to install and operate waste outfalls or other activities or structures on aquatic lands, the department, if in agreement, will require a lease for use of the lands involved.

- (b) The annual rental will be based upon the fair market value of the land used plus the actual values of quantifiable public resource elements being withdrawn. The size of the area withdrawn will vary with the type and volume of waste, type of treatment, type of outfall installation, or size and impact to other activity or structure and local conditions and extent of impacted natural resources. The value of resource withdrawn will depend on the size of the area and the number and identifiable economic value of natural resources affected.
- (c) Future changes in volume of waste discharged and type of treatment or alteration in the structure or activity will be reflected in adjustment of annual rental.
- (8) Leases for experimental production of renewable resources or energy on second class tidelands, shorelands or beds may be issued at rates of no less than fifty percent of fair market rental for no more than five years. At that time or earlier when the department determines the activity is economically viable, full fair market rental and if appropriate royalties will be charged.))

AMENDATORY SECTION (Amending Order 343, filed 7/3/80)

WAC 332-30-145 BOOMING, RAFTING AND STORAGE OF LOGS. All requirements in this section shall apply to the department and to port districts managing aquatic lands under a management agreement (WAC 332-30-114).

- (1) Unless specifically exempted in writing, all log dumps located on aquatic lands, or operated in direct association with booming grounds on aquatic land, must provide facilities for lowering logs into the water without tumbling, which loosens the bark. Free rolling of logs is not permitted.
- (2) Provision must be made to securely retain all logs, chunks, and trimmings and other wood or bark particles of significant size within the leased area. Lessee will be responsible for regular cleanup and upland disposal sufficient to prevent excessive accumulation of any debris on the leased area.
- (3) Unless permitted in writing, aquatic land leased for booming and rafting shall not be used for holding flat rafts except:
 - (a) Loads of logs averaging over 24" diameter.
 - (b) Raft assembly, disassembly and log sort areas.
- (4) Unless permitted in writing, grounding of logs or rafts is not allowed on tidelands leased for booming and rafting. However, tidelands which were leased for booming and rafting prior to January 1, 1980, are exempt from this provision.
- (5) No log raft shall remain on aquatic land for more than one year, unless specifically authorized in writing.
- (6) For leases granted to serve the general needs of an area such as an island, the leased area shall be made available to others for booming and rafting and at a reasonable charge.
- (7) Areas within a lease boundary meeting the definition of log booming are water-dependent uses. The rent for these areas will be calculated according to WAC 332-30-123.
- (8) Areas leased for log storage shall have the rent calculated by applying a state-wide base unit rent per

acre. Temporary holding of logs alongside a vessel for the purpose of loading onto the vessel is neither booming nor storage.

(9) The base unit rent, application to existing leases, and subsequent annual rents will be determined as provided for water-dependent uses under WAC 332-30-123 except for the following modifications:

(a) A formula rental calculation will be made for each such area leased as of July 1, 1984, as though the for-

mula applied on July 1, 1984.

- (b) The assessment for an upland parcel shall not be used when the following situations exist:
 - (i) The parcel is not assessed.
- (ii) The size of the parcel in acres or square feet is not known.
- (c) When necessary to select an alternative upland parcel, the nearest assessed waterfront parcel shall be used if not excluded by the criteria under (b) of this subsection.
- (d) Because of the large size and shape of many log storage areas, there may be more than one upland parcel that could be used in the formula. The department shall treat such multiple parcel situations by using:
- (i) The per unit value of each upland parcel applied to its portion of the lease area. If it is not possible or feasible to delineate all portions of the lease area by extending the boundaries of the upland parcel, then;
- (ii) The total of the assessed value of all the upland parcels divided by the total acres of all the upland parcels shall be the per unit value applied in the formula.
- (e) The total formula rents divided by the total acres under lease for log storage equals the annual base unit rent for fiscal years 1985–1989. That figure is \$171.00 per acre.
- (f) For purposes of calculating stairstepping of rentals allowed under WAC 332-30-123, the base unit rent multiplied by the number of acres shall be the formula rent. In cases of mixed uses, the log storage formula rent shall be added to the formula rent determinations for the other uses under leases before applying the criteria for stairstepping.
- (g) Inflation adjustments to the base rent shall begin on July 1, 1990.
- (10) On July 1, 1989, and each four years thereafter, the department shall establish a new base unit rent.
- (a) The new base rent will be the previous base rent multiplied by the result of dividing the average water-dependent lease rate per acre for the prior fiscal year by the average water-dependent lease rate per acre for the fiscal year in which the base unit rent was last established. For example, the formula for the base unit rent for fiscal year 1990 would be:

(FY89 AWLR)

FY90 BUR = FY85 BUR x

(FY85 AWLR)

(b) When necessary to calculate the average waterdependent lease rate per acre for a fiscal year, it shall be done on or near July 1. The total formula rent plus inflation adjustments divided by the total acres of waterdependent uses affected by the formula during the prior fiscal year shall be the prior fiscal year's average.

- (11) If portions of a log storage lease area are open and accessible to the general public, no rent shall be charged for such areas provided that:
- (a) The area meets the public use requirements under WAC 332-30-130(9);
- (b) Such areas are in a public use status for a continuous period of three months or longer during each year;
- (c) The lease includes language addressing public use availability or is amended to include such language;
- (d) The department approves the lessee's operations plan for public use, including safety precautions;
- (e) Changes in the amount of area and/or length of time for public use availability shall only be made at the time of rental adjustment to the lease; and
- (f) Annual rental for such areas will be prorated by month and charged for each month or part of a month not available to the general public.

WSR 84-23-015 EMERGENCY RULES GAMBLING COMMISSION

[Order 144—Filed November 9, 1984]

Be it resolved by the Washington State Gambling Commission, acting at Olympia, Washington, that it does adopt the annexed rules relating to amendatory sections WAC 230-02-020, 230-04-230, 230-04-325, 230-08-095, 230-08-120, 230-12-020, 230-40-050 and new section WAC 230-40-055.

We, the Washington State Gambling Commission, find that an emergency exists and that this order is necessary for the preservation of the public health, safety, or general welfare and that observance of the requirements of notice and opportunity to present views on the proposed action would be contrary to public interest. A statement of the facts constituting the emergency is: Amendatory sections WAC 230-02-020 Time and place of meetings, this amends rule to allow flexibility in the commission's meeting locations in Olympia; WAC 230-04-230 Intentionally understating anticipated revenue-Prohibited, this changes the requirement for licensees to estimate the proper license class, within reasonable ranges, from only bingo, raffles, and amusement games to all activities for which fees are based on income; WAC 230-04-325 Cancellation, change of time, date or location of fund raising event, licensees to notify the commission 10 days in advance of the new time, date or location of change; WAC 230-08-095 Minimum standards for class C and larger bingo games-Monthly and annual accounting records, requested by licensees to clarify recordkeeping and expense documents. Provides instruction for when licensees must use accrual method; instruction on use of formal general ledgers; and documentation of expenditures; WAC 230-08-120 Quarterly

activity report by operators of bingo games (license class C and above), adds requirement for class C and larger bingo games to report attendance data for enhancement of statistical reports. Will enable the commission to report on total attendance and dollar amount played per customer by area and class of license; WAC 230-12-020 Gambling receipts deposit required by all bona fide charitable and nonprofit organizations, permits bingo operators to retain cash receipts for payment on special bingo games; WAC 230-40-050 Fees for card playing, a companion rule change to WAC 230-40-055; and new section WAC 230-40-055 Card tournaments for fee and prizes, clarifies the method and procedure for recording and reporting of card tournaments conducted for a fee.

These rules are therefore adopted as emergency rules to take effect upon filing with the code reviser.

This rule is promulgated pursuant to RCW [9.46].020 (20)(d), [9.46].050(3) and [9.46].070 (1), (2), (5), (8), (9), (11) and (12) and is intended to administratively implement that statute.

WAC 230-02-020 TIME AND PLACE OF MEETINGS. Regular public meetings of the commission shall normally be held ((upon)) in ((the second Friday of)) March, June, September, and December((, or the preceding business day if that Friday is a holiday)). Additional public meetings necessary to discharge the business of the commission may be called from time to time.

AMENDATORY SECTION (Amending Order 139, filed 12/12/83)

WAC 230-04-230 INTENTIONALLY UNDER-STATING ANTICIPATED REVENUE—PROHIB-ITED. It shall constitute grounds for revocation or suspension of a license if any applicant ((for license to conduct bingo, raffles and/or amusement games shall) intentionally understates the anticipated gross or net receipts from ((the)) a licensed activity for any purpose.

<u>AMENDATORY SECTION</u> (Amending Order 112 [140], filed 9/15/81 [6/15/84])

WAC 230-04-325 CANCELLATION, CHANGE OF <u>TIME</u>, DATE, OR LOCATION OF FUND RAISING EVENT. A cancellation or a change in <u>time</u>,

date, and/or location of a fund raising event as defined in RCW 9.46.020 requires:

- (1) For cancellation, the licensee shall notify the commission and the appropriate law enforcement agency in advance of the date upon which the event is scheduled.
- (2) For change of <u>time</u>, date, or location, the licensee shall:
- (a) Give at least ten days written notice to the commission in advance of the new time, date, or location change, together with a signed statement from the chief executive officer that the appropriate law enforcement agency has been notified of the change;
- (b) Pay a fee ((of twenty dollars)) as required by WAC 230-04-201 to the commission for each such time, date, or location change.
- (3) For a cancellation of change in time, date, and/or location, the ((permit form)) license authorizing the event for the specific time, date, or location shall be returned to the commission.

AMENDATORY SECTION (Amending Order 45, filed 12/30/75)

WAC 230-08-095 MINIMUM STANDARDS FOR CLASS C AND LARGER BINGO GAMES— MONTHLY AND ANNUAL ACCOUNTING RE-CORDS. A double entry accounting system shall be maintained by all bingo licensees, except Class A and B:

(1) This system shall include all receipts and disbursements of the licensee, including but not limited to, those related to bingo, and shall conform to generally accepted accounting principles, except as modified by other commission rules or instructions for activity reports. ((The system shall be the same system as the licensee uses as the basis for its reporting to the U.S. Internal Revenue Service on its form 990.))

The preferable method of accounting shall be the accural method. The cash basis or modified cash basis shall be acceptable accounting system methods only as long as they accurately represent the results of operations. ((The preferable method of accounting shall be the accrual method.)) The accrual method is mandatory where the licensee has substantial ((or material)) liabilities or substantial expenses not requiring a current outlay of cash, such as depreciation or amortization expenses.

At minimum, the double entry system shall include ((a general ledger,)) all records required by other sections of this WAC, a monthly cash disbursements journal (check register), ((and)) a monthly sales journal (cash receipts journal), plus a listing of all assets and liabilities. Licensees with substantial assets and liabilities or licensed to receive more than \$300,000 bingo gross receipts must have a complete general ledger system.

- (2) All expenditures by the licensee((, both respecting its expenditures)) relating to gambling((, and nongambling)) activities, shall be sufficiently documented ((by)) in the following manner:
- (a) ((i))Invoices or other appropriate supporting documents from commercial vendors or service agencies should contain at least the following details:
- (i) The name of the person or entity selling the goods or providing the service;
- (ii) A complete description of goods or services purchased;
- (iii) The amount of each product sold or service provided;
 - (iv) The price of each unit;
 - (v) The total dollar amount billed; and
 - (vi) The date of the transaction.
- (b) Disbursements, in excess of twenty-five dollars, made directly to individuals, who do not furnish normal, business type, invoices or statements, should be supported by other written documentation indicating at least the following details:
 - (i) The name of the person receiving the payment;
 - (ii) The amount;
 - (iii) The date, and
 - (iv) The purpose.
- (c) Normally, cancelled checks and/or statements without further support, such as listed in (2)(a) and (2)(b) above, are not considered sufficient documentation.
- (3) All expenditures by the licensee relating to nongambling activities shall be sufficiently documented to provide an audit trail and will conform to generally accepted accounting principals.

AMENDATORY SECTION (Amending Order 127, filed 3/2/83)

WAC 230-08-120 QUARTERLY ACTIVITY REPORT BY OPERATORS OF BINGO GAMES (LICENSE CLASS C AND ABOVE). Each licensee for the operation of bingo games (license Class C and above) conducted by bona fide charitable or nonprofit organizations, shall submit an activity report to the commission concerning the licensed activity and other matters set forth below during each of the following periods of the year:

January 1st through March 31st

April 1st through June 30th

July 1st through September 30th

October 1st through December 31st

If the licensee does not renew his license, then he shall file a report for the period between the previous report filed and the expiration date of his license.

Each report shall be received in the office of the commission or postmarked no later than 30 days following the end of the period for which it is made.

The report shall be signed by the president, or equivalent officer and shall be submitted upon a form to be obtained from the commission. If the report is prepared

by someone other than the licensee or his employee, then the preparer shall also sign the report. The report shall include, among other items, the following:

- (1) The gross receipts from bingo by month.
- (2) The total amount of cash prizes actually paid out and the total of the cost to the licensee of all merchandise prizes actually paid out by month.
 - (3) The net receipts by month.
- (4) Full details on all expenses directly related to bingo, including all compensation paid by the licensee to each person for any work connected with the management, promotion, conduct or operation of bingo including a description of the work performed by that person.
 - (5) The net income.
 - (6) The total number of customers participating.
 - (7) The total number of sessions held.

AMENDATORY SECTION (Amending Order 130, filed 4/1/83)

WAC 230-12-020 GAMBLING RECEIPTS DE-POSIT REQUIRED BY ALL BONA FIDE CHARI-TABLE AND NONPROFIT ORGANIZATIONS. (1) Every licensed bona fide charitable or nonprofit organization shall keep a separate gambling receipts' account in a ((reorganized)) recognized Washington state depository authorized to receive funds, which shall be kept separate and apart and actually segregated from the licensee's general funds: PROVIDED, That if such activities are conducted on the United States' portion of the Point Roberts Peninsula, Washington, the deposit may be made in a British Columbia branch of a Canadian bank. Licensees are not limited to a single gambling receipts account as long as a minimum of one separate account is maintained. The following conditions of deposit will be met:

- (a) No expenditures other than for prizes shall be made from the receipts of any licensed gambling activity until such receipts have first been deposited in the gambling receipts account: PROVIDED, That bingo receipts may be withheld from deposits for jar, pig, or other similar special game prizes if:
- (i) The total of all such prize funds does not accumulate to exceed \$200.00;
- (ii) The amount withheld each session is entered in the bingo daily record, and
- (iii) A reconciliation of the special game fund is made of the bingo daily record;
- (b) All net receipts from the operation of bingo which are being held pending disbursement shall be deposited in the licensee's gambling receipts account not later than the second banking day following receipt thereof;
- (c) All net receipts from the operation of card rooms, punchboards, pull tabs, raffles (Class D and above), and amusement games (Class B and above) shall be deposited in the licensees gambling receipts account at least once each week, and
- (d) All deposits from bingo net receipts made to the gambling receipts account shall be made separately from all other deposits, and the validated deposit receipt shall be kept with the daily records as required by WAC 230–08–080.

- (2) Bona fide charitable or nonprofit organizations that conduct only one or more of the following activities and do not possess any other licenses issued by the gambling commission are exempt from this rule:
 - (a) Raffles under the provisions of RCW 9.46.030(2);
- (b) Bingo, raffles, or amusement games under the provisions of RCW 9.46.030(3);
 - (c) Class A or B bingo game,
 - (d) Class C raffle, or
 - (e) Class A amusement game.
- (3) Bona fide charitable or nonprofit organizations who conduct only fund raising events or membership raffles and have no other gambling licenses are exempt from having a separate gambling receipts account, but must meet the following conditions of deposit:
- (a) No expenditures other than for prizes shall be made until such receipts have first been deposited in the licensee's bank account;
- (b) All net receipts shall be deposited within two banking days following receipt thereof; and
- (c) The validated deposit receipt shall be kept with the licensee's gambling records.

AMENDATORY SECTION (Amending Order 138, filed 11/15/83)

WAC 230-40-050 FEES FOR CARD PLAYING. No fee shall be charged a person, directly or indirectly, to play in a card game in excess of those fees set forth below:

(1) For all card games, except as provided in (2) below, the fee shall not exceed \$1.00 per half hour, or portion thereof, per player.

The fee charged shall be collected by the licensee in cash, or in wagering chips, directly from the player upon each half hour only. No player shall be required to pay for or purchase any other goods or services as a condition of playing cards beyond the \$1.00 per half hour per player except under section (3) below. The fee schedule applicable to the type of games and number of tables in the card room shall be conspicuously posted on the premises where it can be clearly seen by the players in the card games.

- (2) ((The fee for entry into a tournament for prizes shall not exceed \$25.00, including all separate fees which might be paid by a player for various phases or events of the tournament. The licensee shall maintain a record of all such fees collected, by date of collection, for each such tournament held.
- (3))) A person requesting a new deck of cards beyond those regularly furnished by the operator as required by WAC 230-40-070(2) may be charged a fee not to exceed the actual cost to the licensee of the deck. Further, Class D licensees may charge a fee not to exceed actual cost to the licensee per deck for each deck of playing cards furnished to a table as required by these rules, or as requested by any player at the table. The fee shall be collected in cash directly from the players, or the player requesting the deck, at the time the deck is introduced into the game.
- (((4))) (3) This rule shall not prevent a bona fide nonprofit or charitable organization which has been established and operated for purposes other than card

playing from charging its usual membership fee to belong to the organization.

(((5))) (4) The licensee shall collect the same fee from all players at a table except licensed card room employees or the licensed owner. If he elects to allow free play, then all players at a table must be allowed to play for free.

The amount collected each half hour shall be recorded by the licensee immediately following the collection of the fees on a standard card room format prescribed and supplied by the commission to the licensee. All records required by this rule shall be maintained for a period of three years from the end of the licensee's fiscal year for which the record is kept.

NEW SECTION

TOURNAMENTS WAC 230-40-055 CARDFOR FEE AND PRIZES. (1) A card tournament wherein a fee is charged to the participants and prizes are awarded to the winning players shall be licensed by the Commission. Card room licensees with a Class A, B, or E license may conduct a card tournament for a fee without obtaining a card tournament license: PROVID-ED, That Class B licensees are limited to only those card games authorized under their licensing class. Card room licensees with a Class D or R license must first obtain a card tournament license before they can conduct a card tournament in which the players are charged a fee to enter. The licensee shall notify the Commission ten (10) days in advance of any card tournament where the players are charged a fee to enter. A card tournament shall not exceed ten (10) consecutive calendar

- (2) The fee for a player to enter a card tournament for prizes shall not exceed \$25.00, including all separate fees which might be paid by a player for various phases or events of the tournament. There shall be no buy—ins or additional opportunities allowing the players to purchase additional chips beyond those provided with the \$25.00 entry fee.
- (3) The chips used in card tournaments shall have no monetary value and may be redeemed only for prizes established by the licensee. The licensee may award prizes in excess of those entry fees collected as authorized in paragraph two (2) above.
- (4) The licensee may adopt house rules to facilitate the operation of card tournaments: PROVIDED, That all house rules must be submitted to the Commission for approval and posted where all tournament participants can see and read the rules.
- (5) The licensee shall maintain a record of all such fees collected and the number of participants for each tournament conducted. This information shall be entered on the card room daily control sheet for the time and date the tournament begins.
- (6) The licensee shall maintain a record of all prizes awarded to include the amount the licensed operator actually paid for each prize and the name and complete address of each winning participant.

STATEMENT OF PURPOSE

Title: Amendatory section WAC 230-25-120, Limits upon amount for rent, lease or similar payments for fund raising events, revises fees for leasing or rental of equipment for fund raising events.

Description of Purpose: Amends rule to permit distributors to increase their rental rates for gambling equipment used in fund raising events to adjust to the inflation rate.

Statutory Authority: RCW 9.46.070 (11) and (14).

Summary of Proposed Rules and Reasons Supporting Action: Amendatory section WAC 230-25-120, revises fees for leasing or rental of equipment for fund raising events.

Agency Personnel Responsible for Drafting, Implementing and Enforcing the Rules: Keith Kisor, Director, 234–0865 scan, 753–0865 comm, and Ronald O. Bailey, Deputy Director, 234–1075 scan, 753–1075 comm, Jefferson Building, 1110 South Jefferson, Olympia, WA 98504.

Proponents and Opponents: Gambling Commission staff proposes these rule amendments and new rules.

Agency Comments: The agency believes the proposed rules are self-explanatory and need no further comment.

These rules were not made necessary as a result of federal law or federal or state court action.

Small Business Economic Impact Statement: This agency has determined that there would be no economic impact upon small businesses in the state of Washington by the adoption of these amendments or new rules.

AMENDATORY SECTION (Amending Order 111, filed 9/15/81)

WAC 230-25-120 LIMITS UPON AMOUNT FOR RENT, LEASE OR SIMILAR PAYMENTS FOR FUND RAISING EVENTS. ((No-1))Licensees shall not expend for rent or lease (or similar arrangements) of premises in which to hold a fund raising event, or for any equipment or service in connection with the fund

raising event, an amount that exceeds the local prevailing or market price for such premises, equipment or service.

Maximum rental limits shall be:

(1) Premises and other goods or services: Not more than two hundred dollars for all, or any portion, of any twenty-four hour period.

This maximum fee shall include in addition to the use of the premises themselves any and all goods or services of any kind furnished by the person renting the premises to the licensee, or furnished by anyone with a substantial interest in, or immediate family relationship with, that person: PROVIDED, That the limit shall not include (a) fees for gambling equipment which are governed by the maximums set out in (2) below; or (b) charges for food or drink to the licensee or patrons of the fund raising event when the purchase of such food or drink is not, directly or indirectly, a condition of rental of the premises and the licensee may elect to bring in food and drink from an outside source.

(2) Gambling devices and equipment:

(a) Not more than ((three)) four hundred ((and fifty)) dollars from each licensee for all, or any portion of, the first twenty-four hour period for all gambling devices and related equipment to conduct the event, including, but not limited to, cards, dice, cash boxes, shoes, chips, delivery thereof and any schooling in its use.

(b) Not more than two hundred and twenty-five dollars from each licensee for each succeeding twenty-four hour period, or any portion

thereof, for the same kinds of items set out in (a) above.

(3) Individual gambling station:

(a) Not more than ((twenty-five)) thirty dollars for all of the equipment needed to set up each single specific gambling station (such as a single twenty-one table), except for a craps table or a roulette wheel station which shall not exceed ((\$50)) \$55 or for a station showing horse racing films with advance betting on the outcome of the races which shall not exceed \$250, for the first twenty-four hour period, or any portion thereof, including, but not limited to, the equipment, delivery and schooling in its use, to an overall maximum for all items of ((\$350)) \$400, for each licensee as set out in (2)(a) above.

(b) Not more than ((fifteen)) twenty dollars for each successive twenty-four hour period or any portion thereof, for the equipment needed to establish each single specific gambling station as set out in (a) above, to an overall maximum of ((\$\frac{\pmax}{200}\)) \$225 for each licensee

as set out in (2)(b) above.

(4) The maximum charges or limits set out in subsections (1) through (3) above include any amount paid to reserve the use of applicable premises, services or equipment.

No more than 50% of the total allowable fees or charges may be paid in advance of the event. Advance payment shall be made only by check which shall not be drawn or paid more than 90 days prior to the event.

The limits in subsections (2) and (3) above shall not apply to expenditures by the licensee for purchases outright, or construction by the licensee of, gambling equipment.

(b) Surgical treatment; surgery for cardiac or gynecological conditions shall be provided only if approved by the ((state)) regional medical consultant.

(c) Psychiatric treatment only when the diagnostic study clearly indicates a favorable prognosis for relatively short term therapy. A program of psychiatric treatment which will extend beyond twelve months must have the prior approval of the ((state)) regional medical consultant.

- (d) Dental treatment only when it will significantly increase employability or remove an established vocational handicap, or in emergency situations involving pain, acute infections, or injury. Examples of disabling dental conditions for which restorative services may be authorized include widespread ulceration of teeth, destruction of tooth structures, decay which seriously affects the individual's ability to eat, badly malformed or positioned teeth, or rejection of the individual from employment on the basis of his appearance. Restorative dental services will not be provided when the restoration will not directly affect employability;
 - (e) Nursing services,
- (f) Hospital (either inpatient or outpatient care) and clinic services,
- (g) Convalescent, nursing, or rest home care only when there is an expectation of a normal period of convalescence after which other appropriate services leading to the rehabilitation of the client may be initiated or resumed. Such care shall not be provided by the division as a long-term process for conditions not expected to improve,

(h) Drugs and supplies,

- (i) Prosthetic, orthoptic or other assistive devices essential to obtaining or retaining employment,
 - (j) Eyeglasses and visual services,
 - (k) Podiatry;
- (I) Physical therapy; physical therapy shall consist of the employment of the physically beneficial properties of light, heat, cold, water, electricity, massage, manipulation, exercise, and mechanical devices as treatment of disease or injury.
- (m) Occupational therapy; occupational therapy shall include all manual skills and recreational activities which provide specific active exercise for physical disabilities and and shall include psychologic rehabilitation techniques,
 - (n) Medical or medically related social work services,
 - (o) Medically directed speech or hearing therapy,
- (p) Treatment of medical applications and emergencies, either acute or chronic, which are associated with or arise out of the provision of physical restoration services, or are inherent in the condition under treatment, and

This chapter defines the duties of the state ombudsman, local ombudsmen, and certified volunteer ombudsmen; sets out certification procedures for volunteer ombudsmen; provides for ombudsmen access to residents, facilities and records; provides procedures to be followed by ombudsmen when entering facilities; establishes reporting requirements; provides that ombudsmen entering a facility to hear, investigate and resolve complaints or render advice will secure privacy for the visit; provides confidentiality of information secured by ombudsmen, provides that the state ombudsman will develop procedures with regard to referrals to other public and private agencies; sets out requirements that long-term care facilities will post a notice of the nursing home complaint toll-free telephone number and the name, address and telephone number of the office of the long-term care ombudsman and a description of the services provided by that office and describe the format of such notice.

Chapter 388-18 WAC LONG-TERM CARE OMBUDSMAN PROGRAM

NEW SECTION

WAC 388-18-010 PURPOSE. The purpose of this chapter is to implement the long-term care ombudsman program as provided for in chapter 43.190 RCW, RCW 36.39.060, RCW 74.38.040, and RCW 74.38.050.

NEW SECTION

WAC 388-18-020 DEFINITIONS. When used in this chapter, unless otherwise required from the context:

- (1) "Administrative action" means any action or decision made by an agent of a facility as defined in RCW 43.190.020 affecting the provisions of service to residents but does not include complaints of negligence or other tortious conduct of direct-care staff.
- (2) "Legal representative" includes attorneys at law, attorneys in fact, trustees, and, in the case of the estate of a decedent, personal representatives as defined by RCW 11.02.005(1).
 - (3) "Long-term care facility" is defined under RCW 43.190.020.
- (4) "Ombudsman" means any long-term care ombudsman, including the director of the long-term care ombudsman project, ombudsmen employed by the state office, ombudsmen employed by local ombudsman programs authorized by RCW 36.39.060(2) or RCW 74.38.040(9).
- (5) "Resident" means any client, patient, or other resident of a
- facility.

 (6) "State office" means the office of the state long-term care ombudsman.
- (7) "Volunteer ombudsmen" means any volunteer ombudsman certified by the ombudsman program.

NEW SECTION

WAC 388-18-030 DUTIES—STATE OMBUDSMAN. (1) Investigate and resolve complaints on behalf of long-term care residents.

- (2) Monitor laws, regulations, and policies affecting the residents of long-term care facilities.
- (3) Provide the public with information and education programs about long-term care facilities.
- (4) Promote the development of consumer organizations, i.e., resident councils, family councils, family support groups, citizen advocacy groups, etc.
 - (5) Identify major issues relating to long-term care.
 - (6) Assist in recruiting and training of volunteer ombudsmen.
- (7) Coordinate the activities of long-term care ombudsmen throughout the state.
- (8) Establish procedures for ombudsmen access to long-term care facilities.

 - (11) Prepare an annual report by January 1st of each year.

NEW SECTION

WAC 388-18-040 DUTIES-LOCAL OMBUDSMAN. (1) Investigate and resolve complaints on behalf of long-term care residents.

- (2) Monitor laws, regulations, and policies affecting the residents of long-term care facilities.
- (3) Provide the public with information and education programs about long-term care facilities.
- (4) Promote the development of consumer organizations, i.e., resident councils, family councils, family support groups, citizen advocacy groups, etc.
 - (5) Identify major issues relating to long-term care.
 - (6) Recruit and train volunteer ombudsmen.
 - (7) Submit monthly reports to the state ombudsman office.
- (8) Carry out such activities as the state ombudsman deems appropriate.

NEW SECTION

WAC 388-18-050 DUTIES—CERTIFIED VOLUNTEER OMBUDSMEN. (1) Act as an information liaison between the community and the ombudsman.

- (2) May participate in resident councils.
- (3) May participate in family councils.
- (4) Make regular visits to long-term care facilities including:
- (a) Meeting new residents;
- (b) Visiting residents, per request of residents' family, staff, or others:
- (c) Linking/referring long-term care residents and family members to appropriate long-term care services and assisting them to obtain needed information/help.
- (5) Refer complaints requiring investigation or arbitration to appropriate ombudsman.
- (6) Participate in training programs provided by state and local ombudsmen.
 - (7) Submit monthly activity reports to the volunteer coordinator.

NEW SECTION

WAC 388-18-060 CERTIFICATION PROCEDURES FOR VOLUNTEER OMBUDSMEN. (1) All prospective volunteer ombudsmen shall be screened by a local screening committee.

- (2) Selected applicants shall receive thirty hours of training provided by the state ombudsman office.
- (3) Upon successful completion, the ombudsman office shall issue a certificate of completion and a picture identification card.
- (a) Local ombudsman programs certifying their own volunteers shall issue their own certificate which will be signed by the local ombudsman office director.
- (b) State-certified volunteer ombudsmen shall receive a certificate and picture identification card from DSHS. The identification card shall be signed by the division director.

NEW SECTION

WAC 388-18-070 ACCESS TO RESIDENTS, FACILITIES, AND RECORDS. (1) All ombudsmen and volunteer ombudsmen shall have appropriate access to residents and facilities.

- (2) The following times are necessary and reasonable for ombudsman access to residents, facilities, and records:
- (a) Any time during a facility's regular business day, regular visiting hours, or other period the facility is open to the public.
- (b) Any other time access may be required by the particular condition to be investigated or monitored.
- (3) Prior to seeking access to a facility, resident, or record at a time provided for in subsection (2)(b) of this section, the ombudsman shall make a written entry in an ombudsmen program file of the reason or reasons a particular condition requires access at such time.
- (4) Resident visits by an ombudsman may be restricted or terminated by the resident without cause. A facility may restrict or terminate such visits only upon a documented physician's order so providing in express terms which shall be placed in the resident's file. However, if a resident freely and knowingly chooses to disregard such an order and to request continued visits, the ombudsman will honor the resident's choice. In such a case, the ombudsman may request the resident to sign a written statement indicating the resident's choice and stating the choice was freely and knowingly made.
- (5) The ombudsman shall have access to a resident's records only after obtaining written consent from the resident, or the resident's guardian, limited guardian, or legal representative.
- (6) Upon the resident's request, the volunteer ombudsman shall assist the resident or resident's representative to obtain appropriate access to his or her records.
- (7) Ombudsmen shall not seek access to resident records if, in so doing, there is a reasonable likelihood the resident's identity may be disclosed without authorization in accordance with the provisions of this chapter.
- (8) Ombudsmen and volunteer ombudsmen shall treat all information contained in residents' records as confidential.

NEW SECTION

WAC 388-18-080 REPORTING REQUIREMENTS. (1) All local ombudsmen programs shall submit monthly reports to the state ombudsman office. All ombudsmen programs shall use the reporting forms provided by the state ombudsman office.

- (2) Volunteer ombudsmen shall submit monthly activity reports to the volunteer coordinator.
- (3) The volunteer coordinator shall submit volunteer ombudsmen activity reports to the state ombudsman.

(4) Failure to submit monthly reports to the state ombudsman office shall be a sufficient reason to revoke certification status.

NEW SECTION

WAC 388-18-090 FACILITY ENTRY-REPORT AND IDENTIFICATION-DISCLOSURE OF PURPOSE. (1) Upon reporting to a facility or as soon as is practicable after entering a facility, all ombudsmen and volunteer ombudsmen will report their presence to the facility administration and present identification issued and certified by the appropriate ombudsman office.

(2) Ombudsman and volunteer ombudsman picture identification shall be issued by the ombudsman office and include at least the following information:

(a) The name of the ombudsman;

- (b) The name, address, and telephone number of the agency with which the ombudsman is associated; and
- (c) The ombudsman's status as a volunteer ombudsman, if applicable.
- (3) Nothing in this section shall be construed as authorizing disclosure of identities or other confidential information without authorization of the resident, guardian, or personal representative.

NEW SECTION

WAC 388-18-100 PRIVACY DURING OMBUDSMAN VIS-ITS. (1) The provisions of this section apply to ombudsman visits to residents for the purpose of hearing, investigating and resolving complaints, or rendering advice.

(2) When making such visits, ombudsmen and volunteer ombudsmen will take appropriate measures to secure privacy for the visit.

- (3) Generally, securing privacy during such visits will require the visit be conducted as a one-to-one conference between an ombudsman or volunteer ombudsman and a resident out of the presence of facility staff and any other person except the guardian or personal representative. By way of example, such conferences may be conducted in the following settings:
 - (a) A resident's enclosed, private room;
- (b) A resident's shared room, when roommates or others are not present;
- (c) A facility common area if adequate safeguards against inadvertent or other disclosure exist; or
- (d) A facility office or other room if made available by the facility under conditions ensuring privacy.
- (4) Conferences between an ombudsman and two or more residents or residents and facility administration may be necessary or appropriate to carry out the provisions of this chapter and applicable law. The ombudsman shall have discretion to seek such a conference, provided that, if there is a reasonable likelihood private, privileged, or confidential information may be revealed at the conference, the ombudsman shall obtain written authorization for release of such information, signed by appropriate parties in accordance with the provisions of this chapter and applicable law, before proceeding with the conference.
- (5) Ombudsman and volunteer ombudsman shall comply with the expressed wishes or preferences of residents with regard to visits and shall exercise due regard for the rights of other residents and facility schedules and routines, subject only to the requirements of this chapter and applicable law.

NEW SECTION

WAC 388-18-110 CONFIDENTIALITY OF INFORMA-TION. (1) The following limitations on disclosure shall be strictly observed:

- (a) No records or files of ombudsmen relating to any complaint or investigation shall be disclosed unless disclosure is authorized by the resident or by the resident's guardian, limited guardian, or legal representative.
- (b) The identity of any complainant, witness, patient, or resident shall not be disclosed unless:
- (i) Such informant or guardian, limited guardian, or legal representative thereof, consents in writing to such disclosure; or
 - (ii) The disclosure is required by court order.
- (2) The files and records of all ombudsmen programs shall be kept locked at all times when not in use, and access to these files shall be limited to ombudsmen.
- (3) Each ombudsman program shall designate one or more ombudsmen to have authority over the disposition of records and files.

(4) All ombudsmen programs shall have and keep in force written procedures and forms relating to the disclosure of confidential information. Such procedures and forms shall be reviewed by and subject to the approval of the state ombudsman office.

NEW SECTION

WAC 388-18-120 REFERRALS. (1) The state office shall develop procedures to be followed by all ombudsmen and ombudsmen programs with regard to referrals to other public and private agencies.

(2) No referral shall be made to any public or privacy agency in a manner compromising any individual's rights to anonymity, privacy, or confidentiality unless authorized in accordance with the provisions of this chapter and applicable law.

(3) The ombudsman office shall make appropriate referrals to other public and private agencies.

NEW SECTION

WAC 388-18-130 POSTING REQUIREMENTS. (1) Every long-term care facility shall post in a conspicuous location a notice of the nursing home complaint toll-free number and the name, address, and telephone number of the office of the long-term care ombudsman and a description of the services provided by the office.

(2) The office shall provide a form of the notice approved by the office and the bureau of nursing home affairs.

- (3) If a long-term care facility wishes to post a different form of the notice rather than the one provided, the facility must receive prior approval from the office and the bureau of nursing home affairs, and in the meantime, the facility must post the approved form of the notice described in this subsection.
- (4) This information shall also be distributed to the residents, family members, and legal guardians upon the resident's admission to the facility.

In no event can the participant elect to have the catch-up provision apply more than once whether or not the full catch-up had been utilized.

WAC 458-14-152 MANIFEST ERRORS. (1) A manifest error as provided in RCW 84.52.090, 84.56.400 and 84.68.110 will be held to be any of the following:

(((1))) (a) Any error that is clearly evident from an inspection of any "assessment list" or "tax roll" itself; or

- (((2))) (b) Any error that becomes clearly evident upon examination of any record of the county assessor or other public officer, upon which any "assessment list" or "tax roll" is based; or
- (((3))) (c) Any other error made in the process of preparing any "assessment list" or "tax roll", and subsequently becoming evident;
- (((4) Providing that the correction of any of the above errors does not involve a revaluation of property.

Note: A correction of an assessment based upon an appraisal manual, but involving erroneous application of measurements, quantities, rate, etc., would involve a revaluation of property.

The correction of an assessment resulting from the improper classification of land and the wrong per-acre rate would involve a revaluation of property.

When land was valued on a square foot basis and later discovered that the description included a parcel which had been acquired by the state for a highway, this is a manifest error that can be corrected without resulting in a change in the assessed value of the property which is subject to taxation.)) (2) No manifest error shall be corrected that involves a revaluation of the property. Revaluation shall mean a change in value based upon an exercise of appraisal judgment brought about by a physical appraisal or a statistical update as provided for in

RCW 84.41.041. It shall not include a change in value which is based solely upon correcting double assessments, incorrect characteristics, posting errors, incorrect placement of improvements, erroneous measurements, and misapplication of statistical data through clerical error.

(3) Corrections of manifest errors which involve a revaluation of property can only be done by the reconvened July board of equalization pursuant to RCW 84.48.010.

STATEMENT OF PURPOSE

Title and Number of Rule Section(s) or Chapter(s): Chapter 296-30 WAC, Internal rules; includes WAC 296-30-010 Definitions; 296-30-020 Vehicular assault and vehicular homicide; 296-30-050 Distribution of third party recoveries; 296-30-060 Requirement to report criminal acts; 296-30-080 Medical aid; 296-30-130 Public or private insurance; 296-30-170 Costs of examination of sexual assault victims; and 296-30-900 Effective date of amendatory acts.

Statutory Authority: Section 1, chapter 122, Laws of 1973 1st ex. sess., and RCW 7.68.030.

Specific Statute that Rule is Intended to Implement: Section 1, chapter 122, Laws of 1973 1st ex. sess.

Summary of the Rule(s): This notice proposes to provide definitions of terms existing in chapter 7.68 RCW, commonly known as the Crime Victim Act, explain the application of certain statute sections to claim management and set forth distribution of third party recoveries according to date of injury or date of recovery of the claim involved. The rules also provide criteria for the department's responsibility for payment of charges for emergency medical examinations incurred by sexual assault victims who do not otherwise qualify for benefits under chapter 7.68 RCW. Finally, the rules supplement the schedule of maximum fees adopted under RCW 51-.04.030 by allowing treatment of victims by counselors of the masters degree level and establishing maximum fees allowable for such treatment.

Reasons Supporting the Proposed Rule(s): Definitions: Specific victim compensation claim circumstances have illustrated the ambiguity of some of the language contained in the enabling statute. By clarifying that language, the department hopes to provide greater consistency and equity in victim claim management; Vehicular Assault and Vehicular Homicide: Injured victims and survivors of deceased victims of motor vehicle crimes that occurred prior to July 24, 1983, have challenged the department's position that vehicular assault and vehicular homicide amendments operate prospective to July 24, 1983, only. The contention made is that the amendment operates retroactive to July 24, 1983. The proposed rule affirming the July 24, 1983, effective date is intended to strengthen the department's position on this issue, which it believes to be in accordance with the clear intent of the legislature. In addition, both victims and prosecuting attorneys have contended that any victim injured in a single collision where a conviction of vehicular assault or vehicular homicide is obtained is eligible for benefits under the Crime Victim Act. The department agrees and states that agreement by implementation of the rule pertaining thereto; Distribution of Third Party Recoveries: The section of the statute governing third party recoveries has been amended several times resulting in varying requirements for distribution of recovery funds. The proposed rule is for the purpose of specifying the method of distribution for each type of recovery made; Requirement to Report Criminal Acts: In the case of assaults, and particularly sexual assaults, of children, reports are often made to child protective services. That agency then conducts an investigation and reports its findings to the appropriate law enforcement agency. While the statutory requirement of reporting criminal acts to law enforcement agencies within 72 hours is not usually met in these cases, the department believes the intent of the legislature is met by the report to child protective services. The proposed rule is designed to accommodate that situation; Medical Aid: Counseling services provided by counselors of the masters level degree are not included in the treatment rules adopted under the Industrial Insurance Act. However, such counselors have been, and continue to be, instrumental in providing crisis intervention services, particularly to sexual assault victims. The department believes that the crisis intervention aspect often reduces the need for long-term mental health care and that it is

thus cost effective to include these counselors as parties eligible to treat victims; Public or Private Insurance: The requirement to deduct Social Security benefits from victim compensation benefits creates an inequity between those survivors of deceased victims eligible for pension benefits and those survivors eligible for lump sum benefits. The proposed rule seeks to establish a method by which an approximate equity between those two groups of victims will result; Costs of Examination of Sexual Assault Victims: The statutory language concerning examination costs of sexual assault victims is not specific regarding the actual costs for which the department is or is not responsible. The proposed rule establishes criteria for eligible costs in accordance with the department's best interpretation of legislative intent; and Effective Date of Amendatory Acts: Because of the challenges to the effective date of the vehicular assault and vehicular homicide amendments previously cited, the department believes it wise to establish a rule of interpretation of the effective dates of other amendatory acts that may occur. This rule accomplishes that end.

NEW SECTION

WAC 296-30-010 DEFINITIONS. Whenever in these rules and regulations, the following words shall have these meanings:

(1) "Innocent victim" means any person whose injury was not the direct, proximate result of his or her consenting to, provoking, or inciting the criminal act which resulted in the injury.

- (2) "Bodily injury" means any harmful or offensive touching, and is to include severe emotional distress where no touching takes place when:
 - (a) Claimant is not the object of the criminal act and:
 - (i) The distress is intentionally or recklessly inflicted;

- (ii) The distress is inflicted by extreme or outrageous conduct;
- (iii) The claimant has a reasonable apprehension of imminent bodily harm:
- (iv) The claimant is in the immediate vicinity of the criminal act at the time the criminal act takes place.
 - (b) Claimant is the victim of the criminal act and:
 - (i) The distress is intentionally inflicted;
 - (ii) The distress is inflicted by outrageous or extreme conduct; and
- (iii) The claimant had a reasonable apprehension of imminent bodily harm.
- (3) "Private insurance" means sources of recompense available by contract, such as life and/or disability insurance.
- (4) "Public insurance" means any state or federal statutory welfare and insurance plan which provides recompense to victims or their beneficiaries as a result of the claimed injury or death. This does not include state, federal, or private deferred income retirement plans.
- (5) The test used to define "the result of" as used in RCW 7.68.070 is two pronged. First, it must be determined that Cause in Fact exists, and second, it must them be determined that Proximate Cause exists.
- (a) Cause-in-fact exists if "but-for" the acts of the victim the injury producing crime would not have occurred.
- (b) Proximate cause exists if, once cause-in-fact is found, it is determined that the acts of the victim:
 - (i) Resulted in a foreseeable injury to the victim;
 - (ii) Played a substantial role in the injury; and
 - (iii) Were the direct cause of the injury.
- (6) "Institutions maintained and operated by Department of Social and Health Services" shall mean those institutions in which the Department of Social and Health Services assumes responsibility for medical coverage of the institution's residents.
 - (7) "Reasonable cooperation" generally exists when the claimant is:
- (a) Willing to talk to police and give information to aid in the investigation; and
 - (b) Willing to assist in the prosecution of the alleged criminal.
- (8) "First two hundred dollars" means that the claimant is not reimbursed for the first two hundred dollars of loss sustained and the claimant must suffer two hundred dollars in damages before she or he is eligible for benefits. The loss is the first \$200.00 of loss that is incurred by the claimant. If the \$200.00 includes both time loss and medical costs, the Department will deduct the \$200.00 from the time loss. This provision does not apply to costs covered by RCW 7.68.170.

NEW SECTION

WAC 296-30-020 VEHICULAR ASSAULT AND VEHICULAR HOMICIDE. The Crime Victim's Act shall cover those people killed or injured as a result of a vehicular homicide or vehicular assault only after the July 24, 1983 effective date if there has been a conviction for the vehicular assault or vehicular homicide. Eligibility under this section occurs when the claimant's injury results in the assailant's conviction for vehicular assault or vehicular homicide, or when the claimant's injury is a direct result of the collision which led to the vehicular assault or vehicular homicide conviction. The claimant's injury need not be the one which led to the conviction.

NEW SECTION

WAC 296-30-050 DISTRIBUTION OF THIRD PARTY RE-COVERIES. (1) Prior to July, 1977. Any claimant who receives Crime Victim's benefits is required to fully reimburse the Department for all benefits paid to the claimant under this Act if the claimant recovers damages from the person or persons who committed the criminal act. The reimbursement is limited to that amount recovered by the victim.

- (2) After July, 1977 and before April 1, 1980. Any claimant who receives Crime Victim's benefits is required to fully reimburse the Department for all benefits paid to the claimant under this Act if the claimant recovers damages from any liable party. The reimbursement is limited to that amount recovered by the victim.
- (3) Injury/death occurred on or after April 1, 1980 and any recovery made before July 24, 1983. This amendment incorporated the industrial insurance third party recovery statutes RCW 51.24.050-.100 into the Crime Victim's Act. The amendment changed the Department's entitlement to reimbursement. For those victims injured or killed on or after April 1, 1980, and for any recovery made prior to July 24, 1983, disbursement of any award or settlement is as follows:
 - (a) Reasonable attorney's fees.
 - (b) Victim receives 25% of the balance.

- (c) The Department shall receive the balance to the extent necessary to reimburse the Department for benefits paid.
 - (d) Any remaining balance is paid to the victim.
- (e) If any remaining balance is paid to the victim, no further crime victim benefits will be paid to the victim until the amount of benefits she or he continued to be eligible for equals the remaining balance paid at the time of settlement or award.
- (4) Recoveries made on or after July 24, 1983. This section applies to all claimants who receive an award or settlement from a liable third party on or after July 24, 1983. These awards shall be disbursed as follows:
- (a) Costs and reasonable attorney's fees paid proportionately by the victim and the Department.
 - (b) Victim then receives 25% of the balance.
- (c) Department receives the balance to the extent necessary to reimburse the Department for its lien minus attorney's fees.
 - (d) Any remaining balance goes to the victim.
- (e) The Department may compromise its lien for injuries which were sustained on or after April 1, 1980.
 - (5) Steps for determining proportionate attorney's fees:
 - (a) Determine the settlement/award obtained by the claimant.
 - (b) Determine attorney's fees and costs.
- (c) For an open claim, determine the amount of the Department's lien at the time of settlement/award. If the claim is closed at the time of the recovery, determine the claimant's full entitlement from the Department.
- (6) Calculate what percent of the total recovery equals the Department's lien for open cases, and the claimant's entitlement for closed claims. This percent is the Department's proportionate share.

Ex.:	\$1,000	Recovery
	\$ 200	Attorney's fees and costs
	\$ 100	Department lien
	\$ 20	Department's proportionate share of attorney's fees and costs.
	\$ 100	Equals 10% of the total recovery, thus the Department's proportionate share of attorney's fees and costs is 10%.

(7) Once the claim is closed, the Department shall reexamine its proportionate share. If the claimant's final entitlement is greater than the amount of the Department's lien at the time of recovery, the Department shall reimburse the claimant for the Department's increased percentage of the attorney's fees and costs.

NEW SECTION

WAC 296-30-060 REQUIREMENT TO REPORT CRIMINAL ACTS. (1) The following are examples under which the seventy-two hour reporting requirement in RCW 7.68.060(2) will be tolled:

- (a) Coma of victim.
- (b) Youth of victim (because of age victim is unaware that a crime has been committed against her).
 - (c) Rape Trauma Syndrome.
- (d) A report of an assault against a child made to Children's Protective Services when such report is made within seventy-two hours of when it reasonably could have been made.
- (2) This list is not and should not be considered exhaustive but is for application purposes.

NEW SECTION

WAC 296-30-080 MEDICAL AID. RCW 7.68.080 is hereby interpreted to allow treatment as follows:

(1) Evaluation and counseling by a counselor with a MSW or equivalent degree in a related discipline. 45-50 minutes, with report 40 units.

NEW SECTION

WAC 296-30-130 LUMP SUM BENEFITS. (1) Lump sume benefits paid to the survivor(s) of an unemployed victim will be paid on a monthly basis if the survivor(s) is entitled to private or public death benefits. The death benefit payments will be deducted each month from the crime victim's death benefits. Crime victim's benefit payments will continue until the combined public or private death benefits and the crime victim's death benefits equal the total amount that the survivor(s) is eligible for under the Crime Victim's Act.

(2) The amount of the monthly payments will be based on the state's average monthly wage and will be determined by the percenta-

ges established in RCW 51.32.050.

(3) This lump sum payment will be adjusted upward by a factor of 8% to reflect the present and future value of the money.

- (4) The survivor(s) of an employed victim are entitled to a maximum of ten thousand dollars in death benefits. These benefits will be paid in the same manner as the benefits paid to the survivor(s) of an unemployed victim except that the monthly rate shall be determined by the deceased's regular rate of pay.
- (5) This procedure was adopted to ensure equal treatment of survivor(s) in like circumstances.

NEW SECTION

WAC 296-30-170 MEDICAL BENEFITS. (1) Victims of sexual assault shall be entitled to benefits under this statute regardless of whether she or he qualifies for benefits under this Act, Provided, the hospital or emergency medical facility proves to the department that:

- (a) The care was provided/
- (b) The victim was not billed; and
- (c) The examination was performed for the purpose of gathering medical evidence for possible prosecution of the assailant.

NEW SECTION

WAC 296-30-900 EFFECTIVE DATE OF AMENDATORY ACTS. (1) The statute in effect at the time the criminally caused injury occurred is the controlling law.

NEW SECTION

WAC 388-83-012 ASSIGNMENT OF RIGHTS. To be eligible for medical assistance an applicant shall assign to the state of Washington, department of social and health services, all right, title, and interest to any medical care support available pursuant to an order of a court or administrative agency and any third party payments for medical care.

AMENDATORY SECTION (Amending Order 1930, filed 12/29/82)

WAC 388-85-105 CERTIFICATION OF ELIGIBILITY. Entitlement to medical assistance continues until the individual is determined ineligible for cash assistance.

- (1) When eligibility for AFDC is terminated:
- (a) For AFDC cash assistance due to increased income or increased hours from employment, medical assistance shall continue for four calendar months beginning with month of ineligibility.
- (b) For AFDC cash assistance due to reaching state legal age of majority, a determination and a certification of eligibility for medical assistance under another program category will be made.
- (c) Lack of cooperation in WIN or lack of school attendance is not an eligibility factor, redetermination of eligibility for medical assistance will be made according to appropriate cash program.
- (d) For AFDC cash assistance due solely to the loss of the thirty dollars plus one—third or the thirty dollar income exemption, medical assistance shall continue for nine calendar months beginning with the month of ineligibility.
- (2) Redetermination of eligibility for medical assistance shall be the same as for the related cash assistance program:
- (a) For individuals under age eighteen not related to SSI, eligibility shall be redetermined every six months using AFDC financial criteria.
- (b) For individuals in medical institutions eligibility shall be determined every twelve months.

- (3) Any change in circumstances relating to the individual's financial or medical eligibility must be reported within twenty days to the CSO.
- (4) Client notification procedures for any change of eligibility shall be the same as for cash assistance.

AMENDATORY SECTION (Amending Order 2096, filed 4/18/84)

WAC 388-24-044 MANDATORY MONTHLY REPORTING. (1) As a condition of continuing eligibility for AFDC ((and RA)), certain recipients must return to the department a completed monthly ((status)) report (((MSR))) by the fifth day of the month following the month for which the ((MSR)) report describes the household circumstances. Recipients ((who must report)) reporting monthly are those ((whose certification and computation of grant form indicates)) who:

- (a) ((Income budgeted from the grant)) Are currently employed, or
- (b) ((Deprivation or reduction in earnings occurring within twelve months preceding the month of application for assistance)) Were employed in the two months prior to the month of application, or
- (c) ((A fraud overpayment deduction,)) Terminate employment.
 - (d) ((WIN exemption due to illness,
- (c) An individual sixteen through eighteen years of age,
 - (f) An individual without a Social Security number,

- (g) Shelter costs over eighty percent of the payment standard)) Recipients in subsection (1)(b) and (c) of this section shall be required to report for three months.
- (2) Failure to return a completed ((MSR)) report by the fifth day of the month shall result in termination except as provided in subsection (3) of this section.
- (3) If the recipient furnishes the completed report to the department within ten days from the date of a termination notice pursuant to subsections (1) and (2) of this section, the department shall:
 - (a) Accept the replacement form; and
- (b) Reinstate assistance if the information on the replacement form indicates the recipient is still eligible.
- (4) If the information on the replacement form indicates the recipient is ineligible or eligible for an amount less than the prior month's payment, the department must ((notify)) give adequate notice to the recipient ((according to chapter 388-33 WAC)).

In the matter of amending WAC 480-90-021 and 480-90-071 relating to gas companies; amending 480-100-021 and 480-100-071 relating to electric companies; adopting 480-90-072 relating to gas companies; and adopting 480-100-072 relating to electric companies.

This action is taken pursuant to Notice No. WSR 84-20-048 filed with the code reviser on September 28, 1984. This rule change hereinafter adopted shall take effect pursuant to RCW 34.04.040(2).

This rule-making proceeding is brought on pursuant to RCW 80.01.040 and is intended administratively to implement these statutes.

This rule-making proceeding is in compliance with the Open Public Meetings Act (chapter 42.30 RCW), the Administrative Procedure Act (chapter 34.04 RCW), the State Register Act (chapter 34.08 RCW), the State Environmental Policy Act of 1971 (chapter 43.21C RCW), and the Regulatory Fairness Act (chapter 19.85 RCW).

Pursuant to Notice No. WSR 84-20-048 the above matter was scheduled for consideration at 9:00 a.m., Wednesday, November 7, 1984, in the Commission's Hearing Room, Sixth Floor, Highways-Licenses Building, Olympia, Washington, before Chairman Robert W.

Bratton and Commissioners Mary D. Hall and A. J. "Bud" Pardini.

Under the terms of said notice, interested persons were afforded the opportunity to submit data, views, or arguments to the commission in writing prior to November 2, 1984. Under the terms of said notice, interested persons were afforded the opportunity to submit data, views, or arguments orally at 9:00 a.m., Wednesday, November 7, 1984, in the Commission's Hearing Room, Sixth Floor, Highways-Licenses Building, Olympia, Washington.

At the November 7, 1984, meeting the commission considered the rule change proposal. Written comments were received from Washington Natural Gas Company, Puget Sound Power and Light Company, Northwest Natural Gas Company and the Washington Water Power Company. Oral statements at the open public meeting were presented by Bill Baker (Puget Power), Bryan Matsuyama (Cascade Natural Gas), Paul Hoglund (Washington Natural Gas), Dan Morin (Whatcom County Opportunity Council), Tom Chin (Evergreen Legal Services), Art Hoover (the Washington Water Power Company), and Chuck Adams (Public Counsel Division, Office of the Attorney General). Generally the comments favored the rule change, but the utilities sought a policy statement as to alleged implications of this rule on other commission rules pertaining to the obligation to provide service.

The rule change affects no economic values.

In reviewing the entire record herein, it has been determined that WAC 480-90-021 and 480-90-071 relating to gas companies and 480-100-021 and 480-100-071 relating to electric companies should be amended; and 480-90-072 relating to gas companies and 480-100-072 relating to electric companies should be adopted to read as set forth in Appendix A, shown below, and by this reference made a part hereof. The amendment of WAC 480-90-021, 480-90-071, 480-100-021 and 480-100-071 as well as the adoption of 480-90-072 and 480-100-072 were designed to ensure that regulated gas and electric utilities provide home heating to low income residential households between November 15 and March 15, provided the residential customer meets certain qualifications and abides by a payment plan to be arranged between the customer and the utility.

ORDER

WHEREFORE, IT IS ORDERED That WAC 480–90–021 and 480–90–071, relating to gas companies and 480–100–021 and 480–100–071 relating to electric companies be amended; and 480–90–072 relating to gas companies and 480–100–072 relating to electric companies be adopted as set forth in Appendix A, as a rule of the Washington Utilities and Transportation Commission to take effect pursuant to RCW 34.04.040(2).

IT IS FURTHER ORDERED That the order and the annexed rule, after first being recorded in the order register of the Washington Utilities and Transportation Commission, shall be forwarded to the code reviser for filing pursuant to chapter 34.04 RCW and chapter 1-12 WAC.

APPENDIX "A"

AMENDATORY SECTION (Amending Order R-27, filed 7/15/71)

WAC 480-90-021 GLOSSARY. (1) Commission – the Washington utilities and transportation commission.

- (2) Utility any corporation, company, association, joint stock association, partnership, person, their lessees, trustees or receivers appointed by any court whatsoever, owning, controlling, operating or managing any gas plant within the state of Washington for the purpose of furnishing gas service to the public for hire and subject to the jurisdiction of the commission.
- (3) Customer any person, partnership, firm, corporation, municipality, co-operative organization, governmental agency, etc., who or which is receiving service from a utility or has completed an application to any utility for service.
- (4) Gas any fuel gas, whether manufactured, natural, liquid petroleum or any mixture of these.
- (a) Natural gas a mixture of gaseous hydrocarbons and nonhydrocarbons, chiefly methane, occurring naturally in the earth which is delivered from the producing equipment to the customers through transmission and/or distribution systems.
- (b) Liquefied petroleum gas a gas consisting of vapors of one or more of the paraffin hydrocarbons, or a combination of one or more of these vapors with air.
- (c) Manufactured gas any gas produced artificially by any process in which the gas is delivered from the generating or producing equipment into the transmission or distribution system.
- (5) Cubic foot of gas a volumetric unit of measure used in sales and testing.
- (a) Sales for the purpose of measuring gas for billing a cubic foot is normally that amount which occupies a volume of one cubic foot under the conditions existing in the customer's meter and as indicated thereon. However pressure and/or temperature recording or compensating devices may be employed to reflect other temperature or pressure base conditions for computing the volume sold. When temperature and/or pressure compensation factors are to be used to compute the volume of gas sold they will be used as set forth in the utility's tariff.
- (b) Testing for the purpose of testing, a cubic foot of gas shall be that amount which at a temperature of sixty degrees fahrenheit and pressure of 14.73 pounds per square inch absolute, and free of water vapor, occupies a volume of one cubic foot.
- (6) British thermal unit (Btu) the quality of heat required to raise the temperature of one pound of water at 60° fahrenheit and standard pressure, one degree fahrenheit
 - (7) Therm a unit of heat equal to 100,000 Btu's.

- (8) Meter test a test of the volumetric accuracy of a meter.
- (a) Periodic test a routine test made in the regular course of a utility's operation.
- (b) Complaint test a test made as the result of a customer request.
- (c) Proof test a test made prior to each setting of a meter. New meters which are, upon receipt by the utility, acceptance tested to an acceptable sampling plan need not be 100% proof tested prior to the initial installation.
- (d) Special test any test other than a periodic, complaint or proof test.
- (9) Energy assistance grantee a grantee of the department of community development which administers federally funded energy assistance programs.
- (10) Household income the total of all household members as determined by the department of social and health services or department of community development eligibility requirements for low income assistance.
- (11) Payment arrangement payment schedule by written or oral agreement between the customer and the utility.
- (12) Payment plan payment schedule by written agreement between the customer and the utility under WAC 480-90-072(3).
- (13) Winter period November 15 through March 15.

In the application of these rules, those terms used in the public service laws of the state of Washington will have the meaning therein ascribed to them.

Terms not defined in these rules or the applicable statutes are to be given that meaning generally accepted in the gas industry.

AMENDATORY SECTION (Amending Order R-153, Cause No. U-80-97, filed 12/23/80)

WAC 480-90-071 DISCONTINUANCE OF SERVICE. By customer – a customer shall be required to give notice to the utility of his <u>or her</u> intention to discontinue service.

By utility – (1) service may be discontinued by the utility for any of the following reasons:

- (a) For the nonpayment of bills. The utility shall require that bills for service be paid within a specified time after issuance. The minimum specified time shall be fifteen days. Upon the expiration of said specified time without payment, payment arrangement, or a payment plan, the bill may be considered delinquent.
- (b) For the use of gas for purposes or properties other than that specified in the application.
- (c) Under flat rate service, for increased use of gas without approval of the utility.
- (d) For wilful waste of gas through improper or imperfect pipes, fixtures, or otherwise.
- (e) For failure of the customer to eliminate any hazardous condition found to exist in his facilities (i.e., piping, venting, appliances, etc.).
 - (f) For tampering with the utility's property.
 - (g) In case of vacation of the premises by customer.
- (h) For nonpayment of any proper charges, including deposit, as provided in the tariff of the utility.

- (i) For refusal to comply with provisions of WAC 480-90-091, access to premises.
- (j) For violation of rules, service agreements, or filed tariff(s).
- (k) For use of equipment which adversely affects the utility's service to its other customers.
- (1) For fraudulent obtaining or use of service. Whenever a fraudulent obtaining or use of the service is detected the utility may discontinue service without notice: PROVIDED, HOWEVER, That if the customer shall make immediate payment for such estimated amount of service as had been fraudulently taken and all costs resulting from such fraudulent use, the utility shall continue such service, subject to any applicable deposit requirements. If a second offense as to fraudulent obtaining or use is detected the utility may refuse to reestablish service subject to appeal to the commission. The burden of proof of such fraudulent obtaining or use will be upon the utility in case of an appeal to the commission. This rule shall not be interpreted as relieving the customer or other person of civil or criminal responsibility.
- (m) For failure to keep any agreed upon payment plan.
- (2) Except in case of danger to life or property, fraudulent use, impairment of service, or violation of law, no utility shall discontinue service unless the following conditions are met:
- (a) ((Before effecting disconnection of service, a utility shall make a good faith, bona fide effort to reach the customer in person or by telephone to advise the customer of the pending disconnection and the reasons therefor. Where telephone contact is elected, at least two attempts to reach a customer by telephone shall be made during the utility's regular business hours. If a business or message telephone number is provided by the customer, the utility shall endeavor by that means to reach the customer if unable to make contact through the customer's home telephone. A log or record of the attempts shall be maintained by the utility showing the telephone number called and the time of call. Telephone or personal contact shall not be a substitute for written notice of disconnection as specified below.
- (b) (i) Each utility shall provide written notice of disconnection served on the customer either by mail or, at its option, by personal delivery of the notice to the customer's address. If a mailed notice is elected, service shall not be disconnected prior to the eighth business day following mailing of the notice: If personal delivery is elected, disconnection shall not be permitted prior to 5 p.m. of the first business day following delivery. Delivered notice shall be deemed effective if handed to a person of apparent competence in the residence or, if a business account, a person employed at the place of business of the service customer. If no person is available to receive notice, notice shall be deemed served if attached to the primary door of the residence unit or business office at which service is provided. If service is not discontinued within ten working days of the first day on which disconnection may be effected, unless other mutually acceptable arrangements have been made, that disconnect notice shall become void and a new notice shall

- be required before the service can be discontinued.)) Each utility shall provide written notice of disconnection served on the customer either by mail or, at its option, by personal delivery of the notice to the customer's address. If such written notice of disconnection is for nonpayment during the winter period, the utility shall advise the customer of the payment plan which is available pursuant to WAC 480-90-072(3), payment arrangements and responsibilities. If a mailed notice is elected, service shall not be disconnected prior to the eighth business day following mailing of the notice. If personal delivery is elected, disconnection shall not be permitted prior to 5 p.m. of the first business day following delivery. Delivered notice shall be deemed effective if handed to a person of apparent competence in the residence or, if a business account, a person employed at the place of business of the service customer. If no person is available to receive notice, notice shall be deemed served if attached to the primary door of the residence unit or business office at which service is provided. If service is not discontinued within ten working days of the first day on which disconnection may be effected, a new notice shall be required before the service can be discontinued.
- (b)(i) Before effecting disconnection of service, a utility shall make a good faith, bona fide effort to reach the customer in person or by telephone to advise the customer of the pending disconnection and the reasons therefor. Where telephone contact is elected, at least two attempts to reach a customer by telephone shall be made during the utility's regular business hours. If a business or message telephone number is provided by the customer, the utility shall endeavor by that means to reach the customer if unable to make contact through the customer's home telephone. A log or record of the attempts shall be maintained by the utility showing the telephone number called and the time of call. Telephone or personal contact shall not be a substitute for written notice of disconnection as specified above.
- (ii) Where the service address is different from the billing address, the utility shall in all instances prior to effecting discontinuance of service upon its own initiative provide notice to the service address except as provided in subsection (2)(e) of this section regarding master meters. If personal service is effected upon the billing address, then personal service must be effected upon the service address; if service by mail is effected to the billing address, then service by mail must also be effected to the service address.

The utility shall offer all customers the opportunity to make such designation. In either case, it shall not effect termination until five business days after provision of notice to the third party. Utilities shall discover which social agencies are appropriate for and willing to receive such notice, and the name and/or title of the person able to deal with the termination situation, and shall inform the commission on a current basis which agencies and position titles receive such notifications.
- (3) Payment of any delinquent amounts to a designated payment agency of the utility shall constitute payment to the utility, if the customer informs the utility of such payment and the utility verifies such payment.

- (d) Apply to the utility or other appropriate agency for low income weatherization assistance if such assistance is applicable for the dwelling;
- (e) Agrees to a payment plan designed to pay the past due bill by the following October 15, as well as paying for continued utility service.

AMENDATORY SECTION (Amending Order R-29, filed 7/15/71)

WAC 480-100-021 GLOSSARY. (1) Commission - the Washington utilities and transportation commission.

AMENDATORY SECTION (Amending Order 8, filed 9/9/68)

WAC 113-12-080 VITAMINS, MINERALS AND FOOD SUPPLEMENTS. (1) No chiropractor shall sell or dispense or permit to be sold or dispensed any vitamins, minerals or food supplements.

- (2) Dietary advice may include the recommendation of vitamins, minerals and food supplements as long as they are recommended for the normal regimen of the patient and not for treatment of a specific disease. The normal regimen of the patient shall not include therapeutic levels of vitamins, minerals and food supplements.
- (3) The chiropractor shall not receive any direct or indirect profit from the sale of vitamins, minerals and food supplements as provided in chapter 19.68 RCW.

Reviser's note: RCW 34.04.058 requires the use of underlining and deletion marks to indicate amendments to existing rules. The rule published above varies from its predecessor in certain respects not indicated by the use of these markings.

NEW SECTION

WAC 113-12-190 PUBLIC TESTIMONIAL AD-VERTISING. (1) Public Testimonial advertising includes the use of a statement testifying as to a chiropractor's qualifications, abilities and character or to the value of chiropractic services.

- (2) The use of testimonial advertising will not be considered false or misleading if the following guidelines are met:
- (a) Testimonials must relate to patient care provided within the immediately preceding five-year period.
- (b) The testimonial should be documented by a notarized statement of the patient, a copy of which is kept by both the chiropractor and the patient.

- (c) The testimonial must be consistent with the history of the patient's care, including office records, examination reports and x-rays.
 - (d) Testimonials should not:
 - (i) be exaggerated or misrepresented.
 - (ii) state that a technique or doctor is superior.
 - (iii) claim specific cures.
 - (iv) compare one chiropractor to another.
 - (v) include a named diagnosis.

NEW SECTION

WAC 113-12-195 FULL DISCLOSURE OF COST OF SERVICES. (1) This rule will apply to all representations made in public advertising regarding the provision of chiropractic services, including x-rays or chiropractic examinations, on a free basis or at a reduced cost.

- (2) When a chiropractic service is represented in public advertising as available without cost or at a reduced cost that service must be made available to everyone who wishes to take advantage of the offer on an equal basis. No charge may be made to any individual or third party health care payor for any services which have been provided on a free basis. Billings to patients or to third party health care payors should accurately reflect the actual charge to the patient, including any discounts, reduced fees or waiver of co-payment.
- (3) All billings to third party payors for patients who are also being treated for an unrelated condition must fully disclose the additional treatment being provided and the charges for that treatment.

AMENDATORY SECTION (Amending Order PL 380, filed 6/4/81)

WAC 113-12-200 SCOPE OF PRACTICE—RE-VOCATION OR SUSPENSION OF LICENSE AUTHORIZED FOR PRACTICE OUTSIDE SCOPE.

- (1) The chiropractic disciplinary board finds that over the past few years there has been an increasing number of persons licensed as chiropractors who have been practicing other healing arts while holding themselves out to the public as chiropractors to the detriment of the public health and welfare of the state of Washington and contrary to the legislative directive contained in RCW 18.26.010(5). The board further finds and deems it necessary to carry out the provisions of chapter 18.26 RCW that this rule be adopted to give guidance to members of the profession, and the public, in interpreting for purposes of application by the disciplinary board of RCW 18.26.030, the scope of health care which comes within the definition of chiropractic in RCW 18.25.005 and which is authorized under a license to practice chiropractic in the state of Washington.
- (2) RCW 18.25.005 defines the term "chiropractic" for purposes of chapters 18.25 and 18.26 RCW, as that practice of health care which deals with the detection of subluxations, which shall be defined as any alteration of the biomechanical and physiological dynamics of contiguous spinal structures which can cause neuronal disturbances, the chiropractic procedure preparatory to, and complementary to the correction thereof, by adjustment

or manipulation of the articulations of the vertebral column and its immediate articulations for the restoration and maintenance of health; it includes the normal regimen and rehabilitation of the patient, physical examination to determine the necessity for chiropractic care, the use of x-ray and other analytical instruments generally used in the practice of chiropractic: PROVIDED, That no chiropractor shall prescribe or dispense any medicine or drug nor practice obstetrics or surgery nor use x-rays for therapeutic purposes: PROVIDED, HOWEVER, That the term "chiropractic" as defined in this act shall not prohibit a practitioner licensed under chapter 18.71 RCW from performing accepted medical procedures, except such procedures shall not include the adjustment by hand of any articulation of the spine: AND PRO-VIDED FURTHER, That nothing herein shall be construed to prohibit the rendering of dietary advice.

- (3) The board finds that the following diagnostic techniques and procedures, by whatever name known, are not within the definition of "chiropractic" as specified in (2) above and in RCW 18.25.005, and, consequently, a license to practice chiropractic does not authorize their use:
- (a) The use of x-rays or other forms of radiation for any other reason than to x-ray the human skeleton.
 - (b) The use of any form of electrocardiogram.
- (c) The testing and reduction to mathematical formulae of sputum and/or urine (commonly known as "Reams" testing).
 - (d) Hair analysis.
- (e) The use of a vasculizer or plethysonograph (commonly known as plethysmography) except for research purposes.
 - (f) The use of iridology.
 - (g) The taking of blood samples.

The above list is not to be considered exhaustive or to limit the board in any way from finding under the statutory definition in RCW 18.25.005 that any other diagnostic technique or procedure is outside the scope of chiropractic practice.

- (4) The board finds that the following treatment modalities, by whatever name known, are not within the definition of "chiropractic" as specified in (2) above and in RCW 18.25.005 and, consequently, a license to practice chiropractic does not authorize their use:
- (a) Ultrasound, diathermy, high voltage galvanic therapy and x-rays or other radiation.
 - (b) Colonic irrigation.
 - (c) Extremity adjusting.
 - (d) Electrotherapy.
- (e) The use of a transcutaneous electrical nerve stimulator (TENS).
 - (f) The use of the endonasal technique.
- (g) The use of any type of casting other than light body casting.
- (h) The use of meridian therapy (whether known as "acupressure," "trigger point therapy" or the same type of therapy under any other name.)
- (((i) Prescribing of specific vitamin and food supplements for treatment of specific diseases:
- (j) Selling of vitamins or food supplements for any reason:))

- $((\frac{k}{k}))$ (i) The use of hypnosis for any other than relaxation purposes.
 - (((1))) (j) The use of clinical herbology.

The above list is not to be considered exhaustive or to limit the board in any way from finding under the statutory definition in RCW 18.25.005 that any other treatment modalities are outside the scope of chiropractic practice.

(5) In accord with the legislative directive of RCW 18.26.010(5), the use by a chiropractor of diagnostic techniques or procedures or treatment modalities which are outside the definition of chiropractic in RCW 18.25-.005, whether or not listed in this rule, or the use by a chiropractor of any of the diagnostic techniques and procedures listed in (3) above or the use by a chiropractor of any of the treatment modalities listed in (4) above shall constitute unprofessional conduct under RCW 18-.26.030 (10) and (11) which shall be good and sufficient cause for revocation or suspension of that chiropractor's license to practice chiropractic in Washington.

NEW SECTION

WAC 113-12-210 CLINICALLY NECESSARY X-RAYS. All offers of free x-rays should be accompanied by a disclosure statement that x-rays will only be taken if clinically necessary in order to avoid unnecessary radiation exposure.

WSR 84-23-034 ADOPTED RULES CHIROPRACTIC DISCIPLINARY BOARD

The Purpose of the Rule Change: To change the implementation date of the DRG pricing system.

The Reason These Rules are Necessary: Implementation problems.

Summary of the Rule Change: The implementation of the diagnosis related group (DRG) based pricing system is being changed from October 1, 1984, to January 1, 1985.

AMENDATORY SECTION (Amending Order 2162, filed 10/18/84)

WAC 388-87-070 PAYMENT—HOSPITAL CARE. (1) The department will pay hospital costs of eligible persons who are patients in general hospitals when such hospitals meet the criteria as defined in RCW 70.41.020.

Recipients must have been approved as financially and medically eligible for hospitalization. They are:

- (a) Categorically needy recipients;
- (b) Limited casualty program recipients;
- (i) Medically needy recipients;
- (ii) Medically indigent recipients;
- (c) Recipients of continuing general assistance.
- (2) For hospital admissions and outpatient services occurring between July 1, 1982, and ((September 30)) December 31, 1984, and for services described in subsections (5)(a), (b) and (6) of this section, except for nonallowable revenue codes, reimbursable cost will be determined by the application of the ratio of hospital commission approved operating expense and total rate setting revenue. For all administrative days, days of hospitalization in which medical necessity is below that appropriate for acute hospital care, the departments maximum reimbursement level will be the adjusted state—wide average per diem rate for skilled nursing facilities.
- (3) However, for the period February 15, 1983, through June 30, 1983, reductions in the payment rate will be applied to services provided to persons eligible for the medically indigent component of the limited casualty program and recipients of continuing general assistance. For these two eligibility groups, hospitals will be statistically clustered into groupings on their base of full-charge paying patients. A different reduction in the payment rate will be applied to each group of hospitals as follows:

(4) However, for the period April 1, 1984, through ((September 30)) December 31, 1984, and for services described in subsection (5)(a) through (d) of this section reductions in the payment rate will be applied to services provided to persons eligible for the medically indigent component of the limited casualty program and recipients of continuing general assistance. For these two eligibility groups, hospitals will be statistically clustered into groupings on their base of full-charge paying patients. A different reduction in the payment rate will be applied to each group of hospitals as follows:

Payment amounts will be based upon historical average costs per discharge adjusted for case mix and indexed to the current period, with the following exceptions:
- (a) The payment rates for certain rehabilitation, pain treatment, psychiatric, alcoholism treatment and detoxification, and long-term hospital-level care services will be determined in accordance with the methods described in subsections (2) and (4) of this section.
- (b) The payment rate for services provided to patients occupying beds utilized by the Fred Hutchinson Cancer Research Center bone marrow transplant program will be determined by multiplying the applicable ratio of operating expense to revenue times allowable charges and applying the reduction described in subsection (4) of this section, as appropriate.
- (c) The payment rate for children's hospitals will be determined by computing the ratio of indexed historical cost to total rate setting revenue, not to exceed the hospital commission approved ratio of operating expense to total rate setting revenue. This ratio shall be multiplied times allowable charges. As appropriate, the reduction described in subsection (4) of this section will be applied.
- (d) The payment rates for cases meeting the criteria of cost outlier will be set at eighty percent of the rates determined in accordance with the methods described in subsections (2) and (4) of this section.
- (e) For the period ((October -1, 1984)) January 1, 1985, through June 30, 1985, reductions in the payment rate will be applied to services which are provided to persons eligible for the medically indigent component of the limited casualty program and recipients of continuing general assistance and are not covered under (a), (b), (c), or (d) of this subsection. For these two eligibility groups, hospitals will be statistically clustered into groupings on their base of full-charge paying patients. A different reduction in the per-case payment rate will be applied to each group of hospitals as follows:

WAC 388-87-070 PAYMENT—HOSPITAL CARE. (1) The department will pay hospital costs of eligible persons who are patients in general hospitals when such hospitals meet the criteria as defined in RCW 70.41.020.

Recipients must have been approved as financially and medically eligible for hospitalization. They are:

- (a) Categorically needy recipients;
- (b) Limited casualty program recipients;
- (i) Medically needy recipients;
- (ii) Medically indigent recipients;
- (c) Recipients of continuing general assistance.
- (2) For hospital admissions and outpatient services occurring between July 1, 1982, and ((September 30)) December 31, 1984, and for services described in subsections (5)(a), (b) and (6) of this section, except for nonallowable revenue codes, reimbursable cost will be determined by the application of the ratio of hospital commission approved operating expense and total rate setting revenue. For all administrative days, days of hospitalization in which medical necessity is below that appropriate for acute hospital care, the departments maximum reimbursement level will be the adjusted state—wide average per diem rate for skilled nursing facilities.

(3) However, for the period February 15, 1983, through June 30, 1983, reductions in the payment rate will be applied to services provided to persons eligible for the medically indigent component of the limited casualty program and recipients of continuing general assistance. For these two eligibility groups, hospitals will be statistically clustered into groupings on their base of full-charge paying patients. A different reduction in the payment rate will be applied to each group of hospitals as follows:

For these two eligibility groups, hospitals will be statistically clustered into groupings on their base of full-charge paying patients. A different reduction in the payment rate will be applied to each group of hospitals as follows:

- (5) For inpatient hospital discharges related to admissions occurring on or after ((October 1, 1984)) January 1, 1985, payment amounts will be determined according to a diagnosis-related group based pricing system. Payment amounts will be based upon historical average costs per discharge adjusted for case mix and indexed to the current period, with the following exceptions:
- (a) The payment rates for certain rehabilitation, pain treatment, psychiatric, alcoholism treatment and detoxification, and long-term hospital-level care services will be determined in accordance with the methods described in subsections (2) and (4) of this section.
- (b) The payment rate for services provided to patients occupying beds utilized by the Fred Hutchinson Cancer Research Center bone marrow transplant program will be determined by multiplying the applicable ratio of operating expense to revenue times allowable charges and applying the reduction described in subsection (4) of this section, as appropriate.
- (c) The payment rate for children's hospitals will be determined by computing the ratio of indexed historical cost to total rate setting revenue, not to exceed the hospital commission approved ratio of operating expense to total rate setting revenue. This ratio shall be multiplied times allowable charges. As appropriate, the reduction

described in subsection (4) of this section will be applied.

- (d) The payment rates for cases meeting the criteria of cost outlier will be set at eighty percent of the rates determined in accordance with the methods described in subsections (2) and (4) of this section.
- (e) For the period ((October 1, 1984)) January 1, 1985, through June 30, 1985, reductions in the payment rate will be applied to services which are provided to persons eligible for the medically indigent component of the limited casualty program and recipients of continuing general assistance and are not covered under (a), (b), (c), or (d) of this subsection. For these two eligibility groups, hospitals will be statistically clustered into groupings on their base of full-charge paying patients. A different reduction in the per-case payment rate will be applied to each group of hospitals as follows:

NEW SECTION

WAC 437-06-010 PURPOSE. The purpose of this chapter shall be to ensure compliance by the Washington State Sentencing Guidelines Commission with the provisions of the Public Disclosure Act, RCW 42.17.250 through 42.17.340 in conjunction with the Criminal Records Privacy Act, Ch. 10.97 RCW, as well as RCW 9.94A.

NEW SECTION

WAC 437-06-020 DEFINITIONS. (1) "Public Record" includes any writing containing information relating to the conduct of government or the performance of any governmental or proprietary function prepared, owned, used or retained by the Commission regardless of physical form or characteristics.

- (2) "Writing" means handwriting, typewriting, printing, photostating, photographings, and every other means of recording any form of communication or representation, including letters, words, pictures, sounds, or symbols, or combination thereof; and all papers, maps, magnetic or paper tapes, photographic films and prints, magnetic or punched cards, discs, drums, and other documents.
- (3) "Commission" means the Washington State Sentencing Guidelines Commission.
 - (4) "Disclosure" means inspection and/or copying.
- (5) "Denial of disclosure" denotes any exempting from disclosure of any public record.

NEW SECTION

WAC 437-06-030 PUBLIC RECORDS AVAILABLE. Requests for any identifiable public record may be initiated at the Commission Office during normal business hours (8:00 a.m. - 12 and 1:00 p.m. - 5:00 p.m.).

The Commission shall at all times take the most timely possible action on requests for disclosure, and shall be required to respond in writing within ten working days of receipt of the request for disclosure. The Commission's failure to respond shall entitle the person seeking disclosure to petition the Public Records Officer pursuant to WAC 437-06-090.

NEW SECTION

WAC 437-06-040 PUBLIC RECORDS OFFI-CER. The Commission shall designate a Public Record Officer, located in the Commission Office, who shall be responsible for implementing the Commission's rules regarding disclosure of public records, coordinating staff in this regard, and generally ensuring compliance by the staff with public records disclosure requirements.

NEW SECTION

WAC 437-06-050 REQUEST FOR PUBLIC RECORDS. (1) The written request may include:

- (a) The name of the person requesting the record;
- (b) The time of day and calendar date on which the request is made; and
 - (c) The nature of the request.
- (2) A request for disclosure shall be made during the customary business hours or by mail. Public records shall be made available for inspection and copying during office hours. However, if these activities would interfere with essential agency functions, the agency reserves the right to require advance notice and to limit the amount of time spent on inspection of documents.
- (3) This chapter shall not be construed as giving authority to any agency to give, sell or provide access to lists of individuals requested for commercial purposes, and agencies shall not do so unless specifically authorized or directed by law.
- (4) If the public record contains material exempt from disclosure pursuant to law, including those laws cited in WAC 437-06-100, the Commission must provide the person requesting disclosure with a written explanation for the nondisclosure, pursuant to WAC 437-06-080.
- (5) Any person continuing to seek disclosure, after having received a written explanation for nondisclosure, pursuant to WAC 437-06-080, may request a review under the provisions of WAC 437-06-090.
- (6) When a person's identity is relevant to an exemption, that person may be required to provide personal identification, including photographic identification and/or fingerprints.

NEW SECTION

WAC 437-06-060 FEES - INSPECTION AND COPYING. (1) No fee shall be charged for the inspection of public records.

- (2) The Commission shall collect fees, plus postage, to reimburse itself for actual costs incident to providing copies of public records.
- (3) Nothing contained in this section shall preclude the Commission from agreeing to exchange or provide copies of manuals or other public records with other state or federal agencies. One copy of the implementation manual will be issued to public agencies upon request.
- (4) Prepayment of copying costs and postage shall be a prerequisite to copying and/or mailing of public records. However, the Public Records Officer may waive the costs of copying or postage.

NEW SECTION

WAC 437-06-070 PROTECTION OF PUBLIC RECORDS. Public records shall be disclosed only in the presence of a Public Records Officer or his or her designee, who shall withdraw the records if the person requesting disclosure acts in a manner which will damage

or substantially disorganize the records or interfere excessively with other essential functions of the Commission. This section shall not be construed to prevent the Commission from accommodating a client by use of mails in the disclosure process.

NEW SECTION

WAC 437-06-080 DISCLOSURE PROCEDURE. (1) The Public Records Officer shall review file materials prior to disclosure.

- (2) If the file does not contain materials exempt from disclosure, the Public Records Officer shall ensure full disclosure.
- (3) If the file does contain materials exempt from disclosure, the Public Records Officer shall deny disclosure of those exempt portions of the file, and shall, at the time of the denial, in writing, clearly specify the reasons for the denial of disclosure, including a statement of the specific exemptions or reasons authorizing the withholding of the record and a brief explanation of how the exemption applies. The remaining non-exempt materials shall be fully disclosed pursuant to WAC 437-06-050.

NEW SECTION

WAC 437-06-090 REMEDY FOR REVIEW OF DENIAL OF DISCLOSURE. (1) If the person requesting disclosure disagrees with the decision of a Public Records Officer denying disclosure of a public record, this person may within 20 days petition the Commission's Public Records Officer for review of the decision denying disclosure. The form used to deny disclosure of a public record shall clearly indicate this right of review.

(2) The Public Records Officer shall review decisions denying disclosure in the most prompt fashion possible, and such review shall be deemed completed at the end of the second business day following receipt by the Commission of the petition for review. This shall constitute final agency action for the purposes of judicial review, pursuant to RCW 42.17.320.

NEW SECTION

WAC 437-06-100 EXEMPTIONS TO PUBLIC RECORDS DISCLOSURE. The Commission reserves the right to determine if a public record requested in accordance with the procedures outlined herein is exempt or nondisclosable under RCW 42.17.250 through RCW 42.17.340. Nondisclosable records include, but are not limited to:

- (1) All exemptions as set forth in RCW 42.17.310(1).
- (2) Records which are relevant to a controversy to which the Commission is a party but which records would not be available to another party under the rules of a pretrial discovery for causes pending in the superior courts, including records involving attorney—client communications between the Commission and the Office of the Attorney General privileged under RCW 5.60.060(2).
- (3) Non-conviction data, as defined in RCW 10.97.030(2), shall be disclosed to the subject of the record in person in the central office of the Commission,

but may not be copied except for the purpose of challenge or correction when the person who is the subject of the record asserts the belief in writing that the information regarding such person is inaccurate or incomplete (RCW 10.97.080). Persons who are incarcerated, or their attorneys, shall receive a copy of non-conviction data upon asserting the belief in writing that the information regarding such person is inaccurate or incomplete.

NEW SECTION

WAC 437-06-110 QUALIFICATIONS ON NONDISCLOSURE. (1) To the extent that nondisclosable information can be deleted from the specific records sought, the remainder of the records shall be disclosable.

- (2) No exemptions shall be construed to require nondisclosure of statistical information not descriptive of identifiable persons, as required by RCW 42.17.310(2).
- (3) Inspection and copying of any specific records otherwise nondisclosable is permissible pursuant to an order of the superior court in accordance with the provisions of RCW 42.17.310(3).

NEW SECTION

WAC 437-06-120 INTERAGENCY DISCLO-SURE. (1) Unless prohibited by law, information may be disclosed by the Commission to outside agencies, including other state of Washington agencies, or other state agencies.

(2) Outside agencies receiving information pursuant to subsection (1) of this section shall be thereby subject to the same standards of disclosure as are required of the Commission.

CHAPTER 437-10 WAC

Bylaws

NEW SECTION

WAC 437-10-010 OFFICERS OF THE SEN-TENCING GUIDELINES COMMISSION. (1) The presiding officer of the Sentencing Guidelines Commission denominated the "chairperson" shall be appointed by the Governor. The chair shall call and preside over all meetings of the Sentencing Guidelines Commission, appoint the presiding officers and members of subcommittees of the Sentencing Guidelines Commission except as specifically provided herein, and do all such other things as are appropriate for or delegated to such officer by the Sentencing Guidelines Commission; (2) A vice-chair, appointed by the chairperson of the Sentencing Guidelines Commission, shall preside in the absence of the chair as well as act for the chair and the Sentencing Guidelines Commission under direction; (3) In the absence of both the chair and vice-chair, an acting vicechair, appointed by the Sentencing Guidelines Commission shall preside at that meeting of the Sentencing Guidelines Commission.

NEW SECTION

WAC 437-10-020 MEETINGS OF THE SENTENCING GUIDELINES COMMISSION. (1) The Sentencing Guidelines Commission shall meet at the call of its chair or upon request of any three members of the Sentencing Guidelines Commission.

- (2) Subcommittees, advisory committees shall meet upon the call of their respective presiding officers.
- (3) Policies and rules relating to the calling of, frequency, openness to the public, and opportunity for participant discussion during meetings; member's absences; quorums; rules of order; forms of action; and voting procedures pertain also to subcommittees. Minutes for the subcommittees and advisory committees shall be recorded and automatically adopted if there are not objections raised.

NEW SECTION

WAC 437-10-030 ABSENCES OF MEMBERS FROM MEETINGS. Any member who misses three consecutive meetings will have the fact called to his attention by the chair of the Sentencing Guidelines Commission with the request that the member reconsider his ability to continue as a member. The chair shall also advise the Governor of situations regarding absenteeism which he/she deems appropriate to call to the attention of the Governor and request that the Governor consider a replacement for that member.

NEW SECTION

WAC 437-10-040 QUORUM. A quorum for the transaction of business, except actions taken pursuant to Sections 4 or 16 of the Act, shall constitute no fewer than a simple majority of the voting members appointed. The members present at a meeting at which a quorum is not present may elect to proceed with the business of the meeting subject to ratification of all action taken whenever a quorum is next present at a meeting.

Actions taken pursuant to Sections 4 of 16 of the Act must be approved by an absolute majority of the voting members of the Commission.

NEW SECTION

WAC 437-10-050 PARTICIPATION AND DISCUSSION DURING SENTENCING GUIDELINES COMMISSION MEETINGS, RULES OF ORDER, AND FORMS OF ACTION. (1) Only duly appointed members or his or her designee of the Sentencing Guidelines Commission and such other persons as are recognized by the chair shall be permitted to participate in the discussion of any matter before the Sentencing Guidelines Commission unless otherwise authorized by a majority of the members of the Sentencing Guidelines Commission present and voting. Any person wishing to participate in such discussion shall notify the Sentencing Guidelines Commission in writing, not less than three days prior to the meeting at which such discussion will be held.

(2) The business of the Sentencing Guidelines Commission shall be conducted in accordance with "Robert's

Rules of Order," New Edition, unless such rules are suspended or unless otherwise provided for by these rules.

(3) The Sentencing Guidelines Commission shall act by the adoption of a motion or a resolution.

Reviser's note: Errors of punctuation or spelling in the above section occurred in the copy filed by the agency and appear herein pursuant to the requirements of RCW 34.08.040.

NEW SECTION

WAC 437-10-060 VOTING PROCEDURES. (1) Voting during meetings of the Sentencing Guidelines Commission shall be recorded.

- (2) The chairperson shall have the same voting rights as any other member of the Sentencing Guidelines Commission.
- (3) Only duly appointed members of the Sentencing Guidelines Commission (not designees) shall be permitted to vote on any issue before the Sentencing Guidelines Commission; no proxies shall be permitted to vote.
- (4) Action by the Sentencing Guidelines Commission will be determined by a simple majority vote in accordance with quorum requirements.
- (5) Any member on the Sentencing Guidelines Commission who has a direct or indirect personal interest in a contract or application before the Sentencing Guidelines Commission will withdraw himself/herself from voting on that matter. The Sentencing Guidelines Commission member may, however, participate in discussions and answer questions from other Sentencing Guidelines Commission members.

NEW SECTION

WAC 437-10-070 MINUTES. (1) All meetings of the Sentencing Guidelines Commission and subcommittees will have staff available to make a written record concerning the actions of the Commission.

- (2) Upon termination of the Sentencing Guidelines Commission meeting, the minutes shall be promptly recorded and submitted to the Commission members for final approval.
- (3) At the next scheduled meeting of the Sentencing Guidelines Commission, the minutes shall be reviewed by the Commission and any amendments or changes will be made. The commission will then adopt the minutes as final. Subcommittee minutes will be recorded and mailed to the subcommittee members. These minutes will be automatically approved and adopted if there are no suggested changes.
- (4) The chair of the Sentencing Guidelines Commission along with the executive officer will sign the approved Commission meeting minutes. The minutes will then be placed in appropriate folders for a permanent record, subject to audit and public inspection. Subcommittee minutes will be signed by the subcommittee chair and the executive officer.

NEW SECTION

WAC 437-10-080 CHANGE IN BYLAWS. (1) A section or subsection of the bylaws may be reviewed for change at the request of any voting member of the Sentencing Guidelines Commission.

(2) A change in the bylaws must be approved by a simple majority vote of the Sentencing Guidelines Commission.

Restrictions in Area 8 and the Skagit River provide protection for Skagit River origin chinook, chum and coho. Restrictions in Areas 12A and 12D provide secondary protection for Hood Canal natural chum stocks. Restrictions in Area 8A protect natural Stillaguamish River and Snohomish River chum. Restrictions in Area 13A and Minter Creek protect normal timed chum returning to Minter Creek Hatchery. Restrictions in Areas 10, 11, 13, 13C, 13E, 13H, 13I, 13J and 13K are required to protect south sound normal chum stocks. Restrictions in Area 12C are no longer required.

These rules are therefore adopted as emergency rules to take effect upon filing with the code reviser.

- (f) Leave taken voluntarily to reduce the effect of an agency reduction-in-force under the provisions of WAC 356-30-335.

WAC 356-35-010 DISABILITY—SEPARA-TION—APPEALS—PROCEDURES. (1) When a permanent employee becomes disabled, employment may be terminated by the appointing authority after a minimum of 60 calendar days written notice, provided that the employee shall be allowed to exhaust accrued sick leave before separation if the disability prevents attendance at work. If the employee is unable to work due to the disability during the notice period and there is no paid leave available, the absence shall be considered approved leave without pay. Separations due to disability shall not be considered disciplinary actions and shall be appealable to the personnel appeals board on grounds that a disability does not exist. The 60 calendar days notice

shall not be required when the employee requests and the appointing authority approves a shorter notice period.

- (2) For purposes of this rule, determinations of disability shall be made by an appointing authority only at the employee's written request or after obtaining a ((physician's)) written statement from a physician or a licensed mental health professional. The appointing authority may require an employee to obtain a medical examination at agency expense from a physician or a licensed mental health professional of the agency's choice. In such cases, the agency shall provide the physician or licensed mental health professional with the specification for the employee's class and a description of the employee's position. Evidence may be requested from the physician or licensed mental health professional regarding the employee's ((physical)) ability to perform the specified duties.
- (3) At the time of notification that his/her employment will be terminated because of disability, the employee shall be informed by the appointing authority of the right to appeal. The appeal must be filed in writing to the personnel appeals board as provided in Title 358 WAC within 30 calendar days after notice of separation is given.
- (4) During the notice period required by ((paragraph)) subsection (1) of this section an employee being separated due to disability shall be counseled by the agency regarding benefits for which the employee may be eligible through employees' insurance plans, social security, worker's compensation, veteran's benefits, public assistance, disability retirement, vocational rehabilitation, and such other related programs as may be available.
- (5) The names of permanent employees who have been separated because of disability shall be placed on reduction in force and promotional registers by the director of personnel as provided in WAC 356-26-030 upon submission of a ((physician's)) statement from a physician or licensed mental health professional that they are ((physically)) able to perform the duties of the class(es) for which the registers are established.

AMENDATORY SECTION (Amending Order 177, filed 10/26/82)

WAC 356-42-055 ARBITRATION—GRIEV-ANCE—PROCEDURE. Whenever arbitration of a grievance is requested of the personnel board pursuant to an agreement as authorized by WAC 356-42-050(2), the procedure set forth below shall apply:

- (1) The request for arbitration shall be in the form of a complaint. It shall be filed on a form supplied by the personnel board, or in a writing containing the same information as required on the form within thirty calendar days from the date the director of personnel or designee indicates in writing that the mediation is at impasse. The request shall state the following:
- (a) The name, address and telephone number of the party filing the request, and the name, address and telephone number of any principal representative.

- (b) The name, address and telephone number of the opposing party, and, if known, the opposing party's principal representative.
- (c) Clear and concise statements of the facts upon which the grievance is based, including times, dates, places and participants in occurrences.
- (d) A listing of the applicable sections of the collective bargaining agreement, rules, policies, etc., upon which the grievance is based and which are claimed to be violated. A copy of the collective bargaining agreement or of the pertinent sections of the agreement shall be attached to the request for arbitration.
 - (e) A statement of the relief sought.
- (f) The signature and, if any, the title of the person filing the request for arbitration.
- (2) By mutual agreement the parties to the grievance may extend the thirty-day time frame for requesting arbitration established in subsection (1) of this section. Agreements to extend the time frame shall be reported in writing by the parties to the director of personnel.
- (3) A copy of the original grievance and copies of subsequent written statements of the grievance and the agency's written responses dated prior to submission of the grievance to mediation shall be attached to the request for arbitration.
- $((\frac{3}{3}))$ (4) The personnel board's hearings coordinator shall review the request for arbitration to determine compliance with subsection (1) of this section. If the personnel board's hearings coordinator determines the request to be incomplete, he or she shall notify the person filing the request of the portions of the request which need to be supplemented or changed to comply with subsection (1) of this section. When the personnel board's hearings coordinator is satisfied that the request substantially complies with subsection (1) of this section he or she shall mail, or otherwise cause to be served, the request on the opposing party(ies). Any refusal by the personnel board's hearings coordinator to serve the request for arbitration on the opposing party is reviewable by the personnel board upon motion of the requesting party.
- (((4))) (5) Within twenty days of service of the request for arbitration, or within such longer period as the personnel board may allow, the party receiving the same shall answer the allegations of fact and contentions set forth in the request by admitting, denying, or setting forth doubt as to the truth of or falsity of any particular alleged fact or contention. The answer shall be filed with the personnel board and served on the grievant, or, if represented, on the grievant's representative, all within the time provided. Failure to answer an allegation of fact within the time required, or admission of a fact in the answer, shall constitute a waiver by the answering party of the right to contest the fact in the arbitration proceeding, unless for good cause shown, the personnel board provides otherwise. At the discretion of the personnel board for good cause shown, the request or the answer may be amended at any time prior to the end of the arbitration hearing.
- (((5))) (6) After receipt of the answer, or if no answer is timely filed, the personnel board's hearings coordinator shall set the matter for arbitration. At least twenty

days notice shall be given of the time and date of the arbitration unless both parties agree to a shorter time.

(((6))) (7) The grievant shall have the burden of proof and shall go forward with the evidence.

- (5) The editors of student newspapers shall be protected from arbitrary suspension and removal because of student, faculty, administrative or community disapproval of editorial policy or content.
- (6) The editors shall be subject to removal only upon violation of the "Code of Newspaper Ethics" as interpreted by the guidelines as adopted by the board of publications or for violations of laws. The decision for removal is subject to review by the campus president.

- (1) A person who has issued to him or her a degree of doctor of dental medicine or doctor of dental surgery by a ((foreign)) non-accredited dental school listed by the World Health Organization, or by a non-accredited ((foreign)) dental school approved by the board of examiners, shall be eligible to take the examination given by the board in the theory and practice of the science of dentistry upon furnishing all of the following:
- (a) ((A-c))Certified cop((y))ies of dental school diplomas.
 - (b) Official dental school transcripts.

(c) Proof of identification by an appropriate governmental agency; provided, however, that alternate arrangements may be made for political refugees.

- d) Effective February 1, 1985, satisfactory evidence of the successful completion of at least two additional predoctoral or post-doctoral academic years of dental school education at a dental school approved pursuant to WAC 308-40-101(1) and a certification by the dean of that school that the candidate has achieved the same level of didactic and clinical competence as expected of a graduate of that school.
- (((2) Examination by the board of a foreign trained dental applicant shall be a progression examination given in English in the following sequence:
- (a) Passing scores on national board examinations, parts I and II.
- (b) Satisdfactory performance on a preclinical examination in all portions of the restorative examination. This portion will be completed on a typodont.
- (c) Satisfactory performance on a clinical examination required of all candidates for dental licensure including the prosthetic/oral diagnosis and treatment planning examination.))
- (2) Upon completion of the requirements in (1), an applicant under this section will be allowed to take the examination pursuant to WAC 308-40-102 and will be subject to the applicable provisions of WAC 308-40-101; PROVIDED, HOWEVER, That individuals who had fulfilled the requirements for application prior to the requirement of (1)(d) and who have applied by January 31, 1985, may be allowed one opportunity to pass the clinical (practical) examination in 1985.
- (((3) That licensure examination for foreign trained dental applicants shall be held by the board at least once a year with such additional examinations as the board desires to hold. The time and place of the examination shall be fixed by the board at least six months prior to the date that the examination is to be held.))

STATEMENT OF PURPOSE

Title and Number of Rule Sections: WAC 232-28-61401 Amendment to 1985 Washington game fish seasons and catch limits-Lake Washington and Wenatchee Lake; and 232-28-61402 Amendment to 1985 Washington game fish seasons and catch limits— Deep Lake (Thurston County).

Statutory Authority: RCW 77.12.040.

Specific Statute that Rule is Intended to Implement: RCW 77.12.040.

Summary of the Rule: WAC 232-28-61401, kokanee (landlocked sockeye salmon) are under the jurisdiction of Washington Department of Game while sockeye salmon are the responsibility of Washington Department of Fisheries. Length information indicates that those fish taken in the fishery under 20" are kokanee while those over are sockeye; and WAC 232-28-61402, delays the general fishing season opener from April 15 to May 25, 1985.

Reasons Supporting the Proposed Rule(s): WAC 232-28-61401, for effective management of each type of fish, different management strategies are required and anglers need to differentiate between kokanee and sockeye; and WAC 232-28-61402, Deep Lake has become an important rearing area for juvenile coho salmon due to fry plants made immediately below the outlet by the Department of Fisheries. The objective of these and other similar plants in the Chehalis system is restoration of self-sustaining, natural coho runs. When Deep Lake

opened for its normal trout fishery in mid-April of 1983, large numbers of coho salmon smolts were inadvertently harvested or lost to the effects of hooking and handling mortalities. A delay in the trout season opening date until late May will still provide a viable trout fishery, but at a time when the coho smolts have vacated the area by migrating seaward. The Department of Game will have to absorb additional costs for the holding of catchablesized trout for a later release date. In addition, the lake's basic management intent will have to be converted from trout-only to mixed species management. Since either 1+ or 0+ juvenile coho will be present the entire year, the lake cannot be rehabilitated with rotenone to control nonsalmonid species that compete with and/or feed upon small trout. Trout fry plants will be discontinued due to the expectation of poor survival and an associate low benefit to cost ratio.

(4) It is unlawful for a person receiving a special hunting season permit for mountain sheep to apply for another permit for that species if they are successful in taking a mountain sheep. A person who receives a special permit for mountain sheep and is unsuccessful in taking a sheep may reapply after waiting for five years. A person applying for a permit during that period will be disqualified for an additional five years, in addition to any other penalty provided by law.

(5) It is unlawful for a person receiving a moose permit to apply for

another permit for that species.

(1) Black bear.

(a) No dogs are permitted out of the vehicle, including on a strikeboard, outside of the designated hunting area. If the bear is started inside a permit area, it may be pursued and killed outside the permit boundaries.

(b) When a bear is taken, the permittee shall skin the entire bear, including head, leaving claws attached, and deliver the hide, together with the first tooth behind the canine tooth on the lower jaw to the regional office. All bear hides taken pursuant to a black bear damage permit shall be disposed of as prescribed in RCW 77.12.240.

(c) Within 5 days after expiration of a black bear permit, the permittee shall return to the respective region a bear hunting report and the windshield identification cards. Failure to comply with this provision shall constitute ineligibility for the next year's black bear damage permit drawings.

(d) The permittee shall abide by all conditions as set forth on the black bear damage permit. Failure to comply with these hunting conditions shall constitute a violation of RCW 77.16.020(1) (Hunting

bear during closed season).
(2) Deer and elk.

(a) Only persons with a damage permit are allowed to hunt and take one deer or one elk as designated on their damage control permit.

(b) If a hunter takes an animal of the same species during an earlier hunt, that person will be ineligible for a damage hunt permit.

(c) Deer and elk damage control hunts will be antlerless only unless specified eithersex on the damage permit.

(d) The April 1 to June 30 time period will be excluded from damage control hunts.

(e) Permittees may hunt only within the prescribed area and season dates as specified on their permit. If a deer or elk is wounded inside the damage hunt area, it may be pursued and taken outside permit boundaries.

(f) Within five days after expiration of a deer or elk permit, the permittee shall return to the respective region a deer/elk hunting report. If an animal is taken, the permittee shall skin the entire animal and deliver the hide together with an incisor tooth to a Regional Game Department Office. All deer or elk hides taken pursuant to a damage permit shall be disposed of as prescribed in RCW 77.12.240. Failure to comply with this provision shall constitute ineligibility for the next year's damage permit drawings.

WAC 220-44-05000L COASTAL BOTTOMFISH CATCH LIMITS. Notwithstanding the provisions of WAC 220-44-050, effective 12:01 a.m. November 28, 1984, it is unlawful to possess, transport through the waters of the state, or land in any Washington state port bottomfish taken for commercial purposes from Coastal Marine Fish-Shellfish Management and Catch Reporting Areas 58B, 59A, 59B, 60A, 61, 62, or 63 in excess of the amounts or less than the minimum sizes shown below for the species indicated:

(1) Widow rockfish (Sebastes entomelas) - Closed. It is unlawful to possess widow rockfish taken for commercial purposes.

(2) Shortbelly rockfish (Sebastes jordani) and Idiot Rockfish (Sebastolobus spp.) – no maximum poundage per vessel trip; no minimum size.

- (3) Pacific ocean perch (Sebastes alutus) 5,000 pounds or 20 percent of total weight of fish on board, whichever is less, per vessel trip, no minimum size in Areas 58B, 59A and 59B. Areas 60A, 61, 62 or 63 are closed to the taking of Pacific ocean perch.
- (4) All other species of rockfish (Sebastes spp.) -7,500 pounds of all other species combined per vessel trip per calendar week, defined as Sunday through the following Saturday, except that a fisherman having made a declaration of intent, may make one landing of no more than 15,000 pounds of all other species combined per vessel trip biweekly, defined as Sunday through the second Saturday following. The declaration of intent to fish biweekly must be mailed or delivered to the Department of Fisheries, 115 General Administration Building, Olympia, WA 98504, and must be postmarked at least seven days prior to the beginning of biweekly fishing. The declaration of intent to fish biweekly must contain the name and address of the fisherman, the name and registration number of the vessel, the date on which biweekly fishing will commence, and must be signed and dated by the fisherman. The fisherman may return to the one vessel trip per calendar week fishing at the beginning of any month by filing a declaration of intent to stop biweekly fishing with the department in the above manner. The declaration to stop biweekly fishing and begin one vessel trip per calendar week fishing must be made at least seven days prior to the beginning of the month in which the one vessel trip per calendar week fishing will resume. It is unlawful for any vessel to make more than one landing in excess of 3,000 pounds of other rockfish species in any calendar week.
- (5) Sablefish minimum size 22 inches in length, unless dressed in which case minimum size 16 inches in length from the anterior insertion of the first dorsal fin to the tip of the tail, except that an incidental catch less

than the minimum size of 5,000 pounds is allowed; no vessel trip restrictions.

- (6) It is unlawful during unloading of the catch and prior to its being weighed or leaving the unloading facility to intermix with any other species a species or category of bottomfish having a vessel trip limit.
- (7) For purposes of this section, a vessel trip is defined as having occurred upon the initiation of transfer of catch from the fishing vessel, and all fish aboard the vessel are considered part of the vessel trip limit at the initiation of transfer of catch.

*Area 12C excluding that portion south of a line from Cushman powerhouse to Ayres Point – Closed except gill nets using 6-inch minimum mesh may fish from 4:00 PM to 8:00 AM Monday night, November 26 through the morning of November 27, and purse seines using the 5-inch strip may fish from 5:00 AM to 8:00 PM Monday, November 26.
